### Co-President's Message



On Simchat Torah, we finished reading the final book of the Torah, D'varim (Deuteronomy) and began reading the first book, B'reshit (Genesis). We do this year, after year. I recently learned that the final letter of the Torah is a Lamed  $\dagger$  and the first letter of the Torah is a Bet  $\Xi$  When we put those letters together, we get the word "lev",  $\forall$ , which means heart. This is commonly thought to mean that as long as the Jewish people

never stop learning, the heart of the Jewish people will never stop beating. This learning can be informal, like when someone tells you something you never knew before or formal as in a classroom. It can be simple, like learning a single new fact, or complex, like studying a new topic. ### Rabbi's Message



#### We will Speak as We Create: the Transformative Power of Words

Barukh ata Adonai Eloheinu Melekh ha'Olam sh'ha'kol nihiyah bed'varo

The above blessing is one of the most commonly-recited blessings over food and drink, as it applies to nearly anything not obviously plant or grain-based which we consume. As you well know, it is also a most beloved blessing here at Beth El. "Shehakol," as the blessing is referred to in short-hand, is the blessing upon enjoying "potent potables" other than wine. Following all morning services, we have the tradition of sharing a l'chaim after reciting this all-important blessing.

For the longest time, I actually misunderstood the literal translation of this deceptively simple prayer. Having grown up, both hearing and reciting this prayer countless times, I always assumed it meant, "Blessed are you, Lord our G-d, Sovereign of the

universe, that all is as it is." My assumption was that the word "bedvaro" referred to all things "in their element," and that we were thus expressing our collective gratitude even and especially for consumable products that did not have their own special, product-specific blessings. Only later, did I learn that the actual translation is "Blessed are you, Lord our G-d, sovereign of the universe, by Whose word all things came to be." Theologically, this rendering opens up whole new meanings and implications for us.

We just commenced a whole new annual Torah reading cycle with the reading of the portion of Genesis, in which G-d literally creates the World with words. It is interesting to ponder the fact that we, as humans, in a powerful act of *imitatio dei*, also set upon our goals, first as verbal utterances and expressions. Indeed, words contain the power not only to express realities, but actually to create them. There's that famous magical incantation "abracadabra!" There is much scholarly speculation as to this magical formula's origins and meaning. One theory posits that the word is a variation on the Aramaic Avra Kehdabra אברא כדב, meaning, "I will create as I speak."

While as mainstream, rabbinic Jews, we don't practice magic, we can still agree that the spoken and written word carries with it special transformative qualities and properties. As we charge forth into this new Jewish year, I invite us to reflect on the power of our words, both those uttered publicly and those shared privately, and how they might be crucial vehicles for healing and understanding at a time when our world is so broken.

Moving back to the US this past summer, I am struck by the drastic change in civil discourse from even a half-decade ago. But we have it within our agency to change the tone and model of what healthy, respectful dialogue can look like. A couple of weeks ago, the New York Times ran a piece about a social experiment called "America in One Room," in which over 500 US citizens, representing all states and covering a wide diversity of political persuasions, gathered to discussed major issues of the day. The project was inspired by a political theorist who posited that inviting individuals of diametrically opposed political viewpoints into an in-person dialogue would result in the two parties ultimately adopting more centrist positions and a more moderate outlook.

I was fascinated by this theory, which, by the way, was corroborated by the America in One Room experiment. How powerful to think about people encountering each other respectfully and truly *listening* and being ultimately transformed by each others' words! We live in a moment when, both politically and religiously, moderation is being tossed out the window. To borrow a most famous line from "The Second Coming," a famous piece by the great poet W.B. Yeats, "things fall apart, the center cannot hold." How reassuring to see an example of people taking a step back, taking a deep breath, and truly *encountering* each other and respecting one another's complexities.

We here at Beth El also possess a secret treasure of highly intentional, intelligent moderation. Conservative Judaism offers a timely antidote to the malaise of modern extremism. When we allow ourselves truly to think and feel deeply, immersing ourselves in both our traditional sources and taking seriously our current context, we too can arrive at a moment of ideological clarity and internal harmony.

How do we achieve this holy grail of reclaiming the center? We achieve it first through our words. We achieve it through our learning of Jewish texts. We achieve it through our respectful dialogue with each other, approaching one another with a spirit of camaraderie and curiosity. I am so excited to learn and grow with you and be transformed by our words.

And, in this spirit, I raise a glass to you, offering both a l'chaim and praising our G-d of the universe, who willed us all into being – through words.

#### Judy Nussbaum, Film Festival Chairperson and Board Member



Our FJLC and *HaMoadon* programs are both off to a great start! It has been wonderful greeting our Beth El children and teens each Sunday and Wednesday, in addition to meeting nine school families new to our community this year!

During the month of October the FJLC participants explored on the value of *Ma'acheel R'a'veem*, or feeding the hungry. We connected this value to the holiday of *Sukkot*, which of course focuses on the harvest. Madeline Levine Wolf of the Jewish Relief Agency (JRA) in Philadelphia, visited and spoke with the children about the facts of hunger in Philadelphia and the surrounding area. Our 4th-7th graders visited JRA at the end of the month and participated in packing and delivering food to those in need. All of our FJLC participants made and packed over 75 lunches and snack bags for the Trenton Area Soup Kitchen during our Sukkot event. It was an eye opening experience for all.

Our *HaMoadon* Hebrew High School program began during *Sukkot*. Although the weather prevented us from being in the *sukkah*, we had a wonderful opening session reconnecting and getting to know new friends. The teens also had the opportunity to choose from three elective sessions, including Jewish Performers & Artists, Kosher Living, and creating Jewish Info Graphics. During our second session, we partnered with Cook for a Friend and helped Beth El volunteers package up the delicious homemade meals they made for homebound seniors in the Philadelphia area. Then we began our first session electives.




### HaMoadon Hebrew High School







### Cemetery Plots at King David Memorial Park

No one really expects the need of having to buy cemetery plots. It is a wonderful benefit of belonging to Congregation Beth El of Yardley. There is no better time to buy than the present time, before you have the need. We want to help you make the choice before the emotional time after a death.

Many funeral directors encourage the pre-need arrangements of all of the aspects of the funeral, burial, and monuments. The Cemetery Committee can offer you the time to select a plot at the cemetery or just by reviewing our plot maps and photographs.

King David Memorial Park is located in Bensalem, PA. Beth El has over 400 plots in section R. Effective September 1, 2016 the Board of Directors approved a price increase to \$1800 per plot. This is far below the price for the general public making a request at King David. A Family Gravesite includes four plots and costs \$7200. Sign up now for the reduced prices. These charges are transacted with the synagogue only and you may not deal with King David or other congregants directly for the purchase or sale of any plots in Section R.

When a plot is paid in full the owner is granted the rights of sepulcher and these rights are shared with their heirs even if they are not members. Beth El does not sell plots to non-members of the congregation. In the event of an owner moving or not needing their plots, they may return their papers for a refund less 10% of the purchase price. The price of the plot does not include any services, openings, burial, vault, or monument charges.
