## Speak to the Children of Israel

One might wonder what was going on in Moses' mind, the twenty-seven times he was commanded to "Speak to the Children of Israel."

If Moses was like most people - according to G. Robert Jacks in Getting the Word Across: Speech Communication for Pastors and Lay Leaders - he was probably worried about making a mistake and feeling foolish.

As Jerry Seinfeld famously observed, "According to most studies, people's number one fear is public speaking. Number two is death. Death is number two. Does that sound right? This means to the average person, if you go to a funeral, you're better off in the casket than doing the eulogy."

So how might have Moses overcome his concerns? Jacks suggests that the default list of concerns, when speaking or reading in public are, in priority, myself, my audience, and my message:

1. My first concern is myself: will I make any mistakes, mispronunciations in my reading? Will I look foolish?
2. My second concern is my audience: when I make those mistakes or mispronunciations, what will they think of me? Will they think that I am a fool?
3. My final concern is my message, and at this point we need to be honest (as I learned from John Oliver): if a concern isn't number one or number two on a priority list, it isn't really a priority.

This may go some way to explaining why, when people read aloud in English at services - or at the Passover Seder - they sometimes tend not to do so with any great enthusiasm, expression, or interest, which defeats the entire purpose of speaking in public: to get a message across to whomever may be listening.

Jacks suggests inverting the list of priorities, as follows:

1. My first concern should be my message: this is the purpose of my communication, the reason I am speaking or reading in front of other people, to get my message across.
2. My second concern should be my audience: this is also the purpose of my communication, because without an audience, to whom am I getting my message across?
3. My third concern (and therefore not really a priority) could be myself, but at this point I should be unconcerned: if I have focused on getting my message across to my audience, does it really matter if I made any mistakes along the way?

I mention this because this next month you may find yourself seated at a Passover Seder and called upon to read. My advice is to treat this as an opportunity, to read the words as if they are a gift from God, a precious treasure you are privileged to share with others, the ritual text that keeps our people from generation to generation. Like Moses before you, it is your turn to Speak to the Children of Israel.

## What is "good" Hebrew school?

Does it have to be a big school with many students? Does it need to be in a big building? Does it have to have a large budget? Does it need a huge staff? Not really. What really counts is results. Helping kids learn how to lead a Jewish life. Getting them inspired and proud of their Jewish heritage. Instilling a feeling of kinship with other Jews. Developing a connection to the State of Israel as our Jewish homeland. And internalizing the Jewish values of honest dealing and mutual respect that underlie Judaism.

At FJLC, our goal is to give each and every one of our kids the awareness and interest to continue Jewish learning, along with the skills to live a Jewish life. That's why we teach the things you would expect from a Hebrew school, such as Jewish holidays, prayer, Hebrew, history, and traditions. But look closely at our curriculum and you'll find that we go deeper than that. You'll find what I think of as Jewish soul. As academic director, my aim is to help grow a love of Judaism and the rest will follow.

Part of Jewish soul-building is giving kids Jewish experiences that will stick in their brains and in their hearts. At FJLC, we do more than just talk about Jewishness, we help kids see and experience it for themselves.

This includes building relationships with other Jews - other peers, other family members, and others in our Congregation. If WE want our kids to be proud Jews, the first step is connecting them to our Jewish community here at Beth El.

We partnered with JPhilly and participate in a program to have our students interact and improve the relationship with others in our community. We will be asking for volunteers of all ages to come to our program and talk to our students one on one. They are called "grandfriends" but anyone who loves Judaism and wants to pass that love to the upcoming generation is welcome.

Charitable giving is an essential aspect for many households. We often tend to write a check to our preferred charity without giving it much thought. However, this method may not always be the most beneficial for tax planning purposes. There are several ways to donate to Beth El or any other charity. Over the next few weeks, the financial committee plans to share with you some strategies that can help you support your charities while maximizing the benefits for you and your household.

This week's strategy is called a donor-advised fund. You may consider this option if you are not getting a tax benefit for your donations through Schedule A on your tax return because you are taking the standard deduction.

Another reason to consider a donor-advised fund is if you have a large amount of income in one tax year and would like to make a more significant donation in one year for the deduction while spreading the donations over a few years.

There are various ways to make contributions to a donor-advised fund. The easiest method is by writing a check and funding it with cash. Another popular option is to donate appreciated stocks to the fund. We will be sharing more about the benefits of donating appreciated stock shortly. Other assets can also be used to fund the donor-advised fund, but the two listed are the most common.

