DRINK ON PURIM TO UNIFY AND INCREASE AFFECTION FOR ONE ANOTHER

The Kitzur Shulchan Aruch begins Hilchos Megillah with a well-known expression:

משנכנס אדר מרבין בשמחה, From the time that Adar enters, we increase our joy. The climax of this joy is experienced most notably during the seudas Purim, the festival banquet held

on the day of Purim. In keeping with the spirit of simcha that prevails on this day, the Gemara apparently directs one to imbibe in excess, as stated "One is obligated to become intoxicated (with wine) on Purim until one does not know the difference between "cursed is Haman" and "blessed is Mordechai." (Megillah 7B) Abudraham explains that this custom is intended to commemorate the feasts of wine mentioned

in the Megillah, which were turning points in the eventual salvation of the Jews.

However, there is a dispute as to the degree of intoxication required, with some authorities holding that one should literally become intoxicated, while others maintain that one should simply imbibe a bit more than his usual amount, so that he will become drowsy and fall asleep. For when one is

sleeping, he will not "know" the difference between "cursed is Haman" and "blessed is Mordechai."

In any event, one should keep in mind the words of the Chayei Adam who emphasizes the fact that if one feels that he will disregard or be lax in performance of mitzvos, such as blessings or prayers, or that he will behave inappropriately, it is better that he does not drink.

> The Chochmas Manoach offers that the central idea behind drinking enough is not to be unable to tell the difference between Haman and Mordechai, but that one must cast off the hatred and jealousy that he may feel toward his fellow.

> This being the case, the Sages advised that people eat and drink together, so that they will bond and increase their affection for one another. On Purim, especially, the Sages

mandated that people should imbibe to the extent that they completely forget about the ill-feelings they may harbor. Thus, the understanding of the obligation is that one will not only eliminate the animosity he may have for his fellow, which is a serious sin, but he will also come to completely dispense with any jealousy that he may feel.

The story of Purim tells the story of opposites – V'nahapoch Hu (Everything is topsy turvy on Purim day). The Jews come into the story of Purim as a single nation with ACHDUS and unity. However, attending Achashveroshs' party, they lost their sense of ACHDUS, and Haman was able to suggest our destruction. The Jews finally come together once more with ACHDUS and unity and fast, and the story flips and the Jews are saved.

We are at a period in our history once more with antisemitism on the rise, and we feel as if the nations of the world want to destroy us once again. We must heed the story of the Megillah this PURIM – We must ELIMINATE any animosity we have with each other, REMOVE any jealousy, and UNITE as one nation, ONLY this will allow us to overcome the hatred and evil, and we will then merit the rebuilding of the Beis Hamikdash and the coming of the Messiah.

GIFTS FOR THE POOR (MATANOT LA'EVYONIM)

Fulfill one of the four integral mitzvot of Purim by having your donations distributed on Purim day to the needy of Jerusalem.*

Every penny of your donation goes to the poor on Purim day.

You may make your check to the Rabbi's Benevolent Fund (earmarked for Gifts for the Poor). Drop off your check to the office any time before Purim day.

The Laws of Purim

Times

- 1. Purim is preceded by the Fast of Esther, which begins at dawn on the 13th of Adar and continues until nightfall. When the 13th is on Shabbat, the Fast of Esther is observed on the preceding Thursday. It is forbidden to eat and drink on this day (one may, however, wash, and wear leather shoes).
- 2. In unwalled cities, Purim is celebrated on the 14th of Adar, from night to night.
- 3. In cities with walls dating from the days of Joshua, Purim is celebrated on the 15th of Adar, as it was in Shushan, the capital of Persia; hence the name, Shushan Purim. Jerusalem is a walled city and most of its suburbs are also considered part of Jerusalem regarding this law.

Reading the Book of Esther


- 4. The Scroll of Esther is read publicly in the evening and on the morning of Purim.
- 5. It must be read from a scroll written in accordance with Halachah.
- The reader and the audience must have intent to fulfill the *mitzvah* of reading and to fulfill the obligation of the blessings before and after.
- 7. It is customary to make noise when the name of Haman is mentioned.
- 8. It is forbidden to speak from the time of the blessings before the reading, until the end of the blessings after the reading.
- 9. Ideally the scroll should be read in the presence of FOR A FUN AND EASY WAY TO a minyan.

