

PRESIDENTIAL PERSPECTIVES

During the Summer of 2020, with the Campus shut down and most of our programs suspended, we faced the immediate challenges of hosting remote Services, Religious School instruction, and closing down our Preschool. We knew that how we would communicate with our Congregants and our outside community was important and essential. Assessing our then means of communication, including our website, bulletin (which had been suspended), and emails, it was apparent we needed to do more.

Our initial goals for upgrading our ability to better communicate with our Congregants were to restart the publication of the bulletin and upgrade our website. We knew that what we were doing in the short



term was okay, but additional programming and communication efforts would have to be addressed once the Covid-19 pandemic receded. When Ed Simon joined us as executive director, he determined that a full-time programming and communications coordinator was essential to achieve what was required long term.

So, Ed began the process of interviewing and hiring a person with the required skill set. And less than a year ago, he recommended, and we approved, the hiring of Leslie Snadowsky as our programming and communications coordinator. Again, we knew that what we were doing for programming and communications was okay, but we had no idea where it could go from there. Leslie, as the professional in this area, knew.

The changes to our printed and digital materials, programming and our means of communications have been incremental and subtle, and, as such, the totality of these changes cannot be easily recognized and appreciated – the bulletin for example. And while this has been achieved through the joint efforts of our staff, clergy, lay leadership, and many Congregants, maybe understanding and appreciating Leslie's contribution is best through third-party validation.

The Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) is the largest organization for programming and communications coordinators in the United States with a membership of more than 31,000 professionals. It has a significant and active local membership (after all, this is Las Vegas/ Henderson), and each year the local chapter recognizes and honors excellence in public relations with its Pinnacle Awards competition. Last year, Pinnacle Awards winners included UNLV, Cleveland Clinic, The Howard Hughes Corporation, Touro University, and Sunrise Hospital.

This year, the PRSA announced Leslie and CNT will be honored ELEVEN times at its Pinnacle Awards ceremony. Leslie will accept the awards at the PRSA dinner, at the DragonRidge Country Club, on **Tuesday, November 15**, **2022**, and we intend to be there to show our appreciation for what Leslie has accomplished for CNT.

As a student of the Holocaust, I am always amazed at the number of stories that have arisen over time. Beyond the stories of the horror of the Holocaust are the stories of heroism, miraculous escapes, and extraordinary kindness and courage. We have all heard of Oskar Schindler, but less well-known and equally significant is the story of Wilfrid Israel. Some have called him the "Jewish" Oskar Schindler, because he, too, risked his life to save Jews during the Holocaust. In fact, he saved many times more Jews than Schindler did.

Wilfrid Israel was the owner of Berlin's largest department store and a member of one of Germany's most prominent Jewish families. He helped save thousands of Jewish children through the Kindertransport operation and secured the escape for hundreds of his employees and

their family members from Nazi Germany. Yonatan Nir learned of this incredible act of heroism growing up on his Kibbutz in Israel which had been founded by Jews saved by Wilfrid Israel. As an adult, he became a filmmaker and produced an incredible documentary that has been shown around the world, winning many prestigious prizes. Through the generosity of my dear friend Gard Jameson, Yonatan will be coming to Las Vegas to show his film and talk personally about the making of the film. There will be two showings. One will be at King David Memorial Chapel on **Wednesday**, **November 9, 2022, at 6:00 p.m.**, in commemoration of Kristallnacht – the night of broken glass –



which many scholars feel was the start of the Holocaust. The second screening will be at Ner Tamid immediately following services on **Friday, November 11**. Services will start at **6:15 p.m.** and will be abbreviated. Both screenings are open to the public at no charge. I strongly encourage you to attend one of these screenings and to bring older children to this event.

Too often lost amongst the many stories from the Holocaust are the stories of Jewish heroism. In a world filled with darkness, this individual's light was a beacon of hope that saved thousands of Jews. This is a story that needs to be told and heard.



#AskFarrah - Learning With Music

Q. Why is it important to expose children to music at an early age?

According to Howard Gardner's Theory of Multiple Intelligences, music is the first intelligence we gain and the last one we lose. It's why we can remember a tune from our childhood, even when we're decades into adulthood. Music is also one of the first ways children experience math! Our bodies react to music when we're rocked to sleep as babies. It's that early that we begin to develop a steady beat and rhythm. This leads to recognizing and working with patterns, as well as one-to-one

correspondence (ex: touching each bead as I count aloud). All of these experiences lead to a strong development of math skills. This is one of the many reasons it's so important to have a strong music

program in our schools.

