Deadlines for the Shofar are on the 16th of the month **prior** to the new edition coming out; except if it falls on Shabbat or a Jewish holiday.



I have always been taught that Jews are from one of two ethnic backgrounds: Ashkenazic or Sephardic. Ashkenazic Jews are from Eastern and Central Europe. Everyone else is Sephardic...or so I thought. It was not until this past summer while talking with Ken Kaissar that I learned that there are Jews who do not fall neatly into either of these categories. I was right about Ashkenazic Jews. They do mostly come from Eastern and Central Europe. But the rest of the Jewish population are not, in fact, all Sephardic. Jews of the Iberian Peninsula (e.g. Spain, Portugal) and Northern Africa (e.g. Morocco and Algeria) are generally Sephardic Jews. The third major group are

Mizrachi Jews who are from Middle Eastern ancestry (e.g. Iraq, Yemen, and Egypt). Besides these major groups there are many smaller groups encompassing a single geographic area (e.g. the Felashim from Ethiopia and the Igbo from Nigeria).

I've been thinking a lot about this over the last few months. How is it that I went to Akiba Hebrew Academy and Camp Ramah and never learned that there are more than two ethnic backgrounds? I was reminded of this misinformation on Shabbat, when in our Etz Chaim Chumash some of the Haftorot are delineated by only Ashkenazic and Sephardic portions. I pointed this out to Ken, and he replied simply, "I'm not in there. I guess I don't count." He didn't seem upset about it...but I was. I think what upset me the most is that I am not the only one who has been taught this way.

You might be wondering why I chose to write about this. First, is to hopefully spark the interest of some of you who were taught the way I was to learn more about the diverse ethnic backgrounds of Judaism. Second, because I think it relates to how we look at our own community. I recently met with Larry Schachter and Mindy Albuck, our Rabbinic Search Committee Chairpeople, to discuss the composition of the committee. We all agreed that we wanted a diverse committee, but what, exactly does that mean? Which demographics are the important ones to use as we select congregants for the committee? We discussed general things like age, gender, and family (e.g. young family or empty nester). We talked about specific things like if they go to services or serve on a committee (no, ethnic background was not discussed). After a very long discussion, we came up with a list of people which we hope reflects the broad demographics of our community. Along with Mindy, Larry, and me (as an ex-officio member) the Search Committee members are: Andrew Braverman, Stephanie Bunin, Robin Cohen, Eric Fishbein, Michelle Flash, Phil Freidenreich, Helene Geiger, Jen Goldstein, Amy Kaissar, Norman Marinoff, Rich Oring, Beth Sadoff, Leon Weissman, Jack Wellerstein, and Steve Young. This committee will be working endless hours over the next few months writing our application, reading rabbi's resumes, meeting with candidates, and arranging for congregational visits. It is an arduous task, and I thank them all for sitting on the committee.

As we start the search for our next spiritual leader, we are blessed that Rabbi Weiss will still be with us for the next eight months. I do not want to wait eight months, however, to thank Rabbi Weiss and her family on behalf of the entire congregation for their support, dedication and love over the past two+ years. As we all know, the past year and a half have been incredibly challenging for all of us – and that is especially true for Rabbi Weiss who has had to navigate COVID while trying to get to know each of us, serving as our spiritual leader over Zoom and helping to keep our community cohesive and connected – while at the same time raising her own family. I am confident that whatever path Rabbi Weiss and Rabbi Rank choose, they will be successful and wish them only the very best.

Shalom friends,

Believe it or not, it is already November, and as our kids are eager to remind us, Hanukkah is nigh upon us. The Talmud recounts a famous debate between students of the School of Shammai and students of the School of Hillel. Discussing the question of how to kindle the Hanukkah candelabra, Shammai insisted, "Pochet v'holekh" – that the number of candles is successively decreased. Therefore, we light eight candles on the first night, seven candles on the second night, and so on. Hillel, on the other hand, asserted, "Mosif v'holekh" – that the number of candles is increased, beginning with one candle on the first night, two on the second night, and so on.

We need to understand that this was not an arbitrary dispute. Rather, this controversy reveals divergent points of view; different attitudes and stances toward life. Students of Beit (the school of) Shammai were hard-headed realists, perhaps with a touch of cynicism. Students of Beit Hillel were idealists and visionaries. Truth be told, we are all – each of us in one way or another, and at different times – students of one school or another.

The realist can always point to some undeniable aspect of experience that encompasses both the physical and human worlds. In the physical world, for example, even the tallest candle eventually burns out; physical objects crumble and the hardest, most durable substances eventually disintegrate. The physicists' Second Law of Thermodynamics asserts that all energy gradually runs down.

