What a year it has been!! When Larry and I first wrote to you about closing the building, we were making decisions week-by-week, always hoping that we'd be able to get back into our building "next" week. Now, it's been 3 months since we've been able to gather together in person to pray, to learn and to socialize. Although I enjoy seeing so many of you virtually, there is nothing quite like being able to gather together. To that end, we have formed a new "Re-opening Task Force" (RTF) so that we can safely get back into our building and once again pray, learn and socialize together. The task force is led by Brian Levey and includes our professional staff and Presidents as well as Jill Cohen, Michelle Flash, Phil Freidenreich, Rich Gorelick, Gretchen Merchiore, Lewis Rose, Glenn Roskein, Joan Rubin Kritz, Lee Schachter and David Sokol.

The mission of the RTF is to "develop a plan that enables Congregation Beth El to reopen in a way that ensures the safety of our congregants and professional staff". We will be as transparent as possible, informing you as we have updates. However, if you have questions between updates, feel free to contact one of us and we will do our best to answer.

Many of you have been asking about the High Holidays. I'd like to emphasize that the RTF will NOT be specifically addressing how the High Holidays will be handled. The Religious Activities Committee (RAC) will determine a plan based on the RTF's decisions about the number of people who can safely congregate together in the building. With that in mind, the RAC is working with two possible scenarios:

- If we return to being in "red" then we will have a fully on-line High Holiday celebration. We do not yet know if that will be using Zoom or a live-streaming service. We are looking into several options.
- If we are in "yellow" or "green" then we will likely be having a hybrid celebration (a combination of in person and live streaming).

We do not yet know exactly how this will work, but it will involve small groups of congregants entering the building to pray together.

We know that there are some of our congregants who will not feel comfortable gathering together in person in September. I want to emphasize that we still plan to offer the live-stream option for those congregants who do not want to or cannot gather together. We are very proud of the virtual programming we have offered since March. We continued to have twice daily minyanim, and even added a Sunday evening minyan. Shabbat, Passover and Shavuot services were offered virtually as well. We've had many adult education classes and programming, including a day-long Wellness Day in May and a Book Nosh in June. Our annual meeting had a record number of congregants attending and Hazak offered a wonderful Live concert (via YouTube) by Avi Wisnia. Our Hebrew School didn't miss a beat and quickly and seamlessly went virtual in March. In July, you can look forward to a discussion with Eli Rosen and a partnership with Ramah Day Camp which is offering on-line activities for kids all month.

When the building finally does re-open you will notice changes, many of which still have to be determined by the RTF. It is possible you will need to have your temperature checked before entering the building and you may be required to wear a mask. There may be designated entry and exit doors. We will do our best to post signs to help you keep track of these changes. I also want to let everyone know that effective July 1, Karen Lewin will be working part time. This was a difficult decision made by the Board of Directors at the May meeting.

In a recent sermon, Rabbi Weiss said, "we can't reopen because we never closed." I love this statement, because it truly was only our building that has been closed since March. Our community has stayed open, active and vibrant. We supported each other in times of loss, celebrated together for holidays, Confirmation, and graduations, and helped each other when congregants needed support. In my December article, I thanked everyone for making Beth El one of my "miracles". I hope that you all feel now, more than ever, that Beth El is truly a miracle because we have come together in the most beautiful way at a time when we had to remain physically far apart. I once again thank you all for being miracles in our community. I look forward to safely gathering with you soon.

This month, July 2020, marks our family's one-year anniversary at Beth El. What feels now like an eternity ago, you welcomed us in ways I can characterize only as above and beyond. As I recovered last summer from a complicated illness, still not knowing exactly how I would "land," you greeted us with signature Beth El warmth and thoughtfulness. As the year progressed, my appreciation and admiration for this deeply caring and talented community only deepened. I feel both proud and blessed to build community together. And here we are, a year later, this time with many unknowns as well as deep, existential crises, on a collective scale. What gives me solace is knowing we approach all of the myriad of challenges together.

