As March arrives, we are completing our first full year of our COVID-19 closure. It is hard to believe that the last time we gathered as a TBD family was for Purim 5780 (March 2020). This year has been unprecedented in many ways. We all look forward to the time when we can reopen the building and come together for worship, learning, and friendship.

I found this article from a physician located in Marietta and thought I would share as it sums up the best practice for the "present normal" as only a small portion of our population receives vaccinations. " 'We are all going to wear masks and gloves 'til the virus is gone,' he said about the 12 employees in his office and his patients. 'Just because we were immunized doesn't mean we can take any risks. Remember, it's only 95 percent effective, not 100 percent.' "

Using all the electronic means at our disposal, Rabbi Jesse continues to keep us connected by celebrating each and every occasion and holiday. Building repairs and maintenance is underway. Since last month's update - our survey was completed and is currently with Gwinnett County for review. New entry doors were installed and they are waiting for finish trim work and paint. Weather permitting, trimming / pruning of some of the larger trees on the property is also scheduled.

Rabbi's Message

March marks one year since Temple Beth David last experienced gatherings of our TBD family and guests in times of joy, sadness, and every emotion in between. As we approach a second Passover afflicted by the plague of Coronavirus, we recall the plagues that befell Egypt. We reach out to one another and we give thanks for our community and for all that we have. Passover is about overcoming adversity and solidifying our status as a Jewish community. Prior to the exodus from Egypt we were defined by others, after the miracle of the splitting of the Red Sea we became a nation, a people, a family. Passover is not an easy holiday. We read about how Pharaoh enslaved us and decreed every male Israelite be drowned in the Nile. We speak about how God hardened Pharaoh's heart. We retell the terrible tenth plague – the killing of the first born and how the Israelite families were spared from this painful plague. We do not pass over the difficult parts of the story.

It has always struck me as odd that Passover is the most observed Jewish holiday. It would make more sense for Purim to be more widely celebrated than Passover, for one it's all about joy. Passover takes a lot of work and preparation. In terms of food and the overall experience, many holidays are much more appealing. Yet somehow Passover is the holiday that draws the most participants. Why? Family. Passover is when we became a family so it is our annual family reunion. We gather around our tables breaking matzah and reading the Haggadah. Our Haggadot may be different but there are similarities to every seder, from Snellville to Sydney. We do not discuss the exodus from Egypt as some foreign event from ancient history. Our objective is to find ourselves in the story of Passover. We do not do this alone. We do not do anything in Judaism alone.

When we arrived safely to the other side of the Red Sea it was not just Miriam singing, dancing, and playing her timbrel...it was the entire Jewish family. Our prayers praise God because God gives us life, purpose, and one another. This year, as we did last year, we will have a Zoom seder. We will read about the plagues and we will talk about this current plague. We will also take stock and acknowledge how lucky we are to have one another. What we do today echoes into the future. We end our seders with the phrase, 'hashanahaba'ahb'Yerushalayim' next year in Jerusalem. For those of you reading this that have not had the experience of Passover in Israel, I hope one day that you will. Even if you do not make it to Israel, continuing the tradition and adding to the Passover seder is important. As Jews we all matter and it takes each and every one of us to be the best Jewish community we can be.

GWINNETT INTERFAITH ALLIANCE PROMOTES UNDERSTANDING AMONG COUNTY'S DIVERSE FAITHS

For many years, Gwinnett County has been known for its numerous and diverse houses of worship. Now it's becoming known for their growing connection, a connection strengthened by the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance, (GIA for short), dedicated to promoting understanding and respect among Gwinnett County's different faiths through interaction, communication and education.

At a recent Gwinnett County Commission meeting, a petition supporting removal of the Confederate memorial from the Gwinnett County Courthouse lawn was presented by a member of Medina Institute Mosque and a pastor from Grace Lutheran Church. The petition was one of GIA's activities and was signed by members of Gwinnett's Hindu, Jewish, Lutheran, Methodist, Muslim, Sikh, Unitarian-Universalist and non-denominational communities.

In October of 2018, Temple Beth David in Snellville invited members of the community to attend its vigil and worship service after the Tree of Life Synagogue shooting. Formation of the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance was a direct result of that memorial. Since then, GIA has come together to support its members after such events as the mosque shootings in Christchurch, New Zealand, and the fatal shooting of a Sikh police officer in suburban Houston.

