# 25 Months

#### Melissa Colten



In late May 2019, at the members meeting in fellowship hall, I met Congregation Dorshei Tzedek for the first time. The community had grown so much since its founding in 1991 that I had been brought on as CDT's executive director to take on the administrative, operational, and financial management of the congregation. Much has happened in the 25 months since that

members meeting: ShulCloud integration, Rabbi Toba's sabbatical, COVID-19, Zoom everything, good-byes to Rabbi Shahar and administrative associate Lidia Pruente, online searches and a virtual hiring process for our Director of Congregational Learning, Earnest Vener, and administrative assistant, Erin Dimson-Doyle (both amazing).

Life changed and we all adapted. We've become accustomed to making countless technical adjustments, learning in virtual classrooms, looking at our own faces on screen in a small box, sitting in pods, coping with new A/V equipment in the sanctuary, viewing and/or attending outdoor services at Gann Academy, swallowing the awkwardness of stepping into a room with a masked person or 2, and later into a room full of masked people, and finally unmasking. We have made new connections in isolation, we have read and memorized each other's names, and we are now—maybe—taking a break and letting our eyes adjust to broader unplugged landscapes as we head into summer's wider horizons.

I was in Indiana last weekend. Plane having just landed, and pleading polite ignorance, I asked the Budget rent-a-car clerk what the state's mask mandate was, how Indiana was faring, if she had been vaccinated, etc. Just some exhausted late night post-flight bantering small talk. She apologetically replied that she had been vaccinated. Although her son had warned her against it, she had gone ahead and done it. "There are a lot a people coming through this airport from all over," she said. As for the mask rules, it just depended on the store.

Later, at camp pre-registration, families lined up to have their kid's vaccination card copied or, if their child hadn't been vaccinated, have them covid tested before entering the main registration building. After waiting outside for a good 20 minutes, the breeze coming off the lake, my son and I finally made it through the first set of double glass doors of the temporarily repurposed facilities building. We saw row after row of kids and teens sitting in chairs waiting for their test results behind the intake line of computers. We were there for about 2 minutes. A camp employee gleefully photocopied our vaccination card, handed it back to us, and firmly attached a band around Theo's wrist.

Did my little trip make me feel happy and relieved that we live where we do? Not really, no. Quite the opposite. What it did was pop my Massachusetts bubble, and now it feels like I'm coated with a mix of overchewed bubblegum and Palmolive - stale stretching and slimy, but hopeful that I'll get clean after applying some serious elbow grease.

There are so many things I appreciate from the comfort and safety of the Dorshei Tzedek community. Oddly, after

15 covid months,

19 additional households,

3 new staff members with altered positions,

2 board presidents,

1 short-term personnel committee,

2 medium-term re-entry protocol committees, 1000+ hours of Zoom meetings and funerals and shiva minyanim and b'nei mitzvah and Shabbat services, and

1 trip to Indiana,

it is just now that I feel that I am beginning to fully grasp who and what Congregation Dorshei Tzedek is, after that members' meeting 25 months ago.

Congregation Dorshei Tzedek, first and foremost, is a group of people: 249 households from the states of New York, Maryland, New Hampshire, Virginia, Louisiana, and Massachusetts. Within Massachusetts, about 47% of our households reside in Newton, but we are truly spread all over Massachusetts in a total of 27 towns.

We have quite an age spread - from 1 year old to 93: 6 of us are under age 4; 80 are children aged 4-13; 101 are aged 14-22; 148 are aged 23-35; 114 are aged 36-50; 175 are aged 51-65; and 101 of us are over age 66. Our interests are as different as our ages, spanning from immigration to singing to Talmud, from spirituality to politics to the arts, all with our own opinions and stories, and ways of holding and communicating them. How are we such a remarkably cohesive congregation?

This group of people doesn't just rise to challenge, it fiercely embraces it. Pinpointing the most controversial issues, deconstructing them in discussion, examining their parts on personal and societal levels as individuals, intellectuals, and members of ever-expanding

and shifting communities, CDT is constantly growing its "we." Note what work has been initiated and/or accomplished in just the past 2 years: Newton Sanctuary and Solidarity Collaborative's (of which CDT is a founding member) sanctuary project; the Voter Mobilization Project's 80,000+ postcards; the Mental Health initiative's informational and self-care workshops and support groups for parents and larger community, commitment to ongoing anti-racism work, Kesher Yisraeli/ Israel Connections discussions and presentations-just to name a few. While others ignore or castigate, CDT welcomes and listens. There is an extraordinary commitment here to identify and define the stickiest and thinnest lines that both separate and connect us. CDT is accustomed to deep thought, which is rare in the 21st century, and yet still fills the brain and heart like fresh air fills the lungs.

