### President's Message



Just a few weeks ago we celebrated Rosh Hodesh Elul, the beginning of the month that leads us into the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah. As summer is winding down, we are all getting ready for the new school year and for the New Year. Everyone knows that the Jewish holidays are never on time. This year is no exception; we all know they are coming early!

This year also brings excitement in the form of change. We welcome Rabbi Scott Hoffman to the Bima along with our returning Hazzan Alan Rosenbaum. We have had many opportunities for everyone to meet Rabbi Hoffman. He brings his runner's style and his southern charm (he's from Maryland), and we all look forward to his spending time with us this holiday season.

In the last Shofar, Liz Ravitch asked several questions that she and others have been pondering. I can answer in one word, 'Yes'. In short, she asked about maintaining our progress, continuing to grow and keeping our sense of community. Planning to maintain our progress has been going on behind the scenes for a few months already. We are pleased to welcome several more families into our community this summer. Some may have joined because of a recent Shiru La'Adonai event which drew more than 70 people. Others have joined because we offer a comfortable place to call home. ### Rabbi's Message



### **Rosh Hashana – A New Beginning?**

Hebrew is a strange language in certain respects. Take the word "shalom". You know from Hebrew school that it can mean not only "peace" but also "hello" and "good-bye." Of course, the strange part is that the last two words are opposites. I'm no expert on languages, but I suspect that the word for "black" is not the same as the word for "white" in too many tongues.

It turns out the same peculiarity occurs with the word "shana". Shana can in certain cases mean "to repeat." For example, the great third century CE code of Jewish law is called the "Mishna", perhaps because it was originally mastered in oral form through constant repetition. The last of the five books of the Torah, Deuteronomy, is sometimes termed "Mishneh Torah", the repetition of the Torah, because it refers to incidents described in the preceding books.

But the root "shana" can also mean "to change", "to be different". Let's start with an example we all know well. On Passover, we recite the "Mah Nishtanah", which asks why this night is "different" from all other nights. When the Talmud wishes to distinguish between cases which are not comparable, it uses the language "shani hatam", "that case is different."

So as we approach this New Year, we must ask ourselves – should we continue as in the past, or should we change? And the answer is usually a bit of both. Each fall we must look at our lives honestly and objectively, but also with an eye to realism. Chances are we're doing some things in our lives well, and if we simply continue on the current path, we will have more than fulfilled our religious obligation. On the other hand, few of us couldn't benefit from a change or two, and Rosh Hashana is a great time to initiate the process of betterment.

So have a Happy New Year, with respect to those behaviors which are new - as well as those which are not.

### High Holidays - Meet Hazzan Alan Rosenbaum



### MEET BETH EL'S HIGH HOLIDAY HAZZAN

### Alan Rosenbaum

Cantor Rosenbaum will be serving as High Holy Day Cantor at Beth El for the third year in a row. Hazzan (Cantor) Alan Rosenbaum graduated from Gratz College with honors in May 2008 where he received a Masters Degree in Cantorial Studies and Jewish Music, and was the recipient of the Abramson Fellowship for the 2004-2005 academic year. He served as part-time cantor at Congregation Beth El-Ner Tamid in Broomall, Pennsylvania, and in addition has served as the High Holy Day Cantor at The Congregations of Ner Zedek in Philadelphia; Congregation Ner Tamid in Cherry Hill, New Jersey; Temple Beth Shalom in Livingston, New Jersey; Beth Hillel Synagogue in Bloomfield, Connecticut; and Temple Torat Emet in Boynton Beach, Florida.

Before becoming a cantor, Mr. Rosenbaum served as a professional choir singer in a number of synagogues in the Philadelphia area, including Temple Beth Zion-Beth Israel in Center City, Har Zion Temple in Gladwyne, and Main Line Reform Temple in Wynnewood.

Mr. Rosenbaum also has performed with local opera companies in the metropolitan Philadelphia area and in New York and New Jersey, including the Delaware Valley Opera Guild, the Little Lyric Opera Theater, and the Rittenhouse Opera Society in Philadelphia; the Camerata Opera Theater of New Jersey; Rose Valley Chorus and Orchestra in suburban Philadelphia; and the Amato Opera Company in New York City. He also has performed in concert and recital programs throughout the Metropolitan Philadelphia area, and in summer concert programs in Cape May, New Jersey. During the summer of 2002, he appeared in the role of Nikolai in a U.S. premiere of the opera "Golden Medina", by composer David Finko, based on a true story about Russian emigration to the US in 1913, and of course, a love interest that developed on board the boat between a Jewish girl and a Russian nobleman.

