Visions of CDT

AT THE Members' Meeting on November 20, Judy Herzig-Marx, one of the founders of CDT, reminisced about the founders' hope to create a Reconstructionist congregation that would be welcoming and spiritual,

serious about Jewish practice and learning, and attentive to social needs. I think we can say that they succeeded brilliantly.

This year we will be looking both backward and forward at CDT's history and future. This started with a Board/Off-Board chairs retreat in November, and will culminate in a CDT doublechai (21 years for CDT, 15 years for Rabbi Toba) celebration and fundraiser on March 24, 2012.

The strategic plan adopted by the members in 2007 described a number of themes, including a need for growth, fostering a cul-

ture of giving to support CDT, attention to space concerns, nurturing leadership, continuing to recognize and meet spiritual needs, and understanding and articulating the goal of a community of learners.

At the Board/Off-Board retreat, we noted the activities and achievements that have supported these goals. CDT has grown steadily since 2007, and the combination of growth and successful **nediv lev** efforts has resulted in a generally stable financial situation. The positions of full-time Education Director and Administrative Director have become key assets of the congregation. We have relieved the members of a major burden by engaging a High Holydays Coordinator, and we have moved High Holyday services to a more pleasant and appropriate location. Leadership training, a formal nominating process, the development of board "job descriptions," and a structured presidential succession, are among the steps that have strengthened leadership.

Members have devoted countless hours to teaching and learning how to leyn, and to helping and supporting their friends and fellow members through Chesed opportunities and the Avelut group. And looking outward, many and varied tikkun olam actions have embodied our concern about the society we live in. Finally, in addition to ongoing adult education opportunities and regular school programs, we launched a congregation-wide discussion of what it means to be a "community of learners" a few years ago. One of the products of this process has been the creation of a pilot program involving our 1st-3rd grade families, Project LO"X (Learning Outside the boX), for which we are receiving financial and consulting support from Combined Jewish Philanthropies.

We achieved all this because of the work, involvement, and enthusiasm of CDT members and staff who have helped develop CDT life by energetic participation in activities that are interesting and important to them.

One topic of the strategic plan was how to understand, define, and communicate the identity of CDT. The members renewed this conversation at the Members' Meeting. Thoughts were shared on the question: if CDT were an animal, what animal would it be? (responses included: an octopus, using its arms to carry on many activities; a hive of bees, producing sweet honey and honoring female leadership; an elephant, who has a long memory and makes a sound like a shofar). Individuals spoke about moments at CDT during the last year that they found personally inspiring, and members had the opportunity to break into small groups to talk about their thoughts and feelings on how to describe CDT's qualities. In addition, Allison Hausman (Board Co-Chair, Communications), on behalf of the website team, previewed the proposed new CDT website.

In the months ahead, the CDT Board will be considering and engaging members on these themes and, as there is no road without bumps, on the challenges that we may still face.

Of course, we all have very individual views about CDT. To close on a personal note, for me what continues is as significant as what changes. My wife and I were drawn to CDT by the energetic, musical, and warm services, and the welcoming and friendly people. Over the years we have absorbed the insights and spiritual values of Reconstructionism as taught by Rabbi Toba and other members of the community. For me, those particular characteristics are the keys to the identity of CDT, and I like to think that they reflect and respect the vision of CDT's founders.

CDT Mission Statement

Dorshei Tzedek is a Reconstructionist Congregation dedicated to creating a caring and inclusive community, and to enhancing Jewish practice and learning in the lives of our members. Dorshei Tzedek means 'seekers of justice,' and as our name implies, we are seekers: of meaningful spirituality, of serious Jewish learning, and of social justice.

Consistent with Reconstructionist philosophy, we are committed to seriously engaging with Jewish tradition, challenging that tradition, where need be, and building on the tradition in creative ways. We do this in order to enhance our own lives as contemporary Jews and to perpetuate our bond—and

our children's bond-to our heritage. We view education for ourselves and our children as fundamental to Jewish life.

We are a participatory congregation, encouraging all of our members to take an active role in some aspect of our congregational life. Our rabbi is our partner in this endeavor, and is both teacher and participant in our community. We value diversity in our congregation, and welcome all those who share our commitments.

Finally, we affirm the concept of mitzvah as obligation, acting on our Jewish values through deeds of tzedek (social justice) and gemilut chasadim (loving kindness), both within our congregation and in the larger community.

Thursday evenings, 7:30-9:00pm, December 1, 8, & 15



BY THE TIME you read this, we will have hopefully had a successful changeover to our new listserv service. Many thanks to **Dan Halbert** for all his thoughtful research and effort in making this happen.

