
THE 2023 ADULT B'NAI MITZVAH CLASS



(1) Sonya Haggerty was born in the early 70's to a Holocaust survivor. Above all I want to make a difference... to leave this world a better place (for my/our kids) than I found it."

- (2) Ann Brandt, a native of Connecticut, received her B.S. from the University of Connecticut and her M.S. from the University of Bridgeport. One week after graduation she married Lee and moved to Maine where she taught grade six while he finished his tour of duty as a Staff Judge Advocate. They then moved back to CT. and Lee opened his law practice while Ann taught kindergarten, her favorite grade. In time they had children: Donna and Susan. And then the unthinkable happened when Lee died of cancer. Ann went back to teaching_nursery school, Headstart, and Sunday school_and pursued her interest in politics, being elected twice to represent her district in the Representative Town Meeting. Three years later she was introduced to Sid who lived in California and had three teenagers: Larry, David and Linda. - (3) John Henderson converted to Judaism in February, 2019, after several years of study at Congregation Beth Israel in Scottsdale, Arizona. He moved to Las Vegas for a few-year stint as an owner of Rachel's Kitchen, and ultimately found CNT. Since joining CNT, John has been active in the music programs, most notably as the regular guitarist for the "Shabbat in the Round" service. John loves the study of Judaism and has enjoyed working with his fellow students. Outside of CNT, John is the CIO of WorldStrides, a father of five, a grandfather of two and one on the way, a huge fan of the Alabama Crimson Tide, and the husband of Morah Pamela.
- (4) Mindy Bachrach is originally from Brooklyn, where she was one of four siblings raised in a Conservative Jewish family. While her bothers both became Bar Mitzvah, Mindy and her sister did not. - (7) Valerie Catallozzi became a Jew-by-Choice in 2019 after meeting her Jewish boyfriend, Sandy, several years earlier. His love of Judaism was infectious, and it sparked her interest in studying Judaism and her desire to become Jewish. When CNT announced the year-long Adult B'Nai Mitzvah program, Valerie knew this was the next important step in her Jewish education. The ABM program has given her an opportunity to better understand Hebrew and Jewish ideology on a much deeper level, as well as making life-long friends with her fellow classmates. - (9) Lauren Vogel Friedman has had it on her bucket list since she was 13 (now 51) to become a Bat Mitzvah. When this opportunity presented itself, she grabbed her buddy Sonya, who had a similar goal, and signed up. Lauren has embraced learning to read Hebrew, studying the history of Judaism and is looking forward to reading from the Torah as a Bat Mitzvah. Lauren is leading by example for her children, by taking on the motto "it's never too late to achieve a goal." She is driven by passion and trust in herself all while making the class laugh when they're all feeling a little meshuga.

What is an Adult B'nai Mitzvah?

A bar or bat mitzvah is a Jew who chooses to make a public acknowledgement of his or her status as an adult within the Jewish community. This ritual traditionally occurs at the age of 13, but some Jews participate in the ceremony later in life.

For the eight people in this class, becoming a bar or bat mitzvah (literally, a "son or daughter of the Commandment") has been a meaningful religious experience. They lead this morning's worship service following twelve months of intense study during which they learned to read Hebrew, to understand the history and culture of the Jewish people, and to appreciate the value of Judaism in their lives.

Over the course of the past year, they transitioned from eight individuals experiencing a personal rite of passage to a close circle of friends sharing a journey of discovery. They appreciate the family and friends who supported them in this endeavor.

The Elements of Jewish Worship

The Time: Based on the story of Creation in the Book of Genesis, the Sabbath (Shabbat, in Hebrew) is observed from sunset on Friday through sunset on Saturday.

The Place: This building is known in Hebrew as a beit knesset (meeting house) and in English as a synagogue (from the Greek word for "meeting"). The raised platform in front is a bimah and the curtained area is the aron ha-kodesh, or Holy Ark. In accordance with the Second Commandment ("You shall not make for yourself an image"), there are no pictures or statues of people or animals within this sacred space.

The People: The service is officiated by Rabbi Sanford Akselrad and Cantor Jessica Hutchings, although most of this morning's worship will be led by the ABM class members. Congregants are invited to participate in the service by reading and singing, as well as by standing in respect at various moments. There is no kneeling in Jewish worship.

The Objects:

The aron ha-kodesh (Holy Ark) contains the Torah scrolls. One will be taken out to be read by the ABM class members during the service.

The Torah scrolls are hand-written Hebrew copies of the Five Books of Moses: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Number and Deuteronomy. The text is divided into 52 parashot (portions), and one is read each Shabbat morning. In this way, the entire text is completed each year. This morning's reading comes from Bo (Exodus 10:1-13:16), and will be followed by the Haftarah, a passage from the books of the Prophets (Jeremiah 46:13-28).

The siddur (prayer book) is written in both English and Hebrew. It contains a variety of traditional prayers, Biblical passages and modern poetry and prose designed to enhance the worshipper's connection with the Divine. Its title, Mishkan T'fillah, means "dwelling place (of) prayer."

The kippah (skullcap) is a small headcovering meant to remind the wearer that s/he is in the presence of God.

The tallit (prayer shawl) is worn by adult Jews, following the commandment to wear a "fringed garment" (Numbers 15). Each B'nai Mitzvah student will receive a tallit at the beginning of this morning's service.
