AT THE BEGINNING of October, the Pew Research Center released a major survey of American Jewry, the first such survey undertaken by researchers outside the Jewish community. The survey is quite comprehensive, including people who identify as Jewish by religion, as Jewish aside from religion, as partly Jewish, and as having Jewish heritage but no longer identifying as Jews

(for more information, you can see the survey results at www.pewforum.org/2013/10/01/ jewish-american-beliefs-attitudes-culture-survey/).

In certain ways, the survey results serve as a vindication of the insights of Mordecai Kaplan, founder of Reconstructionist Judaism, who described Judaism not as a religion but as a "civilization," encompassing a whole complex of traditions and activities beyond religious ritual and belief. Kaplan used the term "Jewish peoplehood" to describe this phenomenon, and the survey results would seem to bear this out: there are a significant number of American Jews who describe themselves as Jewish aside from religion. Fully three-quarters say they have a "strong sense of belonging to the Jewish people," while only 19% say adherence to Jewish religious law is central to Jewish identity.

What is perplexing, however, is that among those who identify as Jewish but describe themselves as having no religion (including one-third of Jews born since 1980), there is markedly lower connection to Jewish organizations and Jewish practice, and a much higher tendency to intermarry and not raise one's children as Jewish. So while in theory "cultural" or "secular" Judaism is a valid way to express one's Jewish identity, in practice it is unclear what this tendency will mean for American Judaism in the future.

In this context, I am excited that we are, as a congregation, undertaking a year-long inquiry into what it means to be a Jewish community, and what membership in such a community implies. Over the years I have used the term "covenantal community" to describe a congregation like Dorshei Tzedek -one in which the members are connected through a common set of values and sense of purpose. It is perhaps that sense of common values and purpose that Jews of older generations mean when they identify as Jewish "by religion"—even if their own religious practice is thin and/or they don't particularly believe in God. Once upon a time, Jewish cultural identity was intertwined with religious practice. People kept kosher homes because that's just what one did, and the holidays were times to gather with family, irrespective of belief or level of observance. It did not take much effort to be a Jew in certain neighborhoods of Brooklyn or Baltimore or Chicago or many other towns and cities in the first half of the 20th century.

Today, it takes a considerable amount of intention and effort to remain connected to Jewish practice and have a sense of Jewish community. Communities like Dorshei Tzedek are, to my mind, profoundly countercultural, primarily because Judaism itself is countercultural. Where America emphasizes the individual, Judaism emphasizes the communal. Where our capitalist culture celebrates constant material accumulation, Jewish tradition puts spiritual practice and concern for others as our central responsibility. In an increasingly universalistic, culturally intertwined world, Judaism is at its root a tribal culture, affirming the particularity of Jewish tradition.

All of this means that if CDT is to thrive and grow, we need to continually revisit what it means to belong to a community like this. The culture in which we live is not conducive to Shabbat practice, or making time for our kids to learn even the rudiments of Jewish literacy. There are so many demands on our material resources and our precious time-how do we make space for all that it takes to sustain a thriving Jewish community? By thinking together about what CDT is and what it can be, what it means in our lives now and what it might mean in the months and years to come, we can address head-on the cultural dilemmas highlighted by the Pew survey. My own hope and belief is that we can transform what was once called "religion" into a far broader, more dynamic sense of what it means to live a mindful, spiritual, ethical Jewish life—an approach to Judaism that might be attractive to Jews who now define themselves outside of the organized Jewish community.

I hope everyone in the congregation will find a way to engage in our conversations this year. You are encouraged to attend the Members' Meeting on November 17 (see back page), where we will kick off the communal discussion. You are also invited join in the Board's exploration of these issues (see Board Notes on page 6 for more info). May our conversations be rich, and may they lead to a renewed sense of what we share and what we aspire to.

EXPLORATION OF MEMBERSHIP: DORSHEI TZEDEK'S YEAR-LONG STRATEGIC INQUIRY

The Dorshei Tzedek leadership team just launched our congregation's year-long exploration of membership in our community at our board retreat on September 29th. We invite the congregation to join us as we set out to explore what it means to be a member of a covenantal community like CDT at a time when fewer people than ever before are affiliating with religious institutions. Why do we, as members, find our connection to Dorshei Tzedek important? Why should anyone else? As Rabbi Toba pointed out at the retreat, membership in a congregation like Dorshei Tzedek is a radically countercultural proposition.

We have two goals for the year:

1. A deeper understanding of why and how commitment to the CDT community adds value to the lives of our members. This deepened understanding will enable us to articulate this value for current and potential members, and to evolve as a congregation in ways which enhance this value.

2. A set of concrete policies and procedures regarding the Membership function at CDT, including leadership and staffing (i.e., Executive Committee role, Membership Committee role, and processes for reaching out to both potential and existing members).

To meet these goals, we are challenging ourselves to question broadly and think deeply as the year unfolds. As we launched the conversation at the retreat, we discovered that this enterprise will be both exciting and challenging. Our initial conversation was about how to define a successful congregation - and we quickly learned that we don't necessarily agree. Do we expect that members will love, or even like each other? Or is the goal simply acceptance? What is the role of the sacred in defining our community? And what is sacred anyway?

We are discovering that we will need to be able to live with contradictions and disagreements - and that those very tensions are perhaps where we will learn the most.

