On November 5, 2021 our congregation suffered a painful loss with the passing of Marian Berger, our "professional volunteer." With the help of her husband, Milt, I write this memorial of an incredible woman.

Marian and Milt joined Congregation Beth El in July, 1970, shortly after moving to Levittown and having their first daughter, Wendy Joyce. Two years later, they had their second daughter, Debra Beth. After their children started school, Marian became involved with Sisterhood. The old Beth El building had an enormous kitchen. Sisterhood did all of the

catering for Bar & Bat Mitzvahs, weddings, extended Kiddush and special events. Marian was one of the cooks in the kitchen. She actually learned a lot about cooking by being part of the kitchen crew. They must have been great teachers and role models, because Marian was known as a great cook. After two years in Sisterhood, Marian won "Woman of the Year" at the annual paid-up membership dinner and she eventually became treasurer of Sisterhood. Marian was active with the PTO when her children were in Hebrew School. She helped to run the Purim Carnival and made hamantaschen. She also joined Hazak from its beginning. She was the treasurer and greeted people at the door when they came for food and entertainment.

When Marian started to volunteer in the Beth El Office, there were several other volunteers. Eventually, Marian became the only "full-time" volunteer. When Marian started doing the bookkeeping, all record keeping and billing were done manually using paper and pen, which is how she preferred it. Marian did not love using the computer, and according to Milt, she "suffered through" the installation of and conversion to three different synagogue software packages. When we switched to ShulCloud last year, Marian was completely overwhelmed by it, but with Barbara's help she was able to familiarize herself with the necessary aspects to complete the bookkeeping. She was very much a team player and learned what she needed to in order to continue to do the billing.

Marian volunteered her time out of a love for the congregation and received nothing tangible in return. She truly loved greeting our members, hearing our stories and sharing in our joys and tears. She had an incredible memory for details, and made us all feel like we were the only ones in the world that mattered. Even on the High Holidays, she loved being one of the greeters at the door, because she knew almost everyone who belonged to Beth El.

On November 2, 2003, at a celebration for the first 50 years of Congregation Beth El, an award was presented to Marian "In recognition of her many years of dedicated and selfless service to Congregation Beth El." I remember being at the celebration, and she was truly shocked and humbled to receive the award. I'm not sure she ever felt like she deserved the award, but every single person who interacted with her would absolutely say that she did.

As much as Marian knew about all of us, she was a private person who generally asked about others instead of talking about herself. Until her funeral, I did not know that she was a nurse. Although she preferred to not talk about herself, when asked, she always beamed with pride talking about her children and 5 grandchildren. For Marian, there was little difference between her daughters and their husbands...she treated her sons-in-law as if they were her own. Each of her grandchildren felt incredibly close to her and had a special relationship with her. She was truly a matriarch to her entire family.

She was also a matriarch and role model to the Beth El community. We will all truly miss her. I miss her I miss her two syllable "hi" every time I come into the building. I miss seeing her whole body laugh when I rolled my eyes at her every time she wanted to discuss billing. I even miss her apologizing to me for "taking so much of my time" reviewing bills (although every time she did, I'd roll my eyes at her again...and she'd laugh again). I miss catching up with her.

I believe her family summed up her life beautifully in her obituary: "Marian dedicated her life to her family, her community, her synagogue and to anyone who needed help. There are few people as caring and free from malice as Marian was. She never had an unkind word for anyone, was always the first to step up to help, and could always be counted on to work harder and longer than anyone else. Trained as a nurse, she epitomized the caring nature associated with nursing...Her time on this earth might have ended, but her impact will be felt for decades by the people she loved and cared for, and those who will remember her kindness and try to act as she would have. WWMD- What would Marian Do?"

Thanks to a generous donation from Milt, the synagogue office will soon be dedicated in Marian's memory. I cannot think of a more fitting memorial to such an incredible woman.

Purim 2020 Larry Schachter, Barbara Schwartz, Marian Berger, Karen Lewin



Shalom friends,

As I write, we are winding down the secular calendar year of 2021, a year in which many of our loved ones experienced health challenges as the world as a whole navigated substantial turmoil and continued uncertainty. In the laws of *bikkur cholim*, the mitzvah of visiting the sick, in the Shulchan Arukh, the authoritative 16th century Jewish law code, there is a particularly striking phrase repeated throughout the commandment. The phrase that commanded my attention was "mevakesh alav rachamim," which literally means "request for him mercy." The phrase comes in the context of praying on behalf of a loved one who is ill and its resonances are great and many.

Notably, we are not simply commanded to pray for those who are ill – we are instructed to implore God for mercy on their behalf. I was especially struck that this exact phrase appears in a commentary on the section in the book of Leviticus dealing with a certain kind of spiritual and physical contamination, when the rabbis imagine the Torah's description of the person afflicted with the spiritual and physical malady of *tzaraat* running through the camp declaring his status, "Impure! Impure!"—as a means to elicit communal compassion. In other words, the sick person's declaration of her/his condition would automatically arouse her/his community into a state of prayer for mercy, thus expressing deep care.

