From the Rabbi's Study Passover Hopes and Memories

Thoughts of Pesach take me back to my childhood. I have strong memories of my mother sitting in my bedroom and

handing me a floppy, square, blue record. She showed me how to play it and asked me to listen to it until I could sing a song on my own. I remember playing that record over and over, until I was able to sing it myself. As you might have guessed — the song was the Four Questions. And a few nights later, when we traveled to my Aunt Charlotte and Uncle Sam's, I was asked to sing it aloud.

I remember that first year and several that followed. Sitting at over-crowded tables which filled every space in their apartment and listening to Hebrew from a Maxwell House Haggadah. It was a time before I learned to appreciate the unique taste of gefilte fish; when those chocolate phosphates that kept coming out of the kitchen looked like they'd be a bit easier to swallow. Yet, all in all, being surrounded by generations of family left me with a sense of warmth and comfort. It's that feeling that I never lost and continue to associate with Passover.

In my imagination, our Israelite ancestors had a similar experience when they crowded together with their neighbors to partake of their first Seder meal while they were still slaves in Egypt. Protected by a streak of lamb's blood smeared on their door, they waited for that night to end, as the angel of death passed over their home and brought them liberation.

As dawn broke the next morning they gathered their belongings, received 'parting gifts' from their Egyptian neighbors, and began leaving the land they had dwelled in for the last 430 years. Their stay had begun in gratitude for the generosity of Pharoah who welcomed Joseph's family during a time of famine. But as the years passed their experience was transformed into a life of slavery.

At our Seder tables we describe their exodus as a time of freedom. But freedom is the wrong word. Instead, their release should be called a liberation. For though they were no longer slaves, the Israelites were also not free to choose their own path. They would have to wait another 40 years to enter their own land, where rather than follow the path of the world around them, they were free to build their own society and culture.

It's interesting that over the course of Jewish history we've spent the majority of time living in other people's lands rather than our own. And even today, despite the freedom and blessings of America, we continue to squeeze our Jewish customs and traditions into the framework of American life.

I think this is the other reason that I love Passover, a home-based holiday that almost all American Jews continue to observe. It's a time when we gather with family, eat traditional foods, open a Haggadah, sing Hebrew songs, and feel a sense of connection that unites us with our ancient ancestors as well as our broader community. It's an inspirational day that belongs to us, a time when we live our values, which we continue to cherish and share with our children and grandchildren — God willing, for generations to come.

Wishing you and your family a happy and healthy Pesach!

Cantor's Corner

Into The Clearing by Cantor Adam Kahan

Each significant moment in the Jewish Calendar is a chance for reflection. Where do I find myself? What is the same? What is different? As we come through the story of our exodus from Egypt, we get to see how the imagined enslavement compares to our moments now. I'm in awe of the amazing lives we have, compared to the portrayed existence of enslavement back then. Without a doubt, there are challenges today in our lives, and in our broader society, but even still, we are better off now. The seeds for gratitude are everywhere I choose to notice, so much so, it's almost overwhelming... as I type this on my laptop, in a sturdy house with electricity, a stocked fridge, in a stable society, and with the ability to control the temperature of my room. Imagine that! What a life!

In this moment, I also notice the great strides made within our Temple community. A few years back, we were in a place of great narrowness. The lockdown was a constriction while simultaneously causing us to stretch. Beautifully, our community actually gained traction within itself, amongst itself... but there clearly were missings in that environment, too.

As a (relatively) new clergy member to our temple, I hadn't the chance to really be with "my people", my congregation. I was seen, and able to contribute from afar, but I wasn't enmeshed....not how I would have desired. But times have changed. Thank God. Seriously, let's do that. Baruch HaShem!

From the Land of Egypt, the Israelites emerged. Their flattened matzot, their breads of affliction, showed the complete lack of elevation, of heights to their spirits.

As they came out of Egypt's darkness, they rose, they leavened. I am so grateful for the way our community has risen. In this past year, more and more often I have had congregants come to me for pastoral moments...chances to listen, to support, to seek clarity together as life twists and turns. Certainly, I cherish times filled with music, but I also so value these moments of composing life together in conversation. They leaven my experience. They lift my days to greater heights.

