Co-Presidents' Column

the time you read this column, our March members' meeting will be over, and we'll have spent much of that meeting talking, again, about new space. Space is a subject that is, at the same time, exciting and unsettling: exciting because the fact that we need more space speaks to our vibrancy and attractiveness as a religious community; unsettling because the path is not clear and because more space means a greater financial commitment. We should all be proud of the hard work our community has done around space planning, in parlor meetings, in member meetings, and in our growth, space, and fund-raising committees. We've come a long way in the past few months — and we've a ways yet to go, yet — so let's step back and take stock of where we are.

We established an ad hoc space committee on the recommendation of a previous ad hoc committee on congregational growth and development. The space committee assessed our current needs vis-à-vis the resources of the First Unitarian Church and found several significant shortcomings: we have but one office and need three; our classrooms are overcrowded; we are approaching the limit of our Shabbat morning davening space; we have regularly exceeded the capacity of the Parish Hall on Purim, Hanukah, and some b'nai mitzvah; and we frequently must resolve calendar conflicts with the Church. We have made a decision to muddle through for one more year, keeping our school and office at the Church, but we have also taken an office for Rabbi Toba at Second Church across the street.

Through a series of parlor and member meetings, we reviewed the earlier work of our growth committee, looked at our demographics with a view to where we might locate, and envisioned our ideal space. We learned that most members would prefer to locate near where we are now, that we want a space that can be flexibly configured, that we like the idea of multi-use, multi-religious holy space,

and that we prefer warmth and grace to glitz and glamour.

It's important for all of us to realize that we have simply outgrown the First Unitarian Church and that if we can't find a single location that meets all of our needs, we may have to locate our school in one place, our davening and holiday space elsewhere, possibly our offices somewhere else yet. I think we'd all rather find a single location that meets our needs; but, inevitably, our expenses are going to rise.

And so we have the constant question of what we can afford. No one really likes talking about money, especially in a community like ours that doesn't view personal wealth as an index of personal worth. But we do need to estimate our financial capacity and will be asking your help.

Underlying the subject of finances, though, is our Torah of Money, the values we bring to assembling the resources needed to fulfill the spiritual mission of Dorshei Tzedek. What are appropriate ways to recognize financial contributions from members, their families, and their friends? How should financial responsibilities be shared between current and future members? How can we acknowledge the importance of non-financial contributions, both to the search and acquisition of new space and to the ongoing operations of our congregation? These are just three of the important questions that Torah of Money should debate.

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Meanwhile, the space committee has been making site visits to buildings that come available within our target geographic area. Partly they just need to develop a shared understanding of what constitutes more and less desirable space. But we also know that the chances of finding space are vastly increased if people know you're looking. One of the buildings the committee visited is the Central Congregational Church on Walnut Street in Newton. Because its location is so close to the Unitarian Church and because the building is both ample in size and beautifully maintained, we asked the church if we could arrange tours for our members, and the church was happy to oblige us. More than 40 of you, representing 35 households, turned out Thursday night, March 7, to walk through the building, and more toured the church on March 17. That level of interest was exceptionally gratifying to the space committee and quite impressive to the church leadership who hosted us. At the time of this writing, we're looking forward to another well-attended tour on March 17. It's important that as many members as possible become personally and directly engaged in the search for space, because that's the best way to achieve an outcome that works for all of us.

The space committee itself will both continue to explore other sites as we learn of them and perform a due diligence assessment of the Congregational Church. The church has shared their operating costs with us and the terms of their existing rental agreements. The committee is investigating parking arrangements with other buildings and land-owners in the area. They may seek an independent assessment of any structural improvements that might be necessary, as well as an estimate of renovations needed both for our immediate and our long-term needs. All these steps are part of a normal process of carefully evaluating any major decision, and all such things take time and careful consideration. We'll use as many channels as we can to keep you informed of events as they unfold.

So that's where things stand a week before the members' meeting. If we stay true to our values, if we maintain a frank and open decision process, and if all our members continue to be engaged in this important work, then the excitement generated by our shared vision and our new possibilities will easily overcome our concerns, and we can move forward to the next stage of our development as a community.

Notes from Our Board

The board last met on 10 February and 10 March 2002.

Judy Hersh summarized the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation (JRF) Kehillah Building Workshop she recently attended. She brought back from the meeting the important message that it is essential to keep our mission and core values visible (and audible) at all times. To achieve this all members, not just the leadership, should be able to describe Reconstructionism and the mission and values of the congregation to new members and non-members. This not only helps our membership stay focused, but also helps to attract prospective members to the congregation who share our values. Judy also learned that vibrancy and internal growth happen when members have connections within their sub-communities, that there is crossover between sub-communities, and that we solidify community by taking care of each other.

