CNT To Produce Boffo Purim Spiel With Celebrity Talent



Jeff Leibow, an actor and producer who starred in the internationally acclaimed musical "Jersey Boys," and Colleen Freedman, a choreographer who danced with the likes of Backstreet Boys, Katy Perry, Lady Gaga, and Paula Abdul, are joining theatrical forces with Congregation Ner Tamid's Cantor Jessica Hutchings to produce "The Little Mermaid Purim Spiel" at the synagogue on Sunday, March 13, 2022, at 10:30 a.m.

"For almost eight years, the Purim Spiel has become the event of the year for dozens of our aspiring actors and musicians in our Religious School, and I'm elated to bring back our full stage production Spiel," Cantor Hutchings said. "It is a chance for 26 of our students to take to the stage, Jewishly. This year, we swim to Disney's 'The Little Mermaid' as our inspirational theme. With a hero and a villain in the plot, and through the lens of mermaids, we will tell our ancient Purim story from persecution to freedom."

Leibow, a Congregation member who for seven years starred as The Four Seasons' Nick Massi in the Las Vegas production of "Jersey Boys," and who produces charity events for the Neurofibromatosis Network, will be directing the CNT cast. "Every opportunity I have to lend my musical talents to the temple, I do, and when Cantor Hutchings approached me about directing this year's Spiel, I jumped at the chance," he said.

"I've been a part of the Spiel for a few years, and you see the comradery between all of the students," said choreographer Freedman, who has also worked on multiple TV shows and movies including "Dancing with the Stars," "Glee," "La La Land," "The Greatest Showman," and "True Blood." "It's been really neat to see how the kids have grown over the years."


Even though Congregant Freedman is currently pursuing a law degree at UNLV, she is making time to teach the synagogue's kids how to dance their way through their fishy tale.

PRESIDENTIAL PERSPECTIVES

You recently received an email from Edward Simon, our Executive Director, regarding security measures approved by the Board of Trustees. This was in response to the latest attack on a synagogue in Texas as well as the significant increase in antisemitic threats and activity both nationally and in our community. While we have provided armed security over the past several years for High Holidays, and the Yeshiva Day School has been providing armed security on the Campus during school hours, we have now instituted it during services and Sunday Religious School. The \$100 per year fee being assessed to each family covers this cost.



However, this security fee does not address the full cost of providing a secure environment when you are on our Campus. In the world we now live in, armed security is not the complete answer to protecting you and our Campus. For the past several months we have been evaluating our existing security infrastructure and security procedures. We have recently received proposals to upgrade both, and the Board will be addressing this in short-order, including funding from existing moneys, projected revenues, grants, and additional gifts.

As I write this article the Omicron variant is receding, but we have no idea what the situation will be when you read this or what it will be in the weeks or months ahead. As you know, our Covid committee will continue to address the protocols and procedures which have allowed us to provide you with services and programs while at the same time seeking to protect you.

But there is another story that has been unfolding over the past two years, which has been somewhat overshadowed by the pandemic. Despite all of the dislocation and uncertainty caused by the pandemic, we have reopened the Kantor ECEC and it is thriving. We have expanded our administrative staff, upgraded operating procedures and practices, and commenced the refurbishing, remodeling and expansion of our facilities. Our membership has shown significant growth with the addition of many young families, the religious school has record attendance, and our financial condition is healthy.

Just imagine what we will accomplish when we are back to "normal."

The old Jewish joke which defines most of our holidays goes like this, "They tried to kill us. We won. Let's eat!"

Like most humor, there is a certain amount of truth to this joke. While most of our holidays do not focus on our imminent demise (think Yom Kippur, Rosh Hashana, Tu B'shvat, and *Shabbat* to name a few), there are holidays that do commemorate our victory over oppression (think Chanukah, Passover, Yom Hashoa to name a few).

This month's holiday – Purim – also falls into this category.

A sadly familiar tale of a government that turns against our people and our very existence is threatened.

We win because of the bravery of Esther and Mordecai.

