Looking Back, Looking Forward

As summer approaches, I am thinking back on all that has occurred at Dorshei Tzedek since Rosh Hashanah 5767. There has been a good deal of transition, as our new fulltime staff, Marla Lichtman and Ewa Maniawski Tuschman, have settled in and completed a program year. Each of them has brought wonderful gifts and new energy to the congregation. 5767 has been a year of learning, with 30 people taking my weekly Judaism & Practice classes (in addition to those who attended other adult education programs), with a new 8th grade program, and with our biggest bar/bat mitzvah class ever – 19 kids! We had a marvelous retreat, with almost half of the congregation participating. At the recent Members' Meeting, we voted on a strategic plan for the next 3-5 years, the culmination of an incredible amount of work by many people in the congregation, ably led by Paul Hattis and Laurie Gould. We fielded the firstever CDT softball team, bringing a little Reconstructionist spirit to the synagogue league! We've celebrated births, and supported one another through the loss of parents. We came together as a community at a moment of profound pain and loss, with the death of our beloved Jill Volk. It's been a rich, challenging, and full program year.

It's also been a rich and full year for me personally. On the family level, I had the gift of spending the year tutoring Zoe for her bat mitzvah, and then *kvelling* with Gina as Zoe leyned from the Torah and gave a wonderful d'var Torah. In addition to becoming parents of a bat mitzvah, we've also seen Zach turn 16 this month and eagerly enter the ranks of teenage drivers! And we're thrilled that Zach is heading off to a month in Israel with the NFTY program, with his CDT buddy Adam Goldsmith.

As a rabbi, I've had a number of opportunities to become involved in ways that both complement and extend my work at Dorshei Tzedek. Following my authorship of a rabbis' letter for peace in the wake of the Israel-Lebanon war last summer, I was asked to take on some leadership in

Brit Tzedek v'Shalom, a national Jewish organization that seeks to support Israel through promoting a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. With the help of our very own Stan Fleischman, I have helped create a rabbinic cabinet for the local Brit Tzedek chapter. On a national level, I helped organize a conference this past February, sponsored by the Jewish Funds for Justice, that brought together rabbis and members of Jewish congregations around the country involved in congregation-based community organizing (like our own involvement in the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization). And then this past March I took on the presidency of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association. So much for my post-sabbatical pledge to maintain a little balance in my life!

This is also the time of year that I begin looking forward to the coming year, to upcoming initiatives and programs. I am thrilled that we will be joined after the High Holydays by a rabbinic intern, **Minna Bromberg**, a student at the Hebrew College Rabbinical School, to help support our programming and leadership development needs. Minna is, among other things, an accomplished cantorial soloist and a teacher of Jewish meditation, whose doctoral dissertation focused on Jewish-Christian interfaith families. Our Tikkun Olam efforts will also be supported by a rabbinic intern from the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia, as part of a program sponsored by the Jewish Funds for Justice. **Michael Ramberg** will be working

Whether you are going to Israel for the first time or have visited before, this trip will be an opportunity to experience different aspects of Israeli society, to encounter places where our Jewish history was shaped, to spend time in the incredibly beautiful land itself, and to have an opportunity to learn about and discuss the critical issues facing Israel with other members of the community.

But before all that happens, I am ready for a bit of a summer break! I'll be heading off to Camp JRF to spend a week as a "faculty rabbi," and will then attend an 8-day silent retreat at the Insight Meditation Society in Barre, MA. I'm also looking forward to having a little time to spend with Gina and the rest of my family as well. I hope that you'll have some opportunities this summer for rest, renewal, and a little time by the beach or pool! And if not before, I look forward to seeing you at High Holydays in September.

JRF Update

Dorshei Tzedek has two representatives on the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation (JRF) board of directors. **Cindy Shulak-Rome** is the board Secretary and **Chayim Herzig-Marx** is the Regional President for New England. Each of them is leading a strategic program for JRF.

Cindy is working with Rabbi Erin Hirsh, JRF Director of Education, to build a comprehensive and integrated Reconstructionist religious school curriculum. They are also creating a tighter connection between the Jewish content of Camp JRF and the school curriculum, as well as materials to train non-Reconstructionist educators and education directors in Reconstructionist philosophy and approaches to Judaism and Jewish practice. The materials they create will be of great value to all JRF affiliates and will help to elevate the quality of education we provide our children.

Chayim is working with Rabbi Nancy Epstein, JRF Director of Congregational Relations, to develop the means for JRF to serve its affiliates better. They are focusing on methods for understanding affiliate needs from a life-cycle perspective, which will help JRF staff not only respond more quickly and appropriately to requests from affiliates for assistance but should also enable staff to become pro-active, anticipating developmental issues before they arise.

JRF relies heavily on fund-raising to support its programs and activities: about half of the JRF budget comes through the Development Office. Contributions of any size are welcome! If you'd like to make a donation, please contact Cindy or Chayim.

Tisha B'Av

The fast day of Tisha b'Av (the ninth day of the month of Av) falls this year on **Tuesday**, **July 24**. This day commemorates the destruction of both the first and second Temples in Jerusalem, the first in 587 B.C.E. at the hands of the Babylonian Empire, and the second in 70 C.E. at the hands of the Roman Empire (the Temple was rebuilt when the exiles returned from Babylonia c. 520 B.C.E.). While we will not be having a Tisha b'Av program at Dorshei Tzedek this summer, traditions on this day include reading the book of Lamentations (the Biblical account of the first Temple's destruction) during the evening that ushers in Tisha b'Av, and fasting from that nightfall through sunset of the day itself.

