# Spring is Blooming at CDT

Back in the day, Shavuot was one of the three pilgrimage festivals during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it marks the occasion when Jewish people received the Torah. Thus, it serves as a celebration of Torah, education, and actively choosing to participate in Jewish life.

One tradition associated with this holiday is to stay up all night learning. An engagement with learning can benefit us all. Whether we want to improve ourselves, learn more about our culture or heritage, learn a new language, pick up an instrument, or take up a new sport, it is good for our brains to seek out new challenges. As my wife says, "the brain is a muscle you have to use it." So we study with each other to continue the cycle of Jewish life and learning. While we won't quite be pulling an all-nighter at CDT (!), we will have several sessions to help us explore different aspects of Torah from 8 pm to midnight. ## YOM HASHOAH PROGRAM AT CDT

On May 4, 2016, David Wluka, whose father Icek Wluka was a survivor of the Holocaust, came to CDT to share the story of what happened to the Jewish cemetery from the town of Nowy Dwor in Poland and what is occurring now.

After the transport of the last 4,000 Jews from the Nowy Dwor ghetto in May 1942, the Jewish cemetery was plundered, and the headstones (*matzevot*) and caskets were removed and used as roads and walkways and the bones scattered. The earth left was mined as a gravel pit with just random pieces of graves remaining, on what should have been a holy site.

The story of the Nowy Dwor Jewish cemetery's rescue and restoration began in 1988 and really took off in 2009. A fundraising campaign through descendants of survivors, and work with the local Polish government, allowed local city employees to dig up over 100 gravestones that had been paved over. These matzevot have been installed on a wall in the partially restored cemetery, kept secure by a fence around the premises.

There was a dedication in July of 2011. In June of 2014, a yahrtzeit wall to those who perished in the Shoah and were never buried, was dedicated. David's presentation was a beautiful story, as he and others are helping to right the wrong of what occurred during a horrible part of world history. # MOTHER'S DAY WALK FOR PEACE by Abby Cohen

On Sunday, May 8, over 70 members of CDT joined an estimated 15,000 who participated in the 2016 Mother's Day Walk for Peace through Boston. The walk began in Fields Corner, Dorchester and ended at City Hall. Funds raised support the work of the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute, whose vision is to transform the way society responds to homicide, treating families impacted by murder with dignity and compassion. In addition to taking part in the walk, CDT members donated over \$2,600 this year to this worthy organization.

It was both inspiring and humbling walking through the streets of Boston, going from one neighborhood to another along with so many people, many of whom were families impacted by murder. The Peace Rally at the end of the walk was also moving as Charles Bogues, the man incarcerated for killing Tina Chery's son, Louis Brown, spoke to the crowd, acknowledging the harm he caused not only to Louis' family, but to his own and the greater community. Tina's efforts over the years included reaching out to Charles's mother as well as supporting Charles's efforts to receive parole and rebuild his life.

## CDT VOLUNTEERS AT THE PRISON BOOK PROGRAM

In the late fall of last year, CDT collected over 400 books from members to donate to the Prison Book Program (PBP) in Quincy, MA.

On Tuesday, May 3, a group of eight CDT members went via carpool and T to volunteer for the first time with the PBP. CDT volunteers were assigned to one of three tasks: reading letters written by prisoners to the PBP requesting specific books or kinds of books be sent to them and selecting books from the PBP stacks that most closely match prisoners' requests; verifying that the set of books selected for individuals are a close enough match to the "invoice" describing the requested books, and packaging up the books and addressing the packages to be sent out.

We worked in the basement of the United First Parish Church (Quincy), finding the PBP — a totally volunteer-run organization — to be a very well-organized operation. A good number of other volunteers, some from Boston Cares, worked with us that night. CDT volunteers really enjoyed the experience and expressed interest in volunteering again. Those of us who drove in the carpool brainstormed on our way back about additional ways CDT might further the mission of the PBP; we plan to discuss this at our next CDT Tikkun Olam/Criminal Justice Reform (CJR) meeting.

As an unexpected bonus, a PBP volunteer and member of the Unitarian Church that meets at the United First Parish Church, invited volunteers to go on a tour of the historic church that houses the PBP. Among many other things we were told about the history of the Church, we learned that it was designed by Alexander Parris, the same architect who designed Quincy Market, and that the Church is a National Historic Landmark. Our tour ended with a visit into the crypt that holds the bodies of two presidents — John Adams and John Quincy Adams, and their spouses, down the hall from the PBP!

It is likely we will do this volunteer activity again, so please keep an eye out if you have an interest in participating next time.

## MOTHER'S DAY AT CDT RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

On May 8, more than 70 members of Dorshei Tzedek joined about 15,000 participants in the 20th Annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace, sponsored by the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute, walking from Dorchester to Boston City Hall. With the core belief that "Peace is Possible," the Institute works especially on "healing, teaching and learning" with families directly affected by violence.

Members of our Dalet, Hay/Vav, and Zayin classes walked with their families. Izzy Feinfeld (Hay/Vav) said that "it was really meaningful to see all those people walking for the same important cause." This year's theme was "Celebrating the Courage of Community." We can reflect back on our Mother's Day walk, thinking about the meaning of courage as individuals, as members of our own unique community, and too as members of a broader community which is in need of both justice and peace.

Also on May 8, the younger members of the Dorshei Tzedek Religious School had an inschool program exploring what it means to pursue peace. Students read the story "The Zax," by Dr. Seuss, and learned about solving conflicts. They also explored the words of Oseh Shalom through writing and art. And, in honor of Mother's Day, students created beautiful bouquets to recognize the role of mothers in creating *shalom bayit* (peace in the home).

Starting with our youngest students, reaching up to our oldest and beyond, it was wonderful to come together and recognize that all of us can contribute to making our world a more peaceful place.