Prayer

- 10. The prayer 'al hanissim' is added in the Silent Prayer (Shmoneh Esrei) and in Grace after Meals.
- 11. If one forgot 'al hanissim' one does not repeat the prayer.
- 12. During the morning service (*shacharit*), the Torah is
- 13. The prayer of repentance, tachanun, is not recited, nor is the prayer lamenatzeach.

Gifts To Friends (Mishloach Manot)

- 14. One is obligated to give at least one gift to one fellow Jew. The more the better.
- 15. The gift must consist of at least two items of food, ready to eat.
- 16. It is preferable to send the gift via a third party.



Matanot L'Evyonim

- 17. One is obligated to give a gift of money, sufficient for one meal, to at least two poor people. The more the
- 18. Funds must be available on the day of Purim. (No post-dated checks.)
- 19. It is preferable to take care of this obligation early in the day.
- 20. The gift may be given to a third party in order to distribute on the day of Purim.
- 21. More should be spent on gifts to the poor than on gifts to friends (unless they are also poor).

The Festive Meal (Seudah)

- 22. It is obligatory to partake of a festive meal on the day of Purim.
- 23. It is customary to eat food with seeds -
- e.g., *Hamentashen* with poppy seed filling.
- 24. The conversation should be focused on words of Torah.

Purim Customs

- Many have a custom to dress up in costumes.
- It is customary to give charity to all who ask.
- Some produce amusing Purim plays.
- Some also present amusing *divrei* Torah.



Cooking Corner with Diana Hirsch



Salmon Piccata!!



When I go to an Italian restaurant (and when I lived in California that was very do-able) I tend to order the same thing, salmon piccata. The salmon is usually cooked properly (over-done, according to Gordon Ramsay), but that's not the part I like best. Even the spaghetti usually served with the meal, or the garlic bread I like so much, aren't my favorite parts. I have to confess that it's the capers.

Did you know they are mentioned in the Talmud? I didn't until Jack was having a session with his *chavrusa*, his study partner. (He and Jack spoke on the phone for an hour every week for 14 years!) Study partner (also named Jack) had never heard of capers. If you haven't either, they are little pickled berries, available in the pickle aisle.

Now, this recipe is from America's Test Kitchen. I have a subscription to their magazine, but I found it at https://www.americastestkitchen.com/recipes/13772-salmon-piccata if you want to look it up for yourself.

Salmon Piccata

Ingredients:

- 1 (2-pound) center-cut skinless salmon filet, about 1 ½ inches thick
- 1 teaspoon salt, divided in half
- 1 teaspoon pepper, divided in half
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 3 garlic cloves, sliced thin
- 2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- ½ cup dry white wine
- ½ cup water
- 2 tablespoons capers, rinsed
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon zest

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into 4 pieces
- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh dill

Directions:

- ⇒ Cut salmon CROSSWISE into 4 equal fillets.
- ⇒ Pat salmon dry with paper towels and sprinkle all over with ½ teaspoon salt and ½ teaspoon pepper.
- ⇒ Heat oil in 12-inch nonstick skillet over mediumhigh heat until the oil is just starting to smoke.
- ⇒ Add salmon, flesh side down. Cover and cook until browned on bottom and registering 125 degrees (for medium-rare), about 5 minutes, or 135 degrees (for medium), about 7 minutes.
- ⇒ Remove skillet from heat and transfer salmon, browned side up, to platter or individual plates.
- ⇒ Return empty (except for the little bit of oil left) skillet to medium heat. Add garlic and cook until fragrant, about 30 seconds.
- ⇒ Stir in flour and cook for 15 seconds.
- ⇒ Whisk in wine, water, capers, lemon zest and juice, remaining ½ teaspoon salt, and remaining ½ teaspoon pepper. Bring to boil and cook for 30 seconds.
- ⇒ Off heat, whisk in butter, 1 piece at a time, until combined. Stir in dill. Spoon sauce over salmon. Serve.

Notes:

- 1. Looks like a lot of work, but it's really not.
- 2. Usually, the recipe says skin side down. This recipe calls for flesh side down.
- 3. For the wine, use only stuff you would personally drink. Do not use cooking wine; it doesn't taste as good.
- 4. If you don't drink, it's okay to omit the wine, although cooking does eliminate the alcohol.
- 5. If you feel you have to add oil at some point (as I often do), add only a very little bit at a time.
- 6. In the last part of the directions it says, "Off heat..." which, here, means "while the pan is still hot."
- 7. Enjoy.
