SACRED SERVICE AND COMING NEAR

Rabbi Toba Spitzer



In this season of teshuvah – often translated "repentance," but more literally meaning "turning" and "returning" – I am drawn to reflect on the turnings and returnings in which we are currently engaged, three and a half years after the initial Covid shutdown. We have "returned" in many good ways — celebrating with a full sanctuary (and kids' parties later!) for B'nei Mitzvah; hearing our voices blending together during services, and then sitting and schmoozing together at Kiddush afterwards; our

kids and teachers together again on Sunday mornings. And at the same time, we have "turned" onto some wonderful new paths. Our programming is much more accessible, as we can now offer a virtual component to our services and many other programs. Indeed, we have discovered that for some things – like evening classes – Zoom makes it possible for many more people to attend than did in the past. And our

virtual offerings have expanded our reach, as we now count members from the D.C. area to Milwaukee to New Hampshire!

The shake-up of the pandemic – the extraordinary disruption to and reinvention of communal life - has also been a significant learning opportunity. Beginning about a year and a half ago, I and members of the Ritual Committee convened conversations with a variety of CDT members to explore what we had learned during the shut-down and its aftermath. We reflected on what had sustained, nourished, and grounded our spirits, both in general and at Dorshei Tzedek in particular. And just as I had learned in those early days of the pandemic that it was indeed possible to feel connected to one another in mind and spirit over Zoom, we learned that folks found sustenance in many different ways via the CDT community, whether attending a virtual Shivah minyan or walking with a buddy, doing Zoom Torah study or discussing a film on Saturday nights, reading a Shabbat email or continuing our social justice commitments. During a time when we physically could not all gather together, we nurtured a web of CDT life, with no particular center, just many types and sizes of nodes of connection.

This past summer, we continued the conversation on what we've learned and how it might inspire us, framed by two concepts from Jewish tradition. The first is the notion of *avodah*, a word for "work" that was used by the Talmudic rabbis to refer to priestly service in the Temple in Jerusalem. Once the Temple was destroyed, the rabbis had to reformulate what such "service" now meant. In a famous commentary on a verse from Deuteronomy, calling on the Israelites "**to serve** God with all of your heart," the rabbis asked: "What is 'service' of the heart? You'd have to say, this is prayer" (Taanit 2a). Prayer – and spiritual practice more broadly – can thus be thought of as a kind of "service," leaving open the question: what, and how, might we serve?

The other concept we explored was the term used to describe the offerings made in the Temple. These were called "korbanot," which is usually translated as "sacrifices," but whose root is from the verb to "come close." Through these offerings, the ancient priests were creating pathways to connect themselves and their community to the Divine. This led us to another question: to what, and how, do we seek to "come close" in our own ritual and spiritual lives?

Our conversation on both of these topics was very rich. On the notion of "service," participants noted that it is inherently relational, and it implies that each of us has something to give. Service contains a sense of *kavvanah* — of directing oneself, pointing towards something important. On the question of what we might be seeking to "come close" to in our communal and ritual lives, people included: something within myself; to community, even from afar (Zoom); to a sense of goodness in the world; to Something bigger and beyond, Something vast; to a sense of mystery.

Based on small group conversations of how we might apply these concepts to our spiritual and ritual life at CDT, some interesting themes emerged, and at our second conversation, we broke into five working groups, exploring possibilities in the realm of Nature/the outdoors, song and music, physical movement, opportunities for communal participation/offerings, and an open brainstorm. If you missed one or both of these conversations, not to worry! We have recordings of both, and a wonderful Google document that captures many of the ideas that emerged (and that continue to emerge). May the new Jewish year 5784 be one of continued learning and exploration, as we play and experiment with some new ideas, even as we "return" to what we have always appreciated about our communal life here at CDT. May each of us, in the new year, find our own unique way to serve That which sustains and inspires us, and may we be blessed to "come close" to our inner goodness and to the Source of Life and Love itself. *L'shanah tovah tikkateivu* — may we be written for goodness in the new year!