As we move into this Season of Freedom, I hope we each have a chance to connect with one another, to lift each other up from our narrow moments, to our openings of freedom through community and togetherness.

Education Applate

Holidays Are a Way to Make Each Day Count

Certain numbers are important in different religions. In Judaism, numbers, numerology and counting play a major role in our tradition.

Each Hebrew letter in the alphabet is assigned a number. The word Chai, life, is made up of the letters chet and vud which add up to eighteen. We have several special numbers that repeat over and over in Torah. We see things in threes like the three visitors that greeted Abraham in his tent and we need three stars to be visible in the sky for havdalah (the end of Shabbat) to begin. There are the shalosh regalim (the three pilgrimage holidays)— Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. Ten is a big one as in the Ten Commandments. There are many, many uses of four in our narratives. It rained for forty days and nights in the Noah's Ark story, we were slaves in Egypt for four hundred years and Moses was on Mt. Sinai for forty days. We traveled in the wilderness for forty vears. How many fours are there in our Passover seder! We drink four cups of wine, there are four children and we ask four questions!

In addition to learning about the holidays, third graders in our religious school spend each session focused on the Who Knows One song that we traditionally sing on Passover. Each number is a special part of our Jewish tradition.

On Sunday, May 21st we'll have our annual congregational Mitzvah
Day. Most of the options involve doing good works in the Temple or the wider community. However, we also offer one project centered on a Jewish ritual mitzvah. This year, we'll be making a flip chart calendar. On each

flip page, you'll decorate it with information about the days of the week and write in Hebrew each day of the week. You can draw and write reminders for what happens on Mondays, Tuesdays, etc. (We'll have a lot of amazing art materials to use!)

Interestingly, in Hebrew the days of the week start with Sunday which is called Yom Rishon or Day 1. Monday is Yom Shaynee or Day 2. We count up to Shabbat. It's a spiritual practice each day as a reminder that Shabbat is our goal of the week and our respite in time to recalibrate after each work and school week. Shabbat is our taste of paradise, a chance to slow down, to enjoy all that has been created and to gather with friends and family for prayers, songs and meals.

As Psalm 90:12 tells us, "Teach us to number our days that we may gain a heart of wisdom." Let us make each day count!

Behind The Scenes

Almost two years ago, a task force was convened to review the Temple Beth-El Bylaws. These Bylaws set forth the rules under which the Board of Directors govern.

The Task Force was charged with reviewing the Bylaws to assure effectiveness, relevance and, most importantly, to ensure that the governance structure met the needs of our growing congregation. Some of you may recall that a special meeting of the congregation was held last March, and the new Bylaws were approved and went into effect July 1. After 8 months of operating under the new bylaws, it now seems the appropriate time to inform you of the work, goals and plans of the TBE Board of Directors.

The most significant change in the structure of the Board was to reduce the overall size. This change has given us the opportunity to engage in more fruitful and informed discussions. We have spent a great deal of time establishing clear priorities so that we can move forward in a thoughtful way. Our focus has been to identify ways in which the Board can create initiatives, programs and policies that continue the upward trajectory that Temple Beth-El is on.

We are a strong community that has benefited from the leadership of the Clergy, Senior staff, and lay leaders. Our membership continues to grow as does the enthusiasm of our

members. As lay leaders we know that it is our responsibility to guide this path. Our primary goals are to ensure ou long-term financial

security, meet the spiritual and social needs of our members and to enhance our sense of community.

Currently, the Board is discussing three major initiatives. First, we are planning a review of our current mission and vision statement to be sure that it reflects our values and overall direction. Second, we are developing a strategic planning initiative to provide us with an operating framework for the next several years. Third, the Board hopes to participate in a URJ effort to ensure a safe, equitable and respectful workplace through the creation of a TBE Code of Ethics. We are in the very preliminary stages of our discussions on all three of these efforts. As we move forward, we will keep you informed and periodically seek your feedback.

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

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
