

Since I came on board the Beth El community in August 2019 to sail together towards new horizons the world has changed dramatically. It's been a journey through a whirlwind of an ever-changing reality, being A. Nitzan Stein Kokin swept into new forms of worship and gatherings virtually that we wouldn't have imagined before. With the new

ever emerging variants of the Coronavirus it has been quite a journey for all of us, be it privately or as a sacred community. Every time we reset the sails, a new variant blows along and makes us adjust our plans and rethink. And yet despite it all: We've kept our boat steady, sailing ahead despite the unexpected twists and turns. Such is life. It brings us all kinds of surprises - with or without a pandemic.

When I chose to become a rabbi and to serve a congregation like ours I didn't expect to teach and engage through screens from behind a mask where you can hardly discern my welcoming smile to you! And at the same time I am thankful for modern technology which makes it possible to meet and pray together despite physical distance. With the unforeseen turn that my rabbinate took in the first year of my pulpit I am often reminded of one of my role models, the first woman rabbi of the 20th century - Rabbi Regina Jonas, who served in Germany under the much greater duress of the Nazi-dictatorship and persecution. She certainly had envisioned her rabbinate very differently when she trained for it in the 1920s. Her response when asked about her decision to become a rabbi very much resonates with me today: "my belief in the Godly calling and my love for people. God has placed abilities and callings in our hearts, ... Thus each of us has the duty, whether man or woman, to realize those gifts God has given." I love being with our Beth El community! I love the people and I am happy to continue to serve you here with my abilities, talents, and education as your rabbi.

These days, I am often reminded of the Israelites wandering in the wilderness, not exactly sure where the next camp would be set up or how long they would march until they got there. However, the cloud and the pillar of fire were with them day and night. The Manna fell dependably and sustained them. But they did need to go out together to collect it. Those were all signs of one thing they could be sure of, that they were partners in a sacred covenant with the God of Israel on a journey together into the future.

My installation was initially planned for March 2020 and yet the shelter-in-place order came the week before our planned celebration. This month, with Installation 2.0, we now have the opportunity to celebrate the renewal of our mutual commitment as rabbi and community. Being the rabbi of Beth El is much more for me than just signing a contract. It is a covenantal relationship that began when I first came, and now with the renewal we confirm and solidify our sacred covenant. It means that we continue to be there for each other, that we will stay together through celebrations and losses. That we learn, pray, have fun, support each other and create meaning together. I've become part of our congregational family and God willing, will be with you through joys and sorrows in the years to come. And it is this commitment to each other that we mark and celebrate this month as we continue to navigate the uncharted waters of our journey into the future.

Jonathan Angress Cantor

Voice recitals. Vocal jury. Voice forum. Collegium Musicum. These terms are synonymous among any and every vocal performance music student within every music school and conservatory throughout the world. They were terms that I became very familiar with while I was a voice student and music major at the University of Miami's Frost School of Music.

Upon beginning cantorial school at the Jewish Theological Seminary, a new collegiate musical term, *nusach presentation*, entered my musical student lexicon. A nusach presentation functions as a combination of a musical voice trial compounded with a mock prayer service, so that our cantorial teachers can provide feedback on our vocal, instrumental, and davening skills. Even though the presentation would take place on a weekday morning, we would pretend that it was either Shabbat, Yom Tov, or the High Holidays for the 30 minute presentation.

There were many requirements and musical parameters for each presentation. For example, we would be required to use different musical styles and ensembles in the presentation in order to create an eclectic musical experience. These styles and components would range from solo cantorial compositions, modern compositions, duets, choir pieces, congregational singing, and instrumental accompaniment (i.e. guitar, piano, and/or band). For some of us, we took it upon ourselves to compose and write liturgical melodies in the event that we did not find any musical selections that we preferred to use. I myself made it a point to compose a new melody for each nusach presentation that I performed and officiated in cantorial school.

When I began my first full time cantorial position in Florida, I was tasked with teaching new, fun, and upbeat service melodies to the Hebrew school. I distinctly remember having a conversation with the rabbi and Hebrew school director about the standard existing melodies for *V'shamru*. I learned there was a general consensus that the standard melodies for *V'shamru* were not well loved or successful in the Hebrew school. As a result, this left me with very little options of something new and fun to teach the students. So, I went about composing my own melody which instantly became a hit, not only among the Hebrew school students, but eventually among the congregation itself. Even though I am no longer at that congregation, I am told that the melody is still used regularly.

At the beginning of this school year, the Beth El clergy and Talmud Torah director and staff took the initiative as a team to revamp *tefillah* (prayer) education for our students. Part of this reconstruction is introducing new and fun melodies to our students. As a result, just like with *V'shamru* several years ago in Florida, I ran into

the same issue with the prayer *Mi Chamocha*. Most of the standard melodies for this prayer (along with the ones that are part of the custom of Beth El) are very slow and would not necessarily be engaging for young students. So, I went about composing and writing a new, fun, and upbeat *Mi Chamocha* that so far, has been a resounding success in the Talmud Torah. It is my hope that sometime soon, I will be able to introduce it during our regular services for the congregation.

