President's Message

This month we launched an exciting new initiative at Congregation Dorshei Tzedek—Community Conversations. Community Conversations, coordinated by Andrew Compaine, are a series of one-on-one conversations between members. The goal of the Community Conversations is to elicit individual Jewish narratives, and, in so doing, to mobilize our community's collective resources. To borrow from the mission statement that has been crafted for this effort:

"Over the course of the next few years, we will meet personally with members to help them to articulate their story, and to find out what matters most to them in their lives and in the world. We want to explore where people have come from in their Jewish journeys and where they would like to see themselves traveling next. In the process of sharing their stories, we hope members can become more aware of their vision, of their personal power, and of their potential resources. We hope these conversations will facilitate the sharing of individuals' resources within our community: each of us has interests and needs, and each of us has gifts to share. In the largest sense, we see these conversations as a way to help empower our members so that they may feel a renewed sense of Jewish possibilities, and so that they feel energized in pursuing their Jewish goals. We hope to mobilize our members' resources towards the mission of this community so that collectively we can build our congregation and work together towards our goals: Jewish learning and practice, gemilut chasadim (acts of loving-kindness) and tikkun olam (repair of the world)."

This process represents a wonderful opportunity for us as a community to learn about and appreciate the richness and diversity of our membership, to deepen our bonds as a community, and to identify directions for our community in the months and years ahead. We plan to engage with roughly one-third of the congregation over each of the next three years. Households will be selected each year to represent the diverse voices in our community.

A group of about a dozen CDT members met in January and February for orientation sessions with Rebecca Gifford, a staff member of the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO), and these volunteers are in the process of contacting the households who will be invited to participate this year. In the course of the orientation sessions, the volunteers developed a vision about this project and what it can accomplish, and they left the meetings with great enthusiasm and energy.

The one-on-one conversations will take place in February and March. We hope that these conversations will enable us to seek ways to deepen all of our connections and commitments to the Dorshei Tzedek community. As we discover the issues that are most important in the lives of our members, we can begin to think about how to take action on those issues, both within our congregation and in the broader community. As this process unfolds, I hope that others in the congregation will experience enthusiasm and excitement for these conversations, and that they will serve to enrich all of us as members of the CDT community in our personal and collective Jewish journeys.

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Notes from the Board

February 8, 2004

The board met on Sunday February 8. **Steve Siegel** and **Michael Cohen** from the Nadiv Lev Committee introduced the annual Nadiv Lev Campaign. This year, the campaign will be carried out by telephone. Members of the congregation will receive a mailing, to be followed up by a phone call. All households will be contacted. Board members were trained to make the calls.

Andrew Compaine reported on the Community Conversations project. The purpose of this project is to enrich our understanding of ourselves as a community. The project is described in detail in the President's Column on page 1. The conversations will begin in late February and the project will be concluded at the end of March, when the volunteers will convene to share themes that they heard during the visits.

Ora Gladstone reported on the progress of the search for rabbinic support during Rabbi Spitzer's sabbatical year. The job description has been sent to the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College for distribution to the graduating seniors and other rabbis. The board also asked the committee to broaden the search in case a good candidate did not emerge from the Reconstructionist movement, as well as considering other options in case it was not possible to identify one person who could assume the role of rabbinext year.

Debbie Waber reported that the Personnel Committee, chaired by **Elaine Bresnick**, is carrying out the annual review of Diane Dillon, our administrator. Board members were invited to offer comments to Elaine, and encouraged to make use of Diane's skills in situations where administrative support is required.

Laurie Gould updated the budget. The budget assumes that the Nadiv Lev campaign will raise \$75,000 this year, so it is very important that the campaign meet its goals.

Cindy Shulak-Rome reported on the school. Cindy has assumed the role of teacher in Kitah Zayin, following the resignation of the original classroom teacher. The Education Committee is focusing on post-b'nei mitzvah education, with some exciting possibilities. This year's Tikkun Olam program will focus on economic justice in the clothing industry.

A community of learners program is being planned for the spring, with a focus on Pesach. (See page 3.)

The **Members' Meeting on February 29** will include a program by the Chesed Committee. The business agenda will take approximately half an hour, followed by the program.

The next Board meeting will be Sunday evening, March 21 at 7:30 pm at 60 Highland Street in West Newton.


is in Palmer, Massachusetts, less than 90 minutes from metro Boston.

The End of Life: A Practical and Spiritual Guide

with Rabbi Spitzer and Nicky Silver
Wednesday evenings, March 3, 10, 17, 7:30 – 9:15 pm
While death and dying are topics that often make us uncomfortable, the opportunity to reflect and make plans—for ourselves, for loved ones—is extremely important. Judaism provides guidance for dealing with death, mourning and grieving in ways that comfort both the dying and the mourners. Through a combination of text study and discussion, we will explore these themes:

March 3 and 10: An in-depth exploration of Jewish traditions--and choices we need to make--in relation to burial and mourning, as well as how to comfort mourners. If there is time, we will also explore Jewish ideas about the afterlife.