In the operas of Giuseppe Verdi, some of the roles Mr. Rosenbaum has performed are: Rigoletto, Conte di Luna in "Il Trovatore", lago in "Otello", Germont in "La Traviata", and Amonasro in "Aida". In addition he has performed as Tonio in "I Pagliacci" by Leoncavallo; Michele in "Il Tabarro" by Puccini; Sir Henry Ashton in "Lucia di Lammermoor" by Donizetti; and Valentin in "Faust" by Gounod. In each of the summers of 2003 and 2004, he added a Figaro to his repertoire with Delaware Valley Opera in Philadelphia; in "The Barber of Seville" by Rossini, and in "The Marriage of Figaro" (in English) by Mozart. He performed the roles of the four villains in "Tales of Hoffman (in English) by Jacques Offenbach in August 2007. His classical song repertoire includes music of Schubert, Beethoven, Brahms, Mahler, Fauré, Ravel, D'Indy, and others.

In March 2004, Mr. Rosenbaum won third prize in a vocal competition sponsored by the New Jersey Association of Verismo Opera, at the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall in New York, and was selected as a finalist in a vocal competition for singers of the operas of Giuseppi Verdi. Unfortunately, the finals in this competition were never held.


### High Holidays - Guest Tickets Request

High Holiday Tickets were mailed the week of August 20, 2018 to members in good standing. According to the policy established by the Board of Directors, a member must pay twenty percent (20%) of the year's dues by August 17th, in order to be considered a member in good standing. For family memberships, tickets will also be issued upon request for any adult member of the household who is 18 to 25 years of age or is a dependent, as defined by Internal Revenue Service. Members in good standing of a synagogue affiliated with the **United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism** are welcome to attend our High Holiday Services as our guests. Such guests should email (Barbara@bethelyardley.org) a letter from their synagogue confirming their status and we will be happy to issue their tickets. Tickets for guests are also available for purchase by members in good standing, at a cost of one hundred eighty dollars (\$180.00) per person.

You can avoid paying for additional tickets by upgrading your membership and becoming a Patron or Benefactor. Benefactors

may request up to four free guest tickets; Patrons and Single Benefactors may request up to two free guest tickets, and Single Patrons may request one free guest ticket. 



### Why an Israel Forum at Beth El?

Israel has always been the obvious common unifying influence among Jews since Abraham made a covenant with God thousands of years ago. Israel was the promise given by God to the Jewish people. Today Jews might not agree politically in America or overseas. Mounting evidence now attests to a weakened identification among American Jews with their fellow Jews abroad, as well as a waning sense of communal responsibility at home.

The Forum believes that Israel again can be a uniting factor for all Jews. In order for it to be a bonding agent; information, knowledge and real understanding of the issues that keeps Israel united and linked to all Jews is paramount. Israel Forum will not define who is a Jew but will help sharpen sympathy for Israel.

Israel Forum is dedicated to educating our local community about Israel current challenges as well as the historical events that formed the current Israeli psyche. Secular and religious Jew might not agree on many issues but could be united when defending Israel in public. There is a lot to celebrate about Israel successes in the last 70 years. ### **Jews Honoring Christians at Beth El**



On June 3<sup>rd</sup> of this year over one hundred and forty Jews from the Bucks County community assembled at Congregation Beth El Synagogue to honor Dr. Jim Showers, Executive Director/President of the Friends of Israel Gospel Ministry. It was founded on Kristallnacht in November of 1938 to save the Jewish people. Today, the International ministry, whose headquarters is located in Southern New Jersey, is committed to helping Israel and Jews in any way needed. They raise significant funds for Israel which include donations to Israel Relief and Operation Life Shield for bomb shelters and travel to Israel often to volunteer at Kaplan hospital.

My first encounter with Friends of Israel was ten years ago when I was invited to join an event called, "A Night to Honor the State of Israel" at an Evangelist Church. My initial reaction was one of reluctance. Like most Jews, I was distrustful and figured they had a hidden agenda. It wasn't the case. The Israeli Consulate of Philadelphia attended among other Jews. I was astounded and altered my views about Evangelical Christians. Today most Jews have the same initial reaction that I had.

