

**AS WE HEAD** into the summer, I am reflecting back on what has been an incredibly full year at Dorshei Tzedek, for me personally and for the congregation as a whole. I have been reviewing this past year's newsletters, and it is amazing to see in print

the many things the community has been engaged in since the beginning of 5772. A huge thank you to the newsletter staff for providing this beautiful record of our all of our doings!

As we came into the new year, I was a few weeks removed from my trip to Ghana with the American Jewish World Service, It was my first experience of Africa and an opportunity for grappling with the profound disparities between what I saw there and my life here. I appreciated the interest that so many CDT members had in the trip and the conversations I was able to engage in the weeks and months that followed. It was soon after that experience that rumblings here in the U.S. about growing inequality

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erupted into the Occupy movement. In the November newsletter I wrote about my visit to "Occupy Sukkot," and other members shared about their experiences at Dewey Square. CDT's commitment to social justice continued throughout the year, at protests at Trader Joe's as part of the Fair Food Campaign of the Coalition of Immokalee Workers, during the Food Stamp Challenge this spring, and in our ongoing commitment to Family Table and participation in the Sindyanna olive oil project, supporting Israeli Palestinian farmers and Jewish-Palestinian co-existence within Israel.

It was also a year of learning at Dorshei, for adults and kids. In the fall we kicked off Project LO"X (Learning Outside the boX") for our first-third grade families. With the support of Combined Jewish Philanthropy, the staff and the families explored what is best learned where and when, as we brought learning about Shabbat into members' homes on Shabbat, and took some of the kids' classroom learning both into their parents' learning and into action in the home, the synagogue and the world. In the adult realm, Lori Lefkovitz brought her insight and humor to a wonderful three-session class, "Frontiers of Gender and Judaism"; we had our very first Men's Shabbaton; we sponsored an exploration of the cultural roots of Reconstructionist Judaism with Avi Bernstein and a musical workshop with Hankus Netsky, and we had another wonderful Spiritual Autobiography class. And I was delighted to have a stalwart crew join me early on Thursday mornings for instruction in mindfulness practice.

Turning the pages of our newsletter, I was struck by the energy and creativity of our membership in so many endeavors—the Film Club, softball team, Rosh Chodesh group, erev Shabbat home dinners, Avelut group, the wonderful Havdallah on the Water event at the end of Shabbat Unplugged. In cyberspace, our new website reflects the incredibly hard work of our Web Committee and Communications mavens. This energy, creativity and commitment reached its peak at the wonderful "Double Chai" Gala Celebration this past March. Jen Kaplan and her committee spearheaded an incredible effort that not only netted \$27,000 for the congregation, but gave us an opportunity to celebrate our founders, to honor my time here, and to dance!

As in the life of any person or group, there were also disappointments and losses this year. I had hoped we would sponsor our second congregational trip to Israel this past February, but unfortunately we were unable to get the requisite number of people to sign on for the trip. And we suffered two heartbreaking losses as a community: the death of Susannah Zisk, an active and beloved member, at the fartoo-young-age of 47, this past December; and more recently, the death of David Levi Keimowitz Crozier, the infant son of Jessica Keimowitz and Polly Crozier. Both of these losses, as well as the deaths of parents and other family members experienced by congregants this year, have been opportunities to make tangible our commitment to being a caring community. The countless acts of chesed that happen in the course of a year at CDT are remarkable, and we owe many thanks to our Chesed Coordinators for making it possible for so many to do acts

It would take another few pages to continue to list all that happened at CDT this past year, so I won't even attempt it! Instead, a note looking forward. This summer marks my and Gina's transition to empty-nester-hood, as Zoe heads off to the University of Michigan at the end of August. After the holidays, in mid-October, I will take a three-month sabbatical (arriving back at CDT in mid-January). I will write more about what will be happening during the sabbatical—both for me and for the congregation—in the fall, but for now, I want to wish all of us a relaxing and renewing summer, and once again express my appreciation for everyone in this community.

### CDT Mission Statement

Dorshei Tzedek is a Reconstructionist Congregation dedicated to creating a caring and inclusive community, and to enhancing Jewish practice and learning in the lives of our members. Dorshei Tzedek means 'seekers of justice,' and as our name implies, we are seekers: of meaningful spirituality, of serious Jewish learning, and of social justice.

Consistent with Reconstructionist philosophy, we are committed to seriously engaging with Jewish tradition, challenging that tradition, where need be, and building on the tradition in creative ways. We do this in order to enhance our own lives as contemporary Jews and to perpetuate our bond—and

our children's bond—to our heritage. We view education for ourselves and our children as fundamental to Jewish life.

We are a participatory congregation, encouraging all of our members to take an active role in some aspect of our congregational life. Our rabbi is our partner in this endeavor, and is both teacher and participant in our community. We value diversity in our congregation, and welcome all those who share our commitments.

Finally, we affirm the concept of mitzvah as obligation, acting on our Jewish values through deeds of tzedek (social justice) and gemilut chasadim (loving kindness), both within our congregation and in the larger community.

#### Tisha b'Av

Tisha b'Av, the 9th of Av, marks the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in 586 BCE and again in 70 CE. It is a fast day that marks the end of the first period of Jewish sovereignty in the land of Israel and reminds us of the legacy of suffering and exile in our people's history. Tisha b'Av begins at sundown on Saturday, July 28, and continues through July 29. It is customary to fast for the entire day and to refrain from bathing and anything that gives joy. Other traditions include studying the biblical Book of Lamentations, a powerful account of the destruction of the first Temple, and the book of Job.

