Deadlines for the Shofar are on the 16th of the month **prior** to the new edition coming out; except if it falls on Shabbat or a Jewish holiday.

New Year's Resolutions always fascinate me. "I will lose weight", "I will exercise more", "I will volunteer more of my time" and "I will reach out to friends more" are common ones. What is special about the change to a new year that elicits such a strong desire to change things up? Why is it that December 31st at midnight is so different than any other day at midnight? 



About the Book



1863: In a small Creole cottage in New Orleans, an ingenious young Black woman named Stella embroiders intricate maps on repurposed cloth to help enslaved men flee and join the Union Army. Bound to a man who would kill her if he knew of her clandestine activities, Stella has to hide not only her efforts but her love for William, a Black soldier and a brilliant musician.

Meanwhile, in New York City, a Jewish woman stitches a quilt for her husband, who is stationed in Louisiana with the Union Army. Between abolitionist meetings, Lily rolls bandages and crafts quilts with her sewing circle for other soldiers, too, hoping for their safe return home. But when months go by without word from her husband, Lily resolves to make the perilous journey South to search for him.

As these two women risk everything for love and freedom during the brutal Civil War, their paths converge in New Orleans, where an unexpected encounter leads them to discover that even the most delicate threads have the capacity to save us. Loosely inspired by the authors' family histories, this stunning novel will stay with readers for a long time.

The Book of Lost Names by Kristin Harmel

STIN HARMEL About the Book

Eva Traube Abrams, a semi-retired librarian in Florida, is shelving books one morning when her eyes lock on a photograph in a magazine lying open nearby. She freezes; it's an image of a book she hasn't seen in sixty-five years—a book she recognizes as *The Book of Lost Names*.

The accompanying article discusses the looting of libraries by the Nazis across Europe during World War II—an experience Eva remembers well—and the search to reunite people with the texts taken from them so long ago. The book in the photograph, an eighteenth-century religious text thought to have been taken from France in the waning days of the

war, is one of the most fascinating cases. Now housed in Berlin's Zentral- und Landesbibliothe library, it appears to contain some sort of code, but researchers don't know where it came from—or what the code means.

Only Eva holds the answer—but will she have the strength to revisit old memories and help reunite those lost during the war?

As a graduate student in 1942, Eva was forced to flee Paris after the arrest of her father, a Polish Jew. Finding refuge in a small mountain town in the Free Zone, she begins forging identity documents for Jewish children fleeing to neutral Switzerland. But erasing people comes with a price, and along with a mysterious, handsome forger named Rémy, Eva decides she must find a way to preserve the real names of the children who are too young to remember who they really are. The records they keep in *The Book of Lost Names* will become even more vital when the resistance cell they work for is betrayed and Rémy disappears.




The Thread Collectors by Shauma Edwards and Alyson Richman 1863: In a small Creole cottage in New Orleans, an ingenious young Black woman named Stella embroiders intricate maps on repurposed cloth to help enslaved men flee and join the Union Army. Bound to a man who would kill her if he knew of her clandestine activities, Stella has to hide not only her efforts but her love for William, a Black soldier and a brilliant musician.

Meanwhile, in New York City, a Jewish woman stitches a quilt for her husband, who is stationed in Louisiana with the Union Army. Between abolitionist meetings, Lily rolls bandages and crafts quilts with her sewing circle for other soldiers, too, hoping for their safe return home. But when months go by without word from her husband, Lily resolves to make the perilous journey South to search for him.

As these two women risk everything for love and freedom during the brutal Civil War, their paths converge in New Orleans, where an unexpected encounter leads them to discover that even the most delicate threads have the capacity to save us. Loosely inspired by the authors' family histories, this stunning novel will stay with readers for a long time.



About the Book

Eva Traube Abrams, a semi-retired librarian in Florida, is shelving books one morning when her eyes lock on a photograph in a magazine lying open nearby. She freezes; it's an image of a book she hasn't seen in sixty-five years—a book she recognizes as The Book of Lost Names.

The accompanying article discusses the looting of libraries by the Nazis across Europe during World War II—an experience Eva remembers well—and the search to reunite people with the texts taken from them so long ago. The book in the photograph, an eighteenth-century religious text thought to have been taken from France in the waning days of the war, is one of the most fascinating cases. Now housed in Berlin's Zentral- und Landesbibliothek library, it appears to contain some sort of code, but researchers don't know where it came from—or what the code means. Only Eva holds the answer—but will she have the strength to revisit old memories and help reunite those lost during the war?

As a graduate student in 1942, Eva was forced to flee Paris after the arrest of her father, a Polish Jew. Finding refuge in a small mountain town in the Free Zone, she begins forging identity documents for Jewish children fleeing to neutral Switzerland. But erasing people comes with a price, and along with a mysterious, handsome forger named Rémy, Eva decides she must find a way to preserve the real names of the children who are too young to remember who they really are. The records they keep in The Book of Lost Names will become even more vital when the resistance cell they work for is betrayed and Rémy disappears.