We are fortunate to have Glori Rosenberger lead our music program at The Kantor ECEC. Glori is our Pre-Kindergarten Teacher AND teaches Music & Movement to our Preschool classes. She leads Preschool's Shabbat Sing, getting our little ones dancing and singing each Friday, as well as Havdalah to begin our week each Monday. Glori has been teaching for more than 30 years. She has a minor in Music and a Masters Degree in Creative Arts. She has been involved



with Congregation Ner Tamid for almost 30 years! She is the Religious School song leader and has been a member of the choir for decades, in addition to being a member of the infamous, Shabbatones!

We have been having a great time in Preschool! Our High Holy Days just wrapped up and gave us the opportunity for tot-friendly services followed by a Kantor 'Craftivity,' in our courtyard. 

Holocaust's Unsung Hero To Be Highlighted At Kristallnacht Commemoration And At CNT; Film Director To Speak

Theoretical physicist Albert Einstein said, "Never in my life have I come in contact with a being so noble, so strong, or as selfless as Wilfrid Israel." High praise for Israel, the Holocaust's unsung hero who's credited for saving 15 times more people than Oskar Schindler during WWII. As part of this year's Board of Rabbis of Southern Nevada's Kristallnacht commemoration, there will be two special screenings of the 71-minute documentary "The Essential Link: The Story of Wilfrid Israel." The first will take place on **Wednesday, November 9, 2022, at 6:00 p.m.**, at King David Memorial Chapel & Cemetery, 2697 E. Eldorado Ln., and the second will take place on **Friday, November 11**, at Congregation Ner Tamid, 55 N. Valle Verde Dr., **after 6:15 p.m. Services**. Rabbi Sanford Akselrad will also hold a



pre-screening discussion with the film's director Yonatan Nir for his CNT award-winning webcast "Compelling Conversation." Both screenings are free and open to the public and will be attended by Nir. Gard Jameson, Chair of the Interfaith Council of Southern Nevada, helped facilitate the movie screenings and Nir's appearances. He said Israel is an example of a man who championed the three articles of the Universe's Bill of Rights: to be unconditionally loved and to love; to belong within a compassionate community, and; to become the person that the universe intends for each of us to become.



"These three Articles are underscored by this documentary, 'The Essential Link,' and are foundational to all religions," Jameson said. "Wilfred Israel stood up as a champion for these three rights, by responding; so must we! May our Intention rise up to meet the Unity that we discover in our Diversity; that is the credo of interfaith relations."

Israel, a wealthy Jewish businessman, and owner of Berlin's largest department store in the 1930s, was a member of one of Germany's most prominent Jewish families and was involved in saving

tens of thousands of Jews during WWII. Israel enabled the emigration of the Jewish employees of his firm, ransomed thousands of Jewish and anti-Nazi prisoners from German concentration camps, and played a key role in the Kindertransport operation that saved the lives of nearly ten thousand unaccompanied Jewish children who were brought to Britain.

He was also acquainted with some of the most influential figures of the 20th century, yet little is known about his personal life and heroic endeavors. Nir's film delves into Israel's mysterious story and documents the real reasons for his disappearance from history.

"I grew up in a Kibbutz in northern Israel, and my grandparents were among its founders," Director Nir said. "In the center of this Kibbutz, there is a big house that was built in the 1940s, which is called 'The Wilfrid's House.' So I knew the name Wilfrid from a very young age, but nobody in the Kibbutz knew who was this Wilfrid that the house



was called after. It almost seemed, like the founders of the Kibbutz who knew his story kept it secret. When I read Naomi Shepherd's great book about Wilfrid Israel's life <u>Wilfrid Israel</u>, <u>German Jewry's Secret Ambassador</u>, and found in the Kibbutz archives letters to Wilfrid Israel from people



like Albert Einstein, I realized that there is a huge story hidden in the place where my family lived for three generations, and I became very curious. That was my inspiration to make this film."