We hope that everyone in the congregation will get involved in some way. Each Board meeting will explore a different aspect of membership and its meanings. Every member is welcome to join us at any board meeting, and to share your thoughts at any time. Members' meetings will address the topic as well, and we will surely be soliciting input from our community throughout the year through surveys, interviews, and parlor meetings.

Here is the initial schedule for the year:

October 27: How does a Jewish community engage people at different stages in the life cvcle?

November 17: Members' Meeting

January 12: What kinds of communities are growing and thriving today? What can we learn from other congregations and organizations?

March 4: What are the benefits and expectations of membership at CDT - and what makes it so compelling? What is our "Special Sauce?"

April 13: The synagogue in the age of social media

May 4: The membership function at CDT: outreach, inreach and "radical hospitality"

Special thanks to Ora Grodsky, for her inspiring retreat planning and facilitation, and to all our board members who are stepping up to do research, lead discussions, debate, and engage.

We are launching a special page on the Members' area of the Dorshei Tzedek website where will post all of the readings, meeting notes and presentations from the process. We plan to keep you up to date on and allow you to participate in our exploration process: http://dorsheitzedek.org/ members/membership-exploration. And thanks to the congregation for joining us on this journey - we look forward to all of the creativity and insight that we know each of you will contribute!

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

In planning my daughter's wedding last year, I learned that it is no longer enough to send invitations a month or two in advance. Because people are so busy these days, it is now customary to send "Save the Date" cards six months (or more) in advance.

So here it is: SAVE THE DATE- May 3, 2014 for the *Siyyum* (a celebration of completion) for our *Darshanim* (10th grade) class. At our Shabbat services that morning, our tenth graders will lead part of the service and be honored for their participation in our Religious School program. This is a milestone in the life of our congregation: it is the first time we have had a group of students participate in our school through tenth grade.

In our post- B'nai mitzvah BaDerech program, the class has studied Jewish values, with teacher **Cindy Shulak-Rome**, comparative religions with **Rabbi Toba** and Jewish peoplehood with teacher **Gina Fried** (Morah Gina). They have participated in the TEL (Teens: Experience and Learning) program of the Reconstructionist movement, attending retreats at Camp JRF with their peers from other congregations.

This year, Morah Gina is leading our *Darshanim* class. We chose the name "*Darshanim*" because of its multiple meanings, sharing a Hebrew root with the word "*Dorshei*" - meaning "those who seek", the same root also meaning to consult, investigate, study, interpret or teach. Morah Gina likes to think of her students as "our next generation of seekers, learners, teachers, and – of course – Dorshei Tzedek–niks!"

Each of the students is working this year on writing a spiritual autobiography as well as studying what Jewish tradition teaches about issues of economic justice. The class hopes to develop curricular materials about economic justice to be used in future years in our Religious School.

Mark your calendar and plan to attend as we celebrate, as a community, the accomplishments of our Darshanim students and honor them for their commitment to Jewish life and learning.

TIKKUN OLAM UPDATE: SO MANY PROJECTS TO CHOOSE FROM!

The Tikkun Olam Committee meeting on October 3 was a veritable social justice feast. Laid on the table were a number of new projects. We'll be gathering more information and will make our selections at the next meeting.

The new projects we discussed include:

- 1. Support for legislation to create a domestic workers' bill of rights
- 2. EPOCA (Ex-prisoners and Prisoners Organizing for Community Advancement) "Jobs not Jails" campaign to change harsh sentencing policies
- 3. Newton Congregations' work for affordable housing in Newton
- 4. Ongoing support of the rights of Hyatt hotel workers to organize
- 5. The prospect of partnering with a congregation of another faith through Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries/Ruah
- 6. A work day with Habitat for Humanity in Wayland (planned for next April).

We'll also continue our ongoing Tikkun Olam projects:

- 1. The annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace, which benefits the Louis D. Brown Institute for Peace in Dorchester
- 2. Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO): organizing across religious, class and ethnic lines for the public good
- 3. Red Fire Farm CSA: supporting congregation members who choose to take part of this shared risk model of farming
- 4. Sindyanna Olive Oil: supporting Arab-Israeli cooperation through the sale of olive oil and za'atar at our congregation events
- 5. CIW: Coalition of Imokalee Workers has no active Boston Area organizing; we will re-engage when an active campaign comes to Boston
- 6. Family Table: We continue to collect food for Boston's kosher food pantry (see article below)

Family Table is the Boston area's only food pantry offering kosher food. It is supported by volunteers from the Jewish community (including our synagogue) who collect, sort, pack, and deliver groceries monthly to more than 800 people. CDT has committed to collect 25 cans of kosher or vegetarian soup, and 25 boxes of whole grain cereal every month. This year, we have taken on the additional mitzvah of collecting money to help Family Table purchase fresh produce and dairy products to distribute to their client families.

We also need a driver to bring our food and monetary contributions to Family Table at JF&CS in Waltham one Sunday morning each month. We still need a volunteer for this task on December 1, January 5, March 2. We have also promised to provide at least 8 volunteers (individuals or families) to help pack and deliver groceries on January 5, 2014.

To make a donation: We have collection boxes at the upper door to our sanctuary on Highland Street and outside the Hebrew School office at the FUSN building. When Hebrew School meets on Saturdays, donations are also collected.


