Eighth Night of Jewish Learning Celebrated at Beth El Synagogue

On November 18, the Westchester Board of Rabbis and the Westchester Jewish Council presented their Eighth Night of Jewish Learning,

led by 24 rabbis from all over Westchester County, at Beth El Synagogue Center in New Rochelle. The evening began with Havdalah (end of the Shabbos Celebration), presented by the chair of the program, Rabbi Joshua Strom from Congregation B'nai Yisrael in Armonk and Beth El Synagogue Center Cantor Gaby Schvartz.

Two of the presentations given were by rabbis from Port Chester and Briarcliff. In his presentation, "Reform, Orthodox and Conservative Judaism, How Did We Get Here?"

And these are the names of the children of Israel

As we begin the secular new year, Jews around the world will also begin reading from the second book of the Torah, Sefer Sh'mot (The Book of Exodus); directly translated as The Book of Names. This second book of the Torah describes the fate of the Jewish people in the Diaspora. It begins by renaming all the children of Jacob who have travelled to Egypt to avoid a famine and to join their brother, Joseph. Rashi teaches that this repetition of names is a sign of endearment; it reinforces God's love for Israel by reciting each name and God compares them to the stars in the sky that continue to shine brightly.

Once in Egypt, the children of Jacob put roots down in the plush land of Goshen, build and create their homes, and settle in for an extended period. Yet, their neighbors consider them strangers and aliens, as if they just arrived. The Israelites live and eat separately from the Egyptians. While they try to keep their ways, it is difficult being surrounded by other cultures and beliefs. They are truly living in the Diaspora – away from all familiar rituals and practices and without control of their destiny.

Then, "a new king arose over Egypt who did not know Joseph (Exodus 1:8)." The Israelites find themselves undergoing a cataclysmic change. A new regime perceives them to be a potential threat and fears that in the event of a war, the Israelites would join Egypt's enemies rather than join them as allies. Rambam suggests that Pharaoh began his campaign against the Israelites for strategic and economic reasons. Pharaoh's government was weak and identifying Israel as the scape goat gave the masses something to rally behind. The Egyptians profited from Jewish slave labor and the Pharoah's popularity increased.

Nehama Leibowitz blames the Israelites for not protesting Pharoah's decision to enslave them. She says that the Israelites were without heroes, without those who were brave enough to stand before Pharoah and say no to his oppression. There was no resistance, no battle for their rights. As a result, Pharoah easily did away with their freedoms and enslaved them.

As we enter the secular new year, I have been thinking about the dramatic increase in Antisemitic incidents following the October 7th Hamas Massacre. "From white supremacists in California displaying antisemitic banners on highway overpasses to radical anti-Zionists harassing Jewish people because of their real or perceived support for the Jewish state, we are witnessing a disturbing rise in antisemitic activity here while the war rages overseas," said Jonathan Greenblatt, ADL CEO. Evocative false statements about what the Jewish people are at fault for have returned to mainstream media like nothing we have seen or heard of since Europe in the 1940's.

But unlike the Israelites in Egypt, we will continue to fight back and not stand idly by. The Jewish people refuse to be the world's scapegoats. Instead, we will stand proudly as Jews and continue to share our light with the world. Just a few weeks ago, 30 young children from CSI spent the morning painting *mezzuzot* so they can proudly display their Jewish presence on the front doors of their homes. While recognizing that CSI is filled with a diverse set of views and perspectives on the war in Israel, we are united as a Jewish people, and we stand proudly and bravely together. We are proud to be Jewish and will continue to share that sentiment at CSI and with the world.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Mark J. Rosenberg



CSI's long-time commitment to *tikkun olam*, our obligation to repair the world, is one of the things that makes me so proud of our community. Over the years, our *tikkun olam* efforts have taken the form of Passover food drives, Midnight Runs to bring food and clothing to the homeless, resettling refugee families, food drives to restock the Ossining Food Pantry, organizing Christmas dinners and providing the homeless with a warm place to sleep. In late January, members of our community, including Nursery School and Religious School students will be preparing meals to be distributed to the homeless in our area.