Attached is a document that provides an in-depth explanation of the donor-advised fund. We would suggest you consider consulting with your financial advisor or tax preparer to determine whether a donor-advised fund would benefit your situation. Please get in touch with the Beth El office for guidance if you do not have a financial advisor or tax preparer. They can refer you to one of our members who is knowledgeable about the donor-advised fund and can help you understand how it works.



## Americans donate billions to charity annually. continued

If you give to charity, you need to know about one of the best tools to facilitate generosity: DonorAdvised Funds (DAFs).

DAFs date from the 1930s but did not become popular until the 1990s. DAFs act as vehicles for receiving gifts, often of appreciated stock, and then distributing cash grants to charities selected by the one making the donation. DAFs make the process of transferring appreciated stock and designating checks as simple as a bank's bill-paying system.

All DAF donors receive a tax deduction on the date of transfer. You can also transfer stock during one calendar year and receive a deduction even if the DAF completes distribution of grant money to a charity in a subsequent year. According to Internal Revenue Service rules, you calculate the value of your donation and the resulting fixed deduction based on the average of the high and the low market price on the day of transfer. (You are responsible for computing this value.)

After receipt, the stock you gifted is sold and the DAF, itself a charity, pays no tax on any capital gain realized. The proceeds may remain in cash or you may direct the DAF to invest those assets for potential further appreciation (usually in a professionally managed separate account).

Any subsequent change in the value of the account does not change the amount you can deduct on your taxes.

As the donor, you direct to which charities the DAF distributes assets. Officially, the DAF owns the assets and is not legally bound to use them as you direct, but it is exceedingly rare for a DAF to not follow the donor's advice.

Most DAFs also maintain a database of 501(c)(3) tax-exempt charities (based on those organizations' IRS 990 filing) from which you chose. After you suggest an amount to gift and a charity to receive the gift, the DAF vets and processes your suggestion to ensure the organization qualifies as a public charity under the IRS code. DAFs also handle all record keeping and due diligence and can protect your identity if you want to give anonymously.

## Examining Donor-Advised Funds

Donor-advised funds are the fastest growing charitable giving vehicle in the United States, with more than 269,000 donor-advised accounts holding over $\$ 78$ billion in assets. To put that in perspective, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has about $\$ 39.6$ billion in assets.

Besides consider a DAF, here are other ways to make your charitable giving more significant:

Focus your effort. Passionate giving is more sustainable than spreading donations to every good cause or everyone who asks. Consider focusing your donations to just a few charities. Think through why you are giving and what you feel passionate about.

Find bang for the buck. Fund programs that produce the greatest effect for the least money and focus on long-term positive outcomes.

Include the next generation. You can include your children in the giving process or even help them gift some of their own money.

## Culture and Cream Cheese <br> Items Discussed on February 4, 2024



The Bridal Chair, by Gloria Goldreich, is historical fiction "based on true facts," as they say. It tells the story of the great Jewish painter, Marc Chagall, through the eyes of his only child, Ida Chagall. The action takes place mostly in Paris, as WWII breaks out, threatening the survival of Jews everywhere. However, Chagall, believing that his reputation and greatness make him immune to danger, resists the urging of his daughter to flee. (Spoiler alert: Chagall survived WWII. He died, just short of his $98^{\text {th }}$ birthday, in 1985.) Our reviewer, who really liked the book, recommends reading it side-by-side with a volume of Chagall's paintings.


God and Politics in Esther, by Yoram Hazony. With Purim approaching, this is a timely, and highly recommended, non-fiction read. It offers a penetrating interpretation of the well-known biblical story and, in the process, provides a thoughtful analysis of the nature of political action that retains its relevance twenty-five hundred years after the creation of the original story. If you are interested in the Book of Esther, or in our contemporary war against anti-Semitism, or both, you'll enjoy this book.


The Covenant of Water, by Abraham Vergese. No Jewish content but a great book by the author of Cutting for Stone. A multigenerational saga set in the southwest Indian state of Kerala, it will teach you about an exotic locale; it will introduce you to an entirely different and fascinating culture; it will sing in your ears and tug at your heartstrings. At 736 pages, it is a long book and you will be sorry to see it end.