The ideal victory, however, would be to live in a time when antisemitism itself was vanquished. We do not live in this world. And while the "threat level" may not approach many periods in Jewish history, it is enough to cause us concern at a level that has not been seen in many years. Antisemitism and xenophobia have morphed throughout Jewish history. Names and accusations including "Christ-killers," "poisoners of wells," "responsible for the Black Plague," "blood libels," "inferior race" and "racist Zionists" have all been leveled at us. In today's day of social media, it doesn't take much to accuse us of something absurd, nor does it take much for someone reading these posts to go down the "rabbit hole" of believing in these accusations.

The recent banning of the graphic novel <u>Maus</u> by a board of education in Tennessee demonstrates the need to make sure our educational system understands the importance of teaching about the Holocaust which by definition is a subject that recounts the murder of six million Jews. Hard to teach this subject and sugarcoat it at the same time. Students today who are so desensitized to violence, thanks to video games and movies and TV shows, need to be taught these sad truths so they will understand that history is not a comic book; but something far more serious.

Whoopi Goldberg's lack of understanding about the root cause of the Holocaust was not an act of antisemitism, but surely an act of ignorance by someone who should know better. The fact she didn't understand the Holocaust occurred because of Nazi racism presents itself as a teachable moment. I hope it will be viewed this way.

While I often preach we need to teach the "joy" of Judaism and not just the "oy," there are moments that should remind us that both are what have shaped our values and our dreams. When the Hamans of the world rear their ugly heads, we cannot, must not be silent. In modeling the action of Queen Esther, we understand the importance of speaking truth to power.

Rabbi Akselrad's Compelling Conversations YouTube Premiere Wednesday, March 9

7:00 p.m.

What is antisemitism, and why do we see more of it on college campuses today? These are two tough questions to tackle, but one organization, The Maccabee Task Force, is doing just that at more than 100 college campuses across America.

David Brog is the executive director of The Maccabee Task Force, and he's Rabbi Akselrad's guest on a new episode of Compelling Conversations that will premiere on Congregation Ner Tamid's YouTube channel on Wednesday, March 9, 2022, at 7:00 p.m.

The Maccabee Task Force was created in 2015 to combat the disturbing spread of antisemitism on America's college campuses. The organization believes the BDS movement is at the forefront of this troubling trend and maintain that BDS is an antisemitic movement that crosses the line from legitimate criticism of Israel into the dangerous demonization of Israel and its supporters. They are determined to help students combat this hate by bringing them the strategies and resources they need to tell the truth about Israel.

David said his group has identified strategies that work including the cornerstone of his program, sponsoring trips to Israel for college campus leaders and influencers. When in Israel, they get to talk to pro- and anti-Israel activists and discover much of what they thought they knew about Israel and Jewish people is based on misinformation. The Maccabee Task Force combats hate by giving the opportunity for influential campus leaders to learn the truth firsthand in the Holy Land.

Local podcaster Ira David Sternberg moderates this compelling conversation.

Berlin-Tomaro New Director Of CNT's Kantor Early Childhood Education Center

Farrah Berlin-Tomaro has been hired to helm Congregation Ner Tamid's Gary & Lynn Kantor Early Childhood Education Center.

Originally from Southern California, Tomaro moved to Las Vegas as a child and earned her Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education Administration and a Master's degree in Special Education, Autism, and Behavioral Science at UNLV. She also completed some doctoral studies in Early Childhood Education at UNLV and has engaged in behavioral therapy with children with autism and developmental delays.



"I have worked in early childhood education in the Las Vegas Valley since 2008," Tomaro said. "I have knowledge in this area and a huge interest in using my talents to help grow The Kantor ECEC. In addition to my experience growing up Jewish, I have also spent time working in Jewish private schools and incorporating traditions and customs into the classrooms and beyond. I am excited to play an administrative role and be able to put that experience, along with Jewish education, towards The Kantor ECEC's strong foundation."

Tomaro said a child's earliest educational experiences set the stage for all learning throughout life, and she wants The Kantor ECEC to be a place where enrolled 18-month to Pre-K kids acquire social, emotional, and academic skills through sensory play.