Our efforts to repair the world are not limited to the Jewish community. Rather they are targeted to the community in general, that is, anyone in need. Sometimes, we cook and distribute meals at churches. That is typically not because we are working with that church. Rather, we are simply using the church's facilities, which are not bound by the strictures of *kashrut* and are in the places where most of the people in need in our local community are located. When we run these events, they are open to all who are hungry regardless of religion.

Since October 7 and the resulting antisemitism in our country, there has been a desire among some to turn inward, to shut out those who are not members of the lewish community. While I share the frustration with the many non-Jews, including clergy, who have been less than supportive during these trying times, we must also recognize and be grateful for the many members of our local community who have supported us in many ways. Community members such as the Reverend Tim Ives of the Scarborough Presbyterian Church, who immediately reached out to Rabbi Rosenberg on October 7 and has been a supportive presence since then, the local Italian restaurant which prominently placed a large Menorah on its bar and our friends and neighbors who have repeatedly checked in with us and made clear that they have no tolerance for antisemitism.

I believe that turning inward is self-defeating. As Jews, we are a small minority in this country. Working with outside groups and helping those in need outside of our immediate Jewish community helps foster relationships which integrate us into the greater society, shatter stereotypes and deter prejudice. As *Mishneh Torah* teaches, "we provide sustenance and clothing for the poor of the gentiles together with the poor of the Jewish people as an expression of the ways of peace."

Just as we reach out to our greater community, we also work to grow and support all of the components of the CSI community. Adult programing has, and always will be one of CSI's strengths. Now, moving forward, we are working to support the younger members of our community as well by creating programs targeted towards young families and children. Over the last few months, we have added new programs that cater to young families as well as intergenerational programs that foster fun, learning and connectivity. These include the challah baking class, which was attend by 130 people ranging in age from 2 to 90, and the Shabanukka dinner, which began with a tot shabbat that was followed by a dinner attended by all and concluded with Kabbalat Shabbat for the adults. These events provide opportunities for members of all generations to interact, get to know each other and form relationships. In other words, they build a community and repair our world.

FEEDING THE UNHOUSED IN OUR AREA:

It is a given that each of us is grateful for shelter and food. For many right here in our community, neither of these things are available on a regular basis, or at all.

CSI, along with the other members of the Briarcliff/Ossining Ministerial Association, is once again stepping up to assist those who are unhoused in our area.

You may remember that pre-covid we prepared meals and hosted unhoused adults overnight at CSI. This year we are committed to meals only. Those for whom we prepare meals will be sleeping at Grace Episcopal Church in Ossining.

From Monday, 1/29, through Sunday, 2/4, CSI has committed to provide three meals each day for up to 20 unhoused men. The exact number will be provided as we get closer to our scheduled dates.

This program requires a lot of volunteers to take on various responsibilities in a tried-and-true system. No need to reinvent the wheel, we are confident about how to make it work!

Our 2023 season concluded with the harvesting of a handful of hardy kale in late December. Our community garden has been put to bed with a blanket of fresh wood chips to (hopefully) reduce weed growth in the aisles. We'll be similarly wrapping things up in the main field as mother nature allows.

Special thanks go out to all who supported us this season making purchases at our farm stand, donating to the Organic Farm Fund and volunteering to assist with the many chores. Stats, as of December 14th, include a total harvest of 3,957 lbs. of produce. 43% was donated to either the Lifting Up Westchester Soup Kitchen or the Congregation Kol Ami Food Pantry. The bulk of the balance was sold at our farm stand and the Opportunity Shop or used for CSI activities. In addition, our chicken flock benefited from the produce that wasn't deemed of sufficient quality to sell or donate. Combined with the leftovers from the kitchen, I'd guess that CSI's chickens are some of the best fed in Westchester!

