Exploring the Role of the Non-Jew at CDT

Just after the High Holydays last September, I explained in my column that the congregational leadership was planning four themes for the year: continued work on implementing the strategic plan, our first-ever community Israel trip, the Torah of Chesed initiative, and an exploration into the role of non-Jews at CDT. With the first three of these well under way, I'd like to use my column this month to begin exploring the final theme.

As I wrote last fall, an interesting statistic gathered during the strategic planning process is the rising percentage of interfaith households, which now stands at more than one-fifth of the membership. I believe that this statistic reflects the welcoming nature of our congregation, and it is an area of obvious strength and growth opportunity for our shul. That said, we have not always been clear about the role of non-Jews within our community. For example, there have been times when misunderstanding and conflict have resulted from a lack of context and information about non-Jews and their observance (or non-observance) of specific Jewish rituals. And, while CDT had some discussions and set some policy several years ago, the shul has undergone significant growth and seen many changes since we last took a serious look into this area of our governance.

I am aware that there are deep feelings surrounding this subject, many of them arising from the collision of competing values and the fear that we as a community are forced to make choices among these values. For example, our mission statement says that we are an inclusive community. And yet, we are also a Jewish community, which historically has intrinsically meant that we must also be a particularist – and therefore exclusive – community. What do we mean by saying that we are inclusive or particular, and how do these seemingly at-odds values translate to ritual observance, being in community with others, and to communal honors and leadership roles? Are we always inclusive, or does the blanket inclusion rule have limits? Does Jewishness transcend or override inclusivity in some cases?

These are hard questions for any community to face, and it is my hope that we can explore these questions together in a positive, respectful, and productive way. As luck would have it, we are fortunate this year to have Minna Bromberg as our rabbinic intern. Minna's doctoral dissertation was on identity construction

in interfaith couples. Through interviews with dozens of interfaith families, as well as a variety of clergy, her research exposed her to many different viewpoints on the topic and required that she develop her skills as a non-reactive listener.

Minna has emerged as an ideal facilitator for this type of conversation, and she has graciously agreed to facilitate three openended study groups to help us begin this process. We'll hold these sessions at the beginning of March, April, and May. Each session will allow us to approach these questions from a different perspective. Here are the basic outlines of the session themes:

- In March, we'll begin by looking at what we are bringing to the discussion. What are our difficulties with this topic? What exactly is the role and importance of tradition? In general, where are we coming from as a congregation at this moment?
- In April, we will look at various source texts which address this issue, and particularly at what has come out of the Reconstructionist Movement.
- We'll use the final May session to explore reactions to and reflections on the previous two study groups, and we'll begin talking about how to move forward with this topic towards any action items we might feel are necessary.

We will let you know the exact dates and locations set for these meetings as soon as they are scheduled. If this issue speaks to you, I hope you'll consider joining Minna and me for one or more of these sessions. I'm looking forward to studying together.

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Contacting Rabbi Toba: Rabbi Toba does not have regular office hours but is available to talk about any spiritual, religious, or personal issues that you might want to discuss. The rabbi's voice-mail will have information on how to reach the on-call rabbi.

Rabbi Toba will be away on the congregational Israel trip from February 13 through February 24. During this time, there will be rabbis on-call. 