CDT is in its 30th year - no longer a child, more like an adult entering their prime. Excitingly, we don't have to usher in the next stage, we can design it. We can mold our new world, bravely and proactively build it to include all, to be accessible to all, to be flexible yet strong enough to withstand constant reconstruction so as to match our evolving needs as we grow up, out and in. What is our history and how can we learn from it? How do we want to define our community, design our community, so that we live our values? What does participation mean and look like at CDT? [See page 7 for a full list of our committees and groups] How do we measure it - hours volunteered, wideness of smile, pages written, classes and/ or meetings attended, dollars donated, bagels sliced at kiddush, meals delivered, marches joined?

With so much that has happened in my first 25 months with CDT, I can only wonder what the next 25 months will bring, which themes will be chosen and questions explored, and I can't wait.

# **Shabbat, Holidays & Spiritual Practice**

#### A NOTE FROM RABBI TOBA ON OUR UPCOMING SERVICES

As Covid-19 levels in Massachusetts remain low, and as more and more of our members are vaccinated and it becomes possible to gather again in person, we are moving away from our "Zoom only" format into a new, experimental phase. We are now set up to livestream many of our services and programs, using a Youtube format that will provide much better audio and visual quality than Zoom. This also allows for those beaming in to use the "comments" section for communal chat. Going forward, we will offer a smorgasbord of formats, including some in-person summer services in members' backyards (no livestream), an outdoor all-ages service that will also be livestreamed, and a return to our sanctuary at the end of August (with livestream available for all of our sanctuary services). The Ritual Committee is also discussing using Zoom for some services in the coming year, with everyone (including the service leaders) beaming in from their homes, enabling us to avoid winter storms, to host guest speakers from across the country and the globe, and have an experience where everyone is "together" in the same virtual space. Over the High Holydays, we will also be experimenting with a combination of in-person services with livestream, outdoor gatherings without a virtual component, and Zoom programs.

We appreciate everyone's understanding, patience and flexibility as we figure out how to incorporate the best of our pandemic adaptations from the past year, while also returning to the communal experiences that so many missed. The truth is that no one format works optimally for everyone, but we hope to continue learning and exploring this new world of multiple access options together.

#### SHOFAR MAKING WORKSHOP

August 29th at 3-4 and 4:30-5:30pm Linda Kramer and Steve Zisk's Backyard

At this workshop you will learn how to transform a raw ram's horn into a beautiful shofar! This workshop is for children aged 9+ and adults. Creating the shofar requires persistence and some physical exertion, including sawing, drilling and sanding. Working with raw materials is unpredictable, after an hour your shofar might be done, but you may want to continue sanding at home. Please assess if this is something you are comfortable doing. At the end of the workshop you will have a hand made shofar in time for Rosh Hashanah.

Shofars and materials cost \$18-\$36, sliding scale. Please pay what you are able. You do not need to explain or request assistance. If you are able to pay a bit more, that will help cover the costs for those who need to pay less. Registration is required! Sign up on the Dorshei Tzedek website by August 22nd!

#### **CDT MISSION STATEMENT**

Dorshei Tzedek is a Reconstructionist Congregation dedicated to creating a caring and inclusive community, and to enhancing Jewish practice and learning in the lives of our members. "Dorshei Tzedek" means "seekers of justice," and as our name implies, we are seekers of meaningful spirituality, of serious Jewish learning, and of social justice.

Consistent with Reconstructionist philosophy, we are committed to seriously engaging with Jewish tradition, challenging that tradition where need be, and building on it in creative ways. We do this in order to enhance our own lives as contemporary Jews and to perpetuate our bond and our children's—to our heritage. We view ongoing education for adults and children as fundamental to Jewish life.