"There's a lot of really passionate people here and some amazing families involved, and it seems like everybody is all in to move things forward," she said. "I'm honored to help accelerate all the amazing things that have already been started."

Tomaro will replace Karen Stern as Preschool Director, who plans to stay at The Kantor ECEC to teach and assist in Tomaro's transition.

"I'm not truly leaving," Stern said, "and I'm still going to be a part of the school, but I'm handing over the baton to Farrah because I know when she takes over, she's going to help the school grow. She's coming in with fresh ideas on how she wants to create an amazing program, and she's coming with a whole new skill set and qualifications."

"Karen has done an amazing job restarting our school, taking us from zero students to a thriving educational center," Edward Simon, Congregation Ner Tamid's executive director, said. "And we're really excited to have Farrah come on board who has expertise in early childhood education and can only add to what has already been established. We're really excited to have an expert educator on staff."

Better Than Box Mix Chocolate Brownies

CNT Sisterhood and CNT Little Sisters held a FLOUR POWER Zoom on Thursday, Feb. 17, to show congregants how to bake a sweet treat for *Shabbat*. Prep Time, 15 minutes • Cook Time, 30 minutes • Total Time, 45 minutes Servings, 15 • Calories, 366

Ingredients – 1 cup butter (2 sticks), 2 1/4 cups sugar, 4 large eggs, 1 1/4 cups cocoa powder, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 tbsp. vanilla, 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, 1 cup chocolate chips

Instructions – 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. 2. Line a 9x13 baking dish with foil, allowing it to hang over the edges. Spray foil with non-stick spray and set aside. 3. In a small pot, melt butter over medium low heat. Once completely melted, add in the sugar and stir together. Continue cooking for 1-2 minutes, stirring continually. Don't let it boil. 4. Pour the butter/sugar mixture into a large bowl (or your stand mixer bowl). Add in cocoa powder and mix to combine. 5. Add in eggs, salt, baking powder and vanilla. Beat until fully incorporated. 6. With the mixer on low, slowly add in flour until just combined. 7. Stir in chocolate chips and make sure they are evenly distributed. 8. Pour the batter into your prepared pan and bake for approximately 30 minutes, until a toothpick comes out with moist crumbs attached. 9. Cool in the pan on a wire rack. 10. Once cool, lift the brownies out of the pan using the foil overhang. Peel back the foil and cut into squares.

MENSCH CLUB



NEVADANS FOR THE COMMON GOOD

"...What elevates us in life is not what we receive but what we give. The more of ourselves that we give, the greater we become." Rabbi Jonathan Sacks' words are the foundation for the work of Nevadans For The Common Good. Even during the Covid pandemic, NCG has been striving to assist the Las Vegas and Henderson communities with its challenges and difficulties. Housing shortages and evictions and food shortages continue to plague our friends and neighbors nearby. Our NCG Henderson Strategy Team, comprised of synagogue and church NCG members, is working diligently with the local community on these issues.

DID YOU KNOW: Substance abuse is widely considered to be an epidemic on United States college campuses today. Alcohol abuse and illicit drug use are on the upswing, exacerbated by Covid and its effects on student life. Alcohol, marijuana, cocaine, heroin, fentanyl, and prescription drugs such as Adderal, Oxycontin, and Ritalin are widely used nationwide on campuses and also here in Nevada. In addition, drinking and driving (DUI) accidents and student rape incidents have been increasing dramatically. Consequently, NCG's Addiction & Recovery Group, based at Congregation Ner Tamid, is actively working on a four-part educational series on substance use and ensuing disorders for UNLV students to be presented in February and March in conjunction with Roberta Sabbath, a member of CNT and the Religious Study Coordinator for the UNLV Campus & Community Partnership.

As well, our NCG Lead Organizer, Anna Eng, and NCG CNT Steering Committee leaders will be meeting shortly with Rabbi Akselrad and the CNT Board to discuss NCG actions, including Listening Sessions and other strategic plans to take place within the next few months.