Interview of the Month

YOUR DIRECT LINE TO ANY **QUESTIONS ABOUT THE** HIGH HOLYDAYS — EMILY **MATHIS!!**

In addition to teaching in our school and leading High Holydays programs for children and families, CDT member Rabbi Emily Mathis is now filling a new CDT position as our High Holydays Assistant. I interviewed her about her journey to CDT as well as the goals of her position. What is your Jewish background and how did you decide to join CDT?

I was raised with a Reform Jewish background, and came to the Reconstructionist movement after college. I was looking for a Jewish life and practice that was meaningful, musical, and connected to the broader community. I certainly don't blame my parents, but suburban Jewish life was not super engaging in the 1970s.

When I was in college in Providence, I attended the nearby Quaker meeting, and that community was very much a home for me for several years. But eventually I knew that I needed to find a Jewish community that would fit. I next found two other Reform congregations: Central Reform Congregation when I spent time back in St. Louis where I grew up, and then Congregation Beth El in Sudbury. I was connected to the music, the learning, the



social justice work, and the progressive values. Yet, the Reconstructionist movement and its focus on an always-evolving tradition adds a layer of engagement that I love.

When we moved to West Newton, we knew that we wanted to join a congregation that was walkable, that was in the community — not to feel like we had to go to another town for our Jewish life. We were considering a couple of congregations, and when I ran into Carla Naumburg at a conference, she said, "Join Dorshei; they're your people!" (Of course, Dorshei is Carla's people as well.) Literally, that was her response to my deliberation situation, and she was right. We wanted our family and kids to be with our people, and to be able to connect easily. People join congregations for all sorts of reasons. You like the rabbi, or it's where your friends are, or the Religious School seems great — and in our case, it was all of those and it was three blocks away.

What are your current roles at CDT?

I teach Kitah Gimmel (third grade) in the Religious School, both on Sundays and Hebrew on Tuesdays. Last year, I led several High Holydays services/programs for families with young children. I've also served on the Children's Education Committee (CEC) for a number of years; it's important to me to take an active role in helping students and families to have a sense of inclusion and belonging, and the CEC is a really good group of people!

What is the role of the High Holydays position?

My role is to support members who have questions or needs regarding the High Holydays services, programming, and logistics. Members can find information in the packets that were sent recently, as well as on the Spiritual Life tab on the website — but for any questions not answered, feel free to call or email me!

What do you want to say to members?

If you have any questions, please reach out! We want everyone to be able to enter the High Holydays feeling prepared for a meaningful beginning to the New Year.

AFGHAN FAMILY RESETTLEMENT

Since December 2021 when CDT members greeted the Afghan refugee family at Logan Airport, volunteers have supported this warm, extraordinary family (mother, father, and two young children) with their progress in housing, employment, basic necessities, schooling, English, health, and other challenges in order to transition to a life in Cambridge, MA. There are many opportunities to join this collective effort, both short and long term, in order to continue to support this family's journey towards independence, as it truly takes a village.

BEYOND INCARCERATION

CDT's Beyond Incarceration group participates in a statewide campaign for Criminal Justice Reform focusing on replacing the carceral state with programs that treat people as human beings, no matter their transgressions. We work to change biased and ineffective laws such as mandatory minimums for drug offenses and unreasonable parole terms. Through active participation with the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO), we helped pass the 2018 Criminal Justice Reform law and the 2020 Police Accountability law, and we are active in the Housing Justice Campaign. This year, CDT members also became involved in the No New Women's Prison Campaign.

GBIO

Since 2003, CDT has been a member of GBIO, a broad-based coalition of sixty area churches, synagogues, mosques, unions, and community organizations that have built a relational and action-oriented community of shared values and commitment to racial, social, and economic justice. Based on the concerns of its members, GBIO's current campaigns focus on housing, support for returning citizens, and mental health/ substance-use issues. The leadership team includes Louise Enoch as GBIO Liaison, Alan Epstein as Strategy Team member, and Rabbi Toba as a coordinator of the GBIO Clergy Caucus and Strategy Team member. Other CDT members participate as CDT's Core Team, and all CDT members are encouraged to get involved.

