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The 'Renewal of Spirit' and Our Children

about Debbie Friedman's death. That news also comes after having just participated in a family education program for Zev's Kitah Zayin class where the topic for discussion focused on issues affecting our children's desire to maintain a strong Jewish identity and practice in their lives.

In our family education discussions as parents, we reflected on the question of what key factors and experiences tend to influence our children's thinking and perhaps propel them to want to identify as engaged Jews in their teen years and beyond. At one point of the discussion, I asked my small group, how important was it for any of them to want their children to have a Jewish summer camp experience? I asked that question knowing about the story in the book The Jew in the Lotus, where some American Jewish leaders, after being asked by the Dalai Lama "what has been the secret of Jewish spiritual survival in exile," told him that an important part of the answer in America has been-Jewish summer camp experiences for our youth.

Debbie Friedman's death and this family education discussion made me think about my first Jewish summer camp experi-

ence, at age 12, at the Reform Movement's camp in Wisconsin. I remember the experience having the sort of things you would expect (and perhaps hope for) at a Jewish Reform Movement camp: the usual mix of outdoor activities and sports combined with thoughtful inclusion of Jewish prayer, study, and discussion. For many, camp was also about making new friends and just having fun.

But the year was 1970 and for many pre-teens of that era, camp also brought some very new experiences. Some of them were political. I have memories of being surrounded by counselors and even young rabbis very much affected by the anti-Vietnam war movement (two months after the shootings at Kent State), the civil rights struggle, and the 1960's cultural emphasis on sex, drugs, and rock and roll. In retrospect, I realize that a lot of the "heady" camp conversations, which included those of us in our early teen years, were influenced by what college students and young adults were thinking about: where the country was going, where their lives were headed, and perhaps, where did being American Jews and our attendant culture and values fit into the context of all of that. In addition to the American counselors and staff, the camp also had a number of Israelis-mostly menwho had recently completed army duty, including some who fought in the 1967 Six Day War. They were the "camp heroes" and their war stories also dominated many of the camp discussions. So you had this interesting swirl of people and issues that helped me and many others to begin to really think about the broader world.

But the Jewish aspect of camp wasn't all intellectual. There were really a fair amount of spiritual awakening opportunities as well. I distinctly remember my first Shabbat at camp. There is not space to detail it all—but suffice it to say for someone growing up in a suburban Reform synagogue of the 1960's-the camp Shabbat experience (which was fun, exciting, and had a special integrative quality to it) was something very different from what I had experienced growing up.

Part of that special Shabbat ruach came from the music and singing, which we—even those of us not especially musical found incredibly uplifting and connecting. A good deal of that magic came as a result of the decision that year to hire an 18 year-old guitar-playing woman from Minnesota to be the camp song-leader. Her name was Debbie Friedman and she was amazing! She made camp that summer so warm and spiritual, and certainly helped me desire to be part of a community who values the beauty and soulfulness that comes from sharing Jewish liturgical music experiences. Ultimately, Debbie did that for millions of Jews everywhere.

So-Debbie Friedman, Jewish camp, family education-who knows what factors will be the most influential in affecting our children's Jewish identity and life practices. I know I am thinking about it—and I hope you are too.

Postscript: For families with children attending a Jewish sleepover camp for the first time, \$1,000 grants (per child) are available from Combined Jewish Philanthropies, and subsidies for Camp JRF are also available from our own Camp JRF Scholarship Fund (contact the CDT office for more information).

Religious School News

As I write this, I am looking out the window of my home at trees weighed down by the foot of snow that has fallen today. So it is hard to connect to the fact that we will soon be celebrating Tu B'Shevat, the new year of the trees. This holiday reminds us that while we may be living in snowy New England, we are also connected to the land of Israel, where spring is beginning and the trees will soon be blooming; it is 69 and sunny in Tel Aviv today!

Much of our learning and activities at the school this month revolve around the different aspects of Tu B'Shevat. During Shabbat B'Yachad we shared stories and songs about trees. The students in Kitah Nitzanim and in Kitah Gan practiced the blessing said before eating fruit from the trees and sampled different fruits. Each class worked on a different craft project making "fruit trees" to take home.

The Beit Midrash (Gr. 3-6) students are busy preparing for their Tu B'Shevat Seder. Kitah Vav is studying different rabbinic texts relating to trees, and will help the students in the other classes create "talmud pages" with student commentary on those texts. Kitah Dalet is learning about how Tu B'Shevat is celebrated in different Jewish communities around the world. They learned that the Jews of India serve 50 different fruits at their Tu B'Shevat Seders, so Kitah Dalet's project is to develop a list of 50 different fruits.

This year, thinking about trees in Israel, our thoughts turn to the terrible impact of the Carmel forest fire earlier this winter. One of the places profoundly affected by the fire is Yemin Orde, a youth village located in the Carmel forest area, which is home to 500 at-risk children. The fire destroyed almost half of Yemin Orde's buildings and the village had to be evacuated for a time. The students of Kitah Gimmel have donated the tzedakah money they had collected to Yemin Orde to assist in its rebuilding. The students of Kitah Hey, as their Tu B'Shevat project, are creating cards (in Hebrew and English) sending greetings and best wishes to the children of Yemin Orde.


