# Saying Kaddish

his month I'm addressing questions about the Kaddish prayer.

The Kaddish prayer is in Aramaic, not Hebrew, except for the final sentence. This is because it stems from a time in history (the period of the Second Temple in Jerusalem, 516 BCE-70 CE) when many Jews used Aramaic as their everyday language rather than Hebrew. To the untrained ear it can be difficult to distinguish the two languages as they are related and share common features, including much vocabulary, but they are nevertheless distinct languages and each has a separate system of grammar.

The name of the Kaddish prayer indicates holiness and reflects that the prayer sanctifies God by publicly affirming God's goodness and holiness. As the core of the prayer is a public affirmation of God's goodness, it is said only in the presence of a minyan and not by a person who is praying alone.

Originally Kaddish was said by rabbis when they completed giving a sermon. Then it was adopted and said by congregations when they finished a section of a prayer service, hence the current practice of Kaddish being said a number of times during a prayer service, and especially after major prayers.

Later again, although there is uncertainty as to exactly when, it began to be said by mourners on behalf of their deceased relatives in order to accrue religious merit to them. The underlying idea is that it reflects well on the deceased if they brought up their child to be able to stand up and publicly affirm the goodness of God even in the face of the overwhelming personal loss of a parent or other close relative.

However, a countervailing influence was the Jewish belief that the soul of even the most evil person spends no more than one year in Gehenna (the Jewish version of hell) before being released to go to Olam Ha'ba (the 'World to Come'). Out of concern that saying Kaddish on behalf of a deceased parent every day for 12 months after their death would imply the parent was a very wicked person expected to spend the maximum time in Gehenna, the practice developed of reducing the time frame by one month and saying Kaddish on behalf of a deceased parent for 11 months after their death. Kaddish is then said again on behalf of a parent on every yahrzeit (anniversary of their death).

The text says nothing explicit about death or mourning; it simply affirms faith in God. It thus reminds mourners that life continues despite death, that God still rules over us, and that God deserves praise for our own lives and for the deceased whom we once knew. Especially after a tragic death, this affirmation may be the last thing that we emotionally want to say, but that is precisely its point: saying it affirms the value of life in the face of death. It also helps us emote about the person we lost. It brings us out of our sadness and anger by having us utter appreciation and praise just when we are tempted to deny the importance of both.

I suspect that the Jewish mourner reciting the Kaddish and being comforted by it is responding not to the words but to the "music." Saying Kaddish is not a theological pronouncement. It is the traditional Jewish way of responding religiously to a death. The prayer says more than the words say. The prayer says, "At a moment like this, contemplating my mortality and that of everyone I know, I know that I am a Jew and I reach out to the Jewish tradition to channel God's healing love into my life."

In ways that transcend rational understanding, you will be comforted by going to the synagogue and reciting the Mourners' Kaddish during the mourning period or on a yahrzeit. You will be comforted by the knowledge that you are doing what Jews have always done over the centuries. And you will be comforted by the presence of other worshippers, including mourners like yourself, trying to come to terms with the outrage of death and loss. You will find that the system really works.

# **NEW PATHS TAKEN BY SEPHARDIC JEWRY**

Mondays, April 24, May 1 & May 8 on Zoom with Elisha Russ-Fishbane

This three-part course picks up with the trauma of the Inquisition and Expulsion before doing a deep dive into new settlements of the expanding Sephardic diaspora. Class 1 begins with an appreciation for the ongoing and far-reaching impact of the Spanish Inquisition on crypto-Jews and open Jews alike from the end of the fifteenth century and into the modern period. We then examine, in



class 2, eastern Sephardic migrations, focusing on the Ottoman Empire: the revival of Jewish life in Ottoman Palestine, the rise of Jewish Salonika, and the emergence of Ladino as the language of eastern Sephardic Jewry. In class 3 we will explore the western Sephardic diaspora, focusing on two new centers of Sephardic Jewish life: Amsterdam and the New World.

# President's Post by Russell Kohn



Acouple weeks ago, my mother visited Israel for the first time in 15 years. Throughout her trip, we received WhatsApp

updates with all the normal highlights you would expect: The Western Wall, the beach in Tel Aviv, Roman ruins in Caesarea, and the Israel Museum.

Her trip, though, included a few unexpected highlights: Mass protests against the ruling coalition's measures to limit the power of the courts. I don't believe it is my place here to share my view of these changes, and so I will let you do your own research and form your own opinions. But I will share my thoughts on the discourse itself.

Part of being Jewish is debating, questioning and arguing. We're encouraged by our Rabbis to dive into important topics and study them for ourselves, rather than just taking someone else's word for it. The debate over Israel's future is no different.

Although we live more than 5,000 miles from Jerusalem, we all have a vested interest

in the strength of the Jewish state. Israel is our homeland and, whether we like it or not, is often seen as speaking for Jews globally. Maintaining a vibrant, healthy democracy in Israel is something each and every one of us should care about.

Once again, I'm not going to tell you what to think or what side to support. But I hope you will take the time to read about what is going on and form your own opinion. The future of the State of Israel is too important for us to sit by and watch while history is made. At the same time, we should all remember that these are difficult issues and while we may disagree—vehemently, even—we are all in this together.

