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A GROUP OF CDT men was invited to join the Ritual Committee meeting on May 9 for a wide-ranging discussion of men's participation in CDT events, services, committees, and leadership. While we acknowledged the limitations of dividing ourselves into "men" and "women", given the many different ways that individuals gender-identify, we felt that this issue

seems to pertain to the experience of people in our community identifying as male. While there are certainly many activities where men are well represented, such as family-oriented events, outings, and of course our men's softball team, there are certain areas of community life — including Chesed, the Ritual Committee, Tikkun Olam, and Shabbat morning services — where men are notably underrepresented.

All of the men present said they felt comfortable and welcome at services, although several admitted to counting the other male attendees from time to time. It is also a demographic fact, at CDT and elsewhere, that there are fewer single male members, or male members whose spouse is not affiliated. Many men in our community tend to have children who are engaged in numerous Saturday sports and activities; similarly-situated women probably have about the same attendance level. Still, there is a pervasive sense that the community is somehow run by women, with men encouraged to fully participate and getting extra kudos when they do.

This is not an issue at Dorshei Tzedek alone, nor is it confined to Judaism. As was discussed during the meeting, it may reflect the historic ability of cisgendered, heterosexual men to take for granted their access to full participation and leadership positions in our religious communities, while women and queer or gender nonconforming people have had to make room for themselves in Judaism and Jewish life. It may also reflect that, having lost their traditional role and responsibility for religious observance, many men don't really know where they fit in.

On a personal level, I believe there is room for men to find a sense of brotherhood in and responsibility for our community, but perhaps we have to find our own ways — i.e., it can't be coordinated by the women, even our beloved Rabbi. I think this would be rewarding for ourselves, salutary for the community, and good role modeling for our sons. I would like the opportunity to get to know other men in the community better, and to explore community service and spiritual life together in ways that work for us. I think we could find places and ways to take

on responsibilities, specifically as men, that would feel good for us and strengthen Dorshei without being exclusive.

Here are some ideas:

We could have a men's group that organizes certain activities & events, such as outings and tikkun olam happenings, speakers, etc. We could set a goal amongst ourselves to get a minion of men at services maybe once a month — with a sign-up to get men to commit to participate. We could have another men's shabbaton, which has happened twice in the past to great acclaim (I have not participated)

To help me gauge interest in these or other ways to nurture male involvement in community life, I will set up a Google Spreadsheet linked to our members' area, where (self-identified) men can indicate whether they are interested in participating in, or helping to implement, these ideas. I will also leave space for additional ideas. Depending on the response, we can figure out next steps and the best ways to coordinate amongst ourselves.

RUDERMAN SYNAGOGUE INCLUSION PROJECT:

A Reflection from the 2016-17 School Year

Last spring, Dorshei Tzedek was selected to be a participating member of the Ruderman Synagogue Inclusion Project (RSIP). As a member of this project, we received consultation and advice from RSIP staff. We also received a \$5000 grant, which we used to fund the newly created Inclusion Coordinator position at the CDT Religious School.

On May 23, RSIP hosted an end of the year event to celebrate the success of all the participating members, as we move towards greater inclusion of individuals with disabilities across Boston area's Jewish community. A highlight of the evening was a series of personal vignettes, told by representatives of each participating synagogue. We think Shira Lo**bron**, age 11, aptly sums up the impact of our RSIP participation in her vignette:

"My mom, **Alison Lobron**, is the Inclusion Coordinator at our Religious School. The Ruderman Synagogue Inclusion Project helped create this important job. All people and kids have different learning needs and different ways they learn. The Inclusion Coordinator's job is to help everyone gets their learning needs met in different ways. If your learning needs aren't met, you might feel behind from your peers or less accomplished. You also might feel like you've been excluded from the group. This is not how we want people to feel. It's important to us that everyone has an opportunity to get a Jewish education in their own community. In our Religious School we give everyone the special help they need so they can feel accomplished for what they've learned, proud and valued for who they are. Thank you Ruderman Synagogue Inclusion Project for all the help you've given to the kids in our community."


UNDERSTANDING RACE BOOK DISCUSSION: TEARS WE CANNOT STOP

WWP has grown in the past 28 months from a handful of women who came together agreeing that enough is enough to over 13,000 registered members in Israel, hundreds of activists who work on a volunteer basis day and night, and more than 36,000 followers and supporters worldwide. WWP reaches out to women across Israeli society, from all parts of the political spectrum—Arab and Jewish, religious and secular-and from a range of socioeconomic backgrounds. The movement's demand for a change in national priorities has begun to resonate deeply with tens of thousands of women who refuse to accept that future generations in this region must live indefinitely by the sword.

ON MEMORY UNEARTHED: PHOTOGRAPHY OF THE LODZ GHETTO

On May 7th, CDT Teens and adults visited the MFA exhibit Memory Unearthed: Photography of the Lodz Ghetto, by Henryk Ross, a survivor of the ghetto. The stories of the Lodz ghetto, like many Holocaust stories, are devastating. Though most of the

photography is not "graphic," (for example, mostly they don't depict corpses) they tell a story of both the extreme human cruelty that created the ghetto situation and the vibrant spirits of individual people who suffered there.

One photo that stood out to me was an image of a bridge over an "Aryan" street

that divided the ghetto. Jews were not allowed on that street, so they had to cross over a footbridge to the other section of the ghetto. In this image, you can see people walking on the street below the bridge. I wondered, what were these other Polish people thinking, when they saw the ghetto walls and the Jews crossing the bridge overhead? How did they just walk by? When I voiced this thought, one of the CDT members responded, "and how can we just walk by homeless people on the street? We feel badly, but assume we can not do anything to help." This wise response raises the challenge that we may be as callous as those Polish pedestrians, and in fact we can and must do something to help.

One of Facing History's tag lines is, "People make choices. Choices make history." The point is, each of us makes choices all the time, and those small choices can add up to something much bigger — whole social trends. As I continue to process the experience of Ross' photography, I find myself feeling even more pressed to hold up the question: how do my daily choices — personally and in my professional role at Dorshei — affirm the value of every human life? What cruelty has become normal to me? Viewing this exhibit is an opportunity to shake myself into awareness of what normal behaviors might in fact enable great cruelty.

The exhibit is up through the end of July. It is not easy material, but it is a profound and valuable documentation. If anyone would like to speak further about the exhibit, or would like some framing before visiting it, I invite you to be in touch with me.
