As I write this, we are beginning to return to a somewhat normal life in the United States, and at the same time, I am confronted with the current heartbreaking violence and crisis in Israel and Palestine. I believe that as American Jews - and as members of "Dorshei Tzedek," "Seekers of Justice," we have a duty to learn as much as we can from a variety of sources to best understand

what the current crisis is about and how to encourage our government to support peace while opposing the growing violence. My heart goes out to both Palestinians and Israelis who are suffering through this conflict. My hope is that through compassion, we can show empathy to all who are suffering in this endless struggle.

As Jews we understand what it means to be uprooted from our homes and land and to seek a safe place to live. It is this historical memory that guides us in understanding the feelings and reactions of Palestinians in East Jerusalem who feel that they are being uprooted unjustifiably. At the same time, we understand that innocent Israeli civilians deserve to be able to live in safety and security as well. As Rabbi Toba commented prior to the reading of Parsha Bamidbar which told the story of the census in Numbers or "In the Wilderness", every life is sacred. And this is how we ought to commit ourselves in Israel and Palestine.

I commend the activities of our Israel-Palestine Peace working group and our newer Kesher Yisraeli/Israel Connection group for helping us have respectful and courageous conversations and education about what seems like a hopelessly complex situation. These two initiatives help our community dive deeper into understanding the Israel-Palestine conflict and also connect with individuals and organizations on the ground doing the work of peace and justice, while giving our Israeli and Israeli-identified members the opportunity and ability to share, unfettered, their deep love and care for a country that means so much to them. CHESED: A RECIPE FOR RESILIENCE

A few years ago, in response to the threats of climate change such as excessive heat and intense storms, flooding, and power outages, many cities and towns developed a vulnerability assessment and an action plan to increase resiliency.

Re-sil-ience. The capacity or ability to recover from misfortune, change or stressful life events.

Most resiliency plans emphasize the importance of social connections. Getting to know your neighbors and sharing community activities fosters trust that enables people to reach out when they need help. It also encourages people to feel responsibility for each other and even to seek out neighbors who might need practical or emotional support.

Participating in CDT's Chesed community as a committee member, a volunteer or a recipient builds bonds that strengthen resilience. The

Chesed Committee thanks everyone whose acts of kindness manifest the spirit of Chesed in our community.

COVID UPDATE: As Covid continues to limit some of our options, we order Chesed meals from a local restaurant such as Inna's Kitchen, thanks to Rabbi Toba's Discretionary Fund. When a need arises, a Chesed Coordinator will contact the member to inquire about food preferences, order the meal, and send out a request from LotsaHelpingHands for a volunteer to pick up and deliver the meal.

When a member needs a ride, the Coordinator will discuss Covid precautions (masks, open windows, sitting in the back seat). And, for everyone's safety, the volunteer driver and recipient need to discuss their vaccination status and the status of people in their household when they confirm arrangements for the ride.

CDT AND GBIO FOLLOW-UP TO LISTENING SESSIONS

Todah Roba to the nearly 60 members of CDT who attended a Listening Session in April and May. The purpose of the sessions were to share CDT's social justice activities, and to share stories to help set both CDT's and GBIO's priorities for the coming year.

We heard concerns about or interest in many important topics, including: 1) race relations, white privilege, diversity; 2) climate change and environmental concerns; 3) police reform; 4) voter suppression, politics, civics education; 5) health care affordability; long-term health, mental health; 6) food insecurity; 7) prison reform, prisoner re-entry; 8) education; 9) immigration justice and refugee resettlement; 10) gun violence; 11) housing; 12) domestic worker justice, fair wages; and 13) fire safety.

That's a lot to be concerned about - and without a doubt, there are other issues that CDT members worry about...and take action on! As a community, we already have many initiatives working to seek justice in these areas. For GBIO, our CDT co-liaisons Louise Enoch and Tony Broh are working with GBIO staff and other volunteers in planning a process for understanding the multi-faceted stories shared across all GBIO organizations and to sort the topics into actionable campaigns. We

will be sharing more information soon about the following upcoming events where CDT members can help turn their concerns into a GBIO commitment. Stay tuned for more information about a GBIO Assembly on June 29, where all of GBIO's member organizations and congregations will learn about priorities for further research over the summer and action campaigns in the fall.

I am grateful to announce that as of May 14th, we only have \$150,840 to raise towards our Walk goal of \$600,000 and the fundraising continues until Sunday, June 20, Father's Day. Homicides continue to happen, families need our assistance and children get to grow up in a world that teaches social emotional learning through our Peace Curricula and Peace Play in Urban Settings healing modality.

5782 Religious **School Year**

We are excited to share our vision for the 5782 Religious School year with the CDT community. At every step we will consult with our reentry protocol committee and base our decisions on CDC and state guidelines, and the Newton public schools. As new information arises, we will adapt our program as needed.

SUNDAY RELIGIOUS SCHOOL 9:30AM-12PM

Our intention is to be in-person on Sundays from 9:30am-12pm for Kitot Alef (1st grade) -Zayin (7th grade), with Nitzanim (age 3-preK) and Gan (K) meeting in-person once per month. We hope to be back at JCDS and will confirm as soon as possible.

Each week we will begin together as a community and then students will split up by Kitah (grade level) to explore Jewish holidays, Torah, Jewish culture, and Jewish history. There will be opportunities for family and parent learning throughout the year.

TUESDAY RELIGIOUS SCHOOL FOR KITOT GIMEL, DALET, HEY, AND VAV

We are excited to continue our small group and one-on-one approach to Hebrew and Tefillah (prayer) learning. Once a month students will come together on-site for a Rosh Hodesh (new Hebrew month) celebration that will include a student-led Maariv (evening service) and electives.

Kitah Gimel (3rd grade) students will meet in small groups at FUSN (in Newton) for a one hour Hebrew class on Tuesdays. In this class students will learn the Hebrew alphabet and decoding.

Kitot Dalet, Hey, and Vav (4th-6th grade) students will have a choice between in-person small group Tefillah (prayer) class at FUSN (in Newton) or one-on-one virtual tutoring.

8TH AND 9TH GRADE PROGRAM - ONE SUNDAY AND ONE TUESDAY PER MONTH

We are excited to launch a CDT 8th and 9th grade program in collaboration with Kids4Peace Boston. One Sunday afternoon a month, the 8th/9th graders will participate in a Kids4Peace Boston program with local Boston teens for interfaith and social justice programming. One Tuesday a month, the 8th/9th graders will come back together at CDT to discuss their experience and deepen their relationship to Jewish tradition and culture.



MARK FARBER PHOTOGRAPHY

Mark Farber's work is about place, as inhabited, shaped, or perceived by people. His contemporary landscape photographs examine the built with the natural environment. He works in collections and finishes each project with a hand-made artist book and/or cased Portfolio.

Recent work includes:

- Sea Horizons (currently on display in the CDT sanctuary gallery): a series of seascapes showing simply water and sky with varied light, weather, and time of day; intended to be displayed either individually or in series
- Water's Edge: portraying infrastructure and other urban scenes at the intersection of land and water in and around Boston
- Cape landscapes: more conventional views of outer Cape Cod

Mark has studied at the New England School of Photography, Massachusetts College of Art and Design, Griffin Museum of Photography, Provincetown Fine Arts Work Center, and Truro Center for the Arts at Castle Hill. His work has been included in juried exhibits at Davis Orton Gallery (NY), Perspective Gallery (IL), Plymouth Center for the Arts (MA), PhotoPlace Gallery (VT), and Chatham Creative Arts Center (MA).
