

Dear Chaverim,

One of the big questions this year for me is how do I prepare for the High Holy Days? How will I go into these days of Awe of intense prayer, reflection, and introspection? How do I find the right words in prayer?

There is so much ugliness and brokenness in the world that we witness in the news and in our city every day. As a leader in the community I ask myself: How as a society can we stand

before the imagined heavenly court this year? This year in particular it feels like humanity does not have many merits to show in their favor. Some of us are frustrated, some angry, uneasy, and anxious to name just a few - where will it all lead to? We know we need more mercy, we need forgiveness, we need mending. We need healing! We need solace, we need hope. And hope and goodness there is! Healing can happen. What does it take?

In a conversation with my daughter the other night about how she thinks about this year's High Holy Days, she said: "Mommy, it's not so much about God, it's really about looking into the mirror and about giving yourself a blank slate, to start fresh." So true, and yet I think it goes even further - more than just wiping our slate clean: We need to name the issues. The act of speech is part of healing and reconciling. The process of healing means to put in words that which we aspire to and that which stands in the way. To express in concrete nuanced language that which we need. It can help us to become aware of deeper feelings, get in touch with our gut and articulate what is under the surface. When we can name our deep fears, anger, and more we can start articulating what we need next. God gives us speech to bring our inner growth and healing to fruition.

The 16th century *Kli Yakar* writes:

"Articulate speech comes from God (Mishlei 16:1) for it is a gift from God that He gives speech to humanity. As our Rabbis say (in Yevamot 64a) that God desires the prayers of the righteous because they (the righteous) are to God like a delightful son to his father. If the son asks for something from his father, even though his father already knows what he needs, the father still wants the son to verbally articulate his request because the father delights in the speech of his child's lips. So the Holy Blessed One says to Israel, 'Let Me hear your voice because your voice is pleasing to approach Me' (cf. Shir HaShirim 2:14). [...] Because we are in the eyes of God like a delightful child and dear son."

Even if we are speechless about the state our world is in, and there is little to rave about, God still wants to hear our voices!

Dena Weiss from the Hadar Institute explains this commentary in the following words:

"If we think that prayer is about telling God what our needs are in the hopes that God will fulfill our request, then we are gravely mistaken,... God doesn't need any information from us about our lives. God is God, and God knows. Our prayer is not going to determine if our wishes are to be granted. [...] Petitioning God in prayer is not about conveying information in order to get a result,... God does not grant requests; God grants an audience. Prayer is about being in conversation, about being given the opportunity to air our grievances, articulate our pain, wallow in our suffering, and to never ever be told, 'You've spoken enough' or, 'Here's what you should do' or worse, 'Here's what I would do.' God listens to us like a parent who just wants to be there for us, who just loves to hear our voice."

Rosh HaShanah is the "birthday" of the world. Right after the Shofar blows in the Musaf Amida we recite: HaYom Harat Olam - today the world is created. Let's look at creation for a moment: It is an act of speech. The *Tohu vaBohu* - the chaos and the murmuring deep - are penetrated by light because the Divine **spoke** light into being! God created this, our world, through words. And God saw that it was good!

So this year we come to synagogue on these holy days to pray like **someone is listening**, to put into words all our hearts desires, resting assured that our prayer is wanted and needed and that we can choose to create ourselves anew from amidst the shutteredness of our contemporary world through articulating our prayer. This is what the ancient prayer of *Ochila laEl* in the Musaf is about:

אוֹחְילָה לָאֵל. אֲחַלֶּה פָנָיו. אֶשְׁאֲלָה מִמֶּנוּ מַעֲנֵה לָשׁוֹן: אדושם, שפתי תפתח. ופי יגיד תהלתך:...

I pray to You, God, that I may come into Your Presence Grant me proper speech,

Adonai open my lips that your mouth and the thoughts in my heart be acceptable to You, Adonai my stronghold and my redeemer.

Translation from Mahzor Lev Shalem

Grant us Eternal to find our voice, our words to start our own healing, to find serenity and peace, in order to create good from the chaos of the world.

Dear Families,

When I think about Rosh Hashanah, our Jewish New Year, a vision of crispy apples, round challahs, and sweet honey come to mind. I become giddy thinking about my childhood memories in Missouri as the cooler weather approached and dressing up in our new high holiday "boot"

I actually didn't grow up very connected to Judaism, it was something I was attracted to later in life, but Rosh Hashana was a staple in my upbringing. It was always a period of quality, extended family time with more cousins than I can count, yummy food, and the ability to start the new school year with more intention as it felt like two New Years were upon us.

Eventually, I became very connected, that I started to look more into the world of Judaism for myself and was fascinated by the deep meaning packed into the religion I was living all along.

Once my own kids were born and attended Jewish preschools, I was determined to bring that spirit and light into my own home and family, which now includes my toddler-aged grandson.

Many public schools give days off for the high holidays and for those not celebrating. It can become confusing to know how to greet and celebrate this happy and sweet new year. Jewish families may be rusty with traditions and not know the best way to bring the spirit into their homes and children's lives in a fun and exciting manner.

Here are a few of my favorite ways to teach children about Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, no matter your knowledge level.

A great way to get kids involved is to start with food. You might even want to get them in the kitchen with you. This is a great way to engage them in questions and answers. Food is a huge connector to the holidays—to the feels, sounds, tastes, and smells.

Think about putting pictures around your house to inspire kids to ask more questions and want to learn more.

Yom Kippur, being a more solemn holiday, makes it a little more difficult to involve the little ones. I suggest you start with discussing apologizing, the "I'm sorry" concept. Remind them that even as adults, we aren't perfect and we need to recognize our mistakes and do better next time.

Typically children under the age of 13, pre-B'nai Mitzvah aged, do not fast. For those of us fasting, consider prepping foods for your little ones ahead of time for the day so if you are feeling poorly, you do not have extra work to do. Let your children in on what you are doing by fasting, so they have more understanding and aren't confused.

In conclusion, involve your children at a young age. Speak to them, engage them, intrigue them. Even if it doesn't fully connect today, down the road, it will resonate with them more and more.

What does "step up" basis mean. Let me give you a simple example. If you have an asset for which you paid \$100, and, despite the ups and down of the economy, that asset is now worth \$300 and you sell that asset, you are going to pay taxes on your \$200 gain. But, if you donate that \$300 asset to Beth El, you will get a charitable contribution of \$300. This works especially well with stocks and securities which have an easily ascertainable value at the time of purchase and contribution.

If you wish to do this with stocks or other securities held in a brokerage account, these assets can be easily transferred from your brokerage account to the Beth El Endowment Fund immediately, with no hassle and you will receive confirmation of the transaction.

I am no tax expert. Before you make any decisions, or if you have any questions or concerns, speak to your accountant or financial advisor. Feel free to contact me at (602) 256-7829 for more specific instructions.

One additional suggestion. If you have any desire to make a transfer on your demise or legacy commitment to Beth El, the Beth El Endowment Fund is a perfect receptacle for those funds. They will be used only for the benefit of Beth El, and you can direct how you want the funds to be used, either immediately, or over a period of time.

United for Ukraine Committee Chair

A few months ago, we formed a committee to explore sponsoring a Ukrainian family fleeing the carnage of their home country, through a government program called Uniting for Ukraine. Uniting for Ukraine allows Ukrainians to come here if they have a sponsor who helps them resettle. Our committee is looking for volunteers to assist with this project. We are planning to work through the Sponsor Circle program, with the assistance of HIAS.

We are looking for more volunteers to help us with this mitzvah. 


