
# 2021-2022

## Financial Overview 2021-22

The LJCC ended our 2021-22 fiscal year in good shape thanks to the generosity and hard work of our members. Contributions included funds donated to offset the cost of cantorial services for High Holidays this year and a significant donation to the LJCC general fund. Contributions outpaced the previous year by about \$20,000, and dues outpaced the previous year by about \$7,000. We welcomed some new members into the community and are grateful for their presence and their contributions.

The blintz brunch, the LJCC's signature fundraiser, raised about \$7,000 for the community thanks to the hard work of the committee and volunteers under the leadership of Beth Schwartz.

Our expenditures on staff for the last year are fairly consistent with the prior year. We anticipated that expenses will increase in the coming year now that we have two part-time staff members managing administrative organizational work (Nixx Sandidge) and programs and operations (Jordan Wade). These staff work alongside the LJCC security coordinator (Steve Hurst), custodian (Brandon Steinke), and handyman (Jeff Ridgeway). We benefit from professional services provided for our accounting (Jan Stewart) and technology (Patrick Wong).

Religious school expenses were minimal in the most recent year given that students attended school online with Topeka Beth Shalom.

Cemetery expenses were closely in line with cemetery income for the last year. After some review and discussion of records and funds related to the capital campaign for the cemetery conducted a number of years ago, the board and cemetery committee agreed that funds for capital improvements to the cemetery are designated for cemetery use in the coming year.

Any report of LJCC finances for 2021-22 would be incomplete without recognition of the significant work Les Schwartz accomplished for the community. Les oversaw a shift to a new bank, streamlined accounting practices, and helped direct the community to a more fiscally sound position. We ended the year with a budget overage of more than \$35,000 due in no small part to his guidance and leadership. In addition, after stepping down from the treasurer role, Les continued on in the position to keep the congregation running smoothly and assist in the transition to Jordan Yochim.

## Committee Reports

#### **Cemetery Committee:**

The LJCC owns and is responsible for the Beni Israel / B'nai Israel Cemetery near Eudora. The historic Beni Israel portion of the cemetery is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. This year saw some important changes at the Cemetery.

The Cemetery Committee installed new decorative fencing to designate the "halachic" section of the cemetery. In that area of the cemetery, the traditional Jewish burial laws are strictly adhered to. The cemetery bylaws mandate that there be a halachic section, and the new fencing is an important part of establishing that area.

The committee also purchased a storage shed and had it moved into the northwest corner of the cemetery. This will permit secure storage of grave marking materials, garden tools, hoses and other cemetery tools and supplies.

Priorities for the next year (and beyond) include improving the cemetery road, repairing broken historic tombstones, installing signage, creating small seating areas and doing decorative plantings on the north and west sides of the cemetery. The plantings will also serve as windbreaks and create more privacy. Some of these projects could be eligible for grant funding, which the Committee will study, and recommend to the Board if deemed feasible.

The Cemetery Committee thanks Jonathan Paretsky for several years of ably and tenaciously leading the Committee, and Michael Fox for serving as a valuable committee member. Both gentlemen have stepped off of the committee. John Hoopes joined the committee this year and is the new chair. John is working on compiling all cemetery procedures into one easy to read document. Neil Shanberg and Barry Shalinsky continue serving on the committee, and spearheaded the shed acquisition and halachic fencing projects respectively.

The Committee could use 1 – 3 new members and is actively seeking interested volunteers. We are also seeking regular and/or one-time donations for ongoing cemetery maintenance.

#### **Religious School Action Committee:**

Our second year of pandemic religious school was again online with our friends at Temple Beth Sholom in Topeka. We were thankful for the opportunity to join with them online. But we are very excited to report that now that all our little ones can be vaccinated, Religious School will return in-person in the fall.

We have hired Rachel Downs-Doubrava to serve as our Religious School Director. Rachel is a long-time Lawrence resident who teaches art at Free State High School. She has lots of great ideas about bringing her passion for Judaism, children, and art to our religious school. We are still looking for teachers -so if you have any prospects, send them our way.

This coming year we also will initiate a new program for teens called Kulam. The Kulam program equips Jewish teens of all genders to engage in dynamic and authentic conversations in order to think reflectively, act courageously, and develop healthy, honest relationships. In this program, Jewish teens ask big questions about where, why, and how they belong, while exploring issues of identity, equity, and justice.

We can't wait to see how we can grow once we're back in the building!