These past three months have likely been some of the toughest many of you have seen, navigating your own workloads, becoming your children's co-teachers, and trying to wrap your heads around the specter of a pandemic and all its related tendrils. And for some in our community, you've seen worse. Our community includes heroic Holocaust survivors, survivors of strokes, cancer, tragic losses, and estrangement.

I feel deeply for all of you.

All our Beth El staff and leadership feels deeply for you, even while many of them are thrown into the same boat with you. This is not an easy period, particularly because we are currently steeped in the unknown, and predictability and routine are our last bastions of comfort in a world that can feel topsy-turvy, even when there is no virus, social restriction, or upwelling of social inequalities looming over us.

There is one thing we can be secure about, and that is that this period will end.

Gam Zeh Ya'avor. Whether it is four months or even a year, life will return to some form of a predictable, sensible, and manageable pattern. We hope and pray to help our society overcome the formidable inequalities we are witnessing until they are a historical memory. This era will slowly recede into the distance. It will get smaller and smaller as the years go on, and it will be remembered for all sorts of things, some of which we can predict now, and some, we can even control.

Each of us is experiencing this period differently. Some of us, especially those living in senior living facilities, are feeling heightened loneliness; some of us, including retirees and students in transition, are bored and bingeing on Netflix; some of us, especially those of us who have the unique fortune of maintaining steady work, and especially working parents of young children, and even more so parents with multiple children and/or children with special needs, feel like we are drowning.

For our some of our kids, perhaps it will be "That Spring of 2020 when That I Never Fully Finished Learning Long Division Because My Parents Had To Teach It To Me At Home", or "That Spring When Every Day was Pajama Day" or "Those Weeks When My Siblings And I Fought Every Day Over The iPad Until Our Parents Took It Away And Told Us It Was Broken Even Though It Clearly Wasn't."

For the adults, we might remember it as the Pandemic of 2020 or the Recession of 2020 or The Days The World Stood Still. We will remember that life got really, really hard, really, really fast, and that the luxuries we had taken for granted, seemed -- for the first time in a long time -- as though they could dissolve in an instant.

The whole story has not yet unfolded and perhaps none of these will be the prevailing memories of this time. But this memory does not have to be written for us by chance or by others' actions or descriptions.

There are some things that we can take within our control. As Jews, we are blessed with the special gift of Shabbat -- a perfect time to step back from the events swirling around us and to take the time together, as families, to take stock and create our own unique narrative of what is happening and our own priorities -- even while it is happening. On Shabbat, as individuals and as families, we have the time to take - time to reflect on some of the things we might be learning from this very peculiar and extraordinary period in which we are living.

We can marvel at some of the solutions we have created to deal with new problems; we can look with pride at our children who have mastered the Brave New World of the technology that helps us stay connected in this time of potential isolation, and we can admire their creativity, their innocence, and learn from their resilience. And -- in creating our own personal narrative -- perhaps we will arrive at a place where our personal and familial values and priorities begin to become more clear -- and maybe even more compelling -- than ever before.

It is not my intention to gloss over the very real pain and frustration and fear and exhaustion that many are feeling. Nor do I mean to overlook the very real losses that all of us have been forced to accept, such as the cancellation of joyfully anticipated trips and vacations and the inability to celebrate major life milestones with friends and loved ones -- not to mention loss of jobs and financial security, lost opportunities, and, worst of all, loss of loved ones.

There are no two ways about it: this is hard. Let us try, at least, to take control of the one thing we can, which is the narrative we build around how we faced this time, together, as a synagogue, as a community, with our friends and family, and as individuals who are far more resourceful, empathic, and resilient than we typically acknowledge.

Our commitment as a synagogue during this time has been to continue coming together – to pray, to learn, to schmooze, and to heal and create a living, breathing virtual Beth El, even if that platform only serves us for a few months.

