President's Column

This High Holiday season and the weeks leading up to it have been particularly meaningful for Congregation Dorshei Tzedek. Last month, we joyously processed our Torah scrolls from the Unitarian Church, where we had met for 12 years in rental space that needed to be set up anew for each event, and we dedicated our first permanent prayer space in the Second Congregational Church. In somewhat anthropological terms, we have evolved from a "nomadic" community to a more "settled" one. For me personally, the appearance of a fixed sign in front of the Second Church, proclaiming the permanent presence of Congregation Dorshei Tzedek, was especially moving. I thought back to our first High Holiday services in 1991, when a hundred or so worshippers gathered in an auditorium at Brandeis University, and marveled at the community we have created and how momentous it is for us to occupy our own permanent prayer space.

The securing of permanent prayer space, along with other basic infrastructure (full-time administrative support and organization of an ongoing fundraising campaign), signifies more than a material acquisition. I believe it represents a watershed moment in our development, as we can finally begin to turn more of our attention and energy outward to the larger community within which we live, while still attending to the needs of our particular community.

Although we all view tikkun olam as an essential Jewish value, our energies have in the past been so consumed with building and maintaining the CDT community that we have not been able to engage in these activities as much as we would have liked. However, under the leadership of our Tikkun Olam Committee chaired by Janice Fine, we have more recently begun to have a presence in the larger community as well. The Middle East Discussion group, coordinated by Louise Enoch, has engaged with other congregations in the Boston area to provide a venue for diverse Jewish voices to be heard about the vexing prob-

lems facing Israelis and Palestinians.

The Tikkun Olam Committee has been exploring an exciting avenue for our membership to engage in social justice issues as a congregation. The Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) is a confederation of urban and suburban congregations of all faiths whose goal is to forge common commitments to social and economic justice in the Greater Boston area. This fall, we are engaging in a process of educating ourselves about GBIO so that we can make a decision later this year about whether our congregation will become a full-fledged member. The Tikkun Olam Committee is offering a variety of opportunities for members to learn about GBIO and what membership would mean for us as a community. The most important of these is the Members' Meeting scheduled for Sunday evening November 9. Representatives of GBIO will make a presentation to our membership at that meeting and we will have an opportunity to ask them questions and engage in discussion with them. We will also discuss the possibility of GBIO membership.

To me, it is a mark of our maturation as a congregation and our success in building our own community that we now can direct more of our focus to social justice issues outside of our community. I believe that CDT can represent a unique Jewish voice in the larger community. I hope to see all of you at the November 9 Members' Meeting so that you can learn more about this opportunity and so that your voice can be heard on this issue of great importance to our congregation.

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Nadiv Lev Campaign Update

Thank you and congratulations! We have wonderful news about our first annual Nadiv Lev campaign, which wrapped up last month. Our community involvement has been extraordinary—109 of 146 CDT households, or 75%, have participated in this groundbreaking event! Many households were visited or called by volunteers involved in our Nadiv Lev effort, and we have collected much information about our member's values, preferences, wishes, and attitudes relating to Dorshei Tzedek.

Now, for the financial tally: our original budget goal for this campaign was \$50,000, but during the year, we increased it to \$54,000 because we made additional financial commitments. When we finished tallying cash donations, stock donations, and finding donations credited to the "wrong" area of our bookkeeping software, we found ourselves at \$55,860!

The generosity of our community does not end here. The Nadiv Lev campaign was specifically for our General Fund. In addition, our members and friends have contributed \$394 to our Book Fund, \$8,000 to our Torah Fund, \$772 to our Building Fund, \$2,330 to a special community fundraising event, and \$3,130 to the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. All this has come during a rough economic period and a period of considerable change here at Dorshei Tzedek.

Our Nadiv Lev Committee, complete novices at this process in September of last year, received critical training and advice from our consultant Hillel Korin, from some of our members with fundraising backgrounds, from our Torah of Money Committee and the Board, and from other experienced members of the Reconstructionist movement. We know a lot now, have more to learn, and we feel that we can do this again and be even more successful at it, with your continuing support.

Many people are interested in knowing how gifts to the campaign broke down, in dollar ranges. Quite a few gifts came from outside of our membership, so the numbers below total considerably more than 109 households. Here they are:

- 1 gift of \$5,000
- 5 gifts between \$2,000 and \$4,999
- 11 gifts between \$1,000 and \$1,999
- 20 gifts between \$500 and \$999
- 20 gifts between \$200 and \$499
- 27 gifts between \$100 and \$199
- 55 gifts between \$5 and \$99

Amazing. So, to members of Dorshei Tzedek, friends and supporters of this campaign: a heartfelt "thank you" for being a part of this effort and heartfelt congratulations! We could not have done this without each other, and our congregation and community are the better for it! B'Shalom.

House and Operations Update

The Board met recently and decided on a number of changes for Setup and Cleanup in our new space in the Second Church.

The first change is that is it no longer known as Setup and Cleanup, but instead as Kiddush. Members assigned for Kiddush will no longer be responsible for doing setup before services. People assigned will be responsible for providing Kiddush and setting it up for the congregation, and closing the building securely after they leave. Since we will likely be the only people in the Church on Saturdays, it is imperative that we remember to lock the space. Members assigned for Kiddush do not have to be at services until around 11 am. We do hope, however, that if you are assigned, you will still want to come to services and enjoy our new space!

The second change is that, starting in November, households (as opposed to individuals) will be assigned for Kiddush. For a regular Shabbat service, three households will be responsible for providing all the food and drink. Households should expect to be assigned no more than twice a year, and, in most cases, once a year.

We want to create an atmosphere in the new space where members will enjoy hanging around and schmoozing after services. To that end, we will be setting up more specific guidelines as to what households should bring for Kiddush. Remember, if no one from your household can provide Kiddush on your assigned date, it is your responsibility to switch with another member household and to let me know with whom you have switched. As it comes closer to your assigned Kiddush date, someone from House and Operations will send you a reminder along with a copy of the new guidelines and procedures. Please do understand that as we get used to being in the new space, things may change. We will figure out what is working and what is not, and we will advise you about any changes.


Bar Mitzvah of Sam Fader
