

A Special High Holy Day Message From Our Senior Rabbi: "According to the Exertion is the Reward..."

Shalom Yedidot & Yedidim!

The Israeli Bible Scholar, Professor Uriel Simon, who authored the JPS Bible Commentary to the Biblical Book of Jonah, reminds us that the "fanciful fish tale" of a man surviving within the belly of a great whale, which is read on Yom Kippur afternoon, is not the most profound miracle in the book. More incredible, to his way of thinking, is what happens when Jonah finally agrees to fulfill his mission and preach to the people of Nineveh that, in forty days, their city would be decimated. The truest miracle, claims Dr. Simon, is the response of the inhabitants in this Pagan city of *Nineveh*. They, from the Monarch down to the lowliest peasant, immediately accept the word of a heretofore unheralded Jewish Prophet speaking in the name of an invisible Deity they did not normally worship, all donned sackcloth, placed ashes upon their heads, and observed a three-day fast. Obviously, only a small number of the people actually heard Jonah speak. Yet they all joined in the fast. Nobody investigated Jonah's background or questioned his authority. They just accepted his message on blind faith. They recognized their wrongdoings and earnestly repented. Not only them, but the Ninevites even dressed their livestock in sackcloth and ashes and made them fast as well. Certainly, at least for me, this part of the story is more unbelievable than even the story of a great whale swallowing a human being who survives within the belly of a great sea creature.

After all, even the best of us are often cynical and suspicious. Moreover, for-giveness and expiation for transgressions is supposed to be a process, and an arduous one at that. Often, it takes us many years to arrive at the realization that we need to tamp down our egos, change our ways, and engage in the process of heartfelt *Teshuvah*. So why read the Book of Jonah on the day dedicated to seeking atonement if it shares an unrealistic portrayal of turning and returning to God?

I think the answer is a deep one and one that is somewhat counterintuitive. We read of the *Ninevites' Teshuvah* process precisely because it is extraordinary, sui generis — unique and exceptional. It does happen, but only on rare occasions, and then becomes the stuff of miraculous tales. For the rest of us average folks, forgiveness and expiation demand effort, exertion and most of all, patience. As we are taught in Pirkei Avot 5:23, "Ben Hey Hey said: According to the exertion is the reward".

This BA High Holy Day Guide is intended to serve as a tool in your Teshuvah process. We hope it helps you, your loved ones, our Congregational Family, and all those who choose to join in our Worship Services attain a measure of what we all seek at this time of year - transformation, renewal and the ability to hit the reset button so that the year ahead of us outstrips the year that has passed. It won't be easy, but it is definitely possible. May we have the fortitude to make it so.

Paulie and the Rosebuds join me in wishing you all a *Shanah Tovah U'Metukah*, a sweet, joyous and cathartic 5783.