As we say every Shabbat in the Prayer for the State of Israel, "Avinu Shebashamyim [...] Bless the State of Israel, [...] Guide its leaders and advisors, [...] Bless the Land with peace, and its inhabitants with lasting joy."



Dear Brotherhood Nursery,

I thought I was a doomsday prepper.

Not necessarily in the 'if the end of the world comes DON'T WORRY because I've stockpiled 340 cans of chickpeas!!' type of way. Truth be told, I don't even know where my husband keeps our flashlights and extra batteries. I'm more the 'end of the world is coming at some point? Great—I'm hysterical and devastated for my great great great great great (you get the point) grandchildren' type. I know—I'm such a romantic.

So, when my husband and I closed on our house in the (gulp) suburbs in December 2021 I started prepping. My life, as I knew it, was over. Rather than creating a Pinterest board of my dream kitchen or getting the necessary documentation together to register Elle for kindergarten, the only thing I could think about was losing my beloved second home—aka my local coffee shop and my friends at Brotherhood.

Sure enough, on the night before Elle started Kindergarten this past September, I felt completely unprepared. I hadn't gotten her a haircut or a new outfit to wear for her first day. I forgot to get her a lunchbox and I couldn't, for the life of me, remember if I had ordered her school supplies. I'll spare you the details of how long I debated whether or not I should wear makeup for the drop off.

And—iust as I had romantically predicted, Elle cried hysterically and clung to my leg at that first drop off (those of you who know her are not at all surprised). Kind of automatically I told her that she was brave and kind, that I loved her and that I couldn't wait to hear about her first day. And then, like a robot (with makeup on), I grabbed her hand and walked (but really dragged) her right to her teacher (practically INTO her teacher)—I waved goodbye, turned around and left. Phew. The whole thing felt just as drawn out and dramatic as that sentence. It felt so awkward and yet so right that in a moment of comic-book-like clarity I realized that it was Yellow Room all over again. Rivki nudged me into believing in Elle—that she would be fine, and that goodbyes should never linger. The sense of familiarity was immensely comforting (because who are we kidding-I was a literal wreck leaving her at the door).

I obsessed over how I would make friends. The parents I was introduced

to all seemed to somehow know each other—either because 'she plays Pickleball with my sister-in-law!' or 'we sat next to her at the town pool all summer!' or 'we went through nursery together!'. I had no choice but to surrender to Elle's lead in the hopes that I could make friends with some of her new friends' moms. And while the fall of 2022 was nothing like the start of our Red Room year in the fall of 2020, it felt eerily the same—I was looking to Elle for guidance in the hopes that she'd lead me through my days in our new landscape.

And when I noticed some changes in Elle's sleep patterns once school was in the thick of it? Well—my 'mom-gut' started telling me that her week was overscheduled and so I listened to it and gave her more down time after school for this semester. I didn't for once question my decision, despite most of Elle's friends being scheduled for after school clubs every day, because my year in the Purple Room taught me that my mom-gut was good and strong and right (most of the time) as long as I nurtured and trusted it.

What I've realized while navigating my new life in the 'burbs is that the lessons I've learned and wisdom I've gained from our three years at Brotherhood have become my 'lovie,' and I carry them with me wherever I go. Brotherhood watered me as a seedling mom. It sheltered me during COVID. It taught me that doing what everyone else does, or thinks is the right thing, isn't always the right thing if my gut doesn't believe it is. And, in a hilariously ironic plot twist, it taught me that even if I don't think I'm prepared, I most likely am. Brotherhood—my lovie—I'll carry you with me for the rest of my days.

s a cantor, I am now on the other side of life Acycle events when, prior to my entering the clergy, I had previously been a participant. I had a bar mitzvah and now I train those entering Jewish adulthood. I got married and now I officiate weddings. And I used to just attend funerals and now I sing at them. But perhaps the most interesting shift in perspective that has taken place since becoming a spiritual leader has been in my relationship to the conversion process. My personal connection to Jewish conversion began over ten years ago on my first day of school at the seminary. The dean spoke to all of the incoming rabbinical and cantorial students about the requirements for personal observance including the prohibition of romantic relationships with non-Jews. I promptly spilled my guts to the director of the cantorial school confessing that I was living with my non-Jewish girlfriend who had agreed to convert somewhere down the line. As it turns out, the line was drawn that afternoon and my relationship to the conversion process swiftly began. Presently, I teach a weekly conversion class for eight students. Our classes include the study of holidays, home observance, Torah, and the Hebrew alphabet. Additionally, we held a "Learning Shabbat" last month geared towards the conversion class which featured live explanations of the prayers within the service. We will be holding two more of these services in April on the 7th and 22nd of the month. Guiding people into the Jewish faith is a responsibility that I do not take lightly. Having been connected to the other side of this process, I have sought to develop curriculum that is both informative and practical, enabling converts to meaningfully and feasibly integrate Judaism into their every day lives. And perhaps the most profound impact is that I am learning too. There is never a shortage of new knowledge when it comes to Judaism. My own Jewish identity has only been strengthened by the fresh perspectives and insights from my conversion colleagues; for that I am grateful and humbled.
