



# This Time Rabbi Toba Spitzer



As the Covid-19 pandemic has taught me, time is a funny thing. When people ask me about something that feels like it happened a few months ago, I will suddenly realize it's been more than two years. It's as if the 18 months since the beginning of the shutdown has become a gray smudge on the calendar of my mind. Yet the pandemic has also been a time of counting the days – until we can return

to work; see family and friends and students again; get kids out of the house and back to school. The days and months are somehow both unending and not there at all, a time conundrum.

And then there is Jewish time, the long view, the cycles of the calendar. This month of September coincides with the Hebrew month of Tishrei, the kick-off to the Jewish year. While our personal and communal traditions around the High Holydays have been upended both last year and continuing this year, I find comfort in knowing that Jews have been celebrating these days, in all kinds of different ways, for over 2500 years.

Through all the challenging and joyful times in our history, all of the ups and downs, Jews have blown the shofar on Rosh Hashanah and fasted on Yom Kippur; the cycles have continued.

This Jewish year of 5782, we are marking another ancient cycle: the Sabbatical year, described in the book of Leviticus, during which the Israelites were instructed to let the land lie fallow, to eat whatever grew naturally without planting or harvesting, and to release debtors from their debt and servants from their servitude. Religiously observant farmers in Israel continue to observe the agricultural restrictions of the sabbatical year, and here in America there is renewed interest in exploring the deeper meaning of the year of shmittah, of renewal and release (see page 8).

On a less ancient timeline, we are also marking a big year here at CDT: the 30th anniversary of the congregation. The official kick-off of Dorshei Tzedek was High Holydays 1991, when a handful of households put on some services and hoped others would join them. And they did!

The congregation was largely lay-led for the next six years, with support from rabbinical student (and now Rabbi) Linda Potemken. I arrived in 1997, and this High Holydays begins my 25th year with the congregation. While I am sad that we cannot all be together to kick off our celebration of this anniversary year, I am remaining hopeful that we will be able to gather at a special gala planned for May 2022 (stay tuned for details). In the meantime, we will hear a few memories and reflections from our founders over Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and will have opportunities in the coming months to celebrate both the founding of the congregation and the amazing distance we've traveled since then.

Whether in person at Gann or via Livestream or outdoors at Tashlikh or in a Zoom program, we will gather over these High Holydays to mark another cycle of the year, to begin a process of renewal, to mark a new year which is

as uncertain as the beginning of every year (we're just a bit more aware of that uncertainty now). Rosh Hashanah is also called Yom HaZikaron, the Day of Remembrance, and we will also gather to remember. This past year has been one of loss for many of us, including those in the community who had loved ones pass away, often without being able to see them in their final days. We will take some time on Yom Kippur afternoon, during our Mincha service, to reflect on the many kinds of losses we've experienced during the pandemic, and to seek healing together.

As we mark these many cycles, as we move into this next period of time, may it be less of a conundrum than the year just past. May we each be "written" for a year of learning and fulfillment, a year of inspiration and of comfort. L'shanah tovah u'metukah, many wishes for a sweet and good new year!

# From the Office

## FROM OUR NEW RABBINIC INTERN

I am thrilled to join Dorshei Tzedek as your rabbinic intern, and thankful for the warm welcomes I've received. By way of introduction, I am a third-year rabbinical student at Hebrew College, and recently served as the Yale Jewish community's rabbinic intern. Originally from New York City, I worked as a community organizer with Jews United for Justice in DC before rabbinical school. I earned my BA at Yale

in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies, and studied at Yeshivat Maale Gilboa in northern Israel. In my free time, you can find me practicing yoga, loving Jewish music and dance, or hiking the Appalachian Trail.

I hope to have the opportunity to connect with each of you. I will be teaching weekly Torah study and in our religious school, organizing holiday celebrations, and working with several of CDT's committees. I will also be assisting in Shabbat services and available for pastoral support when Rabbi Toba is on sabbatical.

I'm writing to you as we prepare for the High Holy Days. The timing reminds me of a teaching by the medieval commentator Maimonides on teshuva the complex process of repentance, responsiveness, and renewal to which we pay special attention this season. To paraphrase, Maimonides writes that a person may seek teshuva by themselves, admittedly with varying degrees of success. Yet according to Maimonides, people who seek teshuva together will surely succeed (Laws of Teshuva 2:6).

Maimonides' teaching is simple, but powerful. When we embark on the hard work of teshuva—whether it be reconnecting with our innermost selves, repairing strained relationships, or dismantling systemic oppression—community counts. Or, in the words of racial and environmental justice organizer and writer adrienne maree brown, "community feels responsible for each other." We need each other as we shape change within ourselves and our world.

I am honored to be joining Dorshei Tzedek, a community that strives to live these values as it supports its members and their pursuit of spirituality, learning, and justice. As we enter this uncertain year, I'm grateful to be together. Wishing everyone Shana Tova and a sweet, blessed new year.

