### Dear Chaverim,

On Friday, May 6, our Hebrew School concludes for the year. We will celebrate with a participatory Family Kabbalat Shabbat and Israelthemed dinner in honor of Yom HaAtzma-ut. We will sing and cele-A. Nitzan Stein Kokin brate together, and look back in gratitude on a year in which we came back in person for several fun Family

Shabbatot and Holiday dinners, creatively defying the waves of Coronavirus variants. This time we will sit in a prayer circle with a small group of song leaders in the middle and let the music draw us into an evening of Ruach - Spirit. Some of the newer melodies we've learned in Talmud Torah will be shared with you that night, others we've already sung even in our regular minvanim.

This format follows a new approach in prayer education we have taken in the Hebrew School throughout the past school year. At the end of the school day, all grades join together and greet the new week with Havdalah and camp-style melodies which teach our traditional Hebrew prayers in a joyful, innovative and engaging way. For some of our prayers we move our whole bodies or use hand signs. There is a moment of mindful silence at the beginning, in which we set an intention for the new week, thinking about how we can increase the good in the world, in our families, in our schools, with our friends. In short - we teach our children that our Hebrew prayers can elevate our minds, bodies, and souls.

Some of this new approach has also spilled over to our adult Shabbat experience, with two additional offerings on Shabbat mornings. Once a month, Wendy Rozov offers a meditation service at 10:15 am which is rooted in the Hebrew prayer language and enables you to delve deeper into the soul-body connection. We have a small group of regulars already and I would like to encourage you to try it out. It is on our Beth El Calendar; join Wendy one morning!

In a more intellectual stream is our Be'er HaTorah Study, now taking place during Kiddush at a few designated tables in the Social Hall. Pick up your food at the buffet and join for a discussion of the parasha with classic commentaries. We delve into the questions that we bring to the text through a close reading of the literal, contextual meaning - the P'Shat - and then explore the interpretations and questions asked by great biblical commentators like Rashi, Ibn Ezra, Nachmanides, and more. Be'er HaTorah takes place on regular Shabbatot, when there is no family Simcha. We have survived as a distinct Jewish people throughout the millennia thanks to continuous learning and innovative application of the ancient sacred principles of Torah in our lives. Join us for one Shabbat lunch and try it out.

Looking back on the school year before heading into the summer, I am especially grateful for our renewed teen engagement. Coming out of the isolation of the pandemic, Roberta Harmon has revived our youth experience with creative USY and Kadima events. We now again have a regular teen experience for our Preand post-B'nai Mitzvah youth which we missed dearly during the first 18 months of the pandemic. I am especially proud of our teen leaders who spearheaded the new Torah Club Shabbat (still searching for a cool name - write me your suggestions...), on April 2nd, when a small group of teens took over leading our Shabbat services and big parts of the Torah reading. We will be back in the fall - stay tuned! Another project for continued youth engagement currently in the works is the new Bogrim program we are planning to introduce in August. We will offer learning and teen engagement on Sunday mornings twice a month, complementing our already well established Madrichim program. If you know of 8th or 9th graders who might be interested, please put them in touch with us!

There is so much more I could share here with you for which I am grateful. It was a good year in being able to strengthen our in-person community and I look forward to continuing to reinvigorate Beth El on this front!

As school comes to end and we get ready for summer, I always like to take time and reflect back on the good times, and the not-so-good times, and the plans for future times. The pandemic is still around, but the children are resilient this is their world. Our teachers, the 3's class and Pre-K class continue to wear masks. We taught all classes about being safe - washing our hands, not shar-

ing food, or hugging. They learned how to show our friends we care without being physically close. We also talked about good nutrition and exercising to stay healthy. The PTO was finally able to hold a family fundraiser, the Tomatina Festival, which not only raised money, but was fun for the whole family and the community.

The Department of Economic Security helped a lot of preschools by providing a stainability grant which helped us increase pay for our teachers. We had to keep our class sizes small due to the community-wide teacher staffing shortage. Our staff is amazing and pitched in wherever and whenever needed to keep our school and kiddos in a safe and age-appropriate learning environment.

May is always a bittersweet month in the preschool. We say good-bye to the Pre-K students as they graduate, some of whom have been with us for five years. As we know the first five years of life are the most important growth years. During a child's time in our preschool, we expose them to so much more than academics. They learn to socialize, share, be a friend, have compassion, and get an ethical start to life with Jewish values.

Most of children who have gone to our Preschool make lifelong friends, and some stay together through elementary school, Hebrew School, and sometimes even college. Sometimes they stay connected because their families are friends.

Our school has strong history. This year we have a new student in our 2's class whose father went to the preschool here when he was young. We also have a grandfather that had his Bar Mitzvah at Beth El. I myself, grew up at Beth El when our congregation was located on McDowell. Even though so many families have moved out of our immediate neighborhood, their memories are deeply rooted here at Beth El. They have amazing memories and recommend our school to all their friends. A lot of families I tour have a connection to someone who was or is still here. Thank you to everyone who supports us in this way!
