President's Column

I want to use my space this month to update you on the Board initiative exploring what it means for Dorshei Tzedek to be a Jewish congregation with both Jewish and non-Jewish members. We've now met twice and will be meeting again on **May 7** at **7:30 pm** in the Second Church Living Room (see page 2). During the first two of our three meetings this winter and spring, our rabbinic intern Minna Bromberg helped us begin exploring various themes and exchanging personal stories and perspectives. At the first meeting, we used the mission statement of a study authored about a decade ago by the Reconstructionist movement as a launching point. At the second meeting, we looked at the congregational mission statement and considered how it might be interpreted differently by members who are Jewish and by members who are not.

As I listen, speak, and read during these meetings, the core challenges are becoming increasingly clear to me. I'll make a first attempt to elucidate them here:

- With an increasing percentage of participants who come from other traditions and communities, how do we maintain the thread of Jewish identity, community, and continuity within the context of our synagogue while still being an open and inclusive group?
- How can meaningful Jewish educational, ritual, and spiritual opportunities be created for our members who bring a wealth of other traditions to our community? Are we obligated to provide such opportunities?
- What should we do to address specific areas of community life (e.g. the Torah service) where in the past there have been misunderstandings that caused members to feel uncomfortable or excluded?

These are obviously big and open-ended questions – much bigger than space in the newsletter will permit me to address in this column -- but I do want to say that I am pleased that the community has chosen to address them. I think that the ongoing discussions have helped us raise awareness of these issues and move towards identifying specific areas where we might focus our time and energy next year. Here are a few of the ideas that were suggested at the previous meetings:

- Organize one or more support groups, perhaps around specific events (e.g. the holiday season, b'nei mitzvah celebrations) or around more general ideas (e.g. parenting small children in a home with a parent who is not Jewish)
- Hold regular community-wide programming (e.g. Community of Learners-style events from past years) designed to engage the entire membership, draw in whole families, and raise the general level of Jewish education
- Form a group to examine CDT's bylaws and ritual practices
- Create an informative pamphlet for prospective and new members

With this in mind, at the third and final meeting we will pick up the discussion where we left off at the last meeting with a specific focus on some chosen texts, and we will also spend some time figuring out how to move forward in the fall. I want to again invite the community to participate: if this discussion is of interest to you, please feel free to attend the third meeting.

Understanding Newton's Financial Challenges

May 7, 7 pm 60 Highland Street, CDT Sanctuary

When you hear terms like **structural deficit**, **capital stabilization fund**, and **triple A bond ratings**, do you feel confused? Are you wondering how to become a more informed voter and citizen? Congregation Dorshei Tzedek is sponsoring a learning session and discussion, beginning with a presentation by members of the Newton League of Women Voters who have spent the past two years studying Newton's funding and its budget. Participate in a balanced discussion of both the May 20 override ballot question and the long-term issues facing the city, along with members of other local faith-based organizations, in a spirit of respect and inquiry.

Note that these two events are both on Wednesday, May 7, but are meeting in different rooms at 60 Highland Street.

The Role of Non-Jewish Members at CDT: A Discussion
