Investing in the Future

At the December Members' Meeting—with about one quarter of CDT households represented—we enjoyed a rich evening exploring open questions about our visions of ourselves and CDT five years from now. This exercise emerged from the first phase of the Strategic Planning process, which involves information gathering: finding out what people care about most, and what their visions are for themselves and the congregation.

We extracted ten core themes, reflected in phrases, from our CDT Mission Statement, and asked those attending the meeting to select three phrases that they connected with most. The phrases (with the number of people who selected them following in brackets) were:

- Caring and inclusive community [31]
- Perpetuating our children's bond to our Jewish heritage [28]
- Seekers of meaningful spirituality [26]
- Social justice [26]
- Jewish practice [19]
- Education for ourselves [15]
- Participatory congregation in which all members take an active role [9]
- Diversity [8]
- Connection to the larger community outside of DT [4]
- Mitzvah as obligation [3]

Each participant then paired with someone else with at least two of the same selected phrases, discussing why they chose those themes, their CDT experiences related to the themes, and their vision for themselves--Jewishly and spiritually--and for CDT in 5 years. As the groups reported out to the full meeting, they showed significant diversity in the direction their discussions took. Some were action-oriented; others were issue and values-specific; yet others were more general in their thinking.

Many of you were not there to participate in this most enjoyable evening of connection and conversation. For

some, I know the words "strategic planning" can trigger a serious case of eye-rolling, to quote one member of the committee. But I want to assure you that this isn't like that. Ask yourself this:

- Is CDT a community you are committed to?
- Does CDT represent values that speak to you?
- Do you think CDT might be an important place for you sometime in the next five years?

If you answered yes to one or more of these questions, it's time to invest in helping us plan for the future. You could start by having a conversation like the ones described above with other members of CDT, even with another member in your household. Think about where you would like to be, in five years, in terms of your (and your household's) Jewish practice and life. How do you envision yourself? What is your ritual and/spiritual practice, if any? How can CDT support you? How can CDT help you on your own journey?

The info-gathering phase is still continuing. In early January the Strategic Planning committee will be sending out a short, web survey (totally painless) to the full membership with questions similar to those discussed by pairs at the Members' Meeting (those who attended the meeting are still encouraged to participate in the survey). There will be

CDT Board Report

The Board met on November 20, 2005.

D'var: Jeff Kichen did a d'var on parsha Chayei Sarah. The parsha opens with the death of Sarah. Abraham, needing to find a burial place for her, negotiates with Ephron the Hittite to purchase the cave of Machpela. Speaking to Ephron, Abraham refers to himself as "ger to-shav", a "stranger and sojourner" among you. For Jews, especially during this time of year, it's easy to feel like strangers surrounded by a world not of our own making. Our Jewish community helps us overcome this sense of alienation, providing a center to return to, a place where we can feel whole and where we fully belong.

Membership Update-Inreach: The first CDT game night was a success, with about seventeen members attending. The Inreach committee is working on getting gift baskets to households who have newly joined this fall. Binder updates will be coming out soon. The committee has decided to re-

name itself the Kehilla (translation: Community) Committee.

Membership Update-Outreach: Thirteen households have recently joined CDT. Of them, nine said that their reason for joining was a personal connection with a current CDT member. The new member households are from Newton, Watertown, Cambridge, Arlington, Jamaica Plain, and Boston. The Outreach Committee is now doing phone follow-up with new member households to help introduce them to CDT and find out how they want to plug-in to the community. There'll be a new member Shabbat on December 3 and a new member orientation in January.

Finance Update: Our membership projection for the year is 178 households, but as of last week, we count only 158 paying families. The waters are muddled by uncertainty over those who have not formally said they were leaving CDT, but who also haven't yet paid dues. In the worst case, if no one else paid or joined this year, our deficit would be \$26,000. To encourage people to respond to dues requests in a reasonable amount of time, the Board approved the idea of imposing a \$50 administrative fee on late payers.

