Turning and Returning: Strategic Planning at CDT

With the High Holy Days falling so late this year, it feels as if we've had a head start on projects slated for the new year. Every year the board has an extended retreat-style September board meeting with an in-depth discussion topic and this year the focus for the extra inning was strategic planning. Led by **Paul Hattis**, and facilitated by **Ellen Hemley**, we formally cut the ribbon on Dorshei Tzedek's next round of planning, having completed and implemented two previous strategic plans in our 14-year history as a congregation.

As I described on Rosh Hashanah, the strategic planning process is much like the process of turning and returning. We are looking back to the mission of the congregation, to what we do well and not as well. We are studying the results of all the Community Conversations. We are also reviewing the Torah of Money: how we now raise money and members' feelings about the process. We plan to use the opportunity of strategic planning to think about our future goals and desires—including those related to what we as a community want to offer to members as a way to nurture spiritual, educational, or experiential growth. Towards this end, we'll ask questions of ourselves, such as:

- Who comes to services, who doesn't, and why?
- Who joins CDT and what are they seeking?
- Who doesn't join CDT?
- What draws us together and enables us to act as a community on issues of social justice, or in educating ourselves and our children?
- How we do keep intimacy while expanding?

Turning and returning. And in the end, we aim to produce a plan that will give at least general guidance to all of our committees and staff for their yearly goals for the next five years. Many of you may have participated in the process of strategic planning in your professional lives, or in other volunteer roles in the community. I know that for me, the words "strategic planning" don't elicit the most positive memories from my life chapter in corporate America. Guided by Rabbi Spitzer's Yom Kippur thoughts to all of us about building a "community of practice," I think this process will be very different. I am hopeful that our strategic planning will be inspiring and energizing as we build the next phase of our Reconstructionist community.

Look for communication from the Board regarding how you can be involved in this exciting planning process, thinking about CDT in 3-5 years. We will have many opportunities for members to contribute thoughts and ideas, and when there is disagreement, healthy debate. I look forward to it all, and hope you do too. Board Report (September 2005)

Welcome to New Members: Diana Fisher-Gomberg, Jeff Kichen, Esther Kohn, Angela Vierling-Claassen, and Andrew Schiff were welcomed as new members of the board.

D'var Torah: Rabbi Spitzer opened with a D'var on Parsha Ki Tavo. On the bank of the Jordan River, before they go without him into Canaan, Moses gives the Israelites instructions about the practices God has set out for them to follow when they're on the other side. Moses tells of harsh consequences if they don't adhere to God's commandments and abundance if they do. Ritual practice both creates community and necessitates community. What does it mean to become a community of practice? What would it be like for us as a Jewish community to serve with joy in the knowledge of abundance? As we begin a new round of strategic planning for our congregation, we have the opportunity to approach the project with joy and a sense of abundance, working together to make ourselves into the community of which we want to be a part.

Strategic Planning: Ellen Hemley and Paul Hattis led the strategic planning discussion. Ellen, as facilitator, told the board that to be an effective change agent, one has to be able to hope for change with the expectation of its fulfillment. She asked board members to think about and share their hopes for the planning process. Paul put out three goals for the strategic planning process for the board to think about and discuss. The goals are very consistent with our mission statement; we're not looking for a major shift in direction but rather a strengthening of our preexisting commitments to belonging, participation, diversity and Jewish practice. There may be a sub-group designated to consider resource issues in the "Torah of Money" model, but the approach this time will be that we already have a dues structure in place and unless we find reason to change it, it will stay as it is. The strategic planning group will rely on work already done through Community Conversations as a resource for understanding members' feelings, attitudes and hopes. The next board meeting will be devoted exclusively to more strategic planning discussion.

Finance: We are close to meeting our membership and school goals. There are no great concerns on either the revenue or the expense side. **Sivan Nasoff**, our treasurer, reminded the committee chairs that the Finance Commit-

tee relies on them to submit reports about their committee's expenditures, and the chairs will then get back summary reports on what their committee has spent, which they are asked to review for accuracy.

School Report: Cindy Shulak-Rome, CDT school director, reported that school got off to a great start this week, and that she feels we have an excellent school staff in place. *Kitah Gan* is quite under-enrolled, for reasons that remain unclear, and there are still a few spaces *Aleph* and *Bet* classes.