Who By Fire, Leonard Cohen in the Sinai, by Matti Friedman. Hot off the presses, a great book by the well-known Israeli author of such best sellers as The Aleppo Codex and Spies of No Country. It brings to life not only the little-known story of Leonard Cohen's visit to the Israeli front lines during the 1973 Yom Kippur war, but also the broader picture of the war itself and its lasting impact on Israelis. An absolute must-read for anyone who's a fan of the late singer/poet, as well as for anyone who cares about Israel.




Jewish Women's History from Antiquity to the Present is a rich collection of 21 essays by various authors analyzing the history of Jewish women through the ages. This is one of the textbooks used by Beth El's own treasure, Harriet Freidenreich, in a course she is currently teaching, called **Rethinking Jewish Women's History.** Classes meet at Beth El on Wednesdays at 10:00am. 
We Are Not Like Them, a novel by Christine Pride and Jo Piazza. Set in Philadelphia, this book tells the story two women, best friends since childhood, one black (Riley) and one white (Jen). Their friendship is tested when Jen's husband, who is a Philadelphia police officer, shoots an unarmed black teenager. Riley, who is a news anchor on a local TV station, "wrestles with the implications of this tragic incident for her Black community, her ambitions, and her relationship with her lifelong friend," according to the Amazon description. Recommended by our reviewers.



36 Righteous Men, a novel by Steven Pressfield. A dystopian murder mystery by the well-known author of action/adventure stories set in ancient Greece and Persia. The "MacGuffin" on which the plot turns and which makes the book interesting is the Jewish legend of the hidden Righteous Men, the 36 who protect the world from destruction. According to our reviewer, it's an entertaining page-turner for about three-quarters of the book, after which it gets into supernatural mumbo-jumbo that was not to our reviewer's taste. Overall, however, she believes it's good read.




Death of the Black Widow, by James Patterson and J. D. Barker. The latest thriller from the publishing empire that is James Patterson. No Jewish content; however, a fun read for fans of the genre. Our reviewer also recommends the brand new installment in the saga of Mossad agent Gabriel Allon, now retired. It's called **Portrait of an Unknown Woman,** by Daniel Silva. As usual, agent Allon wants nothing more than a quiet retirement, "when the eccentric London art dealer Julian Isherwood asks [him] to investigate the circumstances surrounding the rediscovery and lucrative sale of a centuries-old painting." As faithful Silva readers would expect, Allon "is [inevitably] drawn into a deadly game of cat and mouse where nothing is as it seems."





The Splendid and the Vile: A Saga of Churchill, Family, and Defiance During the Blitz, by Erik Larson. Another great read from the prolific non-fiction author of such gems as In the Garden of Beasts, Dead Wake, Devil in the White City, and many more. This volume deals mostly with Winston Churchill's actions during World War II. Highly recommended by our reviewer.



The U.S. and the Holocaust, a three-part documentary currently streaming on PBS. By weaving together heart-wrenching footage of individual tragedy and a few grace notes of uplifting survival, this documentary illuminates, story by story, the enormity and horror of the murder of six million Jews during WWII. There is also some overdue coverage of the efforts of anti-Semitic State Department officials to keep the truth of what was happening in Europe from reaching the American public and to sabotage efforts to rescue the refugees.

As part of our work with the Bucks County Interfaith Coalition for Refugee Resettlement, (BCICRR) several Congregation Beth El volunteers have been providing support for an Afghan family that fled Kabul last year when the country fell to the Taliban.

The four-year-old boy is now attending Head Start preschool in Morrisville five days a week from 9:00am - 2:50pm and is driven to school every day accompanied by his aunt. WE ARE IN NEED OF ADDITIONAL VOLUNTEERS TO DRIVE HIM, ESPECIALLY FOR PICK UP IN THE AFTERNOON! For afternoon driving, volunteers pick up the child's aunt at their apartment off Makefield Road, travel 5-7 minutes to the preschool to pick up the child and then drop them both off at home. The family provides a car seat. Criminal and child abuse background checks are very simple, quick to procession-line and are free. We have a Sign-Up Genius to organize the driving and volunteers sign up as their schedule allows.

Prior to Share Shabbat Dinner everyone used to take turns hosting dinners. They would get together at member's homes for break-the-fast, too. "Members became our family. We wouldn't only get together for Jewish Holidays. The Shul community became our extended family."

Cara was so proud of how Beth El came together when her father died and how they were able to have the funeral at Beth El. She felt that it was the perfect "send-off" for her father, who had put so much into Beth El.

Cara would like to see more opportunities for people to socialize and have fun together. She remembers having a casino night. 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

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