"Much has been written and portrayed in the cinema about non-Jews who helped save Jews during the Holocaust," Congregation Ner Tamid's Rabbi Sanford Akselrad said. "Those stories are extremely important. But this award-winning documentary covers an area of history that has rarely been touched upon. While we are all familiar with the story of Oskar Schindler, few know the story of how Wilfred Israel saved several times as many Jews. Moreover, he, himself, was Jewish and risked everything to help save so many lives. This documentary

sheds new light on a rarely documented subject of how Jews also put themselves at risk to save their fellow Jews. This is a fascinating story of courage and heroism."

"I think this film taught me a lot about memory and collective memory of the Holocaust," Director Nir said. "I mean everybody knew Wilfrid Israel, the most important Jewish figure of that time, and admired him. Yet his story was kept untold for seven decades. Why? That's what the film is about... I can just say that in the last decade of his life, from the moment Hitler came to power, Wilfrid Israel used all his amazing qualities and connections as well as a lot of his family's fortune, to help save many thousands of Jews. I was, and I am still amazed by his courage and dedication and high value. He was a true inspiration."

"The hope in bringing this documentary to Southern Nevada is to elicit 'responsibility,' in a time that cries out for more people to be like Wilfred Israel!" Interfaith Council of Southern Nevada's Jameson said. "As my teacher, Elie Wiesel taught me, 'the opposite of love is indifference.' May we live this life affirming our responsibility in our thoughts, words, and acts."

He brought the new Torah to CNT and inscribed several of the remaining letters with the Chernikoff family and Members of the Congregation including Rabbi Akselrad and his wife Joni, CNT's Board of

Directors, Sisterhood, MENSch Club, Ritual Committee, Minyan, Social Action, Nevadans For The Common Good, Religious School, Membership Committee and Interfaith Council. All received certificates.

Helene's Rugelach



Ingredients – 1/2 pound unsalted butter, 1/2 pound cream cheese, 2 cups all-purpose flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tbs. cinnamon, (blend sugar and cinnamon ingredients well) **Directions** – 1. Let butter and cream cheese

come to room temperature. 2. Mix together and blend well. 3. Gradually add flour. 4. Divide into four parts and roll into balls. 5. Wrap in waxed paper and refrigerate overnight. 6. The next day let the dough stand out of the refrigerator 2-3 hours before rolling out. 7. Roll each one into an oblong on a floured surface.

- 8. Sprinkle with mini chocolate chips and chopped walnuts and cinnamon sugar mixture.
- 9. Roll up lengthwise and cut into 1-inch pieces.
- 10. Place on baking sheet which has been lined with parchment paper and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar mixture. 11. Bake at 385

degrees for approximately 20 minutes.

Options:

You can use raisins instead of mini chips. You can spread dough with preserves (apricot and raspberry work best) before sprinkling with nuts and cinnamon sugar mixture.

The yield is about 50 pieces.



"While Jews have been instrumental in establishing the field of psychology.... the Jewish community, like society in general, is not always comfortable openly talking about mental illness or dealing with those who suffer from it." – My Jewish Learning

Many, many years ago, when a family member was struggling with residual depression due to a cancer diagnosis, she sought services from a counselor. We, my family, were to keep this a secret. No one talked about mental health back then. That was private and was not to be shared.

Fast forward 45 years. Do we talk about mental health now, or is it still a family secret? And, if the secret must be kept, do we then seek services, or not?

Nevadans for the Common Good is taking on this issue of mental health. How do we do it? Obviously, the topic itself is too giant to take on, so we break it down. We break it down by talking to people, and we host listening sessions. Listening sessions bring people together. We listen to what people have to say, track trends, and act politically to solve the issue by meeting with power people and politicians.


How comfortable are you when it comes to talking about mental health? Many people may

answer, "uncomfortable." Stigma takes over, and "oh my gosh! Don't let anyone know!"

This month, I'm asking you to throw stigma and discomfort aside and come talk to us. We are hosting a listening session at CNT on **Tuesday**, **November 29, 2022, at 6:30 p.m.** We will sit in small groups and listen to what you have to say about mental health. Are you able to access services? Do co-occurring disorders complicate access to services? Is your counselor a good fit for you? Do you feel alone and isolated? Whatever the issue, whatever you, someone in your family, or a friend is experiencing, we want to hear about it.

Nevadans for the Common Good cannot tell a politician, "Everyone is worried about the cost of services" – unless you are. Join us on November 29.