Israel Forum, a Jewish organization dedicated to educating the local community about Israel, desired to bring visibility and greater understanding about the role that Christian Zionists play in their support of Israel and Jews worldwide. It is true that Christian Evangelists study and live by the teachings of their Bible including the teaching of the Torah which refers to the Jews as the chosen people. God promised the Jews a homeland in Israel, which the Evangelists take for granted as the word of God. They frequently quote the Bible "Those who bless the Jews will be blessed and those who curse the Jews will be cursed."

Recently 80 Million Evangelical Christians in America lobbied to relocate our Embassy to the capital of Israel, Jerusalem. They intensely believe that it is indisputable that Jerusalem is the eternal Capital. No further discussion is necessary on the subject.

Although our program was very successful, we must continue with our educational role. We encourage and welcome new members. Our meetings are held regularly on the second Thursday of each month at Congregation Beth El in Yardley at 7PM.

I would like to recognize the incredible volunteers who facilitated to make this unique event successful with the giving of their time and efforts and monetary donations. Thank you to Mark Melmed for successively organizing the event and using exceptional organizational skills to make this effectual program successful.







This New Year, 5779, the American Friends of Kaplan Medical Center needs your support!

Congregation Beth El, Yardley, was the starting point for a <u>NATIONAL CAMPAIGN</u> beginning in November 5778.

Join with American community leaders and philanthropists to help Israel add a state-of-the-art Cardiac Care/Research Facility at the Kaplan Medical Center (KMC) in Rehovot, Israel. Kaplan has become recognized as a leading cardiac treatment center in the Middle East, but its current physical facility is outdated (barracks built in 1953) limiting Kaplan's ability to provide cardiac care to patients in need of its services. This multi-specialty medical compound is home to a team of 22 cardiologists with international reputations, who currently perform the latest hi-tech medical procedures, some of which are not yet available in the US. The hospital serves the international community, as well as about 12% of the Israeli population. One out of 5 heart procedures in Israel is performed at Kaplan. Its quality care takes a back seat to no one, while its staff invests considerable time in teaching preventive cardiac measures to its patients.

Ironically, few Jewish and non-Jewish Community leaders in the U.S. are aware of Kaplan's existence. Therefore, the American Friends of Kaplan Medical Center (AFKMC) is working closely in conjunction with the State of Israel, to educate community leaders and the public about the Kaplan Medical Center and to its dire need of a state-of-the-art facility for its cardiac patients.

The American Friends of Kaplan Medical Center was incorporated in 2008 as a nonprofit 501(c)(3). It is running a "Brick-by-Brick" campaign to raise \$15 million, over the next two years, for this new high-tech cardiac center costing \$45 million. Citizens of the State of Israel will match each U.S. dollar with two of their own – more than enough to cover the cost. Construction will begin in 2018, and Israel needs our help!

AFKMC is launching the "Heart and Sole" Campaign at the grass roots level to involve donors and create awareness of Kaplan. "Gently Used" shoes collected will be recycled to more than 50 countries overseas. In return, based upon the total weight of shoes collected, AFKMC will receive a check from the recycling agency, located in Bensalem, PA. All proceeds go directly to the "Brick-by-Brick" fund and, community members perform a "triple" Mitzvah by being part of this project Their money is donated to the Kaplan Medical Center project, less fortunate individuals receive the recycled shoes, and recycling saves the landfills.

### **Cemetery Plots**

No one really expects the need of having to buy cemetery plots. It is a wonderful benefit of belonging to Congregation Beth El of Yardley. There is no better time to buy than the present time, before you have the need. We want to help you make the choice before the emotional time after a death.

Many funeral directors encourage the pre-need arrangements of all of the aspects of the funeral, burial, and monuments. The Cemetery Committee can offer you the time to select a plot at the cemetery or just by reviewing our plot maps and photographs. King David Memorial Park is located in Bensalem, PA. Beth El has over 400 plots in section R. Effective September 1, 2016 the Board of Directors approved a price increase to \$1800 per plot. This is far below the price for the general public making a request at King David. A Family Gravesite includes four plots and costs \$7200. Sign up now for the reduced prices. These charges are transacted with the synagogue only and you may not deal with King David or other congregants directly for the purchase or sale of any plots in Section R. When a plot is paid in full the owner is granted the rights of sepulcher and these rights are shared with their heirs even if they are not members. Beth El does not sell plots to non-members of the congregation. In the event of an owner moving or not needing their plots, they may return their papers for a refund less 10% of the purchase price. The price of the plot does not include any services, openings, burial, vault, or monument charges.