Both the CDT-LIST and CDT-ANNOUNCE email lists have changed addresses. From now on, you will be able to post messages as you have always done, but will send them to the new CDT-SHARE address listed below. All you have to do is to take a moment to update your address books by doing the following:

DELETE: CDT-LIST@shamash.org

ADD: CDT-SHARE@lists.dorsheitzedek.org

Just to be clear, the share list is a members' forum where you may share information with one another. If you do not want to participate in this list, you may opt out of receiving these messages—just let me know if you wish to do so and you will be removed. Or, if you do want to participate but would prefer getting all the daily posts in a single email once a day, let us know that and we will change you to a "digest" setting.

As always, if you wish to post to this list, just write your email from the address to which you receive other's messages and send to cdt-share@lists.dorsheitzedek.org. Every member who is signed up to this list will see your message. You may only send messages while you are subscribed to the list and not if you have opted out.

As before, the **CDT-ANNOUNCE@lists.dorsheitzedek.org** is for mass broadcast messages from Rabbi Toba, myself and select Board members. The messages you will receive are important in nature, regarding issues related to the congregation and as a member, you may not opt out of this list.

We hope this is a smooth transition but if you have difficulties, email Marla Lichtman at admindirector@dorsheitzedek.org.

FAQs

Q: Do I have to do anything to stay on the list?

A: You don't have to do anything to stay on the lists you are already on. Please start sending your emails to the new list addresses, and change the entries in your email address books.

Q: What happens if I forget and use the old CDT-LIST@ shamash.org address?

A: The old lists will reply to you with a reminder that they are no longer valid if you forget and send to them by mistake.

Q: Why are you making this change?

A: Shamash.org is discontinuing its email list service as of the end of 2011 for financial reasons.

Q: What if I need to change my email address?

A: Please send an email to Marla Lichtman at admindirector@dorsheitzedek.org; she will take care of it. It's better if you don't try to do it yourself, as we need to keep your email address up-to-date in several different places.

Q: Can I still get a daily digest?

A: Yes, we will try to set up digests for people who are currently getting them. If we forget, send us an email and we'll fix it. You can also set it yourself by clicking on the link at the bottom of every message and following the directions, but we're happy to do it for you.

Q: Why did you rename the CDT-LIST?

A: We chose CDT-SHARE to make its purpose a bit clearer, and to make it clear it was not the official announcement list.

Q: Why didn't you switch to Google Groups?

A: Google Groups (as of August) only lets you invite people onto lists, and not add them directly. The invitations often get lost in spam filters, or people don't respond. For lists like ours, it's a large headache.

Q: Will there be searchable list archives?

A: There is an archiving mechanism for the new lists, but it is not easily searchable. We are investigating various solutions for this desirable feature. **CDT Calendar**

Religious School News

TTENDING OUR SATURDAY morning school program, especially on the weeks when Nitzanim (Pre-K) and Gan (K) meet, one can see how many very young students we have in our school. The teaching staff and I continually think about how best to create an educational experience that meets the needs of young learners. Hebrew College's Annual Early Childhood Jewish Education Conference, held in November, was an opportunity for our staff to explore new ideas in the field and I invited Alison Lobron, our Nitzanim teacher, and Adam Lavitt, our community educator, to attend the conference.

Adam writes about his experience at the conference: "The two workshops I attended explored how to create a joyous Shabbat experience for young children. One workshop, 'Torah Alive!' demonstrated how to create immersive environments in which children can build understanding by entering and acting out Torah stories. The second workshop, 'Sing it! Stamp it! Clap it!' taught Shabbat songs that conveyed early childhood skills through lots of movement, self-expression and fun music."

Reflecting on her experience at the conference, Alison adds: "It was a real pleasure for me to attend the Early Childhood Jewish Education Conference. I participated in two workshops. In the first session, 'Many Faces of the Divine: Teaching Young Children About God' I had the opportunity to think about the many ways that educators can help children to deepen their own spiritual understanding. The next session, 'Building Bias Free Foundations' was presented by a facilitator from the Anti-Defamation League. We explored ways in which we can thoughtfully present messages to children about taking pride in their Jewish identities, as well as their identities as a whole. The conference provided a wonderful opportunity for me to reflect on my teaching practices in the company of many talented and seasoned Jewish educators."

Adam and Alison's participation in the conference was made possible by the synagogue's Jill Volk Teacher Development Fund. The fund, created in memory of CDT member Jill Volk, provides scholarships for teachers in the Dorshei Tzedek Religious School to receive professional development and training. Jill was one of the founders of our school and one of its first teachers. This fund allows her love of Judaism and Jewish learning to continue to enrich our community.
