The Challenge of the New

The High Holydays are the most exciting and most challenging time of year for me. I love that we essentially start the year at its peak, the entire community coming together to sing, reflect, pray, discuss, schmooze (and, of course, eat!). So much wonderful energy is generated over the course of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and it feels like that energy propels us right into our new program year.

The challenging part is perhaps obvious. In addition to the myriad pieces that need to come together to make the holidays run smoothly, there is the daunting task of coming up with sermons sufficiently interesting and meaningful to engage a crowd as highly intelligent and discerning as the Dorshei Tzedek community. This Rosh Hashanah is the eighteenth anniversary of the very first Dorshei Tzedek services, and marks my twelfth High Holydays with the congregation. As I began contemplating writing my talks last month, I somewhat despairingly wondered what in the world I could possibly say. Haven't I taught everything I could ever have to teach? What in the world could I write that would be even vaguely new and different? I started perusing some of my old talks, some of which I could barely remember. Would anyone notice if I did a little sermonic recycling...?

One of the challenges of the New Year is the challenge of the new. Or rather, the challenge of experiencing as new that which can so easily feel mundane, uninteresting, "been there, done that." One of my very favorite lines in the liturgy is traditionally recited each morning, as part of the *Yotzer/*Creation blessing. In this blessing, God is praised as the One that 'makes new, each and every day, the work of Creation.' Whether or not we believe in a God that is literally and actively involved in the ongoing process of creation, this verse challenges us to cultivate a particular kind of awareness. It is an invitation to experience each day as if it is in fact newly created, to greet each morning as if we had just awoken for the very first time.

If that is the challenge of every morning, then what is the challenge of the "new" year? What does it even mean to think of the coming year as "new"? Perhaps it is an invitation on a bit of a grander scale. As we go through the rituals of the High Holydays, rituals that echo ancient rites of atonement and purification, we are encouraged to experience ourselves, and not just the year, as "new." Spiritual progress is like a spiral, not a straight line. We don't move directly from A to Z, but make our

way in ascending circles. At the completion of each circuit, if we're making progress, we find ourselves a little higher than we were the last time we passed this way. The beginning of a new level on the spiral can feel disconcertingly difficult, yet that sense of struggle is often an indication that we have indeed arrived at a new beginning, and are ready for what comes next.

As we enter into 5769, may we each find blessing in the "new" of this year. However similar things may seem to last year, however much we may wonder what is left for us to learn, to do, to contribute, our tradition encourages us to come into the new year with a sense of expectation, wonder, and appreciation. Each moment is a gift, and with a new sense of self, we can savor each of those moments as if it—and we—are new creations. L'shanah toyah!





I was pleased as Dorshei Tzedek's new Education Director to welcome our staff and 80 students as we began a new school year in September.

We are fortunate to have an exceptional teaching staff at our Religious School. We welcomed back veteran teachers Cindy Shulak-Rome, Hillary Pinsker and Yuval Brokman. Cindy is again teaching Kitah Zayin (seventh grade), bringing to her class her depth of knowledge and commitment to the Reconstructionist movement and this community. Hillary is teaching Kitah Vav (sixth grade), drawing on her teaching experience and scholarship to develop a curriculum for it focusing on issues of leadership in the Biblical era.