# Shabbat, Holidays & Spiritual Practice

# **SHABBAT MORNING SERVICES**

As we continue to navigate the Covid-19 pandemic, we will be coming together for Shabbat morning services in different formats, including Zoom and in-person in the CDT sanctuary (with livestreaming). Because of ongoing uncertainty, please be sure to check the CDT website for the latest information about services each week.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** For all indoor services until further notice, for the safety of all concerned we are asking that only those aged 12 and older who have been vaccinated attend, and participants must wear masks throughout the service. Registration is required, and we will limit the number of participants in order to be able to socially distance. We will not share Kiddush lunch together until it is safe to gather closely together indoors without masks. Despite these restrictions, we look forward to seeing you back at CDT!

Labor Day Shabbat, September 4 (on Zoom), 10:00am-11:45am: Rabbi Toba will lead morning blessings and songs and the Shacharit service beginning at 10am, and then at 11am we will be joined by members of the

Matahari Women Workers Center, to learn from those on the frontlines of labor activism about current campaigns (fair wages, wage theft) that influence how we can all make a difference in our own work lives, and in the lives of those who struggle to work with the dignity that all deserve.

Shabbat Shuvah, September 11 (on Zoom), 10:00am-11:45am: For this special Shabbat that falls between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, all are welcome to join Rabbi Toba for a contemplative service featuring song and meditation, and Torah study beginning at 11am. No meditation experience necessary!

Shabbat Ha'azinu, September 18, in the CDT sanctuary and livestreamed, 10amnoon: All are welcome to join CDT member-leaders for Shabbat morning services and Torah study. We ask that everyone attending in person please pre-register on the CDT website.

Shabbat of Sukkot week, September 25, in the CDT sukkah in Newton and livestreamed: Join Rabbi Toba in the sukkah (weather permitting) for a special Shabbat morning service featuring the songs of Hallel! In case of inclement weather, the service will move to the CDT sanctuary. All ages welcome,

but masks required. We ask that everyone attending in person please pre-register on the CDT website.

### THE DAYS OF AWE

#### **Rosh Hashanah & Yom Kippur**

Rosh Hashanah begins Monday evening, September 6. For a full schedule of services and children's programming, see pages 4-5. Our High Holydays this year will feature a mixture of in-person services at Gann Academy (most of which will be livestreamed), outdoor and Zoom programming. So that we can plan appropriately, registration is required for both adult and youth/family services; please go to the High Holydays area of the website to let us know how you are planning to participate: in-person indoors, in-person outdoors, live streaming, Zoom, or a combination thereof. We need to know in order to plan accordingly! To gather as safely as possible, we are limiting the number of attendees at each service to one-third the capacity of the Gann gym (325) people), and require that all attendees be vaccinated and wear a mask throughout the service. All children's and family programming will be held outdoors (with Zoom back-up for inclement weather).

## Rebuilding the Fallen Sukkah: Environmental and Housing Justice on Sukkot

Wednesday, September 22, 7-8:30pm In the CDT Sukkah Sukkot is a joyous holiday, full of fall celebration and relaxation after the High Holy Days. Yet the Grace After Meals for Sukkot contains a curious insertion. "Oh Compassionate One," it pleads, "please raise David's fallen Sukkah!" While the liturgy alludes to the biblical King David, its broader message is clear: venturing outside to build temporary dwellings calls us to notice all that is fallen and in need of repair.

In that spirit, please join Rabbinic Intern Emmanuel Cantor and Tikkun Olam Committee members as we help plan CDT's upcoming work on two urgent, Sukkot-related issues: housing and climate justice. Together we will explore relevant Jewish sources and learn how to get involved in GBIO's affordable housing campaign and CDT's Dayenu Circle, our hub for climate justice action. If you'd like to eat in our Sukkah, please feel free to come early at 6pm and bring your own dinner.

Our congregation values Chesed, acts of loving-kindness. Our gestures of practical comfort and caring are a way that we acknowledge each other's hardships, life transitions or stressful times to build the type of caring community we want to live in.

We see Chesed in action on LotsaHelping-Hands as well as in the CDT-Shares emails when we seek or give advice and referrals. Such acts of Chesed can engender a sense of abundance, especially at a time of loss or fear when kindness and generosity feel regenerative for both the givers and the receivers as well as facilitators and witnesses of caring acts.

The Chesed Committee is currently managing Chesed meals by ordering from a local restaurant such as Inna's Kitchen. When a Chesed need arises, a Chesed Coordinator will contact the member to inquire about food preferences, order the meal, and send out a request for a volunteer to pick up and deliver the meal. Rabbi Toba uses the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund to buy the meals.

## **TIKKUN OLAM ACTIVITIES** ON STEADY COURSE

Stacey Chacker ended her term as chair of the Tikkun Olam Steering Committee on August 1 to become First Vice-President of the congregation and Tony Broh became the new VP for Tikkun Olam and chair of the Committee.

During the spring and summer, the **Greater** Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) heard from 1500 members who participated in its "listening sessions". On August 12, the GBIO Strategy Team rolled out its proposed platform that will develop specific campaigns in the areas of Affordable Housing, Mental Health, and Criminal Justice related issues. During the Assembly Meeting, members ratified the proposal, which also calls for a Steering Committee of leaders directly impacted by the problem areas and Action Teams from member institutions.

