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President's Message

I am so honored to be the 2023-2025 Congregation Albert (CA) Board of Trustees President. I am equally grateful for your confidence in me. As a lifelong member of CA, I have a deep connection to our community and a profound sense of stewardship toward the congregation and the Reform Jewish values we stand for.

Those values play a key role in my Jewish identity. And, as I begin my term as Board President, I want to refocus on some of the important Jewish values that I believe are critical to keeping us rooted in what it means to be Jewish in the 21st century. These are the values that we want to embrace and, in some cases, return to in our CA community so that our congregation will be strong, healthy, vibrant and relevant well into the next 125 years. As I begin this journey through our Reform Jewish values, I am reminded of one of my favorite stories that I bet many of you will remember. It is said that a non-Jewish man came to Hillel, the beloved first century prophet, and promised to convert to Judaism if Hillel could teach him the Torah while the man stood on one foot. The wise Hillel agreed, and, as the man balanced on one foot, Hillel said, "What is hateful to you, do not do to others. That is the whole of the Torah. All the rest is commentary."

Like Hillel, many Jewish thinkers, both past and present, hold lovingkindness (chesed in Hebrew) as Judaism's primary ethical value. The Torah starts and ends with acts of chesed: God clothes Adam and Eve, and buries Moses. So central to Judaism is the value of kindness that chesed is mentioned nearly 200 times in the Torah.

In recent years, scientific research has identified kindness as a universal character strength and virtue that provides significant physical and mental health benefits, increase productivity and profitability in business, and holds societies and communities together by creating and strengthening relationships among people and helping us live harmoniously despite our shared differences. One of the most intriguing discoveries is how kindness generates an increase in oxytocin, the brain hormone responsible for the sense of connectedness and trust. And, even more encouraging is that kindness is contagious. Acts of kindness, random or otherwise, generate further acts of kindness.

Over the coming months and years, our acts of lovingkindness – toward our families, neighbors and coworkers; toward the members of our congregation and the larger Jewish community; toward all people; toward our planet, and (equally importantly) towards ourselves – will be critical in making all our lives happy, healthy, meaningful and secure. Chesed is, perhaps, the most important thing we can practice to ensure the longevity of our congregation, and our world.

It isn't hard to start performing acts of chesed. Give a complement to the person sitting next to you at services. Write a simple note of thanks to your child's teacher. Follow what my family called "the Thumper rule" (from the Disney movie Bambi), that is, if you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all. Try to find a smile, a kind word, or a helpful gesture for someone at least twice every day. Because, as Jews, that's who we are called to be. We are the people who can stand on one foot and say that our belief, our most important spiritual practice, is lovingkindness.

Clergy Comments

One of my favorite parts of the Passover Seder is the account of the four children-each representing facets of our own personalities, and different parts of the community. It is a yearly reminder that though the Passover Seder is meant to be an educational experience (as well as a communal one, bringing together friends, families and those who we do not yet know), it is only successful if we have spent valuable time hearing and listening to the questions that are asked, and those not voiced-taking the time to answer and to engage in a healthy and respectful debate, and acknowledging the diversity to opinions in the community.

I have felt for a long time that the child who offers the question "what does this ritual mean to you", though often called the "wicked one" is actually the one I prefer: that child challenges the setting, not willing to accept as a given what they are being taught, and the label that child has been given is actually a reflection of our own difficulty to embrace questions that make us uncomfortable.

One of the ways in which we can bring meaning to the Passover Seder is through the elements that will appear on our plates and our tables. These vary from one table to the next according to traditions, heritage, family history. As we prepare for our community's Seder, I wanted to share with you some of the elements we will be adding to our plate, and invite you to perhaps consider adding them to your own plates, or sharing with us any additional elements you are considering adding.

An orange: there is some ambiguity as to the need to add an orange on a Seder plate, given that the story that it is associated with has undergone significant changes. But what does not differ is our commitment to creating a truly and sincerely inclusive religious, cultural and spiritual space for all who seek it and wish to engage with us. As a Progressive community, we abide by the values that remind us that our responsibility to each other is not to judge and reject, but to respect and honor each other, as the holy vessels that we each are.

Olives: we add olives to our Seder plate as an expression of our hope for a state of peace that is whole, strong and cannot be broken. While there is still a long way to go, and the work will not be easy, it is nonetheless our responsibility to work towards that time.

<u>Sunflower seeds:</u> We will all hopefully be gathering in safe spaces, and aware that for so many, that opportunity has been taken away from them. As a way of marking our solidarity with the people of Ukraine, we will be adding sunflower seeds to our Seder plate.

And this prayer: This year in particular, we are aware that for many families in Israel and around the world, there will be at least one empty chair at the table-Rabbi Aaron Starr wrote the following beautiful and poignant prayer:

Tonight, we celebrate our freedom, and we sing psalms of joy.

Tonight, we pray for the release of our siblings suffering in captivity.

Tonight, we relish the warmth of our homes, surrounded by family and friends

Tonight, we are mindful of hundreds of thousands of Israelis displaced from their homes.

Tonight we are mindful of all those displaced from their homes because of war.

Tonight, we give thanks for the abundance of food and drink.

Tonight, we note the millions around the world who lack their most basic needs.

Tonight, we sit at the Passover table.

Tonight, we stand for the right of Jews everywhere to live in safety.

Tonight, we remember that we came out of Mitzrayim.*

Tonight, we hope that no one will experience Mitzrayim ever again

The Michelle Goffe Memorial Rose
Garden was conceived thirty years ago to
honor our daughter Michelle, who was
tragically murdered on April 9, 1994, at the
age of 19. Michelle was a beloved daughter,
sister, niece, cousin and friend. Our family
started the garden on the grounds of
Congregation Albert to keep Michelle's
memory alive. It has always been important
to include you, our Congregation Albert
family of friends, in this living legacy.

A metal archway draws you through our Garden, which still features roses but now emphasizes more xeric (drought tolerant) plants. In the original garden of 30 years, we installed four high-quality,comfortable Polysteel benches. But after so long, they became cracked, rusted and discolored. Last April, I was hopeful to receive funds from the estate of Michelle's father, Jerry Goffe, to help replace those well-used benches. Gratefully, this became a reality.


With the research and help of Congregant, Ray Cohen, we were able to locate this same company and four new benches will arrive soon. Ray's continuing help ensures the removal of the four old benches and installation of the new ones.

Congregation Albert Sisterhood made a generous \$1,000 donation which will pay for one of the benches and assist with on-going garden care and maintenance costs: adding mulch, fertilizing, repairing and replacing irrigation emitters and tubing, and planting more perennials and shrubs.

I am eager to have these projects begin so that the Garden will return as a place to quietly sit and reflect, enjoy the beauty of the blooming roses and follow the stepping stones throughout the xeric plantings.

The continuing contribution of money and time from Congregation Albert and its members reassures my family and myself that Michelle's blessed memory will be perpetuated through the Michelle Goffe Memorial Rose Garden.

After we raked, pulled, shoveled and bagged, Ed Magidson hauled 12 cubic yards (twenty-eight 55-gallon bags) of tumbleweeds and leaves to the County Green Yard waste recycle center! This is just the tip of the iceberg for general grounds care. Much more needs to be done.

Meditation Shabbat Services

"By learning and practicing the secrets inherent in breath," Rabbi Shimon said, "Solomon could lift nature's physical veil from created things and see the spirit within."
