# A Journey Towards Covenant: "Recounting the Omer"

This month of April—and the Hebrew month of *Nisan*—brings with it a journey through the heart of our Jewish "master story," the Torah story of Exodus. We retell and reexperience the moment of liberation at the Passover seder, where we remember that "we were slaves to Pharaoh in *Mitzrayim* (Egypt)," and that we were freed from there by the Godly Power of liberation. Seven weeks later, we celebrate the holiday of Shavuot, an ancient harvest festival that the early rabbis recast as the celebration of receiving Torah at Mount Sinai. The intervening weeks are marked by the counting of the "omer," a measure of barley. It is traditional to count each day on the path from redemption to revelation, following the Torah's instructions to "count seven weeks" beginning right after the first day of Passover.

In the Jewish mystical tradition, the counting of the *omer* took on another meaning: not just a countdown to Shavuot, but an opportunity for "*tikkun*," repair, as we prepare ourselves to receive Torah. Each day of the *omer* has its own quality that calls our attention to what it is that needs to be healed in order for each of us to be open to the particular truth, the particular teaching, that awaits us on the 50th day.

We can also understand the *omer* period as a journey into covenant. The Israelites left Egypt a mass of individuals, joined together by little other then their mutual experience of suffering. At Sinai, our ancestors entered into reciprocal relationship with the divine and with one another, called on to create covenantal community. That covenant was framed by instructions for living—what we now call "Torah"—centered on the values of *tzedek*, justice, and *chesed*, loving kindness.

During the *omer* period that begins this month, we are going to be reflecting on our work of "tikkun," of repair, in a way that mirrors of process of moving from Mitzrayim—literally, the "narrow place," the place of constriction and oppression—towards the ideal of covenantal connections. Members of the congregation will be organizing group conversations that will give us the opportunity to tell our stories and help one another reflect on the key issues that affect us and the communities we live in. What are the specific challenges we face in our families and at work? In our neighborhoods? In the greater Boston area? These challenges often make us feel isolated, or are experienced as largely personal problems to be dealt with on an individual level.

The connections that are made as we discover common experiences and the compassion we develop as we listen openly to our differences will, we hope, help us prepare for a renewed commitment to our covenant as a congregation, as well as our commitment to the society around us. We hope our shared stories will shed light on the knots and tears in the social fabric that perhaps we can begin to mend if we are willing to engage them publicly. Are we struggling to pay the bills, to afford our rent or mortgage?

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Do we have money put away for retirement? How do we care for our aging parents, grandparents? Do we have quality, affordable childcare? Can we afford to work at jobs which reflect our values? Do our schools, neighborhoods, and workplaces allow us to care for the environment? How do the complications of social and economic class affect our relationship to Dorshei Tzedek? These are only a few examples of questions that might arise as we share our current challenges.

Action for tikkun olam ("repair of the world") that is grounded in an understanding of our personal struggles allows us to connect and invest more deeply and authentically in the struggles of those around us. Though we will begin this process in our own congregation, churches and synagogues all over the metropolitan Boston area will be engaging in a similar campaign this April and May. A group of members from Dorshei Tzedek are attending trainings run by the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) with other leaders from congregations all over the metropolitan area committed to acting together on our core beliefs and common issues. The trainings are an opportunity to reflect on the habits of collective leadership and to learn how to facilitate "house meetings""- these discussions about the issues we care about and face in our lives every day.

For our own Dorshei Tzedek house meeting campaign—
"Recounting the Omer"—we are planning several opportunities for members to gather together to tell their stories.

Our goal is for every adult member of the congregation to attend at least one house meeting. The first gathering will be at our common "house," at a potluck dinner on Friday, April 21 at 6:30 pm preceding services. We will divide into small groups and CDT members, trained as facilitators, will lead each group through the storytelling process. Childcare will be provided.

There will be two other House Meetings in May (stay tuned for details!). We hope you will attend the potluck meeting on April 21 or one of these other meetings. If you would like to host a gathering at your home, please contact **Esther Kohn** at esthercfs@hotmail.com, 617.524.0478.

We look forward to engaging in this process as a community as we prepare for spring, Passover, Shavuot, and our *tikkun olam* plans for the future. May our journey into the challenges and blessings of covenant be as bountiful as our ancestors' spring harvests!

As an activist, it was great to be part of a visioning discussion on CDT's social justice work. The meeting and the members' survey afterwards has helped my process of internalizing what being part of our community means to me and to the whole.

# March Members' Meeting Report

The March member's meeting opened with a d'var from Rabbi Toba, updates from the Education Director Search Committee and the Strategic Planning Committee, and a review of the nominating process for next year's board and committees.

Most of the meeting was devoted to discussion sessions on topics related to the strategic planning process. The session topics were: education, intimacy and Jewish practice, Torah of Money, and Tikkun Olam. Of these four sessions, each meeting participant could attend two. The intent was for members to have in depth conversations with each other on these themes and to record the ideas that were generated for the Strategic Planning Committee.

The executive committee invited five members to reflect on their experience of the meeting, and their reports follow.

**Debbie Waber**: I was so impressed by the thoughtfulness the members displayed at the meeting as well as their depth of caring about this community. Although the overriding issue was growth (it always is in these strategic planning exercises!), there was remarkably little anxiety about that. No matter what the particular issue, the concerns seemed to be connectedness, shared values and preserving community. I attended discussions about fundraising and ritual practice. In both sessions, the discussions were not about the manifest issue, that is, money or practice, but about how we maintain the power of community while integrating diverse interests and constituencies. The fact that everyone so easily focused at this level gives comfort that we will indeed be able to maintain the CDT culture of community, no matter where this journey takes us.

