Hello,

The next two months hold two of my favorite holidays, Purim and Pesach. As a child growing up at Beth El in Levittown, I have very fond memories of the big Purim carnival, with games, prizes, bingo, food and Andy Flager dressed as the court Jester. If you have not seen a picture of this, it is worth a look. While Purim is a holiday that is celebrated in the synagogue with a community, Pesach is typically observed at home with family and friends around a table. Some of my fondest memories are of my mother cooking for what seemed like days prior to the first Seder and the loud singing of my family. If you've heard me sing, you know that quantity and volume out shines quality. Both holidays retell the story of the Jewish plight; someone wanted to kill us, a hero rose to lead us to safety, and we eat. Sounds like a common refrain, but who am I to argue with a winning theme.

But life is more complicated today. Our synagogue serves a community as it did years ago, but we also provide a platform to face today's challenges. In a county as prosperous as Bucks, there are still people who are in need of food, seniors living alone and families who do not have enough to eat. Many of us give to Mazon or other food based organizations, but two of our members have gone beyond donations and decided to take action. Beth Sadoff created a program called "Cook for a Friend", a great mitzvah to prepare meals for those in need. Each month Beth plans, shops and organizes the chefs to create 120 -150 full meals that are distributed by the JCC in northeast Philadelphia. I have had the opportunity to help cook and it is a great feeling knowing I am doing something to impact another person's life. Making a donation to a worthy cause will never be turned down, but preparing a meal with your hands is a different experience.

Rachael Oring recognized that seniors are vulnerable to food insecurity. She started "Breakfast for Seniors", a program designed to reach a segment of our community who frequently do not have food available. Rachael is the driving force in creating, organizing and distributing bags filled with breakfast essentials to seniors to ensure they have a nutritional start to their day. It would have been easy for Rachael to simply donate to one of the many local food banks, but she, along with Beth, took the responsibility and the words of Rabbi Tarfon in Pirkei Avot to heart: "It is not our duty to perfect the world, but we cannot ignore it either".

In addressing a need to support our sources of food, Joy Finkel took a different approach. In working to create sustainable, better food alternatives, Joy took it upon herself to start the first ever Beth El CSA, Community Supported Agriculture. This method of contracting with local farmers gives them income they can rely on and a fresh, local source of produce for the consumer throughout the growing season. Having belonged for the last several years it is great food at a reasonable price that you feel good about supporting. Joy recognized the need and found a way to do something about it. In January, Beth El was proud to host a community wide event, "No Place for Hate". After seeing incidents of racism and anti-Semitism in Bucks County, Rick Albuck decided he needed to take action. A longtime member of the board of the Anti-Defamation League, Rick organized a rally that brought people throughout Bucks County to Beth El, along with elected officials including our new Congressman Fitzpatrick and State Senator Warren to address the issue. In addition, Rick brought a member of the ADL professional team to provide a broad overview of the how the ADL responds to all cases of discrimination and intolerance. Adding to the strength of the event, ABC News covered the rally which made the evening news. Rick chose to take a stand and make a difference, he didn't simply say something or post on Facebook, he took action.

I am proud to be a member of Beth El, an organization that has Beth, Rachael, Joy, Rick and others who not only recognize the need for action, but do it. Yasher koach to all who make a difference in our community.

The Story of Purim

Purim is one of the most joyous and enjoyable holidays on the Jewish calendar. It commemorates a time when the Jewish people, living in Persia. were saved from extermination. The story of Purim is told in the biblical book of Esther. The heroes of the story are Esther, a beautiful young Jewish woman living in Persia, and her cousin Mordecai, who raised her as if she were his daughter. Esther was taken to the house of Ahashverus, King of Persia, to become part of his harem. King Ahashverus loved Esther more than his other women and made Esther queen, but the king did not know that Esther was a Jew, because Mordecai told her not to reveal her identity. The villain of the story is Haman, an advisor to the king. Haman hated Mordecai because Mordecai refused to bow down to Haman saying that he would only bow to God. Out of anger against Mordecai, Haman plotted to destroy the entire Jewish people. Haman told the king that the Jewish people were different, that their laws



are different from those of every other people's and that they do not observe the king's laws. This put the fate of the Jewish people in Haman's hands, to do as he pleased to them. Haman planned to exterminate all of the Jews.

The word Purim means 'lots' and refers to the lottery that Haman used to choose the date for the massacre. Mordecai persuaded Esther to speak to the king on behalf of the Jewish people. This was a dangerous thing for Esther to do, because anyone who came into the king's presence without being summoned could be put to death, and she had not been summoned. But when Esther approached the king, he welcomed her. Later, she revealed her identity as a Jew and told the king of Haman's plot against her people. The Jewish people were saved and Haman was hanged on the gallows that had been prepared for Mordecai and the Jews.

What we do on Purim

The celebration of Purim focuses on the fact that the Jewish people were saved by Esther and Mordecai's courageous acts.

Read the Megillah

Traditionally the scroll of Esther is read out loud at synagogue twice on Purim: once at night and once during the day. The scroll from which we read is called a Megillah; it contains the story of Esther.