Chanukah Scheduling: Scheduling the Chanukah Party has been challenging this year. Usually it's on a Sunday during Chanukah, but his year the Chanukah begins and ends on Sundays which are also Christmas Day and New Year's Eve. The party was originally planned for Christmas, but out of concern about conflicting with Christmas celebrations, and especially how that would impact the inter-faith households in our membership, we're considering switching it to Monday, the 26, which most people have off. After checking on space availability, Rabbi Spitzer will consult with the Executive Committee and Susannah Zisk, the party organizer, and decide whether to make this change.

Strategic Planning Update/Members' Meeting: The Strategic Planning Committee has had its first two meetings since the last Board meeting. The December 4 Members' Meeting will be an important opportunity to solicit input from the membership. The committee is planning an activity for the Members' Meeting that will help members relate their personal interests to their vision of the future of our congregation.

Contacting Rabbi Toba: Rabbi Toba does not have regular office hours but is available to talk about any spiritual, religious, or personal issues that you might want to discuss. You can contact her at rabbi@dorsheitzedek.org or 617.965.0330 x2. If she is unavailable, there will be a rabbi on-call in case of emergency. The rabbi's voice-mail will have information on how to reach the on-call rabbi.

Members' Meeting Report

The Membership Meeting took place on December 4. CDT president **Nancy Gertz** opened the meeting and introduced the meeting theme of strategic planning.

Chair of the Tikkun Olam Committee **Esther Kohn** reported on our participation in a GBIO (Greater Boston Interfaith Organization) campaign for more affordable health care in Massachusetts. CDT was active GBIO's successful petition drive to put a health care initiative on the Massachusetts ballot in 2006 (See article on Page 8). This effort has given GBIO real leverage in the legislative debate, which has already produced a Senate bill with many provisions favored by GBIO. In addition to organizing CDT members to collect more than 1500 signatures for the petition campaign, the Tikkun Olam Committee is now raising money for GBIO by selling the GBIO Cookbook (\$10), which has several recipes from CDT members.

Jackie Fleischman, co-chair of the Chesed Committee said the committee is looking for member volunteers to help other members who are in need. Most frequent needs are for someone to cook a meal, to provide transportation, to run errands, or to visit those who are ill. If you weren't at the meeting and would like to add your name to the list of volunteers for these important gifts of the heart, please contact Jackie at 617.332.5433.

Rabbi Spitzer encouraged CDT members to participate in a vote to elect members to the World Zionist Congress. The WJC is the only democratically elected organization of world Jewry, and it annually disburses hundreds of millions of dollars raised by Jewish agencies (See article on Page 12). This year for the first time, there is a Reconstructionist slate of candidates for the WJC. It's easy to register to vote on the web at https://www.escvote.com/azm2005/. The deadline for registration is February 15 and the election will be concluded on February 28. Those who register on-line will receive their ballots by email.

Rabbi Spitzer gave a *d'var* on *Vayeitzei*. Shortly after setting out on his journey to Haran, Ya'akov dreams of Angels going up and down a ladder to heaven and receives a message from Adonai. Adonai will protect him, make him the founder of a great people, and give this land to Ya'a-kov and his descendents. Ya'akov vows that if Adonai does protect and provide for him on his journey, Adonai will be his God. This *parsha* contains several lessons for strategic planning. One is that when beginning an en-

deavor, you need a plan, but expect surprises. You can't control for every eventuality. Another lesson lies in the contrast between the grandness of Ya'akov's dream and the practicality of his concerns. Be like Jacob: open to the big dream and also able to carefully think through your own needs. Individually it is for us to consider where we want to be, Jewishly and spiritually, in five years, what we need from this community to get there, and what we want to give back to the community in return.

We're at a very early point in the strategic planning process, in an information-gathering phase. This membership meeting was an important opportunity, though not the only one, for the Strategic Planning Committee to get input from the membership. This part of the process is not about the "hows" but about the "whats" and "what ifs", about visioning.