The commitment that the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance has to its members extends to the entire Gwinnett interfaith community, underlining the belief that any action or event that affects one religious unit of Gwinnett County, affects all religious units of Gwinnett County. The GIA meets monthly on Zoom to discuss issues relevant to Gwinnett County's religious community. Information on the Alliance and on its meetings can be found at GwinnettInterfaithAlliance.org, and everyone is invited to join.

History of TBD

Temple Beth David has a milestone anniversary in 2021. We're turning 40 years old! Here are some tidbits of information from TBD history.

- The first organizational meeting was held in January 1981; Sabbath services were held in private homes. As TBD began to take shape, space was utilized within local schools, a hospital, a day-care facility, and finally a local church for classes and/or places of worship. Rabbi Kravitz hired in August 1981.
- The first Board of Trustees was formally installed October 16, 1981.
- Our religious school was started in 1982, and the first Bar Mitzvah was held that year.
- In 1983, Temple Beth David moved into a temporary home at Button Gwinnet United Church of Christ in Lilburn.

March Recipe

Asparagus & Sweet Pea Soup: <https://marisamoore.com/asparagus-sweet-pea-soup/>

2 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 4 cups unsalted vegetable stock or broth
 1/2 medium sweet onion, diced 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt (adjust to taste based on broth)
 2 cloves garlic, crushed 1/8 teaspoon cracked black pepper
 1 pound fresh asparagus stalks, chopped small 2 Tablespoons fresh thyme, removed from the stem
 2 cups green peas 2 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice

1. Sauté the onion in olive oil over medium-high heat, about 3-4 minutes or until the onions are translucent. Add garlic cloves and cook 1 minute more taking care not to burn the garlic.
2. Add the asparagus, peas, vegetable broth, salt and pepper to a stock pot. Cover and allow the soup to cook over medium heat for 3-5 minutes or just until the asparagus is fork tender.
3. Remove the soup from the heat. Add the fresh thyme and lemon juice. Using an immersion blender on the highest speed, puree the soup until smooth.
4. Serve Warm

Asparagus and Mushrooms in Lemon-Thyme Butter

1 pound fresh asparagus, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces 1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
 1/2 pound sliced fresh mushrooms 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 Tablespoon butter 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
 1 teaspoon olive oil 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1 1/2 teaspoon minced fresh thyme or 1/2 t. dried thyme

1. In a large skillet, sauté asparagus and mushrooms in butter and oil until tender. Stir in remaining ingredients.

Family Needs

For those of you who don't know why **FAMILY NEEDS** was formed – here's why. We reach out to families who experience loss of a loved one or who are going through a serious or not so serious illness.

If you are taking care of an adult or a child with an illness and suddenly find yourself without food in your house because you haven't had time to go to the grocery store – call us. Give us a list and some money and we'll shop for you. If you have a conflict getting children/adult to a doctor or a sports event at the same time and don't have someone to drive – call us. I can't guarantee we can help – but we sure will try. We want to take some of the burden off your shoulders.

If a close relative has passed away – call Rabbi Jesse (480-619-3344) or me (Wendy Fine 770-962-6486 – home – 678-431-2200 – cell) to make arrangements. If you must go out of town – let us know and we can send a platter of food to be delivered after the funeral or for a shiva service wherever you are. If it's local – we do the same thing. If you are having a shiva service for 1, 3 or 7 days we can make sure that you will have someone (usually Rabbi Jesse) to lead prayers and also make sure that there is food (usually dessert items) for afterwards.

We work with the family and your friends to make sure that you get the comfort, care and help that you may need. We also send sympathy and gets well cards as needed.

We don't ask that you pay for any of this, but we can **always** use donations to help cover the cost. Your donations "in memory of" "in honor of" "congratulations" or "get well" are our only source of funds for this service. If you donate please send it to Laura Friedman, TBD treasurer at P O Box 865, Snellville GA 30078. Make sure your check says **FAMILY NEEDS** somewhere on the check, so it goes into the right account. Laura will make sure that the person or family you are helping will get a card stating your donation (but not the amount). These donations will be listed, again, in our monthly bulletin. Believe me – the families you are helping will very much appreciate everything you can do to help. This also ensures that we can continue to do our work.

Please remember one thing – I am NOT a mind reader. Don't tell your friends that you need help. They will sympathize with your and probably NOT tell me. I don't want anyone to feel that they are not important and that we don't care. We do!!!!