Our expanded nature path and picnic area are still a welcome distraction on a warm winter day. Comments or suggestions are always welcomed. See you on the farm!

FROM THE NURSERY SCHOOL DIRECTOR Naomi Elyachar



Allow me to share a bit about the magic of being a two-year-old at CSI Nursery School. Being two comes with many challenges children this age have rudimentary language and motor skills, prefer to be with their own parents or caregivers, and need a lot of assistance to complete tasks. For most people, taking care of one two-year-old for a morning can feel overwhelming, let alone a classroom full of two-year-olds. Luckily for our nursery school students in the Acorn and Sprout Rooms, our 2's teachers understand the beauty of this age. Rather than seeing the limitations of working with this age group, our teachers cultivate a two-year-old's growing abilities and endless curiosity.

Many of our 2's students begin the school year with a bit of timidity and separation anxiety. This is often their first experience being dropped off somewhere. Our teachers create warm classroom environments to help our youngest students feel comfortable and establish consistent routines to instill confidence in them. Two-year-olds are used to a world where they constantly hear, "don't touch that", "not safe", and "no," so we want our 2's classrooms to be a place where they are told, "try this," "here you go," and "yes!"

Our 2's curriculum is very sensory focused. Nearly every week, the Acorn and Sprout Rooms bake challah or another snack. This experience gives them an opportunity to pour, mix, knead, twist, and finally taste. This type of experience leans into their curiosity and sense of wonder as they see the way ingredients can change when mixed together and cooked, and it also helps build skills such as counting, waiting to take a turn, and teamwork.

Our teachers take time to notice their students' interests and lean into them. The Sprout Room loves to see the birds out their classroom window, so the teachers gathered materials to make bird feeders. The children each took part in the sensory experience of greasing and rolling pinecones through bird food before hanging

these bird feeders on a nearby tree. They have the opportunity to regularly check on the bird feeders to notice how much is gone, and even sometimes catch a glimpse of a bird eating from them! The teachers took pictures of every step of this process and created a classroom story. The book helps promote language as the children frequently read the book and talk about this shared experience.

A walk down CSI's hallway to the 2's classrooms will reveal even more about the rich experiences happening in those rooms. Their artwork is always beautifully displayed on their bulletin boards. They have opportunities to paint and draw with different tools, in different ways, and on different media. Photographs of the children engaged in creating the work are often displayed alongside the artwork so onlookers can see the art process. The children's artwork is the product of what happens in the classrooms, but they are truly just one element of the many learning experiences happening every morning at school.

Our teachers help create magical moments for our two-year-olds because they know how to encourage their students' natural abilities and curiosity. I hope these examples explained above shed some light on the complexity and thoughtfulness behind every activity done in the 2's classrooms. When you're two in our nursery school, cooking is more than mixing a few ingredients together, a bird feeder is much more than hanging a pinecone from a tree, and a painting is more than just the piece of artwork hanging on a bulletin board. Each morning at school is filled with activities that build connections and help children understand the world around them and their place in it. We love watching these young children learn and grow throughout the year.







Building Bridges in Our Community

A new year brings new opportunities for *Tikkun Olam* in our very own neighborhood, as the Bethany Arts Center in Ossining gears up for its latest Black History Month exhibit, which will feature, in part, collaboration locally and nationally between the Black and Jewish communities.

Did you know that in 1908, it was Congregation Sons of Israel that sold the new pastor of Star of Bethlehem Church the land for his home, at below market value? Or that in the early 20th century, a Jewish businessman named Julius Rosenwald partnered with Booker T. Washington to construct over 5,000 schools for Black children?

Motivated by an increase in anti-semitic sentiment in local schools, Joyce Sharrock-Cole, Town of Ossining Historian, is curating an immersive experience at Bethany (February 1st through March 8th, 2024) that will include a replica of one of the Rosenwald schools and a history of our very own Congregation Sons of Israel. Joyce needs our help to deepen the impact of her mission, particularly among the youth in our community.