Sheree Galpert from the Strategic Planning Committee led an activity designed to help us gain a better understand our individual priorities. To begin, those present selected, out of ten broad themes drawn from the CDT Mission Statement, the three that had greatest meaning to them. (See President's Message for more details.)

After everyone had made their choices, people were asked to find a partner who had chosen at least two of the same statements, and to talk with their partner about those choices. Partners were to ask each other the following questions: Why did you choose the statements you did? What event, experience, or encounter at CDT has made you feel most engaged and connected? Where would you like to see yourself and CDT in five years? Next, partners formed small groups and spent twenty minutes sharing and expanding on their one-on-one discussions, making a list of the concerns and themes that emerged. Finally we re-gathered in the full group to recap as much of the discussion as we could in a compressed form.

The Strategic Planning Committee will go over the lists that were generated at this meeting and condense the data. They will write up what they found, and that report will be one of the underpinnings of the strategic planning process, along with information gathered from members who weren't present at the membership meeting and from non-members with whom we interact. Members will be kept informed about the progress of the strategic planning process through the newsletter.





The class is intended for folks at any level of Jewish observance/non-observance.

Contemporary Ethics from a Talmudic Perspective with Prof. David Bernat

Monday evenings: January 23, 30 and February 6 at 7:30 pm

Session 1 – Civil Rights in Stressful Times Session 2 – Disability and Inclusion

Session 3 – Debate and Dissent in Polite Society

The course will entail close reading of selected Talmudic passages dealing with ethical questions that resonate with us today. The work will have a dual purpose. We will delve deeply into the specific social and moral issues, and at the same time, gain familiarity with the complex mechanics of Talmudic discussion. The first session will look at the way in which rabbinic legislation attempted to balance the concerns for individual rights and communal safety. The second will examine Talmudic attitudes toward the disabled, specifically as regards their performance of sacred and liturgical functions. During the final class, we will focus on the "rules of engagement" in the Rabbinic Academy. How can we debate important matters with fierce conviction while avoiding personal attack? What are the stakes in maintaining the integrity of the discourse?

David Bernat is Assistant Professor of Religion and Jewish studies at Wellesley College. His doctorate is from Brandeis University, and his areas of teaching and research are Hebrew Bible and ancient Judaism. Prof. Bernat has been a member of the Meah faculty for seven years and gave a class on Psalms at CDT last year.

GBIO and Tikkun Olam

The GBIO healthcare reform effort has been heartening on a number of levels. One is the nature and composition of GBIO – it would be hard not to feel inspired while participating in a community-based effort with thousands of people of different races and cultures, people who come from all over the greater Boston area, are diverse in their religious commitments, and who nonetheless share a commitment to effecting significant change in the wider community that we share. I've also been heartened by the fact that in this effort I am working through my membership and commitment to Dorshei Tzedek. In the past, my political work was often not tied to a Jewish community, though I think that my orientation toward this work comes very much from my Jewish identity. So to have that overt connection feels important to me as an expansion of my current and potential identity as a Jew.

Another way in which this has been a heartening effort is how successful it's been! We can already see significant effects. GBIO pledged 40,000 signatures and collected 42,000 of the 112,000 delivered by MassACT, the umbrella organization with which GBIO is working on this initiative. More than 1,500 of these were collected by Dorshei Tzedek members. This quantity of signatures has had and will continue to have a direct effect for two reasons. First, the public support for increased access to health care demonstrated by the signature campaign caused significant revisions to the bill introduced by the House. Second, there are enough signatures to go forward with a ballot initiative if a bill is not passed that contains the major provisions that MassACT is supporting.