The same applies in the human sphere. We all begin enterprises with enthusiasm and hope. But familiarity and daily repetition dulls our enthusiasm. Cynics, in discussing marriage, for example, often describe it as a "settling down." The same weariness, they insist, takes hold of us in our chosen careers, in our volunteer work, and in the enthusiasm we once brought to Jewish life. The principle that applies in the physical world – a creeping dullness and waning energy– also applies to these areas of human existence. Therefore, they insist, in the spirit of Beit Shammai, we diminish the number of candles to reflect what takes place in real life.

Students of Beit Hillel disagree. They maintain that from the perspective of Jewish faith, we need to add candles. View life in this world, they would insist, from the perspective of what we are capable of becoming. G-d alone is; Man is yet to be. Jewish faith is messianic, anchored in the hope for a brighter future. For the prophets, the 'golden age' lay not in the past, but in the future. "In the days to come," the prophets declare; or "it shall come to pass," or "behold a great day is coming." Beit Hillel would insist that human beings are the only creatures with the power to transcend themselves or to transform their societies.

And in the human sphere, real friendships do not have to peter out; real marriages do not have to become 'humdrum;' they can grow stronger, and the gifts with which we are blessed – nature, music, laughter, family, people, and faith – can grow. The "way of life," Beit Hillel would tell us, leads upward.

And as for the rabbinic debate, long ago our tradition decided to favor the school of Hillel. The increasing candles we light on Hanukkah should be a sign that whatever it is we hold precious, whatever it is we hold sacred, we should add new understanding, fresh insight, and for Jews, more good deeds, lest, G-d forbid, they may be diminished and we with them.

As we approach Hanukkah this year, light more Hanukkah candles, by all means, and remember to add, in every way, more light each day.




Tom Moore: Board Member & Inclusivity Committee Chair

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Jordyn Algazi — November 6



Jordyn Algazi, daughter of Wendy and Jon Algazi, will be called to the Torah as a Bat Mitzvah on Saturday, November 6, 2021. For her mitzvah project, Jordyn wanted to help the community during the pandemic. She raised \$3000, which was used to provide meals from local restaurants to essential workers such as nurses at St. Mary Medical Center, local grocery store employees and nursing home employees at the Watermark Senior Living in Philadelphia where Jordyn's great-grandmother Toni (Nona) used to live. Additionally, Jordyn gathered clothing from her own closet as well as friends and family and donated a significant amount of clothing to the organization Cradles to Crayons. This organization works to provide children from birth through age 12, living in homeless or low-income situations, with the essential items they need to thrive - at home, at school and at play. Charlie Lewin — November 13



Charlie Lewin, son of Karen and Joe Lewin, will be called to the Torah as a Bar Mitzvah on Saturday, November 13, 2021. For his mitzvah project Charlie wanted to focus on literacy as he has a great love of reading. Charlie found out that in the 200+ public schools in Philadelphia, only 7 of them have functioning libraries with teacher librarians. Every teacher in the Philadelphia public schools is required to have a library in their classroom but they aren't given any money to create one. Charlie decided to run two book drives, one at his summer camp and one at his school to collect gently used books to donate to an organization called the Philly Book Bank. The Philly Book Bank helps teachers and the community get books and resources for the children they serve. Educators are able to get up to 375 books per school year, as well as supplemental classroom supplies. Charlie's book drives collected over 3,000 books to benefit Philadelphia public school children. Ethan Braverman — December 4



Ethan Braverman, son of Andrew and Jennifer Braverman will be called to the Torah on Saturday, December 4, 2021 for his 2.0 in person Bar Mitzvah. For his Bar Mitzvah Project he selected two of the themes from his Torah portion: dreams and hunger. Ethan learned about and raised \$1,500 for the Sunshine Foundation. The Sunshine Foundation's mission is to "answer the dreams of chronically ill, seriously ill, physically challenged and abused children ages three through eighteen, whose families cannot fulfill their requests due to financial strain that the child's illness may cause." Each year, the foundation makes children's dreams come true by sending them on a Dreamlift to Disneyworld for a day. Through the generous donations from Ethan's family and friends, as well as the Beth El community, Ethan was able to raise enough money to send four children on Dreamlifts. Ethan also helped the Jewish Relief Agency (JRA) to combat hunger in our community. The JRA serves over 6,000 diverse low-income individuals and families in the Philadelphia area. Ethan visited the JRA warehouse multiple times over the past year to pack boxes of food and deliver the food to residents in the area. Mazel Toy!