GBIO Update

Louise Enoch

GBIO led a powerful action on June 26 to highlight its Housing Justice Campaign. Significant allies and elected officials were present and on the stage, as well as 1400 GBIO members in the audience! Moving stories were told by those most affected by the issues. Officials were asked to move forward with the Public Housing Bond bill, the Real Estate Transfer Fee bill, and two pieces of legislation directly affecting Returning Citizens.

The next step in the campaign is to press for passage of the relevant bills by the legislature. We will do this by organizing "In-District Meetings," where legislators are invited to meet with their own constituents to hear what those who put them in office are asking them to do for our Housing Justice Campaign. CDT members have participated in planning and attending these important meetings in the past, and we hope that many of you will step forward again (or for the first time) to get involved in this rewarding activity. This is an opportunity to engage in direct organizing using GBIO's playbook, as well as a chance to work with GBIO members outside of CDT from your district.

You say you don't know how to do this? That's understandable, but if you attend one of the two scheduled **GBIO Trainings – September 12 (in-person) and 21 (on Zoom), both at 6:30 pm** – on how to organize an In-District Meeting (IDM), you'll become a pro! ISRAEL/PALESTINE PEACE

CDT's I/P Peace Group aims to foster deep learning, respectful dialogue, and activism toward justice and equality in Israel-Palestine. We maintain an active email list open to all members of CDT. This year, we focus on visions for a fully democratic Israel/Palestine, beginning with presentations by Palestinian human rights lawyer Jonathan Kuttab (October 4) and by CDT's own Middle East expert Gail Pressberg (November TBD).

Jonathan Kuttab is a renowned Palestinian human rights lawyer, cofounder of the independent NGO Al Haq, the premier human rights organization in the West Bank, and cofounder of Nonviolence International, which seeks to realize the worth and dignity of all people through the nonviolent resolution of conflicts around the globe.

DAYENU CLIMATE CIRCLE

Under the slogan "Dayenu! Enough! Climate Justice Now," CDT has established a CDT Dayenu Climate Circle, connecting climate activism with struggles for racial and economic justice. With other local Circles, CDT will continue to be involved in climate justice campaigns, including a non-partisan "get out the vote" movement and the study of Jewish perspectives on ecology and protest. Dayenu provides training and resources for building a

multi-generational movement to confront the climate crisis with spiritual audacity.

ECONOMIC DISPARITY GROUP

We live in a society with economic inequities that create human suffering. CDT's Economic Disparity Group's work investigates how economic and class differences within our community can create both barriers and paths to equity and inclusion. Participants in this Board-sponsored effort discuss important and relevant issues and bring dialogue and insight to the larger congregation. Our work builds understandings that help to address challenges of economic inequality in our personal relationships within the congregation and in the larger world.



NEWTON HOUSING PROJECT

On April 11, 2022, CDT hosted a program sponsored by the Greater Boston Interfaith Organization (GBIO) and the Newton Interfaith Housing Coalition to understand the racial discrimination in Newton housing and zoning policies that has persisted for more than a century. Since that meeting, CDT Newton residents have advocated for diverse and abundant housing through public meetings about proposed construction projects and zoning laws.

ONE FAIR WAGE

CDT has long been committed to workers in precarious situations and to a livable wage for all who labor in our community. With other Jewish organizations and worker centers, we support the One Fair Wage campaign, aimed to eliminate sub-minimum wages for the 130,000 tipped workers in Massachusetts. Two-thirds of these workers are women, who have seen a 70 percent decrease in wages since the pandemic began.

UNDOING RACISM GROUP

UR enables CDT members to explore issues of racism and white privilege, educate ourselves, and listen to each other as we unwrap our misunderstandings. We sponsor presentations and discussions of issues, books, and films. Members also participate in outside anti-racism organizations and initiatives.