Our synagogue was not designed to be remote, and we look forward to the time when we can once again gather in our beautiful building as a community. In the meantime, we have built an intricate, virtual 'ark' to carry us through a temporary flood.

Our focus is on building an inclusive, meaningful, warm, heimish Jewish experience. Your priorities may have shifted during this time. This is the nature of a health scare. Hopefully, routines have emerged, and that is enough. Hopefully, you and your family are healthy and safe, and that is enough. Hopefully, internet continues to work, and that is enough. Knowing what "enough" is has become a lost art in the instant gratification culture of contemporary American society, but as Jews, we play the long game. We are a people who know that what we have is enough, and we can be grateful for that.

Please continue thinking about and discussing your individual and family priorities throughout the next phase of this evolving event. Beth El is here for you, not just as a brick and mortar synagogue, but as a community that transcends the confines of a physical building. We are all in this together. Traditional religious worship and practice is vital to our hearts and souls as Jews, but sometimes we must also acknowledge that if we can stay healthy, and if we can stay balanced, and if we can stay together, that will be enough for the time being.


In so many facets of life during this difficult time, we will learn to discern between our wants and our needs and discover what is truly "enough." As Jews who sing "Dayenu" every year at the Seder, as we did even at the outset of this lockdown period, we may just be learning to appreciate this concept on a much deeper level right now.

May we all have what we need—our health, our love, our commitment to each other and our neighbors, to the Jewish community, and to the principles of kindness, justice, and compassion for which our synagogue stands —and may that be enough.



Racial Justice Series:


"Sharing Stories in Challenging Times"

It is also a murder mystery and a lyrical ode to the natural wonders of marshlands and the plants, insects, birds, and other critters that inhabit them. No Jewish content but a really good book.



These Truths: A History of the United States, by Jill Lepore. Lepore is a professor of American History at Harvard University and a staff writer at The New Yorker. She writes that: "Americans are descended from slaves and slave owners, from conquerors and the conquered, from immigrants and from people who have fought to end immigration. A nation born in contradiction will fight forever over the meaning of its history, but engaging in that struggle by studying the past is part of the work of citizenship."



A Secret Gift: How One Man's Kindness--and a Trove of Letters--Revealed the Hidden History of the Great Depression, by Ted Gup. Gup is a professor of Journalism at Emerson College. This book describes the anonymous charitable efforts of his immigrant Jewish Orthodox grandfather to help families in Canton, Ohio, affected by the Great Depression in 1933.



Apeirogon: A Novel, Colum McCann. Two fathers, one Palestinian the other Israeli, each lose a daughter to the interminable Israeli-Palestinian conflict. They are on opposite sides of the conflict. Yet, when they learn of each other's stories, they recognize the loss that connects them. Together they attempt to use their grief as a weapon for peace.



This novel focuses on the marriage of a middle-class African-American couple, Roy and Celestial, who live in Atlanta and whose lives are torn apart when Roy is wrongfully convicted of a rape he did not commit. No Jewish content but relevant in light of current events. The book was published in February 2018, was chosen for Oprah's Book Club, and won the 2019 Women's Prize for Fiction.



Waking Up White, and Finding Myself in the Story of Race, by Debby Irving. According to the author, "Her one-step-forward-two-steps-back experience of racial understanding eventually led her to dig deeply into her own white privilege, where she found truths she never knew existed. Waking Up White describes that journey and the lessons learned along the way."



Truths I Never Told You: A Novel, by Kelly Rimmer. After her father is moved to a care facility, his daughter discovers evidence that her mother, who she believed had died in a car accident when she was a toddler, had actually suffered from postpartum depression. As a mother of a newborn herself, the daughter discovers hidden ties to her mother.



The Story of Louis Pasteur is a 1936 American black-and-white biopic, which stars Paul Muni as the renowned scientist whose discoveries in microbiology revolutionized agriculture and medicine. Muni won an Academy Award for Best Actor, the screenwriters won for Best Screenplay and Best Story, and the film itself was nominated, but did not win an Oscar for Best Picture. 
