The Shofar - Congregation Beth El's Newsletter Issues

Deadlines for the Shofar are on the 16th of the month **prior** to the new edition coming out; except if it falls on Shabbat or a Jewish holiday.



Last month, my father and I set out to visit local cemeteries where our relatives are buried. For me, it was a chance to photograph their graves and upload the photos to the various genealogical websites I use to trace and record my roots. For him, it was a chance to visit his parents' graves as well as to find the graves of his aunts and uncles whom he had not visited since their funerals 20-30 years ago. A couple of things struck me about this excursion.

First, was how different our goals were. I have long said that although I completely understand and support others' need to do so, I do not need to visit a grave in order to visit with a departed relative. I often conjure

thoughts of my grandfather when I need a motivational push and of my grandmother when I need a self-esteem boost. I think this is one reason I love researching my genealogy so much: by doing so I keep the memory of these relatives alive and present in my everyday life.

The second thing that struck me was the fact that all of the cemeteries we visited were in Delaware County, where there are a total of seven Jewish cemeteries. My dad and I spent a lot of time that day talking about the migration of the Jews from Philadelphia outward. His family came from Kiev to Philadelphia in the early 1900's and lived in Strawberry Mansion for two generations. After many of his friends moved to the western suburbs, his family stayed in Strawberry Mansion because they could not afford to move. In fact, he did not move to the suburbs until after my parents were married and had two of their three kids.

The choice to move to Bucks County instead of "the main line" was because my father started working in New York, and this move would shorten his daily commute. For me, that was a choice that dictated much of my life's path. I met my best friend in preschool and, as most of you know, she is still my best friend today. My parents became founding members of a new (in 1971) synagogue in Bensalem. The new synagogue allowed my then secular parents to learn about their religion in a warm, welcoming environment. My siblings and I felt at home there, and there was no question in my mind that I wanted to raise my children the way I was raised. That is why the very first time I came to Beth El in 2000, I knew immediately that it was the community where I would raise my children. The warmth and haimish spirit was obvious and the welcoming environment allowed us all to feel that Beth El was like a second home.

Over the last 18 months, many of us have felt estranged from that second home, and some of us are still feeling cautious about reconnecting in person. Now, with the new strains of Covid, we do not know what the future will look like. As we enter the period before Rosh Hashanah, which is a time of introspection and spiritual work, we could say that all of 5781 (and a lot of 5780) was a time for introspection for many of us individually and for us as a congregation. I actually believe it was this way for much of the world. We have all faced challenges, together and separately for the last 18 months. Yet through it all, I believe that we have emerged stronger, with a new focus on moving our congregation forward. Beth El continues to be the warm, welcoming community that it has always been. Every time I call a prospective member to tell them more about Beth El and to answer their questions, my love for our community gets renewed, somehow being able to remember back to that first time I entered the building and was welcomed with warmth and the haimish spirit.

I think of my grandparents, who migrated away from organized religion because they felt it was too strict, and I am sad for them that they weren't able to have the "synagogue family" that my parents gave to me and that I gave to my children. I am so incredibly thankful that my parents moved to Bucks County and I am thankful to the man (Irv Brody z"I) who knocked on their door and asked them to start a synagogue with him and others. I am most thankful for my Beth El family, who continue to come together spiritually despite being separated physically. I look forward to seeing everyone at our Back to Shul Barbecue, Sunday, October 10th, where we can celebrate once again being together.

The Strength of Threes

Shalom friends.

In the Jewish tradition, there is a special power to the number three. There is even a special concept in Jewish lore that grants the status of a "hazakah" – or expected regular practice – to something that has occurred three times. We pray three times a day as a way to reinforce and strengthen our awareness of G-d, each other, and the world around us. You might have also heard the famous humorous adage: "two Jews, three opinions." Our diversity of perspectives also represents the strength of threes – we are not an either/or

people. We thrive from difference and discussion.

As our family enters into its third year as part of the Beth El community, I look back with gratitude at the different milestones we have marked and the memories we have created together with you during this time. It feels especially appropriate that this coming Jewish New Year we are entering into the third triennial selection of the Torah reading.

Borrowing from another famous grouping of three, the rabbis teach us that the world stands on three pillars: the pillar of Torah, the pillar of ritual service, and the pillar of acts of loving-kindness (Ethics of the Fathers 1:2).

