#### Shabbat Parshat Vayikra 5784

Sermon – Meaning in the Details, Bakar and Tzon Adapted from Rabbi Braun's Sermon in 5783

For most people learning or listening to Sefer Vayikra is a non-starter. For those who try, our eyes gloss over as we read of slaughter of bulls, sheep, blood sprinklings. The details are mind numbing and we struggle to make sense our of any of it. We can't relate and simply think of it as an archaic method of worship. To try and combat that I would like to take one detail, a small one and try and demonstrate that every detail of the Korbanot is meaningful. In the second verse of the book of Vayikra we read:

(ב) דַּבֵּר אֶל־בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל ֹ וְאָמַרְתָּ, אֲלֵהֶּם אָדָם כִּי־יַקְרָיב מִכֶּם קַרְבָּן לִיקֹוָק מִן־הַבְּהֵמָה מִן־הַבָּקָר` וּמִן־הַצֹּאן תַּקְרָיבוּ אֶת־קָרְבַּנְכֶם

A person wants to bring a Korban, an animal, it can be brought from Bakar or Tzon, cattle or sheep. Is there any difference besides the cost of the animal?

Listen to this amazing idea from Rav Yonatan Grossman. He argues that there is a difference, and it is a fundamental one!

Regarding the Korban Olah Hashem tells us:

If your offering is a burnt offering from the herd, (bull) you shall make your offering a male without blemish. You shall bring it to the entrance of the Tent of Meeting, for acceptance in your behalf before Hashem.

The sacrifice is brought before Hashem!

When describing the Olah from the sheep/goat we read:

וְאִם־מִן־הַצֹּאן קָרְבָּנוְֹ מִן־הַכְּשָׂבִיֶם אוֹ מִן־הָעִזּיִם לְעֹלֶה זָכָר תָּמִים יַקְרִיבֶנוּ (י) וְשָׁחַט אֹתוֹ עַל יֶרֶךְ הַמִּזְבֵּחַ צָפֹּנָה לִפְנֵי יְקֹוֶק וְזָרְקוּ בְּנֵיْ אַהֲרֹן הַכֹּהֲנִיְם אֶת־דָּמוֹ עַל־הַמִּזְבֵּחַ סָבִיב (יא)

If your offering for a burnt offering is from the flock, of sheep or of goats, you shall make your offering a male without blemish.

It shall be slaughtered before Hashem on the north side of the altar, and Aaron's sons, the priests, shall dash its blood against all sides of the altar.

- This Olah is also male and perfect, yet it is sacrificed on the north side of the altar.
- There is a second difference as well. The sheep is slaughtered, and the blood thrown on the altar immediately, because it is slaughtered right next to the altar. Yet by the Olah from cattle, there is an intermediate step between slaughter and throwing.
- (ה) וְשָׁחַט אֶת־בֶּן הַבָּקָר לִפְנֵי יְקֹוָק וְּהִקְרִיבוּ בְּנֵי אַהֲרֹן הַכְּהֲנִים אֶת־הַדָּם וְזָרְקוּ אֶת־הַדֵּם עַל־הַמִּזְבֵּחַ סָבִּיב אֲשֶׁר־פֶּתַח אֹהַל מוֹעֵד
- The bull shall be slaughtered before Hashem; and Aaron's sons, the priests, shall offer the blood, dashing the blood against all sides of the altar which is at the entrance of the Tent of Meeting.
- There is slaughter, bringing the blood closer and then throwing, almost as if the cow was slaughtered anywhere before hashem in the chatzer and then brought to the mizbeach.
- Chazal assume that the bull and sheep were both shechted on the North side of the Mizbeach.
- Why then is the description so different?
- Rav Grossman explains that there are two fundamental elements in the Mishkan.
- It is a place where we encounter Hashem, we stand before Hashem.
- It is also a place of worship and sacrifice, on the mizbeach.
- The bull is brought אֶל־פֶּׁתַח אְֹהֶל מוֹעֵד´יַקְרִיב אֹתֹוֹ לִרְצֹנִוּ יְקֹוֵק, at the entrance of the tent of meeting, where Moshe met Hashem, lifnei Hashem. The bull is brought when one wants to encounter Hashem.
- The sheep is described as being offered עָל יֶרֶךְ הַמִּזְבֵּחַ צָפְנָה לְפְנֵי יְקוֹּלָ, also lifnei Hashem, but here the focus is on the Altar. When you bring a sheep Olah you come before Hashem as a worshipper, that belongs to the altar and not the Ohel Moed.
- The relationship you are seeking determines the animal!
- That is abundantly clear from the psukim.
- Why does the bull represent our connection to the Ohel Moed and the sheep to the altar?
- Here we enter the realm of theory, but he offers a few suggestions for this as well and I will share one.
- A bull is completely subservient to his owner. Is carries or plows, nullified before his owner. So too. Sheep are corralled and cared for by a shepherd but allowed to roam on their own, they have a little bit of leeway and control.
- When you stand before the Ohel Moed, stand before Hashem, we bring the bull, we are completely nullified before the Ribono Shel Olam.

When you come to the Mishkan as an Oved Hashem, and you approach the altar, you take a little bit of initiative, you bring the sheep, you acknowledge Hashem as shepherd but act as a Makriv..

Rav Yoni does this with every single detail and it is breathtaking. I know today was a bit technical, but hopefully this idea will give you a new appreciation for the korbanot and the meaning and depth contained in these parshiot.