Don't Miss Out: Sign Up to Learn Hebrew Calligraphy from a Master Artist



Artist Rachel Jackson, of Binah Designs, will be teaching us Hebrew Calligraphy on February 8, 2022 on Virtual Beth El. She will teach us lettering and decorative scrollwork. We'll use her techniques to create our own piece of Hebrew "Mizrach" wall art for our homes. A "Mizrach", which means "East", is traditionally hung on an eastern wall to designate which direction to face when praying at home.

The class is informational, interactive, and a lot of fun. To get the most out of it, we strongly suggest that you buy a Hebrew Calligraphy Kit (\$18), which includes paper, tracing templates, and calligraphy pens. Rachel will show us how to use all of the tools in the Kit, and we'll have time to try the tools for ourselves and ask questions.







Items Discussed at October 17, 2021, Book Nosh Zoom Meeting



Defending Britta Stein, by Ronald H. Balson. This latest book from the well-known author of **Once We Were Brothers** tells the story of a 90-year-old Jewish woman in Chicago who is outraged when a local restauranteur is chosen for an award by the Danish/American Association for his many civic and charitable contributions. Britta Stein knows better. She spray-paints "Coward," "Traitor," "Collaborator," and "War Criminal" on the walls of his restaurant. Litigation ensues, we learn a great deal about wartime heroics and atrocities in Denmark, and are treated to a terrific courtroom drama by Mr. Balson who is, in addition to a best-selling author, an internationally known trial lawyer.



The Girl Who Wrote in Silk: A Novel of Chinese Immigration to the Pacific Northwest, by Kelli Estes. This novel tells the intertwined stories of a contemporary young woman, just out of business school, and a 19th-century Chinese-American girl who, along with her family, is victimized by violent anti-immigrant prejudice and by the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882. Both young women, living in their separate eras, fall in love, complications ensue, coincidences emerge, and hidden truths are revealed. The plot is conventional but the background information is enlightening and relevant to our current times.




Squirrel Hill: The Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting and the Soul of a Neighborhood, by Mark Oppenheimer. In the author's own words, this brand-new book is a "piercing portrait of the struggles and triumphs of one of America's renowned Jewish neighborhoods in the wake of unspeakable tragedy that highlights the hopes, fears, and tensions all Americans must confront on the road to healing."



The Beauty Queen of Jerusalem, by Sarit Yishai-Levi. The author was born in Jerusalem in 1947 to a Sephardic family that has lived in the city for seven generations. She has published four non-fiction books. This is her first novel, which quickly became a bestseller in Israel, and is now available in an English translation. It tells the story of four generations of women, each more beautiful than the next, each trapped in a loveless relationship, and each with secrets to tell. Already an Israeli movie and now an Israeli TV show, this series will be streamed to your screens, suitably subtitled very soon. But read the book first.


People Love Dead Jews: Reports from a Haunted Present, by Dara Horn. An important new book from the best-selling Jewish novelist. This one is non-fiction, about a topic which we hate to think about, but which we must face head on. It's a fairly short book comprising 12 interconnected essays, written with verve, humor tinged with sarcasm, deep historical knowledge, and profound insight. Should be required reading for every American Jew.




The Social Graces, by Renée Rosen. The author, who grew up in "a very traditional Jewish household" in the Midwest, has turned her satirical gifts to a decidedly secular topic in her latest best-seller. It tells the story of one of the most remarkable feuds in history: Alva Vanderbilt and Mrs. Astor's notorious battle for control of New York society during the Gilded Age. A fun read with lots of gossip, scandal (Alva gets divorced and marries a Jew!), lavish masquerade balls, exclusive clambakes, and over-the-top fashions.



Final Account – **a Documentary.** This film, which is available on Netflix, is basically a series of interviews with some of the last survivors of Hitler's Third Reich, many of whom still insist that they did not see, hear, or do anything wrong. It raises interesting questions about conformity, willful blindness, flexible morality, and the participation of ordinary Germans in the greatest crimes in human history.



Hitler's Willing Executioners: Ordinary Germans and the Holocaust, by Daniel Jonah Goldhagen. The author was a young history professor at Harvard when he published this book in 1996. The book, which became an international bestseller, sparked the "Goldhagen Debate," which continues to this day, about the perpetrators of the Holocaust and ordinary Germans' role in it.



The President's Daughter: A Thriller, by James Patterson and Bill Clinton. From the Amazon description: "Matthew Keating [is] a one-time Navy SEAL and a past president ... A madman abducts Keating's teenage daughter, Melanie, turning every parent's deepest fear into a matter of national security. As the world watches in real time, Keating embarks on a one-man special-ops mission that tests his strengths: as a leader, a warrior, and a father." According to our reviewer, no Jewish content but a fun read. Plus, we get some insight into how Bill Clinton sees himself now. Ah, the benefits of old age.