Tikkun Olam: Esther Kohn, chair of the Tikkun Olam Committee, reports that participation in GBIO (Greater Boston Interfaith Organization) activities remains a focus of the committee, but it plans to have other projects too. At present GBIO is very involved in a statewide health care campaign, and the Tikkun Olam Committee is organizing CDT volunteers to work on that. The committee is looking for ways to better bring the work they're doing into the life of the congregation. This year's activities will continue to be organized around health care issues.

Membership Outreach: Membership Outreach Committee chair Carla Naumburg reports that recruitment is going well. Two outreach events were scheduled for October: an Open House on Sunday, October 16 before our Sukkot program, and a get-together to meet and schmooze with our Rabbi and CDT leadership before the October 21 Adult Erev Shabbat service. The Membership Committee is much in need of additional help. Additional committee members are needed and we need to identify and train people who can take over leadership next summer. Board members can help by attending the outreach events mentioned above.

ond will examine Talmudic attitudes toward the disabled, specifically as regards their performance of sacred and liturgical functions. During the final class, we will focus on the "rules of engagement" in the Rabbinic Academy. How can we debate important matters with fierce conviction while avoiding personal attack? What are the stakes in maintaining the integrity of the discourse?

David Bernat is Assistant Professor of Religion and Jewish studies at Wellesley College. His doctorate is from Brandeis University, and his areas of teaching and research are Hebrew Bible and ancient Judaism. Prof. Bernat has been a member of the Meah faculty for seven years and gave a class on Psalms at CDT last year.

Perspectives on Modern Hebrew Literature with Irit Aharony

Monday evenings, November 7, 14 and 21, at 7:30 pm Second Church, Class room 112 (on the first floor a little past the kitchen)

Session 1—The Akedah in Israeli literature: In this lecture we will explore the special place the story of the Binding of Isaac has in Israeli culture. As Abraham was willing to sacrifice his beloved son to God, Israeli fathers are sacrificing their own sons for the sake of the land. We will compare the Israeli Akedah to the Biblical one, focusing on parents (especially mothers) and sons.

Session 2—Jerusalem in the eyes of Yehuda Amichai: Amichai has been Israel's most important poet. His poetry deals with all the important Israeli topics: wars, the Holocaust, surrounding enemies, and others. Jerusalem captured a significant place in his writing. We will read Amichai's poems to reveal his special lyrical point of view focusing on Jerusalem.

Session 3—Israel of Love: It is hard to believe, but Israeli literature is filled with love: romantic, ideal, ironic, and even sarcastic. We will examine contemporary Israeli literature both poetry and prose, and see the influence of love as described in the Bible (for example, Song of Songs) on Israeli literature.

Dr. Irit Aharony was born in Israel, served in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) as a teacher, taught literature to gifted high school students and worked in the Ministry of Education in the program for gifted students. She received her Ph.D. from Bar-llan University in Modern Hebrew Literature, and wrote her thesis on the theme of wandering in Israeli Literature. Since 1996, Dr. Aharony has taught

"Modern Hebrew" and "Israeli Literature" at Harvard University. She has published articles about contemporary Israeli literature focusing especially on the Biblical influence on contemporary Hebrew literature.

Judaism and Practice with Rabbi Toba Spitzer

The first session will look at the way in which rabbinic legislation attempted to balance the concerns for individual rights and communal safety. The sec-

GBIO and Tikkun Olam

Affordable Health Care

Several members of CDT collected signatures during a ten-day blitz launched by GBIO in September and October to support a ballot initiative for accessible and affordable healthcare. CDT-ers and others spread out to communities across the greater Boston area and gathered hundreds of signatures. On two Sundays alone in Newton, volunteers collected almost a thousand signatures. Additionally, signatures are being gathered on Election Day and at neighborhood walks.

You learn a lot about your neighbors when you stand in front of a supermarket holding a petition, looking for signatures. For example, there are many techniques employed to avoid an encounter with someone holding a petition. My favorite is denying that you are, in fact, registered to vote. The hardest part of collecting signatures is the initial contact, convincing people that you are not selling anything and will not put their names on a mailing list or sell them out to a corporation. Once people slow down and listen, you learn that most people care deeply about health care, are dissatisfied with the status quo and are eager to sign and support changes to the current system.

As a new member of CDT, I have been thinking about what issues to get involved with in the congregation, as well as in the larger community. The campaign for changing the healthcare system in Massachusetts seemed like a good place to start. After Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast, I thought a lot about how I might help the survivors of that disaster in a personal way. I thought about volunteering with the Red Cross but the idea was quickly boycotted by my six-month old daughter.