The process of putting together a slate of committee chairs and officers for next year has begun. Cheryl Sacks and Linette Liebling have been appointed to chair this year's nominating committee. Members interested in assuming leadership roles in the congregation should contact Cheryl or Linette. Elections will take place at the Spring Members' meeting in June. Tours of a potential new space (see the Co-Presidents' column) and fundraising were discussed. Dan Rome reported that the Fundraising committee recently met with Susan Applebaum, a fund-raising professional in the Jewish community. Echoing similar advice given to us by the JRF, Susan suggested that in order to inform a search for space and supply information upon which to base a potential bid, we hire a consultant to help us obtain a general idea of how much we are likely to raise within our community. The board approved funds for such a study. The need to keep any fundraising consistent with our mission and values was also discussed; a new Torah of Money committee is being put together to focus on this issue.

In a finance update, it was announced that Lynne Brandon has stepped down as Treasurer due to exceptional work demands. Past treasurer Paul Hattis has stepped in as acting chair of the Finance committee and will head up the budgeting process for next year. Paul reported that the number of members making a Nadiv Lev pledge on their membership form increased markedly this past year; we are moving toward (but have not achieved) a goal of 100%

Seventh Day of Pesach

Following the Israeli calendar of holiday observance, we will close the Passover holiday with a seventh-day service on **Wednesday**, **April 3rd**, from 9-10:30 am. The seventh day is of Pesach is said to be the day that the Israelites crossed the Red Sea, and we will celebrate with davvening, a short Torah reading and discussion, *Yizkor*, and the singing of *Hallel*. Bring your timbrels as we cross the sea!

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Social Action Committee Report

Middle East Group Forms

Last spring, the *tikkun olam* committee convened a meeting of those interested in "working on" the Middle East. Some came with little background, hoping to learn; others came ready for political action. It soon became apparent that it was very difficult to discuss



the issues. Having made assumptions about how others felt, we were surprised at how easily talking about the *intifadah* and Israel's response to it could become divisive. People had a range of strong feelings about the violence in Israel and the roles that both Israelis and Palestinians were (and continue to be) playing in this unfortunate struggle.

As we continued to meet, we began to create a space for respectful listening and safe discussion. We realized that just being able to "have the discussion" and make it possible for others to express their views could be an act of *tik-kun olam*. We decided that supporting such discussions in our own and in other congregations would serve to contradict the seemingly monolithic and unquestioning voice with which the organized Jewish community tends to speak on the subject of Israel. We agreed that alternative voices must be encouraged.

One such voice is that of Uri Avnery, whose visit to the area we recently cosponsored. Avnery, a respected Israeli activist and former member of parliament, strongly advocates for the recognition of both Jewish and the Palestinian "narratives" and holds a vision of peace that addresses the needs of both peoples. Following this event and perhaps inspired by it, we began to work on creating a network of members of congregations who are attempting to generate discussion on the Israeli Palestinian conflict within their own communities.

This network, which has so far included members of Dorshei Tzedek, Temple Hillel B'nai Torah (West Roxbury), Temple Shalom (Cambridge), Workman's Circle (Brookline), Temple B'nai Brith (Somerville), and Shir Hadash (Newton), has been meeting to define our common goals, support each other's efforts, share information about educational opportunities, and plan events together. We hope to expand this network by reaching out to other congregations and supporting their efforts to engage in

these discussions. We believe that building such a network would be a unique contribution. Many of us believe that it is important to the peace process for American Jews to question the Sharon government and speak out about the toll that being an occupying force is taking on Israeli society.

As we continue our efforts to build this network, we will keep you informed of educational events (of which there seem to be many) and hope to engage you in ongoing discussion of these complicated matters. We must acknowledge the despair, hopelessness, anger, and fear that we often feel these days, but we must also endeavor to articulate rational and moral visions of what could be.

Yom Hashoah v'Gevurah Holocaust Remembrance and Resistance Day

To commemorate the memory and strength of all those who suffered in the Holocaust, we will view portions of a video interview of Zelda Liebling, mother of Dorshei Tzedek member Linette Liebling, who was filmed as part of Steven Spielberg's *Shoah* project. In the film, Zelda recounts her life in pre-war Poland and her experiences during the war. (The subject matter is intense, and may not be appropriate for children younger than 12.) 
