Dear Chaverim.

In the dark months of the year we celebrate this Festival of Lights. Holiday decorations illuminate the sidewalks or streets that otherwise might be dark. We ourselves are supposed to light our Hannukiyot in a place in

the house that can publicize the miracle -- often in a window to the street. On this holiday we are not shy to be proud of our Jewish identity - after all - this is what the holiday is all about. Our ancestors celebrated the resilience against an overpowering (hellenistic) universal civilization holding on to their particular identity, empowering themselves to take a stance of independence. They did it with courage in the days of the Maccabees, and prevailed. Later, after political defeat and the destruction of the Temple, they held onto the Talmudic story of the miracle of the oil that lasted 8 nights - a spiritual resilience throughout the ages. Since the establishment of the modern state of Israel, the Maccabean narrative of military prowess and national independence has regained attention and our modern pride of our Jewish identity is intertwined with the fact of the existence of a modern Jewish sovereignty reflected in statehood.

And yet - we once again feel the fragility of our accomplishments as humankind: There is still no end in sight for the war in Ukraine and every few weeks we sense the potential for a new world war. Inflation is curbed a little bit, but living expenses still are so much higher than before the pandemic. The world seems to be a powder keg once more. Israeli politics reminds one of the last few decades of the Temple times with so many factions competing for power and radicalisation in high and low places. Antisemitism regionally, and nationally are a fact that cannot be denied anymore. Thunderstorms and clouds all around, if we would speak in meteorologist terms.

This year, we need these Hanukkah lights. This year, we will relish them.

With every night we light, we will set a tone of resilience, of inspiration, of the potential to goodness, peace, and wholeness that we can midwive into reality! The act of lighting is the act of withstanding the darkness, confusion and instability of our world.

When I think of Hanukkah this year, I imagine every night a different bright, shining, little-light that defuses darkness somewhere in the world. Be it the three new rabbis in Europe, whose ordination I witnessed in October in Germany. One of them, Rabbi Irene, is only the second Spanish rabbi since the expulsion in 1492 and herself the first woman in Spain serving as rabbi! A small light that represents, at the minimum, the strengthening of small Jewish communities in Europe and may end up kindling a new era in the region.

Another kindling light at Beth El are our new Kabbalot Shabbat at our home, where we combine the spirit of prayer with the warmth of home hospitality. We invite you to come bring in Shabbat together and enjoy song, prayer, good food, and the company of each other. We had the first lovely gathering on the Friday of Thanksgiving. Daniel and I invite you to come to our home on Friday night of Hanukkah, December 23 at 5:00 pm (RSVP required)!

Another such kindling of Jewish strength is our new Bogrim program that launched successfully in August and engages the 8th and 9th graders in our community as they discuss and navigate Jewish adolescence to find their voice as part of Jewish and general society. These are just three examples, yet when you look around, you can discover so many more lights of warmth, inspiration, kindness, and resilience, even in this time and age!

This year, when you light your candles, place them proudly so that your neighbors can see them, set an intention each night how to celebrate your Jewish self and the Jewish heritage that you've been handed (from ancestors or through family ties). This year, be a resilient Jew determined to bring your particular light into the world with every day you kindle.

I hope everyone had an enjoyable Thanksgiving! As we embark on the season of giving and gratitude, I once again extend my thanks to all of you who help make Beth El our spiritual home. As we move past the media's barrage of election ads, we are now consumed with holidav ads, music, sentimental movies (which I love), and important causes support those in need.

One of our major priorities at Beth El is our commitment to repairing the world/Tikkun Olam. Our community strives to give for all 12 months of the year. We answer this call so generously whether by donation of time, skill, money, clothing, or food. We do this because we, as Jews, are called upon to leave the world in a better place than when we found it.

Our giving is not just an individual act, but it is also an act central to our purpose as a community. This quote from Rabbi Jonathan Sacks resonated deeply with me and speaks to why being part of Beth El or a synagogue embodies the essence of living a Jewish life.

"Communities of faith are where we preserve the values and institutions that protect our humanity."

In a time where we are barraged with anti-semitic tropes spiraling on all forms of media, Beth El needs to speak up and take a stand. For if not us, then who?

Beth El also needs to continue to repair the world by touching lives through our Chessed committee, monthly social action drives benefiting Valencia Newcomer School and CASS Homeless Shelter, Blanket Boosters, b'nai mitzvah projects, and annual turkey donations.

You may not be aware, but we have several partnerships with other communities around the Valley that physically use our building or participate with us. Our building and our institution is essential to this work.

- Every Thursday the Refugee Welcome Center uses our dairy kitchen to prepare 50-100 weekly meals and snacks. Additionally they collect winter coat, household, and kitchen item donations.
- In our lobby we have permanent collection bins for Ezras Cholim AZ Kosher Pantry and Nourish PHX.
- Recently, Ezras Cholim hosted a trial run of their new food truck to feed the homeless in our parking lot.
- Gesher Disability Resources used our classes during the summer for a special camp that was open to the community.

All these partnerships and others happen because we at Beth El have made a commitment to try and do more in our local community.

On Christmas Day another opportunity to act is scheduled. The social action committee is organizing in-person, hands-on projects and brunch. For those of us looking for something to do on Christmas, please join my family and I at Beth El, where together we can engage and do our part to help.

November was a very busy month in the preschool. We had our annual Fall Festival, which was enjoyed by the children and teachers very much. We had many parents who volunteered to help us. There was a pumpkin maze, art projects, face painting, and all the children had their pictures taken on a bale of hay made to look like a horse. Nora Elias, our Pre-K teacher, created and coordinated this event.

After the event was over, we had fun with the pumpkins checking out the insides of pumpkins by counting the seeds and then roasting them. The children said, "the seeds feel slimy," and "it looks likes spider webs!" The 3's and Pre-K classes did science experiments making a volcano erupt inside the pumpkin using baking soda and vinegar. The children had many ideas to add and make it colorful. The 3's class made pumpkin soup and pumpkin pie to share with everyone else. The Pre-K class made pumpkin cookies and had a Thanksgiving feast with their parents via Zoom.

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
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