Trish Nuzzola: Maintaining connection is an important consideration among all communities fortunate enough to be struggling with the challenges of growth. In our discussion about growth, intimacy, and what makes our community special, members shared personal views on the impact of varying levels of involvement within our congregation -- the "committed" versus "casual" member. I believe that for the CDT community to continue to flourish, we need to honor members who participate in all different ways. The perspectives and experiences of those at the periphery may be different than those at the center, but no less integral to creating and a strong, diverse and vital community. People have different needs, comfort levels, and capacities for how they belong and participate; in many cases, these will vary over time within the same individual. In our commitment to diversity and creating a place for the many layers of Judaism, it is important that we all feel welcomed.

Carol Sklar: I went to the group that would be discussing money and fundraising and to the group dealing with how the congregation is meeting our needs. These were open discussions, interesting and fun. In the money group, we talked about traditional fund raising and how we felt about fund raising in other congregations we had belonged to. Some of us acknowledged that we were concerned that Dorshei might get too expensive to belong to. It was then that I found out we are one of the only sliding scale dues communities. It was a wonderful conversation, over too soon. In the second group, we went around introduced ourselves and told what we had done to volunteer at Dorshei. People raised various issues of what they needed more or less of at Dorshei. We talked about what to do when your child is post B'nei Mitzvah and your identity is no longer attached to the school. It was very much a give and take. Every committee was genuinely interested in hearing what we had to say and what could be done to help everyone feel at home at Dorshei. I was again struck with what a special group this is.

**Lauren Gibbs**: My responses to the two sessions I went to will be in the form of the questions that I left those sessions with:

#### Education at DT:

- How do members who already have significant Jewish practice retain a feeling of continuing to be a Jewish Learner at Dorshei Tzedek?
- How can we support and include families with children who are not in the school?
- How can we reach the goal of creating a post B'nei Mitzvah program?
- How can we increase intergenerational learning opportunities? How can we revive and sustain periodic "Community of Learners" sessions?
- What policies and supports can we put in place to include every child possible in the school?
- How can we increasingly support adult ed. or other learning connections for adults?

Intimacy and Jewish Practice – The topic in the session was: Can we retain a sense of Intimacy if we grow? The surprisingly (to me) large consensus was "yes". The next question was: How do we do that?

- How can we transform B'nei Mitzvah services into shared simchas in which we delight at seeing children in our community grow into young Jewish adults?
- How do we increase the number of shared experiences that members have together?
- How do we revive the active and personal one-on-one



#### Join us for Shabbat Unplugged! What you can do:



"Counting the Omer" will be a series of exercises in what is called "Tikkun Middot"- the "repair of qualities" of heart and mind. This segment will begin the week of April 26-27, and the class will end on June 1, Erev Shavuot. Classes on Thursday are followed by a period of silent meditation with instruction. # Yom HaShoah / Holocaust Remembrance Program

We will be commemorating *Yom HaShoah* this year with a screening of a compelling new film about a little known Holocaust hero. Walter Suskind was a German Jew living in Amsterdam who was forced by the Nazis to serve as the Jewish head of deportation at the Hollandsche Schouwburg (the Jewish Theatersite) in Amsterdam. Using his fluent German, his skills as an actor and business-man, and unfathomable courage and tenacity, he orchestrated the escape of over 1200 Dutch children and adults who were marked for transport to the death camps. Walter took the secret of his mission to his death at Auschwitz, and only a few survivors and resistance workers knew what he had done. Producers **Tim and Karen Morse** will present the film and answer questions afterward. This film is appropriate for adults and students in middle school (accompanied by an adult) or older.



#### **Recounting the Omer**

This fall, Dorshei Tzedek was part of a statewide effort to work for comprehensive health reform in Massachusetts. As I write this article, we are still fighting to make sure that extensive reform will take place. If the legislature does not implement significant reform we will face the challenge, with the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO), of moving forward with a health care ballot initiative next fall. We worked hard and were engaged in direct action. Now it is time to reflect.

As we detailed in the opening article of this newsletter, our congregation will reflect on the key issues we face in our individual lives and in our communities. This process of reflecting and relating as a way to prepare for action is one that the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) has successfully engaged in the past. Through members' conversations about personal experiences, GBIO has identified issues that need attention and action. Over the past few years, affordable housing, improving conditions for workers in nursing homes, and health care reform are examples of issues that have been identified through this process. Our upcoming conversations, our own CDT "house meeting campaign," will provide an invaluable opportunity to identify the issues that Dorshei Tzedek members are grappling with and help us chart a tikkun olam course alongside other congregations across the metropolitan area.

To kick off the House Meeting Campaign, we invite everyone to a GBIO Delegates meeting on **April 6 from 7 pm to 9 pm** (location TBA). GBIO meetings are inspiring, energizing events and a chance to be part of a truly diverse social and spiritual movement across the Boston area. We hope many of you can attend!

#### JRF to Participate in Major Relief Effort for Darfur-CDT Members Invited!!

JRF congregations will participate in a national rally and demonstration in Washington, D.C., on April 30, 2006, sponsored by the Save Darfur Coalition - of which the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation is a member. The coalition intends to deliver to President Bush one million signatures on postcards calling for a larger and stronger multinational force to protect the civilians of Darfur and to exercise leadership to stop the genocide.

The Million Voices for Darfur campaign is a coordinated effort urging Bush to exercise leadership to stop the genocide. Darfur is a region of western Sudan in Africa. Since February 2003, over 400,000 men, women and children have died while another 2.5 million innocent civilians have been forced to flee their homes.

January 12, 2006 marked the 55th anniversary of the ratification of the United Nation's Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide. The day has come to be known as International Genocide Prevention Day. The Save Darfur Coalition launched the Million Voices for Darfur campaign on that day.