The Color of Love, by Marra B. Gad. This is an autobiographical memoir. The author was born in April 1970, in New York, to an unwed, white Jewish mother and an unnamed, black non-Jewish father. Three days later, she was adopted by a Jewish family in Chicago, who provided her with a loving Jewish home. Growing up, she had to navigate a world in which some people are racist, some anti-Semitic, some both. The author believes her perspective is unique, which is not necessarily true. However, her recollections are worth a read.

## Rosenwald Schools Educated Generations of Black

 Americans, a feature story currently airing on CNN. Julius Rosenwald, born in 1862, was a first-generation Jewish American businessman and philanthropist. He rose to become CEO of Sears, Roebuck and Co. In 1917, he established the Rosenwald Fund, which launched, among its other activities, a rural school building program that was eventually responsible for the construction in the South of more than 5,000 schools and shops for African-American children, as well as homes for their teachers. These schools became informally known as Rosenwald Schools.

Her Hidden Genius, by Marie Benedict. Historical fiction about Rosalind Franklin, who was born in 1920, in London, to a wealthy Jewish family. She earned a PhD in physics from Cambridge and became an expert in X-ray crystallography. Using her X-ray diffraction picture of a DNA molecule, Watson and Crick created their famous doublehelix DNA model. Watson and Crick received a Nobel Prize for their work. Rosalind received bupkis. By all accounts, she was brilliant, adventurous, opinionated, and difficult. This book provides a glimpse of this interesting and unjustly overlooked woman.


Tokyo Vice, an HBO Max TV series based on a book entitled Tokyo Vice: An American Reporter on the Police Beat in Japan, by Jake Adelstein. Jake Adelstein is a real person, a Jewish guy born in 1969 in Missouri. At age 19, he decided to move to Japan, where he became fluent in the language, landed a job as a reporter at Japan's largest daily, became an ace crime reporter, had many adventures, and, after 15 years, returned to the US and wrote a best-selling memoir. The TV show is a lot of fun, with interesting snapshots of Tokyo, especially its underworld, and of Japanese culture, especially its seamier, salacious aspects. The second season of the TV show started airing in February of 2024.


The Little Liar, by Mitch Albom, is the latest entry from the prolific Jewish author of inspirational stories whose books have sold more than 40 million copies as of the latest count. Published Nov. 14, 2023, it is currently ranked \#1 in Jewish Literature \& Fiction on Amazon. In the customary guise of historical fiction, it tells the tragic story of the destruction of the Jewish community of Salonika (Thessaloniki) during WWII. Of the more than 50,000 Jews deported by the Nazis, fewer than 2,000 returned after the war. The Greek government tried to suppress this story and it is only gradually coming out.

## Dinners with Ruth by Nina Totenberg Discussion Leader: Joan Zuckerman

About the Book

Four years before Nina Totenberg was hired at NPR, where she cemented her legacy as a prize winning reporter, and nearly twenty-two years before Ruth Bader Ginsburg was appointed to the Supreme Court, Nina called Ruth. A reporter for The National Observer, Nina was curious about Ruth's legal brief, asking the Supreme Court to do something revolutionary: declare a law that discriminated "on the basis of sex" to be unconstitutional. In a time when women were fired for becoming pregnant, often could not apply for credit cards or get a mortgage in their own names, Ruth patiently explained her argument. That call launched a remarkable, nearly fifty-year friendship.

Dinners with Ruth is an extraordinary account of two women who paved the way for future generations by tearing down professional and legal barriers. It is also an intimate memoir of the power of friendships as women began to pry open career doors and transform the workplace. At the story's heart is one, special relationship: Ruth and Nina saw each other not only through personal joys, but also illness, loss, and widowhood. During the devastating illness and eventual death of Nina's first husband, Ruth drew her out of grief; twelve years later, Nina would reciprocate when Ruth's beloved husband died. They shared not only a love of opera, but also of shopping, as they instinctively understood that clothes were armor for women who wanted to be taken seriously in a workplace dominated by men. During Ruth's last year, they shared so many small dinners that Saturdays were "reserved for Ruth" in Nina's house.

Dinners with Ruth also weaves together compelling, personal portraits of other fascinating women and men from Nina's life, including her cherished NPR colleagues Cokie Roberts and Linda Wertheimer; her beloved husbands; her friendships with multiple Supreme Court Justices, including Lewis Powell, William Brennan, and Antonin Scalia, and Nina's own family - her father, the legendary violinist Roman Totenberg, and her "best friends," her sisters. Inspiring and revelatory, Dinners with Ruth is a moving story of the joy and true meaning of friendship.