#### **Ritual Committee:**

This year, the ritual committee continued to grapple with the challenges of ever-changing pandemic conditions. There were several moments in 2021 when it seemed as though we were on the verge of a permanent return to in-person weekly services, only for a sudden renewed surge of COVID-19 to send us back to Zoom. Recently, however, we have been pleased to reintroduce Friday night services at the LJCC itself, in hybrid form, as well as Saturday morning services once a month.

On the holiday front, we had a wonderful Days of Awe last fall, made all the more poignant by the news that our beloved cantor, Rachel Black, will finally be moving on in her career to a permanent position elsewhere. We are hot on the trail of leads for new cantors or service leaders. Other highlights of the year happened outdoors as well, including our Passover scavenger hunt and potluck, with creative contributions and natural knowledge provided by Ken Lassman, and our Sukkot and Lag Ba'Omer gatherings on the LJCC patio.

The ritual committee welcomes anyone who enjoys thinking about, celebrating, and planning Jewish holidays, from Shabbat to Purim. These are challenging times for religious communities, but we hope in the coming year not just to have a High Holidays that live up to the past but to revitalize and re-energize our ordinary weekly practice, by building an everlarger bench of lay leaders ready and willing to assume responsibility for service leadership.

#### **Tikkun Olam Committee:**

The Tikkun Olam Committee is excited to gather in the coming weeks to reengage with issues important to our Jewish lives. Join us in person or online for these events:

#### Monday, June 20. Religious Freedom and Reproductive Justice.

Sharon Brett, Legal Director, ACLU of Kansas will share timely information about the upcoming proposed amendment to the Kansas state constitution that would allow legislative limitations on abortion. We will examine questions related to reproductive rights from a Jewish lens and understand how this proposal relates to religious freedom.

#### July 2022. Forum on Antisemitism and Justice.

Sam Brody, associate professor of religious studies at the University of Kansas, will present on the history and current expressions of antisemitism in the US. With that as a starting point, we will consider the relationship antisemitism has to other barriers to justice in our time and how our Jewish community can chip away at those barriers.

#### **August 2022. What We Can Do About Violence.**

The decades-long conversation we have had in America about violence has led many people to feel hopeless and out of control. We will focus on steps that each of us can take, right away, to mitigate the scourge of violence and the sense of threat that our communities experience.

#### **Summer 2022. LJCC Blood Drive**

#### **Programs and Adult Education:**

The Board recently decided to combine the Adult Education Committee with the programs and operations staff position since the two are doing overlapping work. Jordan Wade works with Suzanne Sherr and others on the former committee to plan educational programming and events.

In the past year we have worked hard to keep online programming going during the times when we could not meet together in person. Events in 2022 have included four Lunch and Learn programs, a book club meeting, monthly in-person Rosh Chodesh meetups, and programming associated with various Jewish holidays.

Our Rosh Chodesh program has been bringing in lots of new faces and we are excited to continue these events at the beginning of every Hebrew month. The event is meant to celebrate the new moon and create space for creativity, rest, and conversation among femaleidentifed, non-binary, and trans folks in our community.

In the upcoming year we are planning a live musical event, several speaker series in conjunction with other committees, a continuation of the Lunch and Learn programs, and several unique lecture opportunities for our congregation.

The goal of this committee is to provide the types of Jewish programming that our community wants, both religious and secular. In the time of Zoom and hybrid programming many things are possible for our small community that we did not previously have access to. If you have a program that you would like to see at the LJCC in the next year please reach out to Jordan and she will be happy to talk about planning and organizing.

## Financial Highlights for 2022-23

- -This is a deficit operating budget, but the board anticipates that fundraising and/or the sizable carryover from last year can be used to offset most if not all of the deficit
- -The board took a very conservative approach to estimating operating revenue and a liberal approach to estimating operating expenses
- -The budget committee, in preparing the proposal for the board's and congregation's consideration, looked at the actual revenue/expense outcomes from the full year pre-pandemic to help inform this year's budget
- -The board wants to adhere to the congregation's decision to provide religious education at no cost to members. To do so we hope tzedakah will cover the costs of the school (~\$15,000) for the year. Non-members will be asked to pay a fee
- -We are separating out the cemetery expenses some annual operating expenses that must be covered every year were incorporated into other expenses (e.g. groundskeeping) that clouded the true cost of maintaining the cemetery
- -Kitchen upgrades are not part of the operating budget but represent tzedakah opportunities. Similarly, cemetery upgrades will rely on the use of funds that were dedicated for the cemetery some time ago and are not part of this year's operating budget