IPPeace Steering Committee met over the summer to discuss its vision for the coming year. Join the IPP listserv to stay informed about details. Members participated in an August 26 webinar designed to explore different ways of thinking about the path toward a lasting peace.

A simple email to the Tikkun Olam listserv from Dani Krasa renewed the congregation commitment to mobilize voters and fight voter suppression. "I just purchased 300 postcards to send to new voters in the 2021 Virginia and New Jersey Gubernatorial race. Is anyone interested in helping?"

Ujima, a democratic, member-run financial and investment organization, stepped up its

Tony Broh and rabbinic intern Emmanuel Cantor are working to establish CDT's Dayenu Circle, which aims to collaborate with five other Circles in Massachusetts. Undergirding all of our activities is the value of climate justice—a recognition that the current crisis rests disproportionally on historically marginalized people, thereby interconnecting climate activism with struggles for racial and economic justice more broadly. Whether advocating on a statewide or national level, expanding environmental practices within the Dorshei community, or exploring Jewish teachings and spiritual resources, we hope you will join us.

# AN UPDATE ON THE **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL**

Earnest Vener. Director of Congregational Learning

A new year of Religious School begins on September 19th at JCDS in Watertown! Our youngest learners, 3-5 year olds, will begin their day on the field with their grown ups for mini minyan: a movement and song filled morning service. Kitot Alef, Bet, and Gimel (1st-3rd grade) will be greeted by teachers, madrichimot (teen leaders), and friends on the playground and blacktop for arrival activities and morning meetings. Our oldest students (4th-7th grade) will start the day with community building. New students will be welcomed into the community, old friends will reunite in-person, and our learning will begin. I can not wait to be amidst the buzz of Religious School in-person: overhearing students creating Torah skits, greeting each other with Hebrew phrases, discussing the connections between Judaism and social justice, hearing the laughter between children as they build community, and so much more! There will be a sense of return, as well as newness, as we adapt to meet the safety needs of all of our staff, students, and families.

This summer we have worked with the CDT COVID Protocols Committee on how to return to in-person learning while mitigating risk wherever we can. In-person learning will take place at JCDS from 9:30-12pm each Sunday. We are so fortunate to be housed at a school that remained safely open the entire '20-'21 school year. We will follow JCDS's policies and remain in-person based on their practices (if they pivot to virtual learning, we will as well). Some protocols include staff vaccination requirements, mask requirements for everyone on the premises (both indoor and outdoors), hand washing routines, and social distancing indoors. Our Tuesday program, for Kitot Gimel-Vav (3rd-6th grade) is taking a new form. Students have the choice to learn in small groups in-person or in one-on-one tutoring virtually. In-person learning will take place at FUUSN and follow the same COVID safety protocols as our Sunday program. On Tuesdays our Kitah Gimel (3rd grade) students learn to decode Hebrew, while our Kitah Dalet-Vav students study Tefillah (prayer). Our Tefillah students read and recite prayers, explore their meaning, and develop an approach to Jewish prayer as a spiritual practice. More than ever, I feel the importance of providing our students with a space to get in touch with their inner lives, cultivate gratitude and a felt sense of love, and experience Jewish prayer as a tool for resiliency. Once a month, our students will join together in-person for student-led Maariv (evening service): an opportunity for them to share back their weekly learning and gather as a community.

Our educators are working hard to prepare for this school year, learning new systems and protocols, and getting ready to welcome their students. We will spend two full days of staff training together. A central focus of our training is exploring the whole school objective that our children will graduate from CDT Religious School with a foundational understanding of the Jewish people as a multiracial, multicultural, and global people. Educators of our youngest students will attend a workshop with PJ Library on how to use diverse Jewish books to provide windows (stories that offer a view into someone else's experience) and mirrors (stories that reflect their own experience) for our students. Different books will be mirrors for some and windows for others, and vice versa. Educators of older students will participate in a Facing History workshop with David Rhodes, CDT's VP of education, parent and Facing History program associate. This workshop will support our educators in connecting the dots between Jewish education and anti-bias work. Teachers will then have an opportunity to meet as teaching teams to incorporate their learning into their curriculum. This professional development will continue throughout the year and extend into parent learning.

As we enter this new school year I am holding the talmudic phrase, kol yisrael arevim zeh bazeh - all of Israel are responsible for one another, at the center of my mind as it relates to disability justice. At our school, this means each educator and each student are essential parts of creating a community of belonging for one another. I am so happy that our inclusion coordinator, Jess Green, is on our team to help us enact this value. As we enter into this new year and new phase of learning and gathering during a pandemic, we will work to honor, through our actions and words, all the neurodiversity in our school - the many ways of learning and knowing, all the unique bodies and ways of experiencing the world, and the varied emotional realities of our community members.

We will continue to practice caution, flexibility, patience, and imagination as we navigate these ever changing waters. I am excited for a year of building a learning-community of belonging with CDT educators, youth, and families.
