Every year during Yom Kippur we are invited to consider the following questions:

- What are we?
- What is our life?
- What is our goodness?
- What is our righteousness?
- What is our achievement?
- What is our power?
- What are our victories?

We are not, however, given sufficient time during the service to actually contemplate them: the paragraph flies by during the repetitions of the Amidah, and the one time we are invited to read it for ourselves – during the private Amidah of Nei'ila at the end of the day – how many of us really pause during our prayers to ponder them?

What are we? – who are you as a human being? *What* are you as a human being? What is your role in life? How do you define yourself?

What is our life? – our goodness? – righteousness? – achievement? – power? – victory? These are all questions that – if explored sincerely – have the ability to improve our experience of life by putting it into context. People pay money to be asked these questions in therapeutic and self-improvement sessions – our Tradition invites us to do it for free.

Regular attendees of the daily minyan will recognize these questions from the first pages of our daily prayers. The rabbis must have been of the opinion that – in addition to the Day of Atonement – one could benefit by starting off one's day by pausing to consider one's purpose and place.

We are entering the *yamim nora'im*, the "Days of Awe" when we take an accounting of our lives. At least once a year, during services, I encourage you to take a moment to consider these questions. Or set aside some time during each week. Or even each day. Consider it a mode of meditation. Because we should all feel that we have had victories, moments of power, achievement, righteousness, and goodness. We should know what our life is, and what we are.

May we all be written and sealed for goodness in the Book of Life.

FJLC - Congregation Beth El's Religious School

Jews are known as the "people of the book" and the importance of education is deeply embedded in Jewish culture. From the time of the Torah, Mishna, and the Talmud we have been taught to question, ponder and sometimes even struggle with God. When did we learn this? For some it was stories we heard as kids, for others, it was texts studied as adults. The one thing we all had in common was that we had a teacher who loved to teach about Jewish tradition.

Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks z"l is quoted as saying, "Teachers open our eyes to the world. They give us curiosity and confidence. They teach us to ask questions. They connect us to our past and future. They're the guardians of our social heritage. We have lots of heroes today – sportsmen, supermodels, media personalities. They come, they have their fifteen minutes of fame, and they go. But the influence of good teachers stays with us. They are the people who really shape our life."

The wonderful thing about working in our Jewish religious school is that we get to see the light in our students' eyes, the wonder of learning, and we help our students struggle with important questions. Why do we blow the shofar, why do we fast, why shake the etrog, why light the candles, why be Jewish? Without Jewish educators our kids (and the whole world) lose that love of questioning and the spark of Jewish joy.

Last year in our program, we focused on the joy and fun of Judaism. This year we are going to focus on ritual, tradition, and community, in addition to the joy of being Jewish.

We want to integrate the Beth El community into our activities. This summer some of our FJLC students met at the Borsht Belt restaurant and Sandie Hirsch told us about the resorts and entertainers at the places in the Catskills. None of our kids had ever heard about these popular Jewish summer resorts and they asked great questions as we were surrounded by memorabilia of the Borsht Belt. This was Jewish education in action and we all realized Jewish education does not start and stop in the classroom. The Beth El community is not just about going to services and celebrating holidays, it is also about everyone teaching and learning together. That is the essence of Jewish Education.

We have some great experiences we want to share with both the school and the community. Please come to Pizza in the Hut in October, Munchies, Mocktail and Movies in December, our mock wedding in February, and Iron Chef Matza in April. We have some more activities that we are planning, but they are secret. Shhh!
