Exploring Your Values and Your Membership

REVISITING WHAT IT

means to be a member of CDT is a complex and ambitious endeavor. It allows us to deepen our understanding of membership. It means

reviewing our history, exploring who we are as a community and what membership means to each of us, and creating a new consensus on a set of practices as a community, today.

Last year, we decided to rename what has been called the "Membership" function at CDT as "Kehilla," meaning "Community." The Board realized that more than just "outreach" and "in-reach," Kehilla implies attention to all aspects of what it means to be a member of our congregation. This year the CDT board is devoting a significant amount of our meeting time to further exploring aspects of what membership and community mean at CDT, leading to a statement that defines membership in our community. Our work is building on the results of our brainstorming and community conversations over the course of last year. Our goal is for this new statement to be a much better articulation of what Kehilla is and could look like at CDT, as well as the basis for aligning our infrastructure to support the growth and development of our community, our Kehilla.

With this goal in mind, we engaged in a vibrant conversation about our values at the November members' meeting to set a foundation for our efforts this year. This column will summarize the outcome of that con-

I urge you to take a look and think about it. It is a fascinating and challenging process to consider the common values that can serve as the foundation for our community.

Setting the Foundation with Values

Rabbi Toba explained to us the concept of "Values-Based Decision-making" as a way to ground discussions such as this. She reminded us that this was the way we undertook a similar, challenging discussion more than 15 years ago about our dues system. (If you haven't recently read the dues pamcontinued on next page

phlet, I recommend taking a look. It is based on values I expect will resonate with most of you and it is a compelling and validating reflection of what makes CDT, CDT). With an ultimate goal of understanding what specific values shape our commitments and opportunities as members, we decided to begin with a more fundamental discussion of core values that describe our aspirations as a congregation.

At the members' meeting we took time as small groups to review a list of values prepared by the Board and to identify those that seem particularly resonant. With the recognition that we are all unique, and our relationship to CDT is fluid and changes based on our circumstances, we wanted to see what values were the most common to prioritize and unite our congregation. As I mentioned above, you can find the full list of values posted on the members-only portion of our website. But to give you a quick idea of how people responded to the list, take a look at the Wordle I created from the "voting" that took place at the meeting.

After our conversations, people prioritized the five values that they felt most strongly reflected our community. In the Wordle above, the larger values represent those that more people selected.

I urge you to engage with us (or me directly) on these values and our conversation throughout the year. Like last year, we will be reporting on our progress and we will be seeking your input periodically during the year so that the result of our work reflects everyone's input.

Children's Education

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

Last year, we introduced a new approach, Project Based Learning (PBL), to our upper grade classes. With this approach, students engage in "learning expeditions" in which they master areas of inquiry the way professionals do: with in depth study, collaborative work with members of a team, consultation with experts and fieldwork, culminating with students producing a high quality project to a public audience beyond the classroom.

Using this approach, students in Dalet/ Hey explored how people experience the Divine and the language they use to describe their experiences. Out of their learning, the students created a beautiful new siddur, which students and parents use on Sunday mornings at the school this year. Last year, Kitah Vav studied the idea of sacred space and explored our own sacred space, the Dorshei Tzedek sanctuary. After meeting with the artists and artisans who created the handcrafted objects and art that beautify the space, the students used what they learned to create guides to these objects on the two tree plaques that now adorn the sanctuary.

Excited by the success of these learning expeditions, we decided to continue using PBL as part of our school program this year in Kitah Dalet (4th grade) and Kitah Hey/Vav (5th/6th grade).

Kitah Dalet, led by teacher **Vered Brooks**, is looking at the text of the book of Genesis, particularly the biblical stories of Abraham and his descendents, to explore what factors give rise to conflict among people and how we can avoid and resolve conflicts.

The students will design materials to use in our school and congregation about conflict resolution.

Kitah Hey/Vav is engaged in a learning expedition, guided by teacher Itai Gal, that is focusing on themes of slavery and freedom in our world. Studying the biblical story of the Israelite enslavement in Egypt and redemption from slavery, the students are comparing that narrative to slavery in modern times. Students will be working to bring the issue of contemporary slavery to our attention by creating a new ritual and Seder reading for use by our congregants this Passover. They will also be educating the community about fair labor practices and selling "Fair Trade" Chanukah gelt at the CDT Chanukah Party on Sunday, December 21. Make sure to stop by their table!

FAMILY TABLE

Here's the problem we're facing locally: 1 in 9 people in Eastern MA still go hungry every day, and that number is increasing! In addition, about 1/3 of the households that receive food assistance from an agency that uses the Greater Boston Food Bank (including Family Table) have at least 1 child under the age of 18 in them! The Greater

Boston Food Bank has witnessed a 21% increase in requests for food assistance since 2008! So we need to keep doing our bit to help them.

Here's what you can do THIS MONTH to help CDT fulfill our commitment to help Family Table, which serves more than 400 needy families in the Jewish Community:

- 1. Bring a donation of kosher or vegetarian soup or whole grain cereal, or a check (made out to JFCS/Family Table) for Family Table with you whenever you come to Services, Hebrew School, or a CDT event. We have 2 collection boxes (one for food, and one for checks - no cash) at the upper door to our sanctuary on Highland Street, 1 box outside the Hebrew School office at the FUSN building, and 1 bin at JCDS on the Sundays that ALL the grades meet there (food only, no money at FUSN or JCDS).
- 2. Sign up to bring our contributions from our boxes at Second Church and FUSN to Family Table in Waltham on one Sunday morning each month. You can sign up for this quick, easy, but necessary, task at: tinyurl.com/delivertoFT (doodle poll).
- 3. Sign up to bring the donations that we collect at JCDS back to our collection box outside our Hebrew School office at FUSN. CDT JOINS 400,000 PEOPLEMARCHING TO CONFRONT **GLOBAL CLIMATE CHANGE**

More than 400,000 people turned out for the People's Climate March in New York City on Sunday, September 21, just days before many of the world's leaders debated environmental action at the United Nations Climate Summit. Between 20 and 30 CDT members participated in the march with some members marching under the CDT banner while the rest of us were scattered among the throngs.

The march was the largest action concerning climate change in U.S. history. While we were marching, over 1,600 actions that took place around the world in 130 other countries.

The march began around 11:30 a.m., at New York City's Columbus Circle. At times, it stretched more than 4 miles as marchers carried banners, signs and entire contraptions depicting everything from Mother Earth herself to the dinosaurs that now make up fossil fuels.

Many marchers never made it beyond 70th Street as tens of thousands of people were stuck between the barricades set up by the NYPD. At 1:00 pm there was a moment of silence throughout the march demonstrating the seriousness of the impact of global climate change. This moment of silence was followed by a deafening cacophony of horns, whistles, trumpets and shofars to show the marchers' commitment to changing the direction the world is moving regarding climate change.

"I went to the march to help [the world of] my future because I don't want to grow up in a world that is going downhill without getting better," said CDT member Sophia Wilcox-Warren.

CDT members who returned from the march and other concerned members have already met to discuss our impressions of the march, why we marched, why other members are committed to this issue and plan to brainstorm ongoing work in our congregation. continued on page 9

Chesed (Loving-Kindness) is an important CDT community value.