In helping prepare programming for the synagogue, my goal as a rabbi has been to embrace these three different central pillars. We strive for the pillar of Torah in our studies together, whether through special learning experiences for youth at FJLC and one-on-one bar/bat mitzvah preparation, or for adults through the many programs offered through our Schwarz-Kurz-Zeller Adult Education Institute and also through Hazak's robust slate of programming, the Sisterhood's Secret Torah of Women series and Men's Club Torah on Tap programs. This past year, our Jewish learning took place in new and unexpected spaces, such as over zoom and sometimes even in the synagogue parking lot. We learned both from each other, for example through our popular "Share Your Passion" series, and also from other Jewish communities, through our more recent "Wandering Jews" Series.

Ritual service is embedded in regular weekday, Shabbat, and holiday services, which have been beautifully enhanced by the efforts of our team of dedicated *gabbai'im*, other service participants, and the exuberance and talent of our Shiru l'Adonai ensemble. Our newly-revamped Bubbes' Gift Shop enables our members to bring Jewish ritual into their homes through offering personal Judaica items. Additionally, it is important to recognize with gratitude the many behind-the-scenes, practical elements that enable ritual service to happen, including building maintenance, donations, and volunteer work. So much of what we do depends upon the substantial work of our volunteer leaders who oversee finances, fundraising, the building, and those who help advise us as we continue to navigate the safety issues raised by COVID. We are very blessed by the countless hours our volunteer executive and board leaders dedicate in the service of the community, as well as the commitment and hard work of Barbara Schwartz and Marian Berger in the office, and our caretakers, Norma Gomez, John Bijaczyk, and our zoom operator Kim Gomez. We are excited to welcome our new School Principal, Shari Sabath, who we know, will also meaningfully support and enhance the ritual life and I earning for our youth.

We see the pillar of acts of loving-kindness express itself in our community in a variety of ways, some more public and many more private. We are thrilled for the return of Cook for a Friend, which is entirely volunteer-powered and operates out of Beth El's kitchen and provides kosher meat meals to Jewish seniors. We are also excited for the social action committee's ongoing partnership with the Bucks County Opportunity Council's monthly food drive as well as their work with AHTN (Advocates for the Homeless & Those in Need) to provide regular meals for the homeless in our broader community.

This year, we have been blessed to learn from powerful speakers engaging us on a range of important topics to open our hearts and minds through our Federation Appreciation Shabbat, our JDAIM (Jewish Disabilities Awareness and Inclusion Month) program, our HIAS Refugee Shabbat, our program on anti-Semitism with the ADL, our second annual Pride Shabbat, our Poverty Awareness Shabbat, and more. Our membership and *chesed* committees have continually risen to the challenges of our moment, extending helping hands to congregants bearing the burdens of isolation and creating special goody bags and swag bags at key points of the year. What I have shared above represents only some of the many ways we are trying to put our values into action in the world around us.

These three pillars hold us up and sustain us, and there are so many ineffable moments of connection that I can neither formally categorize nor possibly capture adequately in words. One of the greatest joys of working in a community is the intergenerational component. It felt especially fitting that our first big return to the building as a community this past June was a Friday night video arcade party following Friday night services celebrating all of our bar and bat mitzvah students whose big day was irrevocably altered by COVID. As part of our multi-generational outreach, we have more recently created seasonal programming designed for families with babies and toddlers. It has been a pleasure to see growth and connection within and between families and friends.

May this New Year bless each of us with the opportunity to continue to grow and to flourish both as individuals and as a community and together to add our own chapter to the tradition and history of Beth El.





Tashlich, which literally translates to "casting off," is a ceremony performed on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah.


During this ceremony, Jews symbolically cast off the sins of the previous year by tossing pebbles or bread crumbs into flowing water.










About the Book:




Esther Amini, the American-born daughter of parents who had fled Mashhad, Iran, tells the story of being caught between these two worlds: the dutiful daughter of tradition-bound parents who hungers for more self-determination than tradition allows.

Amini uncovers the story of her parents' early years in Mashhad, Iran's holiest Muslim city; the little known history and persecution of Mashhad's underground Jews; the incident that steeled her mother's resolve to leave; and her parents' arduous journey to the United States, where they found themselves facing a new threat to their traditions: the threat of freedom.