The city of Jerusalem and the Temple were the center of ancient Israelite society for nearly one thousand years, and each time they were destroyed, there was a massive dislocation of both people and Jewish tradition. The destruction of the second Temple marked the end of Jewish rule in the land of Israel for 2,000 years, and the beginning of rabbinic Judaism—which is the Judaism with which we are familiar today. While we may no longer mourn the absence of the Temple ritual in Jewish life, Tisha b'Av is an opportunity to reflect on the cataclysms that the Jewish people have endured over the millennia. At a time when violence and contention again rages in the vicinity of Jerusalem, the observance of Tisha b'Av is also an opportunity for reflection on what it will take to bring peace and wholeness to all the peoples who call that land home.

Rosh Hashanah 5768 begins the evening of **Wednesday**, **September 12**, and Yom Kippur begins on **Friday evening**, **September 21**. *New location!* This year, Dorshei Tzedek will be holding its High Holydays services at Gann Academy: The New Jewish High School, in Waltham (about 10 minutes from West Newton Square). With a lovely space for our services and expanded room for children's programming, we're looking forward to our best High Holydays yet! Are there members of Dorshei Tzedek who are interested in forming a CDT team in the Coed Jewish Sports frostbite softball league? Softball season does not have to end with the completion of the Men's Synagogue Softball League. For softball players of both genders, the Coed Jewish Sports frostbite softball league is the answer. The league runs from **September to late October**, including playoffs. Games are played on **Sundays**, with typical starting times **10:15**, **12:00**, **and 1:45**. There is usually one double header during the season. Parents are welcome to bring their children. The schedule is posted about a week or so before the season starts so parents will have time to plan for babysitting or child care. Last year games were played at Billings Field in West

Roxbury. All teams make the playoffs in CJS leagues. Ability levels of players vary widely in the CJS leagues. Usually there are beginners or inexperienced players who join, as well as highly skilled players. Teams are required to play at least 2 women in the field each inning, but more can certainly play in the field. Cost is in the \$60 to \$70 range per person. Teams traditionally go out for refreshments after games. And best of all, women Rabbis can play in this league! Interested? 

Reflections on the Retreat

For me, the retreat was hardly a "retreat." It as much more of a plunging in (to the lake) and a coming together and joining others in song, play, and conversations. I had lots of conversations over that weekend.

Some of those conversations were discoveries of new connections. I had met Barbara Huggins as an alumna of my department at Tufts, but I hadn't known that she and her daughter llana are CDT members. I had recently learned that Joel Reider and I went to high school together and I enjoyed sharing memories with him about growing up in San Francisco, but I didn't know that Pamela Schoenberg works around the corner from me on issues that overlap with my interests. I discovered Mark Bronstein's love of puzzles. And Stacey Chacker and I uncovered several similar life experiences.

Other conversations deepened already established connections. Bill Shorr's reflections on his involvement in social justice issues in Latin American and Corinne Lofchie's stories about initiating Jewish-Palestinian dialogue in college led us to new insights about what motivates us to try to make a difference in the world.

And there were the beginnings of conversations I hope to explore in the future. I look forward to learning more about Tania Mireles' gleanings about hope and Jamie Tessler's vast knowledge of medicinal plants. I'm eager to hear more about Al Glazerman's long history of civil rights work and his current involvement in creating opportunities for youth leaving the youth services system. Hearing about Phyllis Glazerman's experiences promoting affordable housing in Newton left me with more questions about the courage it took to engage reluctant neighbors. I'm still curious about what it was like for Carla Naumburg to be with her partner, Josh Herzig-Marx, under the influence of so many years of memories as a Ramah camper. And I'm even more curious to see what might emerge from the powerful camaraderie among CDT kids – within grades and across age differences.

So in some respects, it was a retreat after all. It was a retreat from the habits of busyness that prevent me from lingering to share a thought, to ask another question, to explore a point of connection. What's great is that we don't need to wait two more years to reverse that habit. We can continue those conversations and start new ones. And we can plunge in, if not into a refreshing lake, then into the invigorating depths of an engaged community.

Healthcare Blessing

On May 15, activists from across the GBIO coalition gathered in prayer for the first ever inter-faith worship service. Together, we sang songs from our different faith traditions and in many languages to express our thanks for the successes of the Universal Health Care Insurance campaign, our praise for one another's efforts, and our hopes for what we still have left to accomplish. Emily Sper's blessing that follows was among other blessings and teachings by members and clergy from other congregations.

At the end of the service, we joined one another in silence to honor the victims of two homicides that occurred in the neighborhoods of our GBIO friends that evening. Being among fellow GBIO leaders who are and will be active in addressing the issue of youth violence in its various forms made that moment of silent reverence feel more meaningful and more hopeful in the midst of the tragedy.

I'm Emily Sper, a member of Congregation Dorshei Tzedek.

It was just about 3 years ago that I stood on the stage at Temple Israel at the healthcare kick-off rally and testified about the high cost of health insurance for the self-employed — how within seven years my monthly premium had increased from 200 dollars to over 500 dollars.

When I visited my representative and testified at the State House Healthcare Hearing, I spoke out against stripped-down insurance, knowing first-hand that with bad health insurance you can still end up with 8,000 dollars in medical expenses.

Later, we hit the streets with our petitions for the ballot initiative. I admit that when out collecting signatures on a cold and rainy day. I wondered if it was worthwhile.

Well, I'm not wondering anymore. Today I'm here to celebrate our collective victory, as well as my own enrollment in one of the new plans. As of June 1st, I'll have affordable health insurance!

A huge weight has been lifted off my shoulders. Now I can stop draining my savings to pay for health insurance, nor will I have to borrow money. And, now that I don't have to look for a job just to get health insurance, I'll be able to continue my creative endeavors — the way I'm best able to contribute to making this world a better place in which to live — and grow my own business.
