In the nearly two years that I have been the rabbi at Or Atid, we have had our share of successes and challenges. One of the recent successes was the beginning of our listening campaign, where over 50 people attended a breakfast at our synagogue on a Sunday morning to discuss their Jewish experiences and how Or Atid fits into their lives. It was a great way to reach out to you, our members, and to give you a voice. I commend all of the organizers for their work, and I commend those who showed up to make your voice heard.

This was a great first step to reaching out to our membership, but there is so much more work to do. Over the course of my time here, I have heard people say the refrain “we need to increase our membership” more times than I can count, as if this will be a solution to the challenges that we face. While it will solve some problems, increasing our membership is not an end unto itself. Increasing our membership should happen because we have something to offer, and by that “we,” I mean myself and each and every one of you who finds meaning and purpose and something worthwhile in Congregation Or Atid.

While the phrase “we need to increase our membership” has been uttered quite a bit, rarely have I heard anyone delve further into the conversation or brainstorm ideas about what needs to be done. What we need are action items to turn this need/wish/hope into a reality. Here are just a few things that you can and should be doing to increase engagement with our own members, and to bring new members in:

- It's been said that 80% of life is showing up. So, show up! We've got lots of great events coming up in May, capped off by our annual meeting on Sunday, June 3rd. Looking ahead to the summer, we've got our three Shabbarbecues in late July and early August. We're also here every Friday night and Saturday morning for Shabbat. Showing up strengthens your relationship with Or Atid and connects you with the community of which you are already a member.
- Bring people with you when you show up. Don't come to an event by yourself. Bring someone else with you (spouses don't count!). They could be members who don't usually come to things, or non-members with whom you want to share and highlight Or Atid, showing them how it can be an important part of their life.
- Talk about Or Atid to your friends, Jew and non-Jew alike. Do you know Jews who aren't affiliated? Do you know Jews who could benefit and find some meaning from a connection to Or Atid? I'm sure the answer is “yes.” Tell them why this place is important to you, and see the above bullet point.
- Reach out to me. I try to do my best to connect with as many of you as possible, but I know that I don't reach as many as I should. So, I invite you to connect with me so that we can build a personal relationship if we do not already have one.
- Show up in the Jewish community. When I go to Jewish community events, Or Atid's membership seems to be underrepresented. We increase our congregational profile in the community when we increase our individual attendance at communal events.
- Help me get out into the community. Are there places or organizations with which I should be connected? I'm only one person, and I'm still relatively new here. I need your help. With whom or with what institutions should I be in contact?

There is no one way to solve our challenges. As I am only one person, I only think in my brain, which means I don't have all of the ideas. I'm sure you've got some too. What are your ideas to increase our engagement and membership? What are you doing to implement them? We're all in this together, so let's work together.



I hope by now that everyone has received their Sustaining Share commitment letter for 2018-2019. Please think about it before you make your commitment.

Whether you are at the synagogue once a day, once a week, or once a year, our community is here and ready to support you in every facet of your life. COA membership is not something like a gym pass. Each of us chooses to belong to COA as members and partners in community, and each of us voluntarily pledges financial support.

Annual membership pledges are an investment in the Jewish values and practice that are the heart and soul of Congregation Or Atid. Voluntary pledges represent an annual commitment to our community, Jewish life learning, and social justice. We celebrate joyous times together and we support one another in times of need.

The reason why people resist conventional dues is not that it is premised on obligation but that it trivializes obligation. The reason why people respond generously to the voluntary dues model is not that it eliminates obligation but that it deepens obligation. Putting a price tag on membership cheapens it in that it reduces membership to a purchase and members to buyers. It defines belonging as a market transaction. By that logic, members have no obligation except to pay the bill. They are consumers of a product, not partners in the work of building community. People resist that model- they complain of having to "pay to pray" -because, if belonging can be bought, then belonging is not serious enough to justify the cost. If membership is no more than a purchase, then it is not worth the price.

On the other hand, people respond generously to the voluntary model because it implicitly redefines what membership is. If membership has no price tag, then it can not be a purchase. It must be something else: a commitment to help build community. By removing the trivial obligation that comes with being a buyer, the voluntary model opens the door to a deeper kind of obligation, the obligation that comes with being a true partner. People respond favorably to the voluntary model not because it relieves them of obligation, but because it challenges them to take on a greater sense of obligation. This is the reason that Congregation Or Atid went to the Sustaining Share model a few years ago. Please give from your heart. There is an important teaching in Pirkei Avot, "if there is no bread, there is no Torah." The rabbis recognized that basic financial needs are necessary to sustain a holy community.

