

Dear Friends,

As we begin to venture into the summer, we start to look ahead in the liturgical calendar to the last of the *Shalosh Regalim* - the Three Festivals during the Jewish year: *Shavuot. Shavuot* is known as the Feast of Weeks where biblically, we marked the wheat harvest in the land of Israel. It also commemorates the giving of

the Aseret Hadibrot - the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai.

In the past, I have taught about the special piece of liturgy we recite on Shavuot, the *Akdamut* prayer as part of the opening of the Torah service. I have spoken and written about how *Akdamut* has a very special melody attributed to it, a melody we also use for the Evening Kiddush during the Three Festivals. This melody, which has origins in Eastern Europe, is what is known to most American Jews today. However, as with most prayers and elements of Jewish music, there is almost always more than one melody for a given piece of text. And *Akdamut* is no different.

Throughout the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, I have had the opportunity to view the live streams of many other synagogues throughout the country and even throughout the world. My mentor and colleague in Los Angeles, Hazzan Lance Tapper, introduced me to the live stream of the services from the Pestalozzistrasse Synagogue in Berlin, Germany. This style of service and it's musical offerings (which includes organ accompaniment) hold a very special place in my heart, not only because of the high brow caliber of the music but also because the majority of the music is what my family grew up hearing in shul, first in Germany and then later on in Chicago. One element of the services at Pestalozzistrasse is what is known as the organ prelude and postlude. The prelude is played by the organist in the minutes leading up to the official start of the service, usually while the congregation is taking their seats and settling in (pre-COVID-19). The postlude is played while the congregation exits the sanctuary.

The 19th century German Jewish composer, Louis Lewandowski, who's synagogue compositions comprise the majority of the services at Pestalozzistrasse, composed a selection of 5 organ preludes for the festivals: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Passover, and Shavuot. Each prelude utilizes musical themes and motifs that are specific to the holiday. The Rosh Hashanah prelude uses the High Holy Day ma'ariv motif, the Yom Kippur prelude uses the Kol Nidrei melody, the Sukkot prelude uses the musical theme of the na'anu'im (the waving of the lulav and etrog), and the Passover prelude uses the melody of Adir Hu from the seder. The Shavuot prelude uses a musical motif that

is specific to only Shavuot. The melody for *Akdamut*, however, it is not the melody that I mentioned above and that we in the United States already know. In Western Europe, particularly in Germany, the Akdamut melody is different and is even more melodious than the Eastern European version which is more chant-like. Lewandowski uses this Western European - German *Akdamut* melody as the musical theme of his Shavuot prelude.


Due to the pandemic, synagogues all over the world have created online content, not just live streamed services, but pre-recorded videos of content that their community offers. Pestalozzistrasse is no exception, having released many videos of their community's musical traditions. One of these videos is of the Lewandowski Shavuot organ prelude being played on the organ of the Pestalozzistrasse Synagogue. This video can be found at this link: https://youtu.be/5DxPooUqZ7A

It is my hope that during Shavuot this year, I may be able to incorporate this wonderful Western European German *Akdamut* melody along with the Eastern European version we all know and love. And hopefully these two melodies together will help uplift and inspire us during this year's Shavuot celebration.