In his book <u>This is Real and You Are Completely Unprepared</u>, Rabbi Alan Lew describes Tisha b'Av as the first step in a process of reflection that culminates in the renewal of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (the book is highly recommended for summer study and preparation for the High Holydays!). We begin with brokenness, and from there re-build ourselves as we move into the new year.

CDT will not be holding its own Tisha b'Av observance this summer, but if you are interested in attending an observance the evening of July 28, you may want to join Temple Beth Zion in Brookline (go to http://www.tbzbrookline.org/general-news/join-us-for-tisha-bav-commemoration-at-tbz-saturday-july-28/)

### Family Table: Whole Grains and Kosher Soup!

Dorshei Tzedek is one of 58 area synagogues and day schools that supports Family Table, the kosher food pantry in the Boston area. Participants help collect, sort, pack, and deliver groceries for our recipient families. Anyone can volunteer to help including families with young children. Folks can volunteer for just a few hours once a year or on a monthly basis. Volunteers experience hands-on tzedakah and find that they can make a difference in the lives of others. Dorshei Tzedek participants have found that this simple commitment is meaningful, worthwhile, and immediately beneficial to people in our community.

Family Table provides groceries to over 550 individuals each month and is experiencing an increase in demand for food assistance. Many recipients work full-time but are not earning enough to make ends meet. Others are elderly who live on fixed incomes or those with chronic physical and mental health challenges. These circumstances force recipients to make difficult choices on a regular basis: paying rent, buying medication, or putting food on their tables.

Each month, recipients receive non-perishable foods (dried fruits, nuts, soups, vegetables, canned fish, beans), fresh produce, dairy, personal hygiene products, and Jewish holiday and ritual items such as challah and Shabbat candles.

#### **HOW YOU CAN HELP:**

#### 1. Bring donations of food to shul.

We have now been assigned to collect 25 CANS OF KOSHER OR VEGETARIAN SOUP and 25 BOXES OF WHOLE GRAIN CEREAL per month. We need your help to fill this need. Please bring your donations with you when you come to services or to drop off/pick up your child from the CDT school.

#### 2. Sign up to be a driver for one of the Sunday distribution days.

One volunteer is needed ONE SUNDAY PER MONTH to transport the food. This takes approximately one hour. The driver picks up the monthly donations of food from Dorshei Tzedek and delivers to Family Table at 1430 Main Street, Waltham between 9:00-11:00am on the designated day. # **Religious School News**

**AM THRILLED TO** be joining you all as Community Educator this coming year, and wanted to share a little bit about the work that I started this last year (and will be continuing and expanding on) as part of Project LO"X. Through this pilot project, we asked how we could connect classroom learning with the living classroom of the home, shul and wider world. With Rabbi Toba and Annette Lawson's encouragement and guidance, I used data from my work with 1st-3rd grade families to support my Master's thesis in Jewish Education, "Why Context Matters: Aligning Physical and Social Context in Experiential Education."

While in a normal supplementary school a student might, for example, learn Shabbat Kiddush on a Sunday morning, she might find it challenging to actually try this practice with her family at the Shabbat table. In the more experiential mode of Jewish education that Project LO"X explored, students and parents had an opportunity to actually try Kiddush on Shabbat as a family, and learn about the text of Kiddush at the Shabbat dinner table.

Drawing on theories of experiential education, and research about physical environments and social context (including family education), my Master's thesis explored why the physical and social contexts of learning matter, and how the factors that shape these contexts can work together to create these types of immersive learning experiences.

As I did theoretical research, and reflected on participating families' feedback about their experiences this past year, I was powerfully struck by the way Project LO"X's Shabbat programming this past year has deepened participants' learning and created opportunities for families to try new Shabbat practices – like Kiddush (the blessing over wine) and birkat banim (blessing of

children) – in a social setting and physical environment that supported this exploration.

Through Project LO"X's Kitah-based learning, families were empowered to plan a group experience as an organic outgrowth and direct embodiment of the learning they had done in conjunction with their children's classroom curriculum. This last year, for example, Kitah Aleph voted to organize its learning about Jewish time into an engaging family tikkun leil Shavuot (learning at night) at a member's home, Kitah Bet decided to embody the Jewish values of kibud z'keynim (honoring elders), hachnasat orchim (welcoming guests), and kibud av v'em (honoring parents) by hosting an intergenerational Shabbat at CDT that beautifully honored the experiences and wisdom of elders in the CDT community; and Kitah Gimel chose to become shomrei adamah ("stewards of the earth") by volunteering at Waltham Fields Community Farm on Earth Day, and helping to organize recycling at our Tubishvat all-ages erev Shabbat service. According to participant feedback, each of these programmatic elements has demonstrated the power of well-aligned physical context to create more opportunities for student participation, add warmth to learning experiences, and invite people to embody Shabbat and the Jewish values they learned about. The various physical environments of home, shul, and wider world provided learning environments that invited curiosity, participation, and exploration while building community, and facilitating learning amongst and between parents and students.

I look forward to continuing this exciting work, and continuing to explore how we can all continue to feel more empowered as Jewish learners, not just in the classroom, but in the daily lives of ourselves and our families!





# Reconstructionist Movement



As of June 3, the Reconstructionist movement has officially "reconstructed" itself, with the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College (RRC) becoming the central organization of the movement, and the effective dissolution of the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation, the former congregational arm of the movement. The organizational merger does not affect the functioning of Camp JRF or the Noar Hadash teen Israel trip, and processes are underway to shape congregational services and other functions of the Jewish Reconstructionist Movement going forward.