We are a participatory congregation, encouraging all of our members to take an active role in some aspect of our congregational life. Our rabbi is our partner in this endeavor, and she is both a teacher and participant in our community. We value diversity in our congregation, and welcome all those who share our commitments.

Finally, we affirm the concept of mitzvah as obligation, acting on our Jewish values through deeds of tzedek (social justice) and gemilut chasadim (loving kindness), both within our congregation and in the larger community.

#### TEXT STUDY AND ACTION: ADDRESSING ABLEISM AND DISABILITY IN JEWISH TEXTS AND OUR COMMUNITY -EXPLANATION OF TERMS

When discussing disability many think of physical disabilities, but most disabilities are not apparent at first. As a result, a lot of people feel like they are the only disabled person in their community; however, we are all connected to disability, either in our own daily experience or a time of temporary disability, through friends and family, and certainly in our CDT community. When we recognize that we are all impacted by disability we see the diversity among us and take responsibility for accessibility as a community.

I want to share some working definitions of disability, ableism, disability justice, and accessibility. These definitions are drawn from a variety of sources, including a workshop I attended with longtime disability advocate and thinker Rabbi Julia Watts Belser.

**Accessibility:** Accessibility is the concept of ensuring that places and services are fully open to and usable by people with all types of disabilities. "When access is a practice of love it is no longer simply about logistics and

something you have to do, but something you want to do" Mia Mingus.

**Disability:** Disability is an extraordinarily diverse category. It is an umbrella category that encompasses a huge range of experiences including physical and sensory disabilities, cognitive and intellectual disabilities, mental health disabilities, and chronic health conditions like chronic pain and chronic fatigue.

Social Model of Disability: "The social model of disability is a way of viewing the world, developed by disabled people. The model says that people are disabled by barriers in society, not by their impairment or difference. Barriers can be physical, like buildings not having accessible toilets. Or they can be caused by people's attitudes to difference, like assuming disabled people can't do certain things. The social model helps us recognise barriers that make life harder for disabled people. Removing these barriers creates equality and offers disabled people more independence, choice and control" (scope.org/uk).

**Ableism:** Discrimination and oppression of disabled people. A societal belief that being abled is "normal" and is preferred.

"A system that places value on people's bodies and minds based on societally con-

structed ideas of normalcy, intelligence and excellence. These constructed ideas of normalcy, intelligence and excellence are deeply rooted in anti-Blackness, eugenics and capitalism. This form of systemic oppression leads to people and society determining who is valuable or worthy based on people's appearance and/or their ability to satisfactorily produce, excel & "behave." Importantly, you do not have to be disabled to experience ableism." -a working definition by Talila "TL" Lewis

**Disability Justice:** Disability justice is a framework that examines disability and ableism as it relates to other forms of oppression and identity (race, class, gender, sexuality, citizenship, incarceration, size, etc.).

"This is Disability Justice, an honoring of the longstanding legacies of resilience and resistance which are the inheritance of all of us whose bodies or minds will not conform. Disability Justice is a vision and practice of a yet-to-be, a map that we create with our ancestors and our great grandchildren onward, in the width and depth of our multiplicities and histories, a movement towards a world in which every body and mind is known as beautiful" Patty Berne, Disability Justice Working Draft.

His poems have appeared in Southwest Review, Atlanta Review, North American Review, and many other journals. His poem "Wandlebury Ring," set to music by Kevin Beavers, premiered at the Brooklyn Friends of Chamber Music and has been heard at the Washington Square Music Festival in NYC and elsewhere. Andrew also enjoys songwriting and playing with the new men's guitar circle he founded, CDT Strums.

#### **Artistic Statement:**

My pocket definition of poetry is musical thought. I like it when my poems surprise me--and, hopefully, the reader--by veering off in some unexpected direction. Often this happens by way of my fiddling with rhyme or working within a formal structure like a sonnet. That's what happened in "Riddle," a poem that started off with a famous Zen ko'an ("Show me your face before you were born") and ended up being about the joy of new fatherhood. Somehow Blanche DuBois from A Streetcar Named Desire parachutes in, courtesy of the ghazal form, which invites a fresh start in each verse even as the couplets end with a rhyme word and refrain. My hope is that readers will find my poems accessible on first reading and then perhaps discover new layers if they return. My book Wave is out of print, so let me know if you'd like a copy!