The above notion of "requesting mercy" is a deeply powerful spiritual concept—one that feels all too fitting for this moment in time. In each instance of the rabbis encouraging us to request for mercy, we are reminded that we live communally, that we spiritually live through prayer and mercy, specifically, through invoking the divine quality of compassion for those for whom we care. There are times when we feel limited by what we can do physically for those we love who face life's greatest challenges, such as illness and danger, but there is no limit to the mercy we can request for them and for our world. Our fellow people, our world – these are fragile and irreplaceable entities, and they are, indeed, most deserving of God's infinite mercy.

One of God's famous divine attributes mentioned both in the Torah and in rabbinic sources is mercy; in Aramaic, one of the names for God, *Rachamana*, actually derives from this very quality. As we turn to God for divine mercy, we also turn inward and reach for that essential God-given capacity for mercy which makes us most uniquely and divinely human. During what we hope and fervently pray are the final innings of the worst of COVID, during a time of heightened anti-Semitism and other forms of violent bigotry, and especially in the aftermath of a year of climate disasters sweeping the globe, including mass-scale flooding and fires, and more recently, the devastating tornadoes in Kentucky, we must remember that there is no better place to start to ask for mercy than our own hearts. At home, here at Beth El, we just recently lost a major pillar of our community, with the untimely passing of Marian Berger, longtime member and super volunteer. If you have visited or called our office over the years, you have undoubtedly encountered Marian's signature warmth and thoughtful care. As a community, we feel her loss every day, and her example of kindness is a reminder of the divine mercy for which we pray.

In our prayers, we ask for mercy on behalf of those who are hurting—even on Shabbat, when we otherwise refrain from specific petitionary prayer. So urgent is the call for mercy that we ask for it each day and each moment. We ask for mercy as a community with the knowledge that we are surrounded by a loving community who would do the same for us.

When I was in kindergarten, our teacher read us a story about a little red lighthouse on a huge river. The lighthouse had the very important job of protecting the ships and boats that traveled on the river with the help of its caretaker, the man with the keys. One day, a construction crew started building something on the riverbanks. The little lighthouse was intrigued by this and wondered what would finally be built. The man with the keys continued to come every day to turn on the lights and foghorn when needed. Eventually, the bridge was finished and towered over the little lighthouse. There was a blinking light on top of it. The lighthouse felt small and insignificant. Did the river need it anymore?

One foggy night, the man didn't come. The lighthouse took this as a sign that it was no longer needed and would be forgotten. The bridge was big and powerful, and the lighthouse couldn't compete. Boats and ships were still on the river and one of them almost ran aground because the lighthouse wasn't working. Finally, the man with the keys came and hurried to turn on the lights and the foghorn so the river could be safe again for the boats and ships.

The bridge explained that its light was for the planes not for vessels on the water and that the lighthouse was still very much needed. Together, the bridge, the man with the keys, and the lighthouse made the river safe for ships and planes alike.

It has been quite some time since I was in kindergarten and while I had to look up the details of the story, I did remember the message. One lighthouse can make a big difference. One person can make a big difference.

During January and February, we celebrate Tu B'Shevat and prepare for the celebration of Purim. Tu B'Shevat is the birthday of the trees but has become a symbol for conservation and protecting the environment. Each of us can do our part in protecting the world around us. On Purim we read the story of Esther. One woman was able to save an entire community by using her resources and believing in herself. From the little red lighthouse, we learn that we don't have to do something BIG or with a group to make a difference in the world.

On January 16, the FJLC will have our annual Mitzvah Day during the MLK Day of Service weekend. Each of us will do our small part in making a difference in the world by cooking, delivering food, collecting needed items, making cards and more. Just like the lighthouse, we will be making a difference in the community around us.





We are pleased to announce that this year's "One Book" is People Love Dead Jews: Reports from a Haunted Presented by Dara Horn.

Dara Horn will be appearing at a One Book event on **Thursday, January 27, at 8:00pm**. The program, which is co-sponsored by Gratz College and Drexel University, will be held on the Drexel University campus. We will also be offering a discussion of the book here at Beth El, later in the year.



"People Love Dead Jews: Reports from a Haunted Present" is a startling exploration of how Jewish history is exploited to comfort the living. Reflecting on subjects as far-flung as the international veneration of Anne Frank, the blockbuster traveling exhibition called Auschwitz, the Jewish history of the Chinese city of Harbin, and the little known "righteous Gentile" Varian Fry, Dara Horn challenges us to confront the reasons why there might be so much fascination with Jewish deaths, as emblematic of the worst of evils the world has to offer, and so little respect for Jewish lives as they continue to unfold in the present.

Horn draws on her own family's life — trying to explain Shakespeare's Shylock to a curious 10-year-old, her anger when swastikas are drawn on desks at her children's school in New Jersey, the profound and essential perspective offered by traditional religious practice, prayer and study — to assert the vitality, complexity and depth of this life against an anti-Semitism that, far from being disarmed by the mantra of "Never Forget" is on the rise.