Shavuot – Celebrate as a Community

This year, Shavuot begins the evening of Saturday, May 19th and continues into the 20th of May (the 6th of Sivan, 5778 on the Hebrew calendar).

Originally a harvest festival, it has come to commemorate the giving of the Torah to the people of Israel. ‘Shavuot’ means ‘weeks’ and, per the Torah, we count 7 weeks after the 1st day of Pesah. After this 49-day count, the next day is Shavuot. In ancient Israel, it was one of three festivals during which Jews were required to travel to Jerusalem to make an offering at the Temple – in this case two loaves of wheat bread (to celebrate the wheat harvest). Among the customs that have been adopted over the millennia, one is to engage in study all night long, beginning with Erev Shavuot. When I was a college student, back around the time the Jews crossed the Jordan River, I was able to stay up all night studying for exams. These days I’m lucky to make it to the 11:00 PM news.

So, in honor of my having survived lots of those many cramming sessions (and having passed at least a few of those exams), please come to Or Atid at 8:00 PM on Saturday, May 19th, for a brief service followed by a discussion session which will end around 10:00 PM. Dessert will be provided. We will nosh, study and still have time to sleep, to be rested for our 10:00 AM service on Sunday, May 20th when the Torah reading will tell us why we’re here and what we ought to (and not to) be doing as people. Also celebrating the end of the school year, our students will be joining us.



Please come, but don’t bring your wheat loaves – this year you can come to our synagogue. Next year in Jerusalem.

Helen and Sam Kornblau Religious School News Rabbi Ilan Pardo Education Director

April was a shorter than usual learning month for our students since we had spring break. However, it was quite meaningful as we learned about this season's holidays.

We discussed how to get ready for Pesach. They learned that we need to clean our house and get rid of Chametz (any food that is not kosher for Pesach like crackers, challah, cereals, etc.) and we only eat Matzah and things made from Matzah/Matzo meal during Pesach. We learned about the Pesach Seder, and discussed the different symbolic foods that we eat. We reviewed all the items on the Seder Plate and learned about the meaning of the Afikoman. We reviewed the 4 Questions, and the Wise/Stubborn/Simple/knows Not How to Ask (the 4 Sons).

We discussed the story of Pesach in detail. We learned that we used to be slaves to King Pharaoh in Egypt and that he made us work very hard until we were led out of Egypt by Moshe.

We learned about Moshe and Pharaoh, and how God brought the ten plagues on Egypt. We learned to say the 10 plagues in both English and Hebrew.

We learned about the splitting of the Red Sea, and why the holiday is called Pesach (Passover). We learned to sing the different brachot in the Haggadah. Different grade levels worked on various art projects to take home to use at their Seder table.

After Passover, we continued with learning about Yom HaShoah, remembering the Holocaust as a Jewish Memorial Day. This year, the holiday was on April 12th. We discussed what it means to commemorate the holiday, watching videos of how in Israel, the whole country pauses for a minute to show their respect. We were so awed by how still everyone was, even all the cars on the road pulled over!

To honor the holiday ourselves, we all participated in the Butterfly Project, inspired by the poem "I Never Saw Another Butterfly." We made butterfly mobiles, with colorful butterflies linked together.

Moving on to Yom Haatzmaut, we were excited to learn about Israel's Independence Day. Israel is 70 years old this year!

Our older students explored the origins of the Pesach Seder, by studying passages from the Mishnah and Talmud that are the foundational texts for this most famous and popular Jewish rituals. We looked at the Seder's rabbinic origins, as well as the symbols and their meanings, comparing all of this to the minimal instructions about Pesach that are given in the Torah.

Looking at a variety of news sources and opinion articles, the older students learned about the ongoing issue of the Kotel (Western Wall) and the efforts by the Israeli Government to provide an egalitarian prayer space. They explored perspectives from ultra-Orthodox to Conservative/Reform and from Israeli Jews and American Jews, as well as the complex and often frustrating way that the Israeli Parliamentary system works.

All of our students continue to enjoy learning activities led by our wonderful faculty as we continue to plan and strive for a successful school year.

We continue to learn about the weekly Torah portions and biblical stories. We are advancing with our Hebrew letters, word recognition, and the names of the colors in Hebrew. We play matching games to help learn and review. We continue to review the Hebrew months. Rabbi Pardo visits each grade to observe learning progress.

Our older students continue to learn the structure and content of Shabbat services, and continue to participate in leading Shabbat morning services once a month. Join us and observe how much we learned!