Why do I specifically mention V'shamru and Mi Chamocha? Most recently, I was approached by a cantorial colleague from within the Cantors Assembly (the overseeing entity of Conservative movement cantors and my union) to submit for consideration, new melodies for Shabbat tefillot to be included in a new publication of Jewish synagogue music. Among the many melodies that I have either composed or arranged, my V'shamru and Mi Chamocha were chosen to be officially published in "Shirata: Congregational Melodies for Shabbat and Yom Tov" which will include over 200 new melodies composed from within the past decade. I am honored to have been chosen among my colleagues as one of the many composers contributing to this publication and it is my hope that my V'shamru and Mi Chamocha will reach people and provide a new outlook and inspiration for Jews not only here at Beth El, but all over the world.

As soon as the publication is completed, I will be sure to let our community know and I will make sure to have at least one copy of the publication in my office, if anyone would be interested in perusing it.

The Magic of the Calendar

Our calendar, the Hebrew calendar, reminds of us a time before the incandescent bulb had the almost magical effect of turning night into day. Before this transformation, our whole approach to the day, the month and the year, was driven by the lights in the sky. And for us, the moon commanded our attention, and in important ways, it still does.

Our calendar's cycles reflect the periods of the moon, with each period celebrated in our recognition of *Rosh Chodesh*. As *Sh'vat* yields to *Adar* I, we announce the transition from waning crescent to new moon with the special prayers and thanksgiving to mark the head of the month. And as we do this, I invite you to take a minute to reflect on a couple of aspects of the calendar.

First, this year we have not just one *Adar*, but two! Ordinary folks get to celebrate a leap day every 4 years, but we have the special joy and opportunity to celebrate a bonus month. This happens 7 times in the 19-year cycle of the Hebrew calendar, and the addition of a bonus month modulates the gyration of the Hebrew calendar as it sways (or some say it waves) through our lives, causing others – but certainly not us(!) – to remark about how late or early our holidays fall in comparison to the Gregorian calendar.

Second, let's take a few moments to reflect how the sages and scientists, farmers and shopkeepers, rabbis and others came together to do their work. In a time before Wikipedia, the Encyclopedia Britannica, the LED, and central air conditioning, people observed the heavens, studied the movement of the stars, planets and moon, and through their observations, they calculated the periods of their movement to give us the calendar.

We arrive in a world as innocents and can so easily be lulled into believing that the way things are "now" is the way they have always been and will always be. And yet, we know that this is not true. We know that things change and have always changed, and we hope always for the better. The calendar is no exception. And we know that there were those who fought the idea of the calendar's cycle because of the challenge this concept brought to the long-held belief in an Earth-centered world.

Adar II – and yes, the Gregorian calendar too – serve as reminders of our place in the universe, and the importance of our reliance on our accumulated knowledge to strive for more and better understanding, while retaining a sense of who we are and where we have been. Members like Ellen Goot and Mathis Becker do this now (and Kathy Miller too!) with their keeping the Chapel's yahrzeit plaques posted each month. Their work to help keep fresh the names of these cherished members reminds of a time that once was and the role we each play in making this a better world.

The start of February is always a special time. Spring Training. The Super Bowl. The World Wide Wrap. And this year, the start of *Adar!* Join us at Beth El in the many celebrations that will take place this month, and when you do, take some time to reflect on the wonders of the world, including the calendar, which helps to create order out of the chaos of time.

Now comes the Shabbat meal, the time we enjoy the festive meal.

January seemed to be colder than usual but our children were still able to go outside and plant seeds in our new garden box. We also planted in our existing boxes that the PTO made for us several years ago. The classes start learning at Tu B'Shevat about trees and continue on from there to studying everything that grows in the ground, nutrition, and

even science and math. The children learn that it takes time for our food in the garden to grow and there are seasons to grow different things. Even though Passover is not until April, they talked about what they can grow in their garden now that will be ready for the Seder. They plan on growing enough for the school's class Seders and take home for their own families. They are planting parsley, lettuce, tomatoes, and zucchini. Each class has their own above ground garden bed and they discuss and choose what they would like to plant. There are also large pots in which they planted flowers. Nora Elias, our Head Teacher and Mentor, plans our special school events. Because of the pandemic we haven't had school-wide events with parents, but she always manages to create fun learning programs for each individual age group. The classes go outside one at a time to enjoy the activities during each event.

Our school is in a position that now more than ever is important to the community. We keep our children safe, active, and learning as we always have, but now there is an added component. During this time, families need to isolate more and each of them do it in their own way. Bringing their children to our school encourages socialization and provides a sense of normalcy. Our staff is considered essential workers so we have added pressure to come to work and keep our school open. The shortage of employees is noticed everywhere these days, and some places have had to close due to lack of staff. We do not have enough teachers to open another class or enroll more children. I love my job, and I love working at the synagogue I grew up at. Our team of teachers are a family and we all love what we do. 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
