I am writing this article savoring the high from Rosh Hashanah — kvelling from the warmth and connection, reflection together, singing, dancing, and the guests joining us. What joy! Honestly, it was a recharge that I needed for the Fall. I am so grateful to our Ritual Committee, staff, leyners, service

leaders, educators, musicians, and the countless others who make this a seamless experience for us all. We are blessed in so many ways.

My 5784 delight actually began at our All-Ages Erev Shabbat and Religious School Open House on September 8. Over ninety people were there – many prospective members – with lots of buzz from little kids! Yasher Koach to all who helped to spread the word about CDT and our Religious School. Please, keep it up!

That same weekend, the CDT Board met for a half-day retreat to focus on our "avodah" (work or service) for 5784 (see page 2 of any given newsletter for the Board list). As Rabbi Toba wrote in her September column, service is "inherently relational," each of us has something to contribute, and it "contains a sense of *kavanah* — of directing oneself,

pointing towards something important." As the CDT Board President, I think a lot about how to support and elevate Board members' and others' contributions, connect, and have fun, while serving our beloved community in our continued growth and evolution. At Board meetings, we build in time for learning and deepening relationships; we often have some laughs. This year, once again, we guessed "whodunnit" on fun facts shared about one another. If CDT ever decides to incorporate a cooking lesson for gravy and biscuits (and sausages, I am told are implied) – check, we got it! Just think... next year... you could be sharing in the fun and the service to CDT.

On a serious note, we also reviewed board responsibilities and had rich discussions (see Melanie Adler's article on page 3 for more details). One focus was our new system for *Creating/Sustaining a Safe and Welcoming Community*. On Shabbat, we now have a "Greeter" at the door in front of Fellowship Hall, in addition to our usher in the sanctuary. In order to keep an eye on who is coming in and out, we are now asking that people come in to services and programs only through the main door off of the Highland Street parking lot (or through the all accessible entrance off of the Chestnut Street parking lot, behind the building); we

will be keeping the Highland Street entrance will locked during Shabbat services. Melissa Colten (past CDT Executive Director), Meryl Epstein (Board Member), Margaret Farmer (Executive Director of Operations), and other volunteers researched, attended safety forums, organized trainings with Combined Jewish Philanthropies and the Newton Police, and worked with the Second Church to leverage funding/make building updates. Board members (past and present) and past presidents attended at least one training and are serving as Greeters, downstairs, throughout the service. Thank you all! Our next step is training in CPR and how to use an AED (we have one on the stairs to the Sanctuary, and in the kitchen). We hope to never have to use them – but in the case that we do – we want to be prepared.

This fall, CDT will be kicking off a strategic planning process, led by Sheryl Koenigsberg, John Carroll, Linette Liebling, Richard Thal, and one to two more members TBD. They have considerable expertise with non-profits and strategic planning, and with the additional member(s) will represent a range of perspectives. CDT conducted our last Strategic Plan in 2007 — driven by the need for growth to support our community. We are excited to take a step back and focus on our programming, communications, and culture, as well as needs for space, staffing, and more. We anticipate this being the focus of our November 19 Member's Meeting and look forward to your thoughts and ideas!

I hope that 5784 brings much joy, growth, support, strength in community, and whatever else you are hoping for. It was so wonderful to celebrate the High Holydays and our first Sukkah 'Stravaganza with CDT members and guests. I look forward to being with you throughout the rest of the year.

From the Board

NEW CDT BOARD KICKS OFF 5794!

Last month, new and returning CDT Board members met at the annual CDT Board Kick-Off Retreat to connect, review their responsibilities, learn about recent CDT developments, and get psyched for the upcoming year! Rabbi Toba started the day off with a d'var about t'shuvah as a community practice and the responsibility we all had to help one another return to godliness. (Love that!) We then moved on to a discussion of what it means to be a Board member, heard updates about our new Second Church lease (more space!), learned about the summer's revamp of the CDT website (much more streamlined and user-friendly), heard a plea for more CDT photos (wherever you are, whatever you're doing, take a pic!), and got the latest membership stats — over 260 households with more on the way!

We also spent time talking about what it means to feel welcomed when joining a large group, and our responsibility as Board members to ensure that both members and guests feel welcome when they attend CDT events. Welcoming and engagement will be an ongoing theme for the year, personified



by the creation of a new Board position: VP of Engagement. These priorities also align with potential Tikkun Olam priorities that include supporting the influx of immigrants, both external and internal, to Massachusetts, and with the work of CDT's Safety Committee to ensure that people feel safe attending CDT services. The Board will be meeting again in

October to begin strategic planning for the year — details coming soon!

In the meantime, consider this teaching that Rabbi Toba shared during our meeting: "'Greeting' is a mitzvah. When you don't warmly greet someone, you steal from them the pleasure of being greeted!"

Shabbat, Holidays, and Spiritual Practice

We are excited to be gathering again in person for Shabbat services and holiday programs, most of which are also available on Zoom!

WE HAVE UPDATED OUR COVID PROTOCOLS: We strongly encourage those attending our services and programs to be fully vaccinated, and we are "mask friendly." Masks are not required, but all should feel comfortable wearing a mask at our programs; we will continue to have masks available, and there will be a mask-only section reserved in the CDT sanctuary. We ask that anyone exhibiting any symptoms of COVID-19 please refrain from attending, even if testing negative, and that CDC guidelines be followed for those who have tested positive in recent days. Sukkot is the "Festival of the Ingathering," the Biblical harvest holiday where we celebrate the abundance in our lives while remembering the precariousness of our ancestors' journey through the wilderness. During Sukkot, we build and eat our meals in the sukkah, wave the lulav and etrog at services, and are instructed to be joyous — here are some opportunities to do all three!