March 17: Taking the next steps: how can we as a

community better support one another around death and dying? Do we want to create our own *Chevra Kadisha* (Jewish Burial Society), and participate directly in the preparation of bodies for burial, sitting overnight with the deceased before the funeral, etc.? Is it time for Dorshei Tzedek to have our own burial plots?

Rabbi Spitzer is co-teaching this class with new CDT member **Nicky Silver**. Nicky writes:

I first got involved with this work because of my curiosity about the mystery of death. When my former congregation (The Jewish Community of Amherst) was starting a Chevra Kadisha (Jewish Burial Society), I readily joined. I found great comfort studying and wrestling with other members of my community about issues concerning death. We explored our personal relationship with death, our fears, our concerns, our curiosities, our stories, and our reverence. There were approximately 15 of us who met monthly for over 4 years before we performed our first tahara (the ritual of cleansing and purification). Since 1991, for over 12 years, I was the head of both the Chevra Kadisha and the cemetery committee. As the Chevra Kadisha members grew individually and communally, our work affected the rest of the congregation. Through the years that I held these positions, I saw our community develop a maturity in our relationship to death and dying, which affected other parts of the community as well. We were all pretty skilled at baby namings, weddings, and B'nai Mitzvah. Doing death together seemed to change everything. Death, the shadow, brings with it a time of our greatest emotional need and our greatest vulnerability. When we as a community can support each other during this profound life cycle, deep, open-hearted love and support is developed in a way that other life cycles do not provide.

This course will be both practical and experiential, whether you yourself are a mourner, or supporting a mourner. That is, it is for anyone interested in exploring this important topic.

GBIO & the Nursing Homes Campaign

A *minyan* (ten) Dorshei Tzedek members joined hundreds of others from GBIO member-congregations on February 10 at Temple Salem in Dorchester to help launch an initiative to bring dignity and respect to nursing home front line caregivers (in the Boston area, 80% are Haitian women) while helping to improve care for residents of nursing facilities. It was a very exciting evening—please read some members' reflections below.

One key next step is to build our own personal relationships with workers from local nursing homes so that we can take action together on critical issues facing the workers and those they care for. On Monday, March 15, at the Lutheran Church of the Newtons, 1310 Centre Street in Newton Centre, from 7:30 to 9 pm we will be joining other synagogue and church members from the Newton, Brookline and Brighton areas in a dialogue with care-givers who work at homes in these communities. There are also plans to meet with local nursing home management staff and to begin a resident visitation program. Reflections on the February 10 GBIO meeting

"Arriving a bit late at Temple Salem for the GBIO solidarity meeting with Haitian nursing home workers gave me the opportunity to hear the singing of their first Haitian song ringing out on the streets of Dorchester. Hearing that song while walking up the steps of what had been an old "shul," so similar to the one my grandfather had been the president of in Brooklyn N.Y., was odd indeed, but was also somewhat reassuring. Here is a place of worship being used by subsequent generations of immigrants. The 10 commandments atop Temple Salem, the beautiful old "bima," sitting in what had been the women's gallery, provided the sense of the old and new in tandem. Feeling in league with this newer congregation and finding another relatively uncomplicated issue of civil rights to work for, felt like a very Jewish thing to be doing."

"I gratefully sat in the pew and felt the collective joy among the CDT members upon discovering an additional 2 members in the balcony. We had a *minyan*! Strong and inspirational voices of national pride and spiritual identity—all in Creole—filled the room. My head was warmed by multiple hats: As a longtime occupational health educator/ advocate, I had the honor of working with nursing home workers in several Eastern states, and experienced the long road to improved working conditions, living wages and safer jobs for this essential profession. As a daughter I felt humbled and sad. Just last Fall, I visited my Mom several times during her 10-week stay in a nursing home/ rehab facility, and saw first hand the startling understaffing, stressful working conditions and absence of lifting devices. I saw nursing home residents grow weary with aides who could not respond to urgent requests due to needs of neighboring residents. The caregivers who want to care and the vulnerable elderly were pitted against each other. As a Dorshei Tzedek member I felt happy to be present and proud of Rabbi Spitzer's leadership. Like the Hebrew letters which still adorn the bimah of this now vital and bustling Haitian Church, it was moving to note how guickly the actors change with new waves and generations of immigrants. This is the right time and a good place to breathe our values into simple and meaningful acts of solidarity." -Jamie Tessler

"There was a lot of positive energy in Temple Salem as people sang Haitian-Creole songs, clergy blessed, and an assortment of folks spoke about the working conditions of nursing home workers. Hearing one worker describe her 16-hour day was enough to get anyone angry and involved. The lack of respect was as shocking as the understaffing that stops the workers from giving adequate care to the patients. I didn't realize that working in nursing homes was so much an extension of the inter-generational Haitian family, where grandparents often live with the extended family. Other than the things I expected, such as low wages, lack of health insurance, etc., I was shocked to hear that the Haitian workers are yelled at for speaking Creole among themselves on breaks and that they aren't allowed to take phone calls during the day. A few minutes taken from our busy lives might make a world of difference in the lives of the nursing home workers!"