Although I am far from the floodwaters, I thought I could "think globally and act locally" (as they say), by involving myself in the healthcare campaign. In my own very small way, I could contribute to addressing some of the problems that plague people unable to afford healthcare. At the kickoff meeting at Temple Salem, Esther Kohn reports that "Rev. Hammond spoke about the connections between the aftermath of Katrina and the health care campaign. We are truly doing meaningful service to try to address inequity here in Massachusetts." I am proud of CDT because we have chosen to stand with other congregations throughout Boston and to perform this meaningful service.

Jewish Family & Children's Service Family Table Annual Turkey *Tzedakah* Drive

Hopefully, we all have many things to be thankful for in this New Year, 5766. As November approaches we traditionally begin thinking about preparing for our own meaningful family Thanksgiving celebrations. At JF&CS's Family Table, Greater Boston's Jewish Food Pantry, our "family" consists of 155 needy Jewish families, including 130 children, 73 elders, and 180 adults. Family Table helps Jews in 38 local communities who are experiencing great financial stress due to job layoffs, low wages, serious illness or disability, and the trauma of domestic violence. Imagine what it must be like for a parent to have to choose between paying the rent, or buying food to feed their children.

Each month, Family Table provides essential groceries to needy families throughout Greater Boston. For Rosh Hashanah this year recipient families received a round challah, kosher chickens, fresh carrots, apples, honey, gefilte fish and chicken soup. Family Table is a program of Jewish Family & Children's Service, in collaboration with Synagogue Council of Massachusetts, Jewish Community Relations Council, and Hillel Council of New England, and is made possible by the dedication of hundreds of volunteers and generous donors. Monthly food donations are collected at 48 synagogues, day schools and community centers, and are delivered to the pantry on our monthly "Distribution Days." Volunteers sort, pack and deliver each family's groceries to their homes.

As Thanksgiving approaches, we are asking families in the Jewish community to share their many blessings by helping a Family Table recipient provide a meaningful Thanksgiving celebration for their household. Through our "Turkey Tzedakah" drive, we provide each recipient family with a food certificate or kosher turkey and holiday foods for their family.

Family Table receives annual grants from CJP and Project Bread and monetary donations from individuals and synagogues. 
We send this message to those who struggle with the terrible loss and damage in the wake of Hurricane Katrina,

Help the Reconstructionist Movement Earn Seats at the World Zionist Congress!

June 19-22, 2006

JRF has received official confirmation of its qualification to run an independent Reconstructionist slate in the upcoming World Zionist Congress elections (November 15, 2005-February 28, 2006). This is the first time there will be an independent Reconstructionist slate for a WZC election!

What is the World Zionist Congress?

In 1897, Theodor Herzl convened about 200 Jewish leaders from around the world in Basel, Switzerland to discuss the condition of the Jewish People, the delegates at the meeting, or Congress, decided to create a movement whose goal was to establish a Jewish Homeland. The World Zionist Organization was born and led the campaign for the establishment of a Jewish State.

The State of Israel came into being 51 years after the creation of the WZO. Since that time, the World Zionist Congress has met 34 times to resolve critical issues facing the Jewish people, from building Israel's infrastructure to the establishment of the State...from the aliyah following the Holocaust to the aliyah of today. The WZO also impacts and provides the contact and delivery of Zionist education to Jews throughout the Jewish World. The 35th World Zionist Congress, meeting in Jerusalem June 19-22, 2006, will set an agenda that is certain to affect Israeli society and Israel-Diaspora relations for years to come.

Why a Reconstructionist Slate?

The World Zionist Congress is the only world Jewish gathering for which seats at the table are based on voting

rather than nominations or designations. The deliberations have significant practical consequences, but there is also something symbolically meaningful about the nature of Israel/Diaspora dialogue in a setting constructed through at least a partially democratic process.

With the support of the JRF, RRA and RRC, we have decided to seek delegates in our own name for the first time. Our general desire for some form of involvement should be obvious in the aftermath of the work of the Israel Policies Task Force (see http://www.jrf.org/israel/israel-taskforce.html).

Our goal is to win some seats and, thus, to be engaged in the process in our own name and voice. We will certainly, through this process, develop a new relationship with individuals and congregations interested in being part of our broader engagement with Israel.