There were two significant GBIO events in early December that illustrated the success of the effort thus far. One was a GBIO meeting on December 1 to celebrate the signature campaign. **Salvatore DiMasi**, the Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, came to the meeting and, according to Dorshei Tzedek Tikkun Olam Committee Chair **Esther Kohn**, was "visibly moved" by the energy and commitment that he felt there. He spoke to the GBIO membership regarding the health care bill that the House is supporting: "Your commitment to this cause convinced my members (members of the House) and me that this is the right thing to do... You have inspired me... Massachusetts has been a leader in this country. We can set an example today. It (the bill) is new, innovative, bold, and it's the right thing to do."

One point of contention had been the "employer mandate" that GBIO has advocated for —the aspect of the bill that mandates employers to be assessed 5-7% of their payroll if they do not provide health care to their workers. DiMasi said that he would pledge to continue support of the employer mandate.

The second event was the December 7 rally at the State House when the 112,000 signatures were turned in to be certified. The purpose of the rally was to show public support for an extensive bill offering increased access to health care.

A quote from **Esther Kohn** captures the inspiration of this campaign thus far: "I have to echo our shouts at the December 1 GBIO celebration: HALLELUJAH, WE DID IT!! It was worth standing in the rain and cold on those Sunday afternoons to collect all those signatures. I am amazed that the ballot initiative actually made a huge impact on our state legislators. Many Representatives and Senators are taking political risks to do the right thing. The bill that emerges could dramatically improve the lives of Massachusetts citizens who have not had adequate, affordable health care. MAZEL TOV!"

Everything Old is New Again

When I first met Cindy, I liked her immediately. Smart, intuitive, sensitive, and all with great humor. What's not to like?

A few months into the school year she told me we would be doing a *maccabiah* for Chanukah. This afternoon of very silly games was a tradition. So I asked what had been done in the past, thinking that she would want new ideas. However, she told me that identical games had been played every year for a long time and that the students looked forward to them. What??? Of course, she was right. The students began talking about the specific games, races etc that they were anticipating many weeks in advance of the day.

Each year we read the same stories in the Torah over and over. Because there is often a comfort level in knowing what to expect, be it a game or a story, there is also the reality that we are one year older and approach the games with more skill and approach the stories with a different way of looking at them given the things we have experienced in the past year.

As educators we live with this experience daily. Though we have a core curriculum, it sometimes needs to be tweaked to adjust to the makeup of the class. We are, therefore, often in the classrooms to observe and evaluate how the material is being taught and received. We also appreciate input from parents and students as to what parts are working well and what might need some adjustment. Often, the conversations with the students take place during Community Time, the all-school snack-and-hang-out time before classes. (This is one of my favorite times, as it is when the kids teach me about what books, movies, and music are popular.)

As we grow year by year, it is important to keep rituals and traditions, be they games or holiday celebrations or Torah, in our lives; these are excellent anchors that connect us as a community.

Do you have some free time in the afternoon? Why not visit the "Inspirational Jewish Women" faith quilt hanging at the Brandeis Women Studies Research Center? Over 70 Greater Boston women participated in workshops led by Waban quilter and CDT member **Steffi Aronson Karp**, in which they created fabric collage squares, which were then completed, quilted, and turned into an artistic whole. The entire work measures 14 feet long by 6 feet high. Beside the fabric squares are cards describing the inspirations for each piece.

What is it about chant that speaks to us at such a deep level? Why has chanting found its way into so many cultures and religions around the world both ancient and modern? Though it takes many forms, chant basically combines words (or syllables - like OM), music and rhythm to form a sacred phrase which is repeated over and over again. Chanting becomes a form of vocal meditation, or as my teacher Rabbi Shefa Gold says: "A way of transforming words into doorways, entrances into expanded states of consciousness." Through chanting we are able to focus the mind, and shift our consciousness from the outside world to the inside world of the chant, and then further inside to our spiritual core. There is a huge difference between chanting and ordinary singing. It is primarily a meditative process and a vehicle toward an inward focus. Chanting incorporates breath, heart, spirit, intention and voice together, much like a yoga practice joins physical postures with our deeper core. I have been studying a meditative practice using Hebrew chants for several years and am currently in a chant leadership training program with Rabbi Shefa Gold.