One of Purim's most enjoyable aspects is that when the name of

Haman is read from the Megillah, people make noise to drown out the evil name of the villain with a noise maker called a grogger or Ra'ashan in Hebrew.

Dress in costumes

Mistaken identity plays an important role in Purim. Esther



hid her Jewish heritage from the king. We too hide our identities on Purim as children and adults dress up as characters from the Megillah or as whatever we feel like.

Eat special foods

We eat triangular cookies filled with fruit on Purim that help us to recall the evil villain



Haman who wore a 3 cornered hat. The cookies are called Hamantaschen in Yiddish and are called *Oz'nai Haman* (literally the "ears of Haman") in Hebrew.

Shalach Manot

Lastly, giving gifts of food to friends and giving to those less fortunate are two important Mitzvot on Purim; both of these customs are ways of sharing our joy.



Get Ready for Passover!

It is time to begin thinking about Pesach. Good preparation is the key to a seder and a Pesach when we truly feel ourselves to have been redeemed from slavery as a people as well as from the bondage of our own personal struggles.

Hametz (leaven) – The main ritual observance of Pesach is ridding our homes of all forms of leaven. First, all bread products should be actually removed, either donated to a food pantry, sold, given or thrown away by nightfall on the day before Pesach. Second, we do a ritual search for leaven (bedikat hametz), this year In the evening oF Sunday, April 9th, traditionally by candlelight, using a feather and spoon to collect several pieces of specially placed leaven. This is a great ritual for the whole family! We then recite the formula for nullifying any unfound hametz (bittul hametz). In the event that some products are too expensive to actually be disposed of, they may be sold to a non-Jew for the duration of Pesach, and Rabbi Gruenberg can act as your agent in that transaction if you sign the form in the synagogue office by Sunday, April 9th 11:00am. On the morning of the First Seder night, (Monday, April 10th) we destroy the hametz (biur hametz) that we found the night before, usually by burning it, and we again recite the formula for nullifying unfound hametz. The rituals for searching, nullifying and destroying hametz can be found in a good haggadah.

Beth El will be collecting your nonperishable, unopened chametz and donating it to the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry. Please leave your donations in the lobby no later than Sunday, April 9, 2017, 11:00am.

Ta'anit Bekhorim (fast of the firstborn)

On the day leading into seder, all firstborn Jews customarily fast from morning until evening. However, if one takes part in a mitzvah that includes a feast, the fast is cut short. Join Rabbi Gruenberg on Monday, April 10th at the 7 am morning minyan for some study.

Ma'ot Hittin

As on every Jewish holiday, it is praiseworthy to give to tzedakah so that others will have enough to eat and, in the case of Pesach, provisions for seder. One wonderful opportunity for doing so is by contributing to Mazon, a Jewish response to hunger. We have their materials in the synagogue lobby or go to: http://www.mazon.org.

<u>Seder</u>

The complex details of seder are best addressed through a good haggadah. The Rabbinical Assembly's Feast of Freedom includes a lot of wonderful material, and the Hartman Institute's A Different Night is great for kids, but many others are also worth checking out. Remember that the best seder experience will be one where everyone participates by reading, acting out the story or telling their own stories of personal redemption. There are many online resources to help you enhance your seder.



Small Great Things

Ruth Jefferson is a labor and delivery nurse at a Connecticut hospital with more than twenty years' experience. During her shift, Ruth begins a routine checkup on a newborn, only to be told a few minutes later that she's been reassigned to another patient. The parents are white supremacists and don't want Ruth, who is African American, to touch their child. The hospital complies with their request, but the next day, the baby goes into cardiac distress while Ruth is alone in the nursery. Does she obey orders or does she intervene?

Ruth hesitates before performing CPR and, as a result, is charged with a serious crime. Kennedy McQuarrie, a white public defender, takes her case but gives unexpected advice: Kennedy insists that mentioning race in the courtroom is not a winning strategy. Conflicted by Kennedy's counsel, Ruth tries to keep life as normal as possible for her family—especially her teenage son—as the case becomes a media sensation. As the trial moves forward, Ruth and Kennedy must gain each other's trust, and come to see that what they've been taught their whole lives about others—and themselves—might be wrong.

With incredible empathy, intelligence, and candor, Jodi Picoult tackles race, privilege, prejudice, justice, and compassion—and doesn't offer easy answers. *Small Great Things* is a remarkable achievement from a writer at the top of her game.



The Cemetery Committee can offer you the time to select a plot at the cemetery or just by reviewing our plot maps and photographs. King David Memorial Park is located in Bensalem, PA. Beth El has over 400 plots in section R. Effective September 1, 2016 the Board of Directors approved a price increase to \$1800 per plot. This is far below the price for the general public making a request at King David. A Family Gravesite includes four plots and costs \$7200. Sign up now for the reduced prices. These charges are transacted with the synagogue only and you may not deal with King David or other congregants directly for the purchase or sale of any plots in Section R. When a plot is paid in full the owner is granted the rights of sepulcher and these rights are shared with their heirs even if they are not members. Beth El does not sell plots to non-members of the congregation. In the event of an owner moving or not needing their plots, they may return their papers for a refund less 10% of the purchase price. The price of the plot does not include any services, openings, burial, vault, or monument charges.
